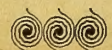

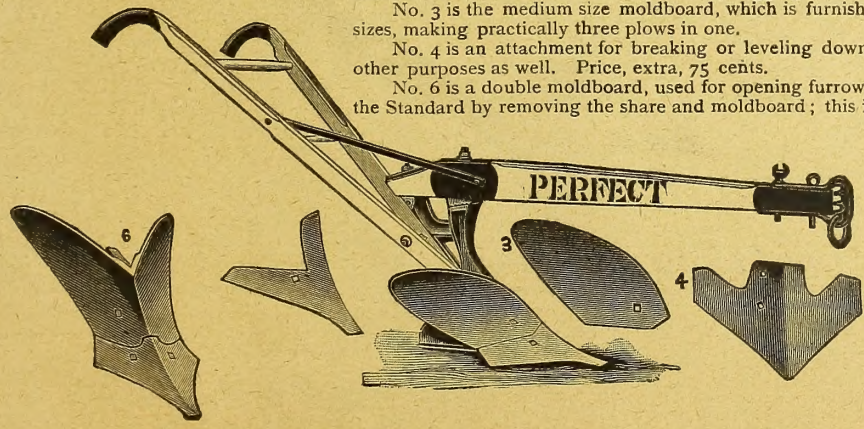

The beam is set high, which makes it excellent for plowing "boxes," "throwing" out carrots, parsnips, beets, salsify, celery, etc., which is a very valuable feature, as roots can be taken out five times faster this way than by digging them out in the old manner.

No. 3 is the medium size moldboard, which is furnished free with No. 0, Regular and Patent sizes, making practically three plows in one.

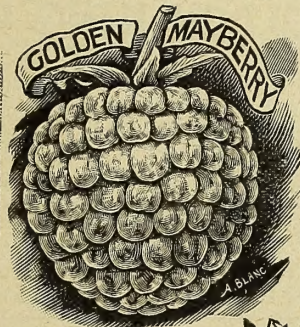

JAPANESE GOLDEN MAYBERRY.

STRAWBERRY-RASPBERRY.

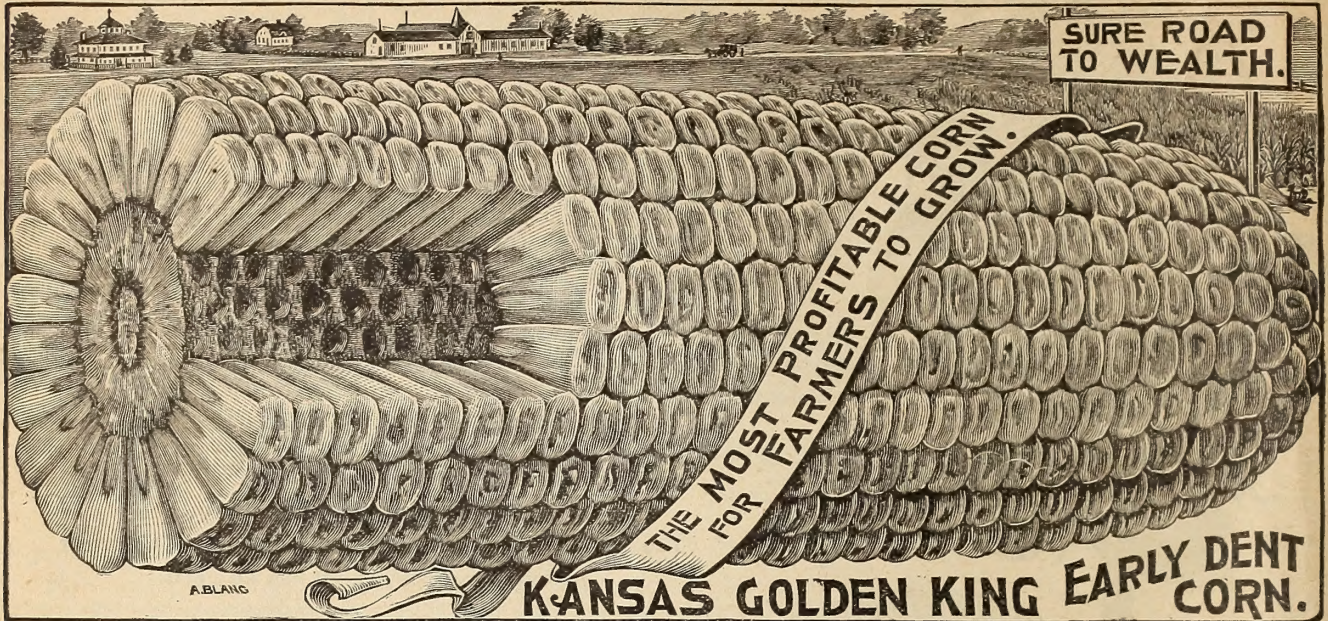

Peas and Oats for Fodder.

Dairymen everywhere are rapidly catching on to peas and oats and with the most profitable results. They make a fodder and hay which in every case doubles the production of milk. 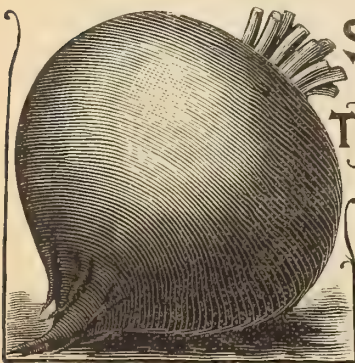

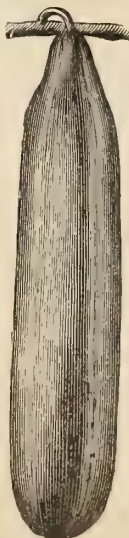

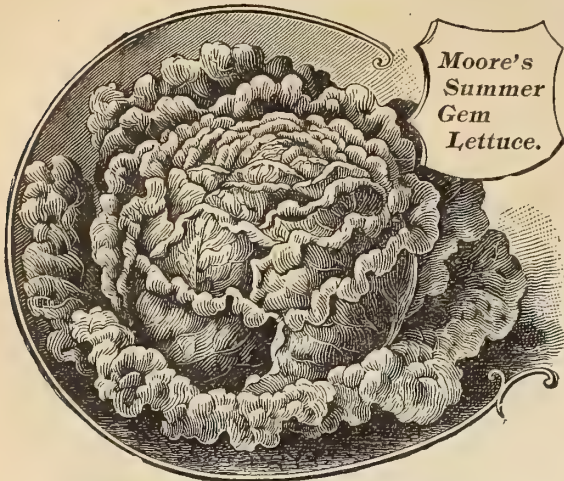

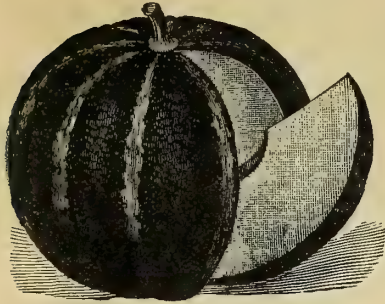

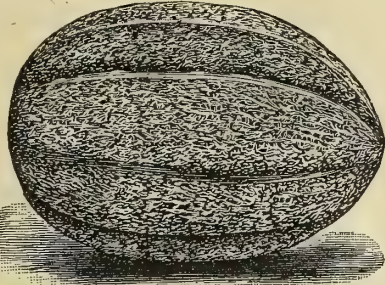

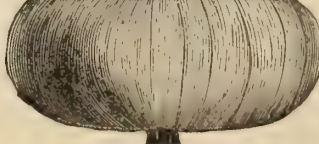

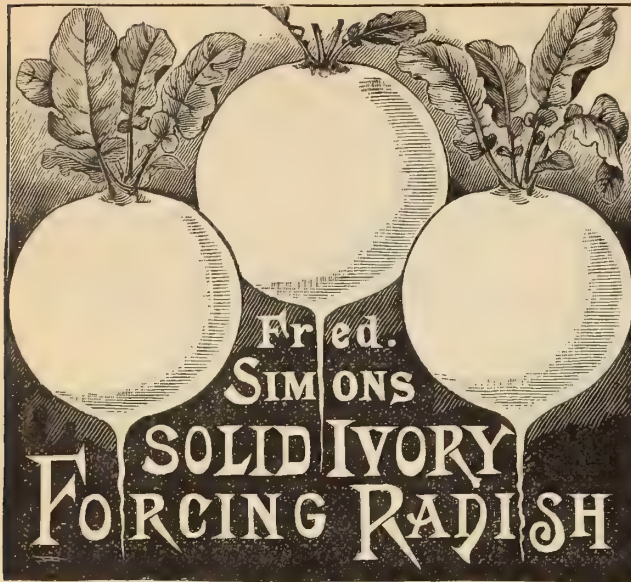

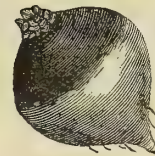

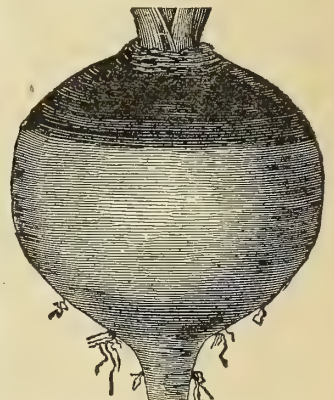
