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

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THE HOME GROUNDS

Of all the Earth's billions of acres, that small portion surrounding the house in which you live is of most concern to you. You see your own landscape from different viewpoints many times each day; though not always are you impressed with its beauty or lack of it,—yet if even a slight change were made your eye would quickly notice it.

You walk around on your small portion of earth much or little at your pleasure, and your interest in it depends largely on what there is growing there. If the plants living there are **not at home** (as to environment) they will not thrive; if they grow well, but as a whole, do not present an attractive and artistic landscape—they are not in the right place. Often a mere rearrangement will effect a wonderful and pleasing change.

The average foundation planting needs changing more or less every four or five years, unless assisted by skillful shearing and pruning; though much damage may result from cutting at the wrong time and place. It is better not to prune than to do it injudiciously. Plants grow and in a few years become crowded, the smaller, less vigorous ones suffer most.

The planting near the foundation of the building is usually confined to the front and one side, and may comprise a variety of evergreens with a few flowering shrubs. The use of perennials near the foundation is not often satisfactory for permanency. Along the property line various hedge material is used to good effect and small plants as markers for walk and drive are, in many situations, desirable.

THE BACK YARD PLANTING

The out door living room" should be the pride of a home and the favorite rendezvous of the entire family. Particularly is it appreciated by a woman: a place where she may dry clothes or air the rugs with a degree of privacy; and a convenient secluded spot where one may walk or lounge and swing at any time during the day. And in addition, this intimate little spot of God's earth affords a year round glimpse of Mother Nature.

And apart from all this—the many little flowering perennials, bulbs, and annuals afford no end of interest and color as they come and go throughout the whole season. Each plant is a living individual member of your particular spot of God's earth, and it is surprising how many (of those kinds suitable to the location) will thrive, even in the back yard of a hundred foot lot.

The success of landscape creation is the result of the cooperation of man and God's plants to the end that each may be happy. Each and all — from the tiny Alpine to the towering Pine—fills its own place so perfectly that there is scarcely a superior among the thousands.

The wonders of God's creation are ever expanding according as one's acquaintance widens. For instance, consider a few seeds of Portulaca, as many as could be carried on a dime; Plant them at the right time and place, give them the rightof way, by removing weeds, and in few weeks your reward is great. Such a profusion of color—red, yellow and white, and nearly every other shade that one could wish for, some double, most single and varying in size. In some miraculous manner, those tiny seeds contained that gorgeous

array of color. As compared to God's part, Man's is small indeed in producing the effect.

THE LAWN

WHY?

Because it is the most essential feature of the landscape work of your Home Grounds. A lawn enhances the value as well as the appearance of your home, and in addition affords comfort and usefulness to the occupants.

WHEN?

Any time when the soil is in workable condition. But there are five months when natural conditions of soil, moisture, and temperature are more favorable to the growth of lawn grasses and less favorable to weeds development: August, September, October, April and May in order of preference.

HOW?

Directions for lawn-making are much easier to obtain than for the inexperienced to carry out successfully. Plenty of hard work from start to finish with the right materials properly applied—that is all, but each step is of importance.

UPKEEP

The very best constructed lawn must have proper and frequent attention if it is to attain the thick velvety appearance that we all like to see.

The routine work of rolling, mowing, weeding, and watering, and the special work of feeding and patching must be attended to at the right time and place, if the good looks are maintained.

ROLLING

Rolling a lawn is done to facilitate the mowing and help the growing conditions of the finer grass plants as well as to create a smooth appearance.

MOWING

The cutting of the grass is really what makes a lawn out of a green-sward. Other things being equal, it is quite true that the more frequently and thoroughly a lawn is moved, the better is the appearance.

WEEDING

The removing (root and branch) of the various coarse undesirable perennials which are always present in greater or less numbers is a necessary operation in order to keep the finer varieties of grass in the large majority.

WATERING

This is to keep the lawn green in dry times, and only those who have successfully carried out such a project have a proper understanding of the term, watering.

FERTILIZATION or FEEDING

The feeding of a lawn is to cause vigorous growth of those varieties of plants that are desired to make the greensward. The more completely the ground is occupied with fine grass, the less chance there is for weeds to get a start.

PATCHING

Due to the ravages of fungus, various animals, and sometimes unaccountable causes, there are bare spots that need repairing.

RENOVATION, RECONSTRUCTION, or NEW LAWN

A lawn may be successfully renovated when there is an established greensward of fairly good varieties (generally speaking) and on a good grade; but where there are also present many coarse plants, (usually perennials,) bare spots, here and there, and a decided unevenness in texture and growth . . . then renovation is a practical method.

RECONSTRUCTION

When a lawn is hopelessly infested with many varieties of undesirable plants or when the grade must be changed, then the lawn must be made over.

NEW LAWN

A new house must be at least partly surrounded by lawn. The usual soil condition is of uncertain quality, being largely sub-soil, and to insure evenness in the new growth, from 2 to 4 inches of live top soil is required over the entire area. This in addition to thorough preparation.

LAWN FOUNDATION

Probably no one feature of dressing the Home Grounds is as effective as the lawn when the work is well done. The **foundation** of **lawn construction** is quite as important as the foundation of a building, in relation to the quality, cost of maintenance and the years of satisfaction to follow.

An improperly or partly-made greensward is a source of trouble, expense, and dissatisfaction.

COOPERATION

To those who prefer to make their own lawn, but who feel the need of an experienced guiding hand—supervisory service will be cheerfully rendered on reasonable terms. PLANTING ALTERATIONS

Plants grow, and as the years pass they require more room, crowding results; and if they are not moved, some are stunted and die, the coarser, ranker growing varieties claim the space, and these become more or less leggy and ragged and perhaps they shut out too much light. In the advanced stage of this overgrown condition, a new planting is sometimes the only solution. Rearrangements are best effected before the smaller, dwarf varieties are spoiled by crowding.

A new planting that combines the artistic and the practical may be so arranged that only minor changes are necessary for ten years to come or even longer. Good work is not done by guess. A true craftsman knows what he is doing and how and why. There should be a happy relation between the price you pay and the job you get.

YOUR HOME GROUNDS HEDGE

A hedge is a living fence. Considering first cost, maintenance, and length of service, it is probably the cheapest of all types of fencing. A live fence is also more artistic and generally satisfactory, although it does occupy more area than most fences.

Variety in hedge material is quite wide, but California Privet and Japanese Barberry are the two varieties most generally used. The former is better for boundaries and the latter is preferred for groups, banks and road edgings. There is a dwarf Barberry also which is very useful. Other hedge materials are Hawthorne, Lilac. Aralia, VanHoute Spirea, Philadelphus, and Forsythia; and in evergreens are American Arborvitae, Box, Japanese Privet, Hemlock and certain Junipers.

The new Red Leaf Barberry is very effective in various settings—as a hedge, group or specimen.

PERENNIALS

RUSTIC ARBORS, FENCES, TRELLIS made of ALL-RED CEDAR

As a support for vigorous climbing roses, clematis, trumpet-vine, honey-suckle. Dutchman's pipe, Wisteria, and various ivy, a 12 foot to 15 foot pole 8×4 inches, butt and tip measurements, is very satisfactory both as to appearance and long life.

For the less vigorous climbing plants and grape vines, an 8½ foot post with two 2½ foot cross pieces fitted in near the center and top makes an attractive and serviceable support. In certain situations a two-rail cedar fence adds something of beauty to the landscape.

VEGETABLE GARDENING

For those people who are very fond of fresh vegetables, and who have suitable soil for gardening, and some time to care for a garden—to all such we would advise the planting of a home garden this year.

FERTILIZATION

All plant life needs nourishment. Oftentimes the soil is deficient; especially is this true around a new place where the sub-soil from the cellar comprises a large part of the fill. Very few plants will thrive in sub-soil and none of the kinds wanted will grow well.

REQUIREMENTS VARY:

Fertilizer is of many different formulae, qualities, and values. Some is very quickly available and soon spent; while other is slowly soluble and longer

lasting: yet both may be of equal value commercially speaking—and where properly applied fulfill the need.

The where, why, when, and how of fertilization would make a long story and uninteresting to many. Perhaps your lawn needs feeding? Is your shrubbery growing properly? Do your trees look healthy? How about the flower garden?

When plants do not thrive, something is wrong:—When the cause is removed, good growth results. The reward of a poor job is a sore spot.

DRAINAGE OF THE HOME GROUNDS

If you have a drainage problem, we can help you.

A long time ago we learned that water runs down hill. There are places where water is seen for several days after a rain. Why? Because there is no hill for it to run down. GRADING AND TERRACE-BUILDING

Grading consists of making rough places smooth or vice-versa. Perhaps a better definition is—grading is the placing of earth where it is wanted for specific effect. Verily, a mountain may be made of mole-holls, and level places made rolling by merely shifting earth according to design.

For hillside situations, a type of construction called terrace may be employed for practical and artistic results.

Terrace construction is work requiring skillful planning, carefully carried out in detail, and even then the job is not always successful at the outset, due to adverse weather conditions.

BACK YARD LANDSCAPE PLANTING

Your front yard is planted for effect from the street. If you want to see it at its best, you must go across the street. Isn't that true?

But whatever the material might be, the work should be done for the full benefit of **Mother** during her busy hours, and convenient for her to step out informally in partial seclusion at will.

(1) There are many back yards planted to flowers, shrubs and fruit trees, but too few that are artistically arranged for beauty of landscape and usefulness.

THE HOME GROUNDS TREES

CARE

Trees are live things and can suffer from thirst, hunger, insect ravages, fungus attack, and mechanical injury. Trees respond to good care—that is, proper feeding, watering, pruning, spraying, and surgery.

PRUNING

This work is best accomplished during the dormant or winter months, and consists of removing (in the right manner) all dead, diseased and superfluous branches, and sometimes changing the general form for specific effect, and improving the balance. Large wounds are painted for protection against fungus. All brush is disposed of and the result is pleasing to the eye and of much physical benefit to the tree. Sometimes a large dead limb is a source of danger

TAKING DOWN TREES

Dead trees and trees that are hollow and in danger of being blown over should be removed. Frequently, such trees are near buildings and wires or overhang the street where skill, extra care and special equipment are factors of much importance.

SPRAYING

All fruit trees and many shade trees need spraying from one to several times annually according to variety and prevalence of various pests. Nice fruit cannot be produced without the use of insecticides and fungicides. Your shade trees may be eaten alive by various insects, until suddenly you find they are dead.

PRUNING FRUIT TREES, VINES AND BUSHES

All fruit trees should be gone over every other year. The cost is small and the benefit large when the work is properly done. Apple trees, especially old ones, when neglected, become so badly entangled as to shut out the sun from the interior, resulting in many dead branches and but little good fruit.

But what wonderful response to thorough judicious pruning! Some seemingly hopeless specimens are so changed by rejuvenation process, that within three years there remains no resemblance to the original tree except the trunk; and the finest of fruit is the reward.

Grapevines, Raspberries and Blackberries require annual pruning, while Currants and Gooseberries may be pruned every other year.

TREE SURGERY

Hollow trees sometimes live for many years until at last a strong wind lays them low. A tree in the Home Grounds is often highly valued, and reasonably so. In some instances the loss of an old tree quite spoils the comfort and interest of the home; and always is keenly felt. Hence the practice of tree surgery, which has grown in the past twenty years by leaps and bounds.

A skilled tree-surgeon can actually put an artificial heart in a hollow tree, thereby strengthening the whole body and adding many years to its life. Split crotches and large limbs are often supported by iron rods and links in order to retain the symmetry of the tree from the devastating effect of a heavy storm.

TREE MOVING

Not all varieties of trees can be moved with equal chances of success, but many trees. (up to twenty-five feet high), may be moved to a new location quite safely when the work is skillfully executed. The transplanting of a tree s not difficult; but to do the work in a manner that assures success is a skillful operation.

TREE FEEDING

As the term indicates—consists of placing the right food in the right place in the right quantity at the right time, and the tree helps itself. Not all trees need to be fed. Some are thriving and need no assistance; others are merely alive and need help in order to grow well. Generally speaking, the older, larger trees suffer most, and slowly die from lack of plant food, having exhausted the soil within reach of its rootlets. Noticeable results follow correct tree-feeding.

WATERING TREES

Trees often suffer from lack of moisture, especially when living near the sunny side of a foundation and other dry locations. Then when a long drought comes they sometimes die. Contrary to general supposition the watering of trees and plants is not a simple, easy task; but rather it is a tedious operation, requiring knowledge, skill and patience, else the job is poorly done.

PLANTING SPECIMEN TREES

The Home Grounds need specimen trees, one or more, according to area. A sizeable tree (15 to 25 feet) gives a new home distinction and dignity as well as beauty and shade. A specimen tree may be evergreen or deciduous in many varieties, selected according to adaptibility and preference.
