## INTRODUCTION.

TO OLD AND NEW customers I will say, that this list of one bundred Hardy Pereunials has been selected from upward of 400 good sorts. This select list has resulted, 1 st., because each sort is deemed worthy of cultivation; 2nd., because ordinary care will insure satisfactory results to the purchaser. Many other equally raluable plants will be added as soon as sufficient stock is available. No one will regret ordering the entire list, and it is hoped that, surely, no one will fail to try a few items.

SOME S:RDS germinate slowly, and in rare cases not until the second year; but as a general thing germination is easy and not long delayed. Seeds are furnished of the species preceeded by (*) at ten cents (five pence) per packet.

TERMS. Plants are sent by mail, prepaid, to any P. O. in the U.S. A., if cash is sent with order. To all foreign countries they must be sent by express at purchasers' expense, but liberal concessions will be made in filling such orders. Seed are sent to Postal Union countries prepaid. Cash should accompany all small orders.

EXTRAS are usually sent with every order, and especially with express orders, but invaraibly of my own selection.

REMIT by Express or Postal Money Order, or International Postal Money Urder on Boulder, Colorado, U. S. A., or by Draft or Registered Letter. Small amounts in one or two cent U. S. stamps.

ORDERS should be sent as early as possible, and will then be filled at the most farorable moment in early spring. Late orders are acceptable, but are not alway so satisfactory.

ESTIMATES will be given on large collections, or for larger quantities than named, or on seeds in bulk.

BOTANICAL SPECIMENS of a large number of rare alpine plants are always on hand, and collectors will do well to correspond.

*Abronia fragrans.-Fragrant Abronia, 1 ft. A very desirable half trailing plant, of the Four o'Clock family; with large umbels of white, tubular flowers, in broad white or purplish involucres. Blooms freely all summer. Each, 20cents; per dozen, $\$ 2.00$.

* Aconitum Columbianum.-Blue Monk's Hood, 5 ft . A freely branching sort with dark blue flowers freely produced during the early summer months. Each 15 cents; per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.

4. *Anemone patens, var. Nuttalliana.-Wind Flower, $1 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. One of the earliest flowers. Large, lavender, crocus-shaped flowers, followed by the plumose fruit and laciniate, silky foliage. Each, 10 ceuts; per dozen, 75 cents.

Antennaria dioica.-Rosy Everlasting. A very dwarf perennial everlasting, with rose colored involucre and silky white foliage. Each, 15 cents; per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.

13. Canadensis.-Canadian Astragalus or Vetch, 1 ft . Erect sort, with deuse spikes of pale yellow flowers. Each, 20 cents; per dozen, $\$ 1.50$.
14. *hypoglottis.-Showy A. or Vetch, $1 \frac{\mathrm{ft}}{\mathrm{ft}}$. Very dwarf, flowers bright

2. *alium boreale.--Northern Bedstraw, 1 ft. A smontl, slender perennial, bearing a large panicle of fragrant white flowers, very showy, and extra good for cutting. Each. 25 cents.
3. Caura coccinea.-Scarlet Gaura, $\mathbf{1} \mathrm{ft}$. A rather showy plant, with white or rose colored flowers, changiug to scarlet. Blooms best in rather poor soil. Each, 10 cents; per dozen, 75 cents.
4. Centiana Bigelovii.-Blue Gentiana, $1 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. A very good variety, which does well in rather light garden sorl, in full sun or half shade. Each, 15 ceuts; per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.
5. *Ceranium Fremontii.-Wild Geranium, 1 ft. Of low bushy habit, blooming nearly all summer. Flower one inch across, purple. Each, 10 ceuts; per dozen, 75 cents.
6. *Cutierrezia Euthamiəe.-Shrubby Golden Rod, 1 ft . A low, shrubby composite, forming dense, hemispherical clumps; a ball of golden yellow in late summer; never spreading from the root like some Golden Rods. Each, 10 cents; per dozen, 75 cents.
7. Heracleum lanatum.-Cow Parsuip, 4 ft . A stately plant for wet places; forming heavy clumps of massive foliage, and very large umbels of snow white flowers. Each, 25 cents.
8. *Heuchera bracteata.-White Alum root, $1 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. An evergreen plant of good merit. Flowers straw-white, in short dense spikes, good foliage, useful for edgings, etc. Each, 15 cents; per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.
9. Sanguinea. - Scarlet Alum root, 1 ft . Very fine hardy plant from Southern Rocky Mountains; large sprays of intensly scarlet flowers, evergreen foliage. Each, 15 cents; per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.

14. Liatris punctata.-Blazing Star, 1 ft . A useful composite, with very showy heads of purple flowers; late summer. Each, 10 cents; per dozen, 75 cents.

*Serrulata.-Yellow Evening Primrose, 1 ft . A slender but much branched, low growing sort, very floriferous, flowers yellow, an inch across; 150 have been counted on one plant, at one time. Blooms continually from mid-summer till frost. Each, 15 cents: per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.
25. *Oxytropis Lamberti.-Crimson Loco, $1 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. Pinnate silky foliage, and spikes of crimson, pea-shaped flowers, arising from the grouud. Very beautiful. Each, 15 cents; per dozen, $\$ 1.00$.
