Discount of 5 per cent. will be made on all orders of $\$$ Io or more, except on collections and special offers.

## Directions for Setting Up Mailing Boxes-New Style.

Moisten the corners a few minutes before using. Then with a small brush rub a little glue into the slot and also on the ends where dovetailed. Place the bottoms in the grooves and bend the piece around, driving the ends together with a small hammer or mallet. If one gets accidentally broken it can be easily nailed with short wire nails.

The sides and ends being made of one piece, with a groove for the bottom, they can be folded together very rapidly without the use of any nails whatever. The top is grooved so as to fit in, and only has to be tied in place.

One corner of the box goes together with dovetailing, and by putting a little glue in the corners a very firm box is made.
