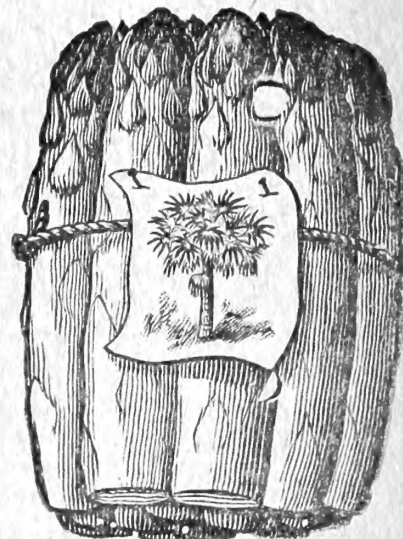

LIVINGSTON'S NEW PEARL FORCING RADISH.



PEARLY FORCING,—(The following is copied from the originator.)—This new sort introduced in the spring of 1891 is a cross between Wood's Early Frame and White Strasburg. A most distinguishing characteristic is its rich, waxy appearance. The shape is one long sought for, and the most advantageous for bunching, being what might be called half stump rooted. The color is pearl white, with the waxy appearance above described, and the texture is very firm and solid. It is about one week later than Wood's Early Frame, but after they are ready for marketing they remain in eatable condition fully two weeks longer, before they show signs of going to seed, and do not become woody. Their long standing after being ready for market without going to seed or becoming woody or unfit for table use, more than makes up for wide planting. If grown properly they have a smaller top in forcing than when grown in the open field. Don't Fail to add this excellent and wonderful squash to your garden.

Flesh deep orange yellow, cavity very small and few seeds. When uncooked it appears to have a shell like any other squash, when cooked there is practically none, the shell or inedible part being only as thick as a sheet of writing paper. 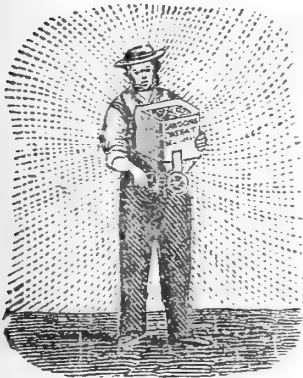
