CULTURE FOR EARLY BULB FORCING.

Pot the bulbs 3 to 6, or more according to size, in a 4 or 5 inch pot, barely covering the Bulbs with soil. This should be done during August, September, and October, the pots being placed out-of-doors on a bed of ashes, and covered over with a few inches of cocoa-nut fibre or ashes. *There let them remain till the bulbs are well rooted*, and have made a little top growth, when a few pots at a time should be removed to a cold frame and be kept partially shaded for a day or two, after which they should be removed to a moderately warm and *moist* temperature, a plentiful supply of water being then given to the roots. A successional supply of flowers can thus be maintained from November to February.

Year by year we see the taste increasing for the so-called "Wild Garden," or the grouping of hardy subjects in a free and unconventional manner, leaving them to colonize and form themselves into pretty natural groups, such as nature exhibits to us in her woods and copses, and wherever she has been left to reign undisturbed. This phase of gardening is one which must have a great attraction for the lover of hardy flowers; by it, bare and ugly places may be made beautiful, and a charm added to the landscape. Few sights are more beautiful in Spring than such hardy flowers as Daffodils, Snowdrops, Chionodoxas, Muscari, Anemones, &c., established in grass. The experiment has been successfully made at Kew Gardens, to the great delight of visitors, and this Spring large stretches and slopes of grass-land thus planted presented quite a "Riviera" picture. At the earliest dawn of Spring the following flowers will lighten up the landscape

with their fresh bright colours: *Winter Aconites, Snowdrops, Early Scillas, Chionodoxas, Early Daffodils, &c.*, followed by *later-flowering Daffodils, Crocuses, Muscari, Anemones, Star of Bethlehem, Cowslips, Saxifraga Campopoli, Late Scillas, Cottage Tulips, &c.* All the foregoing may be grown in grass-land where the grass is not cut till the meadows are mown. On *lawns*, which require cutting earlier, such charming little early flowering subjects as *Snowdrops, Chionodoxas, Early Dwarf Daffodils, and Scillas* may be planted. In places where the grass is not required to be cut, a still wider scope for gardening presents itself, as several of our Summer and Autumn-flowering Lilies may be introduced, as also other tall and stately flowers.

N.B.—We have marked thus † those flowers which will thrive in shady places, under trees, on shady banks, &c., or may be planted in the open border. The variously coloured *Wood Hyacinths* (Blue Bells) will establish themselves freely under Pine and Fir trees and in shady nooks, where scarcely any other flower will thrive, and seen thus they present a lovely sight. § Indicates those bulbs, &c., which are essentially wood plants, and should only be grown in shady situations.

On the South Coast of England and in many parts of Ireland and the West Coast of Scotland, these beautiful Amaryllises may be grown outside, under south walls, planted one foot beneath the surface, and protected with litter or leaves during winter.

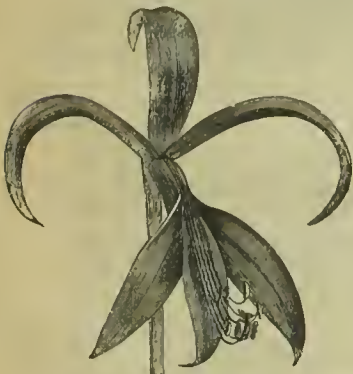

ANEMONE, or WINDFLOWER (See also Novelty List, page 3).

For brilliancy of colour few flowers can compare with the Anemone, which in Spring produces its masses of bloom in endless variety of shades, scarlets, crimsons, roses, blushes, lilacs, blues, purples, and white, all of which for cutting are valuable, lasting long in water. For beds, edgings, and masses, in the borders it is matchless, and may be had in bloom, weather permitting, from November to July, according to situation, locality, and time of planting.

CULTURE.—Any good soil, moderately well drained, suits the Anemone. Plant in succession *A. coronaria* varieties from October to May, the roots four to six inches apart, at a depth of two to three inches, choosing a dry day, and when the ground is in good working condition. *The plantings for Summer and Autumn-flowering should be in a situation where the ground is moist, and in shade from the sun's rays after 10 or 11 a.m., and well sheltered from cutting east winds.* If grown as pot-plants, put three tubers in a four inch pot, and plunge out of doors for a time.

ANEMONES, FOR BEDS AND MASSES, Barr's Double Poppy. (A. coronaria varieties.)

The flowers of the Double Poppy Anemone resemble a semi-double Hollyhock, and are extremely handsome. When planted from October to December, they flower in succession during the early Spring months, while those planted from January to April flower in succession from April to July. *Each amateur should plant Autumn and Spring, and find out which is best for his soil and climate.*

ANEMONES, various Beautiful Species.

Anemone apennina, the blue Mountain Windflower, forms a dense cushion of rich blue, and is one of the loveliest of dwarf Spring flowers. *Mr. William Robinson in his paper at the Conference on Hardy Flowers described its fine effect when planted in meadows or near to large elm trees.* Where Daffodils are naturalized this lovely flower and *A. blanda* should be freely planted, the effect obtained being most charming. *A. blanda* resembles *A. apennina* in flower, but blooms a month earlier. The varieties of *Anemone nemorosa* (The Wood Anemone) literally carpet the ground with their charming flowers. Being shade loving plants they should be planted under trees or in shady nooks on rockwork. *A. nemorosa Robinsoniana* is remarkably beautiful, and *A. nemorosa bracteata* may be called "the Jack in the Green" of Anemones, the white petals resting on green bracts. All the above-named species are exceedingly charming established on rockwork, and are beautiful as pot-plants.

For several years past in *Hyde Park*, *Regent's Park*, and other of the *London Parks*, *Crocuses*, *Snowdrops*, *Daffodils*, etc., have been planted in the grass, to the great delight of visitors. In wild gardens, woodland walks, etc., the *Crocus* should be associated with the violet, the primrose, and the oxlip.

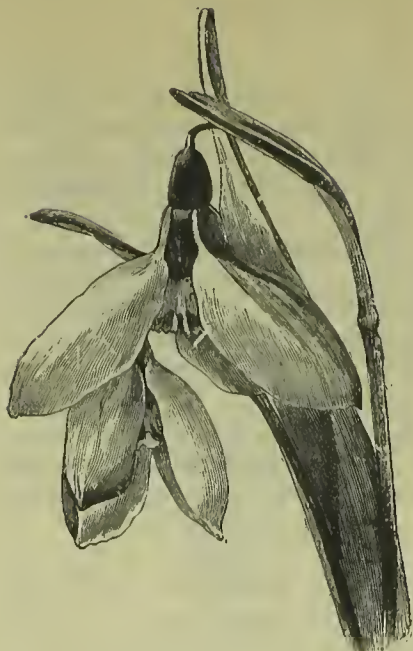

GALANTHUS (Snowdrop).

In the early Spring months, there is nothing more beautiful than a sheet of the **snowy graceful blossoms of the Snowdrop**. In planting, the bulbs should almost touch each other. An effect of surpassing beauty may be obtained with Snowdrops associated with *Scillas sibirica*, or *bifolia*, *Chionodoxa Luellia*, *C. sardensis*, or *C. gigantea*. When practicable such plantings should be permanent, and the surface of the soil top dressed in Summer and sown with annuals, such as *Nemophila*, *Leptosiphon*, etc., or planted with surface rooting bedding plants. The **Snowdrop** and the **Crocus** when planted in alternate circles are very effective, and follow each other so closely that no gap is left in the succession.

In beds of **Tulips** and **Hyacinths**, Snowdrops are very effective between the lines; they flower while these bulbs are just moving the surface, and when the flowers are over there remains an elegant groundwork of green foliage.

The **Snowdrop**, nestling in grass, looks charmingly at home. The turf need not be disturbed, but holes about three inches apart and five inches deep should be made with a dibber, dropping in three inches of fresh soil, then three or more bulbs. *The Giant Single Snowdrop, Galanthus Elwesii*, should be extensively used; its flowers are large and valuable for cutting. In its native habitat it is found growing with the **Chionodoxa**, and the effect of the two together is lovely.

CULTURE IN POTS.—The best soil to use is a compost of good fibrous loam with a liberal addition of leaf-soil, sharp sand, and well-decayed cow manure. The whole should be well mixed and left to stand some time before being used.

In potting, leave the top of the bulb just exposed, and let the soil be in a nice friable state and not too moist. The pots should then, at once, be placed out-doors on a bed of ashes, and covered with six inches of the same material, or by preference, cocoa fibre, and left exposed to all weathers. When the bulbs have well-rooted, and about an inch of the top growth has been made, they may be removed indoors to force, first into a subdued light until the blanched foliage has attained its full green colour, and then into the sunniest situation at command. Abundance of air, a moderately moist atmosphere, and plenty of water at the roots is then necessary for early, well developed, flower spikes. A dry or frosty atmosphere or a draughty situation will cause the flower buds to shrivel. Forcing should only be done gently, the temperature not exceeding 70 degrees.

If finely developed trusses and rich colours are preferred to very early flowers, the Hyacinth should not be forced, but be left out-doors longer to develop, and then be removed to a mild temperature like that of a cool greenhouse, a sitting-room window, or frame, always selecting the sunniest and most genial situation.

CULTURE IN GLASSES.—Pure clear water should be used with a piece or two of charcoal in it to keep the water sweet. The base of the bulb should at all times just touch the water. Place the glasses in a cool dark place to encourage root growth. When the glasses are nearly full of roots admit them to the light gradually, and then to the sunniest place at command till the flower spikes are well developed. Avoid a too dry or frosty atmosphere or a draughty situation, as such conditions will often cause the flower buds to shrivel up. 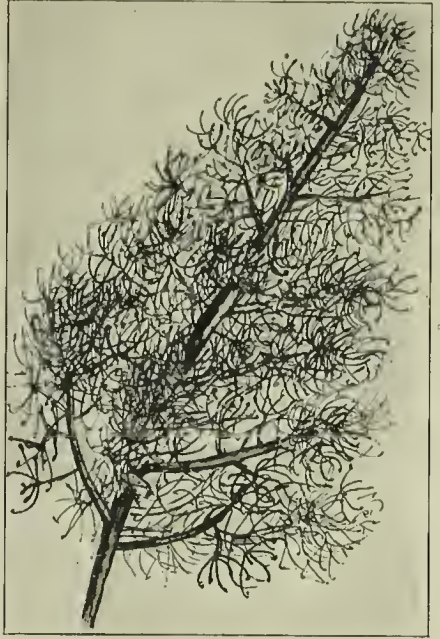

IRISES

IRIS, Various Beautiful Bulbous and Tuberous-Rooted Species.

These Iris Species are all hardy and beautiful, flowering one after the other from November to June. The dwarf early species will be more enjoyed if planted on rockwork, where the flowers could be a little protected from heavy rains. *Alata*, *Reticulata* *Histrio* and *Histrioides*, *Vartani*, and *Stylosa vars.*, are charming winter-flowering species, followed in February by *I. Reticulata*, with its lovely violet-scented blossoms, the sweet-scented *I. Persica*, the beautiful lately introduced species *I. Rosenbachiana*, *Kolpakovskiana*, *Bakeriana*, and *Danfordiæ*. Next in succession come the interesting *Caucasica*, *Orchioides*, the curious Snakeshead Iris *Taberosa*, and the new species *I. Sindjarensis* and *Assyriaca*. These are followed closely by *Susiana*, *Iberica*, etc., with their large handsome beautifully netted flowers; along with these, *I. Atrofusca*, *Atropurpurea*, *Bismarckiana*, *Gatesii*, *Lorteti*, *Lupina*, and *Helena*, surpass in beauty and interest any written description that can be given of them. The charming dwarf Iris *flavissima*, *Bloudovii*, the pretty Peacock Iris, and the beautiful Iris *cristata* flower in May, and are followed in June by *Iris Juncea*, *Boissieri*, *Lusitanica*, and *Tingitana*.

The Irises marked † belong to the *Oncocyclus* and *Regella* Sections, and require special treatment. The roots should be planted in November (the tops not more than two inches below the surface) in a light rich well drained soil, and covered with three or four inches of wheat straw or, better still, marsh reeds, which should be removed in March. Immediately these Irises have done flowering place over the plants a light, or panes of glass elevated eighteen inches above the ground, so as to admit at the sides a free entry of air, and at the same time to keep off rain till October. The object desired is to thoroughly ripen the roots, and prevent their starting into growth before Spring. The covering in winter is to keep off heavy rains, and discourage a premature growth. If this treatment secures the object required, the roots may remain undisturbed for several years, but if it fails, then try Mr. Ewbank's plan of using flag stones to intercept the rise of moisture which stimulates an autumn growth, or lift the roots immediately they have done flowering, and keep them on a dry shelf or in perfectly dry sand till time of planting. *The great beauty of these Irises, especially when seen in established masses, will fully repay the special treatment they require.*

IXIA.—The African Corn Lily (see *Illustration*, page 31), a graceful slender growing plant, with long loose spikes of bloom. The colours are rich, varied, and beautiful, the centre always differing in colour from the other parts of the flower, so that the blossoms expanding in the sun's rays present a picture of *gorgeous beauty*.

CULTURE IN POTS.—From October to January plant five or six bulbs in a four or five-inch pot, using a compost of turfy loam, leaf soil, and silver sand. Make the soil firm about the bulbs, then plunge the pots in ashes in a cold pit or frame, and withhold water till the plants appear, and at first give sparingly. When the plants are in growth, the lights should be left off, except during wet or frosty weather. Early in February, or when the plants have made sufficient growth, remove them to the greenhouse, keep close to the glass, and carefully attend to the watering.

CULTURE OUT-DOORS.—Plant from October to January, at a depth of three inches, and the bulbs two inches apart, in a prepared light loamy soil, thoroughly drained, in a sunny situation, protected if possible from cold east and northerly winds. Cover the earlier plantings with 5 or 6 inches of straw litter, heather, fern-bracken, or other light material to protect the early top growth from frosty winds, but remove the covering in March. The later plantings will flower after the earlier ones, therefore select a situation for them where the sun's rays will be somewhat broken, and thus the blooming period will be prolonged. The *gorgeous beauty* of these flowers amply rewards the little extra care they require to ensure success.

LEUCOJUM (Snowflake), Spring, Summer, and Autumn-Flowering.

Leucojum vernum the **Spring Snowflake**, is one of our earliest and most beautiful Spring flowers, the blossoms of which, resembling a large Snowdrop, are handsome in outline and elegant in bouquets. *L. aestivum* and *Hernandezii*, the **Summer Snowflakes**, flower in April and May, and are remarkable for their elegant blossoms. *L. autumnale* is a charming white, pink-tipped Fairy-like Snowdrop, blooming in August and September. *L. trichophyllum* resembles *Autumnale* in its graceful flowers, but blooms in Spring, and is best grown in pots in a frame; in Portugal, its native country, it is found growing in pure sand. Mr. William Robinson, in his paper at the Conference on Hardy Flowers, remarked:—"The early-flowering *Leucojum* is a more precious flower for gathering than the Snowdrop, and the late-flowering *Leucojum* is graceful and handsome in grass." They all delight in shady situations.

BARR'S BEAUTIFUL HARDY LILIES.

FOR PLANTING IN BEDS, BORDERS, and for GREENHOUSE DECORATION.

THE LILY, for variety of colour, chasteness, and beauty of form, is matchless amongst hardy plants. The flowering commences in May, and a continuous unbroken succession of bloom, from species of different countries, is maintained till the frosts of Autumn destroy the last unexpanded flower buds.

CULTURE OUT-OF-DOORS.—In choosing a situation for planting, *perfect drainage*, natural or artificial, should be the first consideration. The borders of Rhododendron and Azalea beds, and such-like positions, are generally suitable for Lily culture, as the necessary compost for the particular species can easily be given, and the shelter from the surrounding branches is beneficial in protecting the plants from cold winds in Spring, and also affording a partial shelter from the sun's rays in Summer. Sheltered spots in mixed herbaceous and shrubby borders will also do. In preparing the ground, loosen the soil to a depth of several feet, and add fresh loam, coarse sand, and *sweet* decomposed leaf soil, or good peat, care being taken that the soils are as free as possible from insect life, and the compost sufficiently friable. Plant the bulbs 4 to 6 inches deep (except where otherwise stated), and they may then remain undisturbed for many years. The bog or swamp-loving Lilies **Superbum**, and the varieties of **Canadense** and **Pardalinum**, require a moist peaty soil and rather shady situation; they are admirably adapted for growing amongst Rhododendrons and Azaleas in moist situations, and for the sides of brooks, ponds, rivulets, etc.

CULTURE IN-DOORS.—THE LILY being a free rooter requires plenty of pot-room, therefore use in most cases a 6 or 8-inch pot for one bulb, according to its size, and a compost of fibrous loam and sweet decomposed leaf soil, with plenty of coarse sand or good peat, loam and sand will do. See that the drainage is perfect and the inside of the pot clean, to start with. Pot firmly, barely covering the top of the bulb, and leaving room to add more soil when the surface roots appear. Select a situation out-of-doors, protected from the afternoon sun, and stand the pots on a bed of ashes raised above the general level to avoid stagnant moisture, and made firm to prevent the entrance of worms; then cover with 6 inches of cocoa-nut fibre or old leaf soil to keep off excessive rains. When top growth begins to show above the

covering, remove the pots to a cold frame, pit or greenhouse, and start giving water sparingly, a little clear weak liquid manure given twice a week, when the flower-buds are well advanced will greatly assist in the development of fine blooms. A north wall or hedge is a suitable situation for starting the bulbs. If very early flowers are required the Lily may be started in a gentle heat as soon as potted, but as soon as top growth shows itself the plant must be kept as near the glass as possible to prevent being drawn. **Superbum** and the varieties of **Canadense** and **Pardalinum** prefer for soil a moist sandy peat, but will also thrive in any good fairly moist soil.

***LILY OF THE VALLEY,**

For Forcing, and making Plantations out-of-doors.

The clumps of Lily of the Valley quoted, have been specially prepared, and cannot fail to give abundance of flowers. In potting, the crowns should be a little below the rim of the pot, and covered with moss or cocoa fibre, which should be removed when the crowns show through; *tight potting* is of great importance, and care should be taken, in the *first watering*, that the moisture penetrates to the *centre of the clump*. The *Berlin Crowns* are extensively used for forcing by the growers for Covent Garden Market; of these, 15 to 20 may be planted in a 5-inch pot. For *Lily of the Valley beds*, also for massing in north borders, and to naturalize in woods, copses, &c., the *Dutch Crowns* are the best.

CULTURE.—A moist atmosphere, with a temperature of 80 to 85 degrees, and abundance of water is necessary to success in forcing Lily of the Valley; to encourage simultaneously the development of flower and foliage, place the pots in a shady damp part of the house, or invert a flower-pot over the crowns, till the flower and the foliage have made some progress, when remove to a less shady situation. If they are grown in a dry atmosphere, or get an insufficient supply of water at the roots, the crowns, technically speaking, go “blind.”

THE SACRED, OR GOOD LUCK LILY OF CHINA AND JAPAN.

Called by the Chinese, "Jos Flower," or "Flower of the Gods," and "Water Fairy Flower."

This is a species of Polyanthus Narcissus annually imported from Northern China, and prized for the abundance of its flowers and marvellously rapid growth. The flowers are white, with yellow cup, and very fragrant; they are mostly single, but a few doubles are sometimes found amongst them. Each bulb usually produces several flower spikes, bearing many flowers, and the Chinese call the best cultivated and largest developed blooms, "Grand Emperor." In China and Japan the bulbs are grown in the living rooms in fancy bowls filled simply with pebbles and water, and the natives compete with one another in growing the finest specimens for their New Year's Festival, successful culture being regarded as an emblem of "Good Luck." The bulb in this country can be grown as successfully as in China, and it is most interesting to watch its rapid growth, which is somewhere about 20 inches in forty days; grow in a sunny window by day and on a table near the fireplace by night, as frost destroys the flower buds. CULTURE.—Plant the *Turban* and *Turco-Persian Ranunculus* from October to March, and the *Persian* varieties from January to April. When the soil works kindly, and the day is dry, draw drills two inches deep, and five or six inches apart; at the bottom of the drill sprinkle a little sand, press the tubers firmly into the soil, *claws downwards*, and cover them with sand, then with soil, keeping the crown of the tuber two inches under the surface. Cover the early plantings with *long straw, cut heather, or other light material*, which remove in Spring when danger of severe frosts is gone. In April and May, during dry weather, water the beds freely, two or three times a week if necessary and when the flower-buds appear, water daily if required, and continue doing so while the plants are blooming; this will insure fine flowers. *In watering, wet the foliage as little as possible.* If grown as pot-plants put three tubers in a four-inch pot and plunge out of doors for a time.

RANUNCULUS, Barr's Giant Turco-Persian for Bedding.

This new race of Ranunculus is remarkable for a vigorous growth and profuse flowering. The blooms are large and very handsome, in great diversity of colour. When massed in flower beds and borders, these grand Ranunculuses produce a glorious effect. For cutting they are most valuable, and flowers may be gathered from the same bed several times a week, during the flowering period, without impairing the display.

SCILLAS (WOOD HYACINTHS),—May-Flowering.

the Wood Hyacinth is one of the most decorative of May-flowering bulbs. Our native species (*Scilla nutans*) abounds in most parts of the country, and many suppose it to be the “Culver keys” referred to by Izaak Walton. The fine Spanish varieties (*S. campanulata*) have erect flower spikes and larger and handsomer flowers than our native plants, which have arching flower spikes. All the Wood Hyacinths are very effective in flower and shrubby borders, and most valuable for wild gardens and woodlands. They also make charming pot-plants, and may be forced into bloom by March. The white varieties are greatly in demand to cut for table bouquets and vases. Mr. William Robinson, in his paper at the Conference on Hardy Flowers, refers to the Spanish Scillas (*S. campanulata* vars.) as “giving new aspects of flower life.” Wood Hyacinths will thrive under Fir and Pine trees where few other plants will grow.

Those alone who have massed the different varieties of **Single Tulips** (*planting the bulbs 4 inches apart*) can form an idea of their great beauty and the rich diversity there is in shade and colour, and the grand effect they produce grouped in flower beds or borders. The **Single Tulip** is extensively grown for indoor decoration (three or five bulbs in a pot), and cultivated in the same way as the *Hyacinth* for early-flowering and succession. The varieties of the little early **Duc Van Thol Tulips** (with exception of the *scarlet edged yellow variety*, which flowers first), bloom together, and are of the same height, which renders them valuable for beds and borders, where a very early Spring display is required, also for early forcing with the *Roman Hyacinth*, etc.

Hints as to the arrangement of Early Tulips in beds, etc. A difficulty is often experienced by Amateurs in knowing what kind of Tulips to select to bed together, seeing that they are not all the same height, and that some are earlier in flower than others. For the assistance, therefore, of purchasers we have taken special observations at our Nurseries this Spring as to the heights and the order in which the **Early Single and Double Tulips** flower.

The Heights we give in inches, and the order of flowering is indicated by (1), (2), (3), (4), or (5) after the name. It will be noticed that the **Double Tulips** generally are a little later-flowering than the **Singles**. The difference in time of flowering between each number is not great so that (1) and (2) may be bedded together, also (2) and (3), and so on. The varieties of **Duc Van Thol** are not numbered, as they flower before any of the others.

Arrangement of Colours in Bedding.—The following varieties if bedded together produce charming effects:—*Princess Marianne*, *Ophir d'or* and *Wouwerman*; *Pottebakker Scarlet*, *Pottebakker White* and *Chrysolora*; *Prince of Austria*, *President Lincoln* and *Chrysolora*; *Rose Grisdeline* and *Princess Marianne*; *Pottebakker Yellow* and *Thomas Moore*; *Chrysolora* and *Dusart*; *Princess Ida* and *Rosamundi*; *Duchesse de Parma* and *Fabiola*; *Rosamundi* and *Rose Superbe*; *Couleur Cardinal* makes a grand show bedded by itself, but *Snowdrift* goes well with it; *Keizerskroon* makes a fine bed with *Queen Victoria* as an outside border.

THE FEAST OF THE TULIP.

THE ROMANCE OF A FASHIONABLE FLOWER.

AFTER an interval of fifty years, a great TULIP SHOW and CONFERENCE is to be held to-morrow and Thursday in the Royal Botanic Gardens, Regent's Park. This is only one sign of a revival of interest in the flower which has as romantic a history as any plant all the world over. Another sign of a mild repetition of the Tulip craze of three centuries ago is the fact that Tulip feasts, dances, and dinners are quite the fashion, and that at last week's Drawing Room, Tulips were among the most popular flowers, both in their natural state, in bouquets, as dress ornaments, and in fanciful designs woven into the magnificent brocades of the Court trains. The proudest of early garden flowers thus pressing once more to the front, it is interesting at the present moment to trace the history and follow the fortunes past and present of the Tulip.

In the seraglio of the Shadow of God, when the world was a few centuries younger, there was one festival in early spring which for dazzling splendour outshone the rest of the Eastern fairylike night scenes. Unnumbered artificial suns, moons, and stars lit up the Sultan's beautiful gardens, and in the mystic light which turned night into day, tens of thousands of Tulips stood proudly up on their tall slim stalks, the goblet of each blossom perfect, in form and in colour. Among this dazzling dream the Sultan and his harem, and whoever else was great and mighty at the Court of Constantinople, worshipped at the shrine of the Tulip, and the whole of the East echoed the praise of the *thouliban*, or Turban flower, the corruption of which term has become our name for the flower.

The West at that period knew nothing of the Tulip, though it had been great in the East for more years than men remembered. India, Persia, and the Levant had, in the course of ages, woven around it countless legends of love and life and death; great poets sang its praises; the heathen laid it at the feet of his gods, and the early Christian of the East pointed to it as the "Lily of the field," which afforded to Christ the subject of a divine sermon to which the world has clung, and still is clinging, as to a never-failing help when the burden of life grows heavy.

In the sixteenth century an Ambassador of the Emperor of Germany to the Sublime Porte, going from Adrianople to Constantinople shortly after mid-winter, came upon a wondrous sight. On the roadside, among the weeds and grasses, there rose in glorious beauty clump after clump, bed after bed, of tall goblet-shaped flowers. As the sun shone upon them, they blazed with the colour of fire and sunlight, and the smooth broad petals formed a deep cup classically simple and perfect, closing over a heart of gold.

Before long a few Tulip bulbs reached Germany, and thence to England it was but a short journey. 1577 is the exact date at which the Tulip, now one of our most popular flowers, alike in the parks and gardens of the great and at the door of the poor cottager, was introduced into this country.

Visitors invited to see Barr's "Gold Medal" English Tulips flowering in May.

But while we coolly, and not over-enthusiastically, adopted this Oriental wayside plant, something very different was going on in a neighbouring country. The Tulip had made its Western way to Holland, and to the Dutchman it came as a revelation. Who can fathom the mysterious combination of circumstances resulting in a popular craze? The level-headed, unemotional, keenly practical Dutchman awoke one morning to find that he, and his compatriots with him, had, like one man, become Tulipomaniacs rampant and reckless. Fortunes were paid for a single rare Tulip bulb; crimes were committed for the possession of a *Viceroy* or an *Admiral Leifken*; and the theft or loss of a Tulip bulb was a national misfortune. All classes were infected, and for the three years from 1634 to 1637 Holland was but a large asylumful of Tulipomaniacs.

It was at this time that the worthy London citizen, going over to Holland for trade purposes, was so far infected by the craze that reigned supreme as to send home to the tender care of his housekeeper a precious bulb, worth some hundreds of pounds sterling. On his return from his long and perilous journey to Holland, he asked at once after his bulb. Had it been safely received? Yes, the beldame replied, it had arrived; but she did not think much of the Dutch bulb. The taste was not up to that of English onions. She had cooked and eaten it!

The historic event of the Dutch Tulipomania ended as suddenly as it had begun. The nation's enthusiasm was spent; only the professional bulb-growers remained faithful.

Just now the worship of the Tulip in this country is becoming general. That this should be so among Londoners and in Suburbia is probably due to a wonderful object-lesson which Messrs. Barr and Sons, the firm of bulb-growers whose name is honourably known among florists and flower-lovers all the world over, are giving at present at their LONG DITTON NURSERIES. The surroundings of London, miles further out than pretty Surbiton and Long Ditton, are the happy wheeling ground of armies of cyclists. They, and those who go up and down by the South-Western trains, have marvellous tales to tell.

Among the green fields where the grass is rich and high and starred with golden buttercups, among the hedges bursting into sweet white May-bloom, under the avenues of old elms and planes and oaks, there are spread out under the blue sky great stretches of living Oriental carpets. The designs, the colours, the look of richness and depth, are all there; but did ever master weaver or dyer work in shades so luminously beautiful as these? The sun, which otherwise sucks the colour out of a carpet, flushes these acres of crimson and purple and gold with colour notes, dreamt of as something unattainable in art. And day by day, as Spring unfolds her royal robes, these Tulip gardens grow into still greater beauty, and when 10,000 blossoms, their blooming-time being over, softly drop their petals, 10,000 others have arisen to continue the charm and spell of the scene.

Mr. William Barr, a partner of the firm of Barr and Sons, who is as enthusiastic over his Tulips as are his most enchanted visitors, gave a representative day or two ago a few interesting details about Tulips and Tulip-growing in England.

“Are the Dutch late Tulips exactly like the English?”

“No, they differ a good deal. The Dutch growers have always given their chief attention to the colour of the Tulip. A fine colour is everything with them. Now English Tulip-growers insist on a good base and on perfect form, as well as purity of colour. The base of the petals in most Dutch Tulips is of an undecided or muddy colour. With us, unless the base is of a snowy, dazzling white or a clear yellow, we do not consider the flower good.”

“Is it difficult to grow Tulips?”

“Not at all. The Tulip is so hardy, and requires so little special care, that it is one of the easiest as well as the most beautiful spring flowers to cultivate. Then there are so many early and late varieties that you can have a continual show from February till June. Hailstorms are one of the Tulip's chief enemies, as they are of most flowers. Otherwise it has very little to fear from the climate.

“And here,” Mr. Barr explained, as we stood beside an enormous bed of exquisitely beautiful Tulips, broad-petalled, and the shape of graceful cups, “you have a bed of *Darwin Tulips*, one of the finest sections of Tulips. The name is purely a fancy name. It was given by a private gentleman who raised this variety. He had been working quietly and alone for many years at improving his Tulips, and all at once he came out with this splendid result of his work. They are a late race of Tulips, coming into bloom after the Tulips we see in our parks have shed their petals. In growth they are tall and stately, with flowers of perfect form and great substance, of uniform colours and richest hues. *The Sultan* reminds one of Dumas' ‘*Black Tulip*,’ being of a glossy maroon black.”

But time in a Tulip garden flies. The train, with a bush of golden broom on the bosom of its engine, carries you back to Waterloo. The show is over; the Tulips are gone. But you may see them at the show to-morrow.

TULIP SHOW AT THE ROYAL BOTANIC GARDENS.—Lovers of Tulips had a splendid opportunity on Wednesday and yesterday, when the ROYAL NATIONAL TULIP SOCIETY held their fourth annual exhibition, in the gardens of the Royal Botanic Society, Regent's Park. Some very fine collections were shown, and in several of the classes the competition was most keen. . . . A SILVER DAFFODIL FLOWER VASE, presented by MESSRS. BARR AND SONS, for 90 blooms of English florists' Tulips in 30 dissimilar kinds, was secured by Mr. Bentley; while Mr. Needham took the silver medal presented by MESSRS. BARR AND SONS for collection of English florists' Tulips grouped for effect. . . . The great feature of the exhibition, however, was the fine collection of Tulips, running nearly the whole length of the corridor, shown by MESSRS. BARR AND SONS, of Covent Garden. This at once obtained the GOLD MEDAL of the National Tulip Society, and the SILVER MEDAL of the Royal Botanic Society. Here were to be seen some of the finest Tulips grown this season. One section was devoted to ENGLISH TULIPS raised in years past by famous growers, and differing from all Dutch Tulips in having more perfect form and colour. They were certainly flowers that delighted fanciers or specialists. Another section was composed of DARWIN TULIPS, which have never been known to break into "flamed" or "feathered" varieties. In a third section were the PARROT TULIPS, while a fourth included the COTTAGE TULIPS, mostly of the old English garden variety. These and other blooms made up a collection which, for variety and perfection, is seldom seen.

Extract from the COURT JOURNAL, May 15th, 1897.

The Royal National Tulip Society (Southern Section) held its Exhibition and Conference on last Wednesday and Thursday, in the Society's Gardens, Regent's Park. . . . The most attractive collection came from MESSRS. BARR AND SONS, of LONG DITTON, and KING STREET, COVENT GARDEN, who put up a thoroughly representative group of late-flowering Tulips, including many specimens of the eccentric-looking Parrot Tulips, the brilliant self-coloured Darwin Tulips, and the old English Florists' Tulips, beautifully striped, flamed, and feathered in various tints. This exhibit was awarded a GOLD MEDAL, and should have been seen by all lovers of this favourite flower. In the course of the day a paper on the history of the Tulip was read by Mr. Bentley, and another on its cultivation by Mr. Needham. A paper on the hybridisation of Tulips and the raising of seedlings by the Rev. F. D. Horner, was read by the Secretary.
