## THIRTEEN-PERIOD CALENDAR FOR 1935

For a number of years the practice of dividing the year into 13 periods of 4 weeks each has been gaining favor in business. Divided this way, any period is directly comparable to any other period.

The varying number of calendar days, working days, Saturdays, etc., in different months of the ordinary 12 month calendar often distorts seriously such vital statistics of business as sales, costs, production, payrolls, etc. For National Dairy users who record such facts on a weekly or four weekly basis, the 1935 Official 13 period calendar is presented by courtesy of the International Fixed Calendar League, Rochester, N. Y.

Dean E. Batchelder writes:

We thought you might be interested to know of the desert rattlesnake<sup>\*</sup> found to have 8 birds probably goldfinches in its stomach. The rattlesnake was light colored and about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ft. long.

The snake was killed during the latter part of May --- at Diversion No. 3 headquarters camp on the Aqueduct about 10 mi. N. of Desert Center. There was a lawn garden and bird-bath or small fountain near where the snake was found. These features attracted an unusual number of birds.

The snake's stomach I had cut open due to my curiosity but I was much surprised to find the 8 birds within, each swallowed head first."

\* I identified as mitschellii from a piece of skin submitted to me.

Here we collected Uta stans, Uta micro and skulls. Oreuttis were seen but not collected. Also whiptails 1 mi. further along. Callisaurus was seen 1 and 5 mi. north of the Rio de las Flores crossing. This was quite unexpected. The identification was certain: although specimens were not secured. Utas were seen 7 mi S. of Lake San Faustino. Utas and whips and oreuttis at Lake San Faustino.

Stopped for lunch 5 mi N. of Lake San Faustino (= Agua Hechicera) at 4100 ft. Collected a few specimens. Left at 1 P.M. Got a dried toad at <sup>1 mi N.</sup> 7 mi this point later identified as californicus.

Horned toad, skulls and utas at El Compadre. Skulls and utas at Hehi. Small racer shot crossing the road 4 mi. S.E. of Hehi (call it Hehi, Heji)
