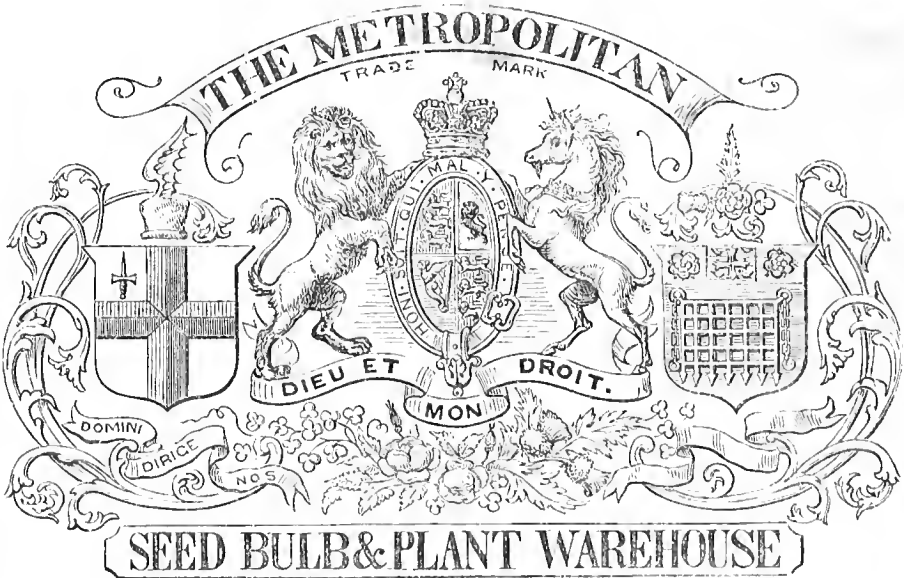

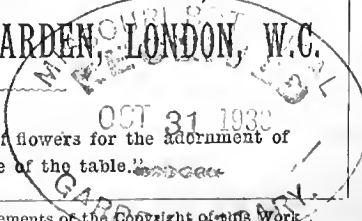

SPECIAL NOTICES.

- I. **The Quality of Seeds.**—The growth of Seeds we test under glass immediately they arrive from the growers, and the purity of the "stocks" we prove at our Experimental Grounds.
- II. **Vegetable Seeds, page 61.**—We quote only the best varieties, and take every possible care to have the finest "stocks," and to attain this a constant series of comparative tests is maintained at our Vegetable Trial Grounds.
- III. **Flower Seeds, page 14.**—Our list embraces a selection of the finest varieties, and the most advanced types in the respective families.
- IV. **Gladstoll, page 66.**—These are, perhaps, of all bulbous plants the most valuable for effect in the flower garden, and to cut for vases.
- V. **Lilies, page 67.**—Our collection represents every variety of merit, and consists of representatives from China, Japan, the Himalayas, the Neilgherries, Cashmere, California, Canada, the United States, British Columbia, the Caucasus, Siberia, the Pyrenees, the Maritime Alps, European Turkey, the Levant, &c.
- VI. **Iris, page 69.**—Our collection is the finest in Europe, and to assist amateurs it is arranged in natural groups, to facilitate their making selections. The varieties of Iris Barbata are grand decorative plants for the margins of lakes, ponds, and such places; while for wild gardens, shrubberies, and woodland walks they are unrivalled, and as cut flowers for vases unsurpassed. Of the Beardless Iris, *page 72*, a group from our plants was figured in *The Garden*, 20th December, 1879. The Japanese Flag Iris (Iris *Kämpferi*), *page 72*, two varieties, of which we have the entire stock, were figured in *The Garden*, 20th August, 1879.
- VII. **Miscellaneous Bulbs**—Our collection of these is exceedingly extensive, so that a constant display is maintained throughout the year by one sort or another. On *pp. 11 and 12*, and *pp. 73, 74, and 75*, are a few bulbs and plants we recommend, especially *Anemone fulgens*, *page 12*, and the Japanese Hyacinth Lily, *page 73*, New Lenten Roses, and New Double Pyrethrums, *page 74*.
- VIII. **Carriage** is allowed on orders of 21s. and upwards, to any Railway Station in England and Wales, to Edinburgh and Glasgow, and to Stations on the North British, Caledonian and Scottish Central Lines, and to Dublin and Belfast. Also to Cork and Waterford, if by steambot from London, but only to Bristol if by railway, *en route* for Ireland. By rail, it is more expeditious; therefore, unless instructed, we shall forward *via Bristol or Holyhead*.
- IX. **Carriage to be deducted at settlement** in accordance with Par. VIII. Formerly we paid carriage in London; but relinquished this practice, as our "Carriage Paid" packages were not delivered as promptly as those not prepaid, and our customers had frequently to pay carriage also before they could get delivery of goods.
- X. **Orders paid in advance**, if in accordance with Par. VIII., can either be sent carriage paid, or a liberal equivalent in goods added. *This latter course will be adopted unless we are otherwise instructed.*
- XI. **Seeds in the Catalogue** which are quoted at "per packet," we forward post-paid.
- XII. **Packages.**—A small charge is made for these, and if returned within a fortnight, allowance will be made for the same. It is, however, necessary when the returned empties have been despatched, to notify to us the date, and the name of the Railway Company. The sender's name should appear on the label, for easy identification.
- XIII. **Fruit and Forest Trees, Shrubs, Plants in Pots, Soils, Watson's Lawn Sand, Wirework, Plant Cases and Stands, Gilbert's Hand Lights, Barr's Portable Cut Flower and Bouquet Transmission Cases, Heated Frames, Garden Engines and Water Barrows, Flower Boxes, Jardinets and Terra Cotta, Rustic, China, and Glass goods**—on these we do not allow carriage.
- XIV. **Five per cent.** may be deducted from accounts paid within one month from date of invoice.
- XV. **Post Office Orders** to be made payable at King Street Post Office, Covent Garden, W.C. All cheques to be crossed, adding the words "and Co." Small amounts may be paid in Postage Stamps, or coin may be sent in a registered letter.
- XVI. **Awards by the Royal Horticultural Society:—**
 For Daffodils, including the Weardale and Longford Bridge Collections two Gold Banksian Medals, a large gold-gilt Silver Floral Medal; also First Class Certificates for individual flowers.
 For Bearded Iris, two Banksian Medals, and for the Japanese Flag Iris, *I. Kämpferi*, three First Class Certificates.
 For Lilies, a Banksian Medal.
 For Double Pyrethrums, the most beautiful of May and June flowers, a Banksian Medal.
 For Miscellaneous Groups of Hardy Flowers, several Medals.
 For Indoor Conservatories furnished, several Medals.
 For Window Decorations and Window Conservatories, several Medals.
- Awards given by the Royal Botanic Society at their great Spring Show, 1877—
 First Prize for the best 12 Hyacinths, for the best 12 pots of Tulips, for the best 12 pots of Polyanthus Narcissus, and for the largest and finest Collection of Hyacinths.

NOTICES TO FOREIGN AND COLONIAL CORRESPONDENTS.

- XVII. To insure attention, *orders should be accompanied by a remittance, a draft, or an "order to pay,"* on a London agent. The remittance should be sufficient to cover the expense of cases, and also of carriage, if the freight is required to be paid in advance.
- XVIII. Seeds and bulbs can now be despatched to India, at the rate of 1s. per lb., in cases, through the Indian Parcels Post, and also in waterproof bags by the ordinary mail at 1s. 4d. per lb.
- XIX. In shipping plants to India, great care is exercised by us in selecting, preparing, and properly packing the same, and our consignments have, on the whole, been very successful. Still, there are so many contingencies, that we cannot, in any way, hold ourselves responsible for the condition in which the plants or bulbs reach their destination.
- XX. Our successful shipments of seeds to India have induced several of the Agricultural and Horticultural Societies there to entrust us with the execution of their orders for distribution amongst the members.

COLLECTIONS.

Stocks, Asters, Wallflowers, Balsams, Carnations, Pelargoniums, Etc.

DOUBLE STOCKS.

In our Experimental Grounds the following varieties of Stocks have proved to be the most distinct and decorative. They are of various heights, and suitable to the different styles of Gardening for which the Stock is so admirably adapted. All are desirable pot-plants, and greatly prized as cut flowers, both for their diversity of colour and fragrance. To have a continuous succession of bloom, sow at intervals from the beginning of March to the end of May; the first sowings should be made under glass, the later sowings where the plants are to bloom.

Large-flowered German Ten-Week Stock, height 1 ft.

For medium or large-sized beds either of one colour, or assorted colours, this is the best variety; it is of a compact, branching, robust growth, with large flowers, which are produced in great profusion.

For medium-sized beds, ribbons, etc., the Dwarf Chrysanthemum, the Dwarf Victoria, the Bouquet Elegantissima, and the German Emperor are the finest, being compact, and of even growth, bearing their flowers conspicuously above the foliage. To cut for bouquets, the Imbrique Pompon, and the Dwarf Bouquet Elegantissima, are most exquisite, the flowers ranging from the size of a Daisy to that of a Pompon Chrysanthemum.

The Aster, when in bloom, is by many lifted, potted, and used for conservatory decoration. THE RANUNCULUS.

The *Ranunculus* combines with great diversity in shade and colour an exquisite symmetry. It is valuable in spring bedding, or for ribbons, masses, and edgings, while as a cut flower it is as useful as the Rose.

CULTURE.—Plant from January to April in any good garden soil, choosing a dry day. Draw drills two inches deep and five or six inches apart, and press the tubers firmly into the soil, with the claws downwards, keeping the crown two inches under the surface. During severe weather, cover with dry litter, leaves, or old tan, but remove this before the foliage gets injured.

CULTURAL TREATMENT.—The growers for Covent Garden pot singly in 5 or 6-inch pots, and plunge in bottom heat, withholding water till the foliage appears, then giving it freely, and grow on in a house with a high temperature and a moist atmosphere, till the flower buds are developed, the plants can then be removed to a cool house. Success in developing the flower spike depends upon a uniform moist temperature. The bulbs for early flowering should be potted and plunged in bottom heat as soon as procured, taking care that the temperature of the house never falls below 60 deg. The successional plantings may be potted at once, and allowed to make root growth or the bulbs may be kept dry where the temperature does not fall below 50 degrees.

Scientific gardening has reached an epoch when sub-tropical or Leaf Gardens in any part of the three kingdoms are no longer a chimera. It is simply a question of the right place for the plants, the right plants for the place, and the treatment necessary to ensure success. In this style of gardening, the Cannas must necessarily take the prominent position: possessing, as it does, large picturesque foliage, varied both in form and colour, with a chasteness yet boldness of outline peculiar to itself, and which renders it an equally pleasing associate either with shrubs or flowers. Although we have alluded to the foliage only of these plants, it must not be forgotten that their flowers are very decorative, rising conspicuously, as they do, from amidst an amplitude of leaves.

A stock of Cannas is easily secured by sowing the seed early in spring in a strong moist heat, and the plants are decorative the first season; or the seed may be sown later to form rhizomes for another year.

The following varieties are a selection of those recently introduced, and we are glad of the opportunity to offer some important additions to the Cannas now cultivated in this country.

Some of the finest effects in our Experimental Grounds have been produced by the varieties of Imperialis, Heddewigii, Laciniatus, and Nannus. If seed is sown in autumn the plants stand the winter, and in summer each plant will form a complete bush. The flowers range in colour from the purest white to the deepest crimson and the most beautiful lilac. Seed may also be sown from March to May out of doors where intended to bloom for a summer and late autumn display.

Intermingled in small beds with the Variegated Alyssum, Cerastium, or White Centaurea, the effect of the blue Lobelia is very beautiful; but when associated with the Silver-leaved Grass (Dactylis elegantissima), the combination is chasteness perfected. Seeing the importance therefore attached to this plant, it is very desirable to have seed from a pure and a good stock.

For a Spring and early Summer display sow in September and October.

PEAS.

The arrangement and descriptive matter following are the results of personal observations at our Experimental Grounds, and at the Chiswick Gardens of the Royal Horticultural Society.

All new Peas, or old Peas with new names, which are not quoted by us, can be supplied at advertised prices; but intending purchasers of either of these two classes would do well to read the Report of the last important Pea Trials conducted at the Royal Horticultural Society's Gardens at Chiswick. It will be found in the *Journal of Horticulture*, 14th and 21st Nov., 1872. The Report is very full, fair, and unbiased in dealing with the would-be novelties in Peas which for years past have been foisted upon the public, unintentionally, perhaps, on the part of the introducers, but complimentary in the highest degree to the Peas which they had re-christened. No two Peas, perhaps, have more synonyms, and no two Peas are to be matched in quality with the *British Queen* and *Ne Plus Ultra*. Nine-tenths of the new Peas, excepting, of course, Mr. Laxton's hybrids, are either *British Queen* or *Ne Plus Ultra*. The Vegetable Trials at Chiswick, which are being conducted under the very able management of Mr. Barron, the superintendent, will prove of great advantage to the gardening community, exposing, as these trials do, the fabrication of new names to standard varieties, giving due importance to bona fide introductions, and also encouraging growers to maintain pure "stocks."

The varieties of Peas, and also other vegetable seeds which we enumerate and describe, are the best representatives of their classes. We mention this as, in our present edition, we have omitted the descriptions to many names, but have fully described the varieties most worthy of cultivation.

BORECOLE OR KALE.

On all hands it is asserted and accepted as a fact that the varieties of the Brassica family are liable to great variations, and no doubt this is correct, especially in the higher forms, such as Broccoli, Cauliflower, and Cabbage. This sportive character is made a pretext, however, for the confusion that exists amongst the names of Kales, but after several years' careful comparative tests—if we are to judge from the extreme purity of the stocks procured from a great variety of sources, and from which we conducted our experiments—we are of opinion that either great care is exercised by the growers in keeping the Kales pure, or they are not liable to sport, as we could see no deviation in our trials from the normal or typical forms of the plants; although there was any amount of variation in the names applied to the same variety of Kales.

The Kales enumerated are accurately described, so that any one interested in the subject will readily identify the varieties, and we may add these are the only Kales really worth cultivating for culinary purposes.

Asparagus Kale demands a special notice for itself. Under this name many seedsmen sell *Couve Tronchuda*; which is the *Portugal* or *Braganza Cabbage*, exceedingly delicate in flavour, and should be grown universally; but we object to the name "*Asparagus*" being attached to it; the leaves are more like blanched sea-kale. See our remarks, page 56. *Buda Kale* is also sold under this name, and not inappropriately so; in the spring it throws up an immense quantity of shoots, which may be blanched and served as *asparagus*. *Jerusalem* is likewise sold under this name, and we think it is the plant to which the name was originally attached. Under this name is also sold *Chou de Milan*. Even *Ragged Jack* is made to do duty, as also *Egyptian Kale*. Our object in making this statement is that our customers may select their own *Asparagus Kale*.

Section III.—EDIBLE ROOTED PLANTS.

BEET.

In our Experimental Grounds the varieties marked * have been tested and found perfectly pure; our customers may, therefore, confidently rely upon the seed producing fine roots of uniform size and quality.

For Illustrated Report of Beets grown at our Experimental Grounds, see "Gardeners' Magazine," 1870.

66. In the process of cooking, Beet is frequently made hard and unedible, and the seedsman or gardener made to bear the consequences of the cook's shortcomings. Following up our experimental trials, we have looked into the cook's department, and offer to our readers the following conclusions:—

1. In preparing Beet for cooking, the greatest care must be taken not to bruise the skin, or in any way wound the root; and if by accident any injury has been done to the root, bake and not boil it.
2. If a deep crimson hue is the colour preferred in the Beet, or a firm flesh, this is best attained by baking.
3. If a light, clear bright colour is desired, or a soft, juicy flesh, then boiling will secure this.
4. If a rich, agreeable flavour is sought for, then select the variety which, before cooking, has the most purple in it, and the flavour may be discovered by masticating a small portion of an uncooked root. If up to the mark, it will leave a rich agreeable flavour on the palate, without any sensation of astringency in the throat. Barr's selection of Nutting's Beet has the desired qualities in the highest degree.
5. Crimson-flesh Beets are all very rich in flavour; but when masticated uncooked, an astringency will be discovered as above described; this class of Beets, however, has its advantages, inasmuch as it can be sown earlier. Barr's selection of Pine Apple Beet is the most desirable of these; it may be sown very early and will not run to seed.
6. Scarlet-flesh Beet possesses least of the saccharine flavour, and Nonpareil best represents this class.

ONION.

The Fruit Committee of the Royal Horticultural Society awarded to us in 1869 a special certificate for the largest and finest collection of onions ever exhibited before them. A report of these at the period will be found in the "Gardener's Chronicle" and the "Journal of Horticulture." In the "Gardeners Weekly Magazine," in connection with the report, will be found illustrations of the different types of Onions, from specimens supplied by us, and grown at our Experimental Grounds.

Our Collection of Onions represented the varieties cultivated in this country, and also in Germany, France, Holland, and Portugal (the seed from Portugal being received from the British Consulate at Oporto); our object was to ascertain if the Onion of the grocers was peculiar to Portugal, or had a representative in this country. From a very careful examination we arrived at the conclusion that the Onion of the grocers is fairly represented, both as regards shape, size, and produce, in our brown-skinned varieties of *Globe, James' Keeping, and Pear-Shaped*, a preponderance of the *Pear-Shaped* being amongst those grown by us from the Oporto seed. We also found that the *Tripoli* varieties of Onion produced with us under ordinary treatment much larger bulbs than the Oporto Onion, while the autumn-sown *Trebons* stood out prominently for size and symmetry, thus proving that those fine imported Onions of the grocers are the result of a favourable climate, combined with the special attention which is given to the cultivation of this bulb in Portugal. Mr. Staudish of Ascot by means of superior cultivation produced from the Oporto seed as fine Onions as any imported.

One of the subjects which the Royal Horticultural Society had in hand during 1875 and 1876 was the Onion. The result of the trial has been fully reported in the various gardening periodicals, where the subject has been dealt with in a broad and very satisfactory manner. This is one of the instances illustrating the important national work which is progressing in connection with this Society, notwithstanding the conflicting interests which have kept it in an unsettled state for the last few years. From the results of this and similar experimental trials which are constantly going on at Chiswick under the able management of Mr. Barron, it is to be hoped that horticulturists will rally round the Society more than they have hitherto done, so that by its operations at Chiswick, it will be able to carry out more fully the great national work for which it was brought into existence.

We have re-arranged our list of Onions, so as to have the allied varieties under their respective heads; this we hope will be found serviceable to our customers in selecting. The first and second groups represent the Flat Onions; the third the *Globe-shaped*; the fourth the Italian Onions; the fifth the *Silver or White Skinned* Onions. The last two groups are mostly sown in Autumn for Spring and early Summer use; when sown in Spring they should be used early in the Autumn.

CELERY.

At the Chiswick Gardens of the Royal Horticultural Society, good service was done in 1874, by a very carefully conducted trial of Celery, in which was elicited the important fact that in this country the really distinct typical Celeries do not exceed four in number, and that the multitude of names are either synonyms, or represent merely trifling variations. Celeriac, or Turnip rooted Celery, is not included in the above remark, its cultivation, we regret to say, being very limited in this country. The examination of the different stocks of Celery grown at the trial, showed the importance of careful selections; still it is noteworthy that the best selected stocks of Celeries are only presentable at table in proportion to the care bestowed on their cultivation; trenching the soil and heavily manuring are indispensable, and during dry weather abundance of water should be given from time to time, to keep the plants growing. LILIUM. (Lilies.)

CULTURE OUT OF DOORS.—The Lily in its native habitat, is found growing amongst brushwood, long grass, on the margins of plantations, or in ravines, &c., and always in soil which is sweet and well drained; so that in choosing a situation for planting these, perfect drainage should be attended to. The borders of Rhododendron and Azalea beds are found admirably suited for lily culture; they also do well amongst dwarf shrubs, or intermingled with herbaceous plants, and in the proximity of trees which give shelter from the sun's rays after mid-day. We have seen *Lilium auratum* alternated with Roses, in the borders of Rhododendron beds, the stems of the lilies in some cases measuring 3 to 4 inches in circumference, and attaining a height of 11 feet, surmounted with from 50 to 100 blossoms. In preparing ground for Lilies, loosen the soil to a depth of several feet to secure the requisite drainage, intermixing fresh loam, peat, and coarse sand, or leaf soil instead of peat, care being taken that the soil is as free as possible from insect life, and the compost of such a character as not to cling to the bulb. Plant the bulbs at a depth of 6 inches, and if all things are equal they need not be disturbed for years. The bog or swamp-loving Lilies, *Superbum*, *Canadense*, and the varieties of *Pardalinum* succeed best in a moist peaty soil. Rockwork and artificial mounds are admirable for lilies, there being a choice of aspects and drainage—thus the bog-loving lilies may be planted at the bottom of the rockwork or mound in sandy peat.

CULTURE IN-DOORS.—The Lily when grown in pots does best in a compost of fibry loam and peat, with plenty of sand, or leaf soil and loam with sand, the top of the bulb covered at least two inches; the pots plunged in ashes out of doors, as recommended in the culture of the Hyacinth, and there allowed to remain till the plants spear through the ashes, or, better still, till the flower buds are formed, before removing to the conservatory, corridor, or sitting-room. While the Lily is growing, a situation should be selected where the sun's rays do not fall upon the plants after mid-day. Lilies grown in pots should have clear liquid manure twice a week, but both the drainage of the pots and the plunging ground must be perfect and the soil kept sweet. *Superbum*, *Canadense*, and the varieties of *Pardalinum*, succeed best in moist sandy peat.

The Lily is a matchless plant for indoor decoration. All the varieties do well under glass. The magnificent *Neigherrense*, so admirably figured in the coloured plate of *The Gardeners' Chronicle*, and *Wallichianum* are purely greenhouse plants.

We have arranged the Lilies in accordance with Mr. Baker's classification, which is a natural grouping based on the shape of the flower; these groupings with a few exceptions, represent also the order of flowering. If purchasers will therefore select from each group, they will secure both diversity of form and succession of bloom.

A DOUBTFUL LILY.

Botanists have not yet decided whether the following is a Lily or a *Fritillaria*. Whatever the ultimate verdict may be, it will not detract from the decided beauty of the plant, which throws up a long spike of rich rose-purple flowers.

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IRIS BARBATA, THE BEARDED IRIS, COMMONLY CALLED GERMAN OR FLAG IRIS.

Our collection of this Section of Irises has been pronounced the most complete in England, and in "THE GARDEN" of Aug. 29th, 1874, a lengthened, classified, and descriptive list is given of the varieties we have flowered. Those we enumerate in this list are a selection from upwards of 200 varieties. The better to understand our descriptions, we furnish a woodcut, and it will be observed from it that three of the petals are erect—these are called *standards*; the other three droop—these are called *falls*. The small tongued parts of the flower are the *petaloid stigmas*, under which run the "beards." The flowers in this Section are all large and very handsome, more or less beautifully mottled in the standards, and reticulated in the falls; the beards ranging from delicate primrose to orange, and the petaloid stigmas frequently enhancing the general effect by their contrast of colour. We furnish these important particulars that our descriptions may be the better understood, as we have not attempted to take in these individual points, but to deal with the colours which strike the eye on first looking at the flower. There is no flower, however, that so improves by examination. At first sight its beauty is equal to the Orchid, but, on closer examination, we have no hesitation in saying it possesses points of interest surpassing the finest Orchid. In colours there are the richest yellows, the intensest purples, the most delicate blues, the softest mauves, and the most beautiful claret-reds. There are whites, and primroses, and bronzes of every imaginable shade—indeed, language fails us in picturing the beauties of this flower; and consequently our descriptions fall far short of the reality; and this will be readily understood when we state that there may be found in almost any one of the flowers from 10 to 20 different



shades harmonizing and blending in such a manner as to make one perfectly enthusiastic. Those who have not used this Iris for surrounding artificial lakes and ponds, or cultivated it in the flower borders, shrubberies, woodland walks, and wild gardens, should do so. It is also most valuable wherever a large quantity of cut flowers is required from May to July, as plants when established, will, with good cultivation, increase in size annually till they attain large proportions, each plant yielding 50 to 100 spikes of bloom.

In the descriptions S. is used to signify *Standards*, or the erect petals; F., *Falls*, or the drooping petals.

We have arranged the Iris Barbata in natural groups to facilitate amateurs in making selections. Each group has a distinctive characteristic. Germanica flowers first, and is represented by the blue, purple, and white Flag Iris of our gardens; they flower at the same time, and are extremely decorative in May. Aphylla, of the *Botanical Magazine*, is the *Micata* of Baker, under which we include *Swertii*; the Standards have a frill-like appearance arising from the marginal coloured transverse lines on a white ground. *Amœna* has the standards white. *Neglecta* has the standards purple, or approaching to purple. *Pallida* has the standards ranging from pale lavender to rose-lilac. *Squalens* embraces those with the standards bronzed; and *Variiegata* has the standards invariably yellow.

BEARDLESS SPECIES OF FLAG IRIS.

The Iris offered in this section are altogether distinct from the Barbata group; and they are equally hardy; most of them are grand aquatics, especially *Aurea*, *Monneri*, *Ochroleuca*, and the varieties of *Pseudo-Acorus*; not only are these majestic in growth, but the flowers are surpassingly beautiful. The varieties of *Sibirica* are graceful aquatics. All the other Iris in this group, with the exception of *Cristata*, *Iberica*, *Ruthenica*, *Stylosa*, *Susiana*, *Tectorum*, and *Umbrosus* may be grown as Aquatics or Sub-Aquatics. *Cristata* is charming on dry banks and rock-work; *Iberica* and *Susiana* require a dry hot situation; *Fetidissima* is valuable for damp shady situations; *Tectorum* is found on the thatched roofs of Chinese houses.

Cristata forms a tuft where it is happy, and when covered with its amethystine flowers is a gem. *Iberica* and *Susiana* possess a beauty peculiarly their own. *Stylosa* unfolds its charming blue blossoms in winter, and is recommended for indoor decoration. *Umbrosus*, the snake's-head Iris, is perhaps the most fantastic flower which March produces. *Ruthenica* is remarkable for its fan-like dwarf growth and elegant blue flowers in July; *Versteicolor* and *Virginica* are very beautiful; while *Orientalis* is a form of *Sibirica*, with flowers larger, more decided in colour, and in refinement unsurpassed by any other flower. *Tridentata* is also a gem; *Spuria major* is as remarkable as it is beautiful; *Longipetala* and *Breviflora* are charming; *Graminea* has remarkably graceful foliage, and flowers as distinctive as they are beautiful.

In "The Garden," 20th December, 1879, a coloured plate appeared of eight Beardless species of Iris from flowers supplied by us.

IRIS KEMPFERI (LÆVIGATA).

The magnificence of these splendid new Japanese Flag Iris surpasses any written description that could be given of them. Thousands of the flowers in our Experimental Grounds during the past summer measured from 6 to 7 inches in diameter, with a breadth of petal 3 to 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches. The prevailing colours were crimsons, purples,

violets and blues, each flower representing several shades, and all with a yellow or orange blotch more or less conspicuously, and surrounded by a halo of blue or violet, close to the petaloid stigma. When unfolding, the flower generally exhibits a different hue to that represented when fully expanded; so that in the young flower there is generally an intensity in the colour, and a richness of bloom spread over the surface that is very charming.

CULTURE.—A naturally good garden soil, well worked, suits this plant; but past experience shows that, in a soil which is naturally moist, but well drained, and laying well to the sun, the largest amount of success is attained. For example, on the moist Bagshot soil the plant makes very strong growth, and flowers with remarkable freedom. On drier soils the plant is comparatively dwarf. For Rhododendron and Azalea borders it will be found most valuable, coming into bloom as it does in July, thus maintaining the succession of flowers. Leaf soil, loam, and peat the plant prefers; but manure should never be given unless thoroughly decomposed, fresh manure being poison to this section of Iris.

In describing the varieties of Iris Kämpferi we have given the prominent colours only—a detailed description of each flower would occupy too much space; for example, a flower may be rich claret on the margin of the petals, and shade up to violet, terminated by an intense blue halo surrounding the invariable yellow or orange blotch, which is partially overlapped by the petaloid stigma, while the short standards may probably be of a different colour to the petals.

FUNKIA (The Japanese Hyacinth Lily).

These are handsome ornamental-foliaged hardy plants from Japan. They develop their leaves early in Spring, and in Summer and Autumn throw up a profusion of fine Lily-like flower spikes. Amongst herbaceous plants they will always command a prominent position, owing to the great diversity of their foliage, which ranges from the miniature to the gigantic. The massive glaucous-green foliage and purple flowers of Sieboldiana; the massive light fresh green leaves and snow-white flowers of Subcordata grandiflora, and the large massive green foliage of Ovata, with its deep purple flowers; than these anything more handsome in flower and shrubby borders or in sub-tropical gardens can hardly be desired. Of the smaller leaved varieties, those with golden variegation and those with silver variegation make grand edgings; others again with the foliage intermediate in size have representatives with leaves beautifully variegated and of various shades of green. Besides these, the three small leaved varieties of Spathulata make neat compact edgings, while the leaves of the Plantanifolia are characteristically distinct. For naturalization all the Funkias are most valuable, and the large-leaved varieties are beautiful when grown in pleasure parks in the grass. In shady and somewhat moist situations the foliage attains its largest size.

HELLEBORUS OR CHRISTMAS AND LENTEN ROSES.

The genus *Helleborus* is represented by six species or heads of families, viz.:—*H. vesicarius*, of Mount Cassius, near Antioch, a plant not yet introduced into cultivation; *H. fetidus* and *H. lividus*, both handsome ornamental foliage plants; *H. niger*, the Christmas Rose, with its geographical varieties, *minor*, *major*, and *maximus*; *H. viridis* and *H. orientalis*, the Lenten Roses, these have many geographical varieties. The *Viridis* section is distinguished by its deciduous foliage which reappears early in Spring, associated with flowers which range from green to dove-purple. Three of these are illustrated in the coloured plate which accompanied *The Garden of 19th July, 1879*. The geographical varieties of the type *Viridis* are *Dumitorum*, *Laxus*, *Bocconi*, *Cyclophyllus*, *Graveolens*, *Intermedius*, *Cupreus* and *Purpurascens*. *Orientalis* group has the leaves coriaceous and persistent, with a polished green surface, and the segments generally conspicuously toothed; the flowers are usually large, the sepals frequently imbricated and assuming a bell-shaped form, surmounted on stems two to three times forked, thus forming a showy branched panicle of flowers, which range in colour from the richest crimson to white; six of these are illustrated in the coloured plate which accompanied *The Garden of 19th July, 1879*. NEW DOUBLE-FLOWERED PYRETHRUMS.

The Royal Horticultural Society in 1878, awarded a Banksian Medal to our collection of Pyrethrums.

The decorative value of these New Double-flowered hardy Pyrethrums it is impossible to over-estimate. They occupy in the flower border in May and June the same position that the *Chrysanthemum* holds in September and October. Indeed, the name "Spring-flowering Chrysanthemum," would not be inappropriate. The flowers are produced in great profusion, large, elegantly formed, and ranging in colour from snow-white to intense magenta-crimson. The plant is graceful, the foliage elegant, and of a pleasing green, and is uninjured by the most severe winters. In herbaceous borders, front of shrubs, and in situations where colour is desired, this plant is matchless. In vases and for table bouquets, the eut blossoms are greatly valued, lasting in water longer than any other flower. For exhibitions in May and June the flowers are most desirable. If the first flower stems are removed as soon as the flower begins to wither, and the plants mulched with rotten manure, to encourage vigorous growth, generally the bloom will be as fine in autumn as it was in May and June.

CULTURE.—Before planting, trench the ground and work in abundance of rotten manure.

Our annual exhibitions of these flowers at the Royal Horticultural Gardens and at King Street, attract considerable notice.

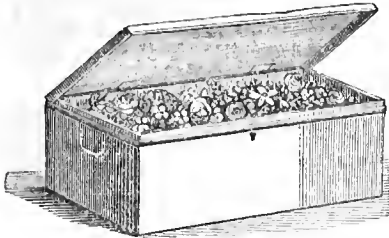

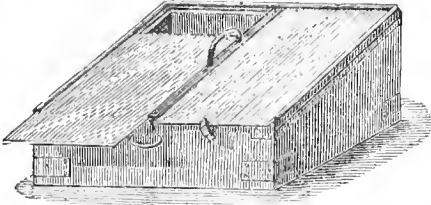
