



This list is to the TRADE ONLY, (nurserymen and large dealers.) We do not intend it for planters or merchants in other lines of trade. EACH ORDER is handled separately. After lifting, the trees are sent immediately to our large cellar where they are GRADED AND BUNCHED UNDER COVER, exposure is reduced to a minimum, and customers may depend upon receiving stock fresh, sound and in perfect condition.

TELEGRAPHIC ORDERS are usually shipped same day as received. We are conveniently located to express office and depots and have telephone connection with Western Union Office. A code word is given in this list for each grade. Use Nurserymen's Telegraphic Code. We will mail you copy on request.

STORAGE FACILITIES. We have here in Huntsville a cold storage warehouse with a capacity of 20 carloads and can hold stock here for bulk shipment in perfect condition until March 15th., to 20th. We take particular pains in storing our trees, using moss all through the roots as we would in packing in cases, and customers are sure of receiving trees with their vitality unimpaired.

THE ART OF PACKING has, through years of experience, by a member of our firm, been mastered. Our packing house is under his personal supervision during the shipping season. Your goods will be properly packed in moss and will open to your satisfaction.

IT IS NOT our ambition to be a low-priced house, but we strive to grow stock that is FIRST-CLASS, TO GRADE ACCURATELY, to have the handling and packing as good AS THE BEST. We expect to sell on the market. We believe this is the way to hold your trade.

BUDS. Our shipments of buds last season doubled shipments of former years, reaching points as far East as Boston, West to Oregon and South to Florida. NOT A SINGLE COMPLAINT AS TO CONDITION—strong evidence of the care we use in packing. We have shipped buds many years and think we understand how to handle them. No charge for packing. Five hundred at thousand rates. Add 25% to thousand rate if order is for less than five hundred.

TEN, HUNDRED and THOUSAND rates apply as follows:

If entire order is less than 50 trees the ten rate to apply. Orders for 50 to 300 trees and NOT LESS THAN TEN TREES of a variety at the hundred rate. Orders for 300 trees and over at the thousand rate. In all cases if less than ten trees of a variety are ordered the TEN RATE must apply.

TREES, SHRUBS and ROSES are tied in bundles of 10. GRAPE VINES, BERRY BUSHES, CURRANTS &c., are tied in bundles of 25.

Please make your order in multiples of these numbers.

Guarantee of Genuiness.

We exercise the greatest of care to keep our varieties PURE and TRUE to name, and we hold ourselves in readiness at all times to replace, on proper proof, all stock that may prove otherwise, or refund the amount paid; but it is mutually agreed between the purchaser and ourselves that we shall not at any time be liable for any amount greater than the original price of the goods.

Packing and Packing Cases.

Our packing season usually begins October 1st, and continues through the winter till March 1st. The work of packing is personally superintended by an experienced member of the Company. We pack in moss. No pains will be spared to make our packing as good as the best.

The cost of cases seven and one half to nine feet long, thirty inches, is \$2.50; twenty four inches, \$2; eighteen inches, \$1.50. Bales, 25 cents to 75 cents. No charge

for drayage.

Bales cost a higher rate of freight; so, as far as possible, we ship in cases.

Shipping.

Please state how goods must be sent; whether by freight or express; also, route. If no directions are given, we will ship as we think best serves customers' interest without assuming responsibility. The risk and cost of shipment belongs to purchaser.

Grades.

We grade carefully; in some cases by caliper, others by height. When by both, the caliper must govern. The lower number is included, and the higher number excluded. For instance, in a grade from four to five feet, four feet trees are included, but five feet go into the next grade. If plump five feet trees are wanted, the order must be for five to six feet. When possible we prefer to send samples to prospective customers.

Caution.

We accept all order upon the condition that they shall be void should any injury befall the stock from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other cause over which we have no control.

Claims.

All claims must be made immediately on receipt of goods or they will not be allowed.

NOTICE.

It is yet early to make an accurate scale of prices and we reserve the right to change these prices without notice as the season advances except where we have accepted orders.

SAN JOSE SCALE.

This pest has caused consternation among Nurserymen in this country, and we realize that to be abreast of the times and hold our trade we must take every precaution to keep our stock free of it. We have had our Nurseries thoroughly examined—see Entomologist's Certificate on last page—and have also arranged to fumigate with efficient chemicals all stock leaving our grounds this season. Customers may rest assured that no infested stock will be traced to our Nurseries. We will attach Entomologist's Certificate to each shipment going to States which have legislated against this pest, showing shipment to be free from it, thus avoiding all delay and expense of examination.

The Climate of North Alabama.

For the information of some of our friends who may think Alabama trees are not quite hardy because grown in such a hot country far "away from frost", we would say: ten to twelve years ago we Chase boys were living up in the State of Maine where we had a chance to learn something of cold weather; at that time we thought Alabama must be a flat, hot, tropical country, growing Oranges and Bananas, Alligators, Snakes, etc., but, we find a State of Maine ulster is right in place in an Alabama winter!

Huntsville is in the extreme northern part of the State, up next to the Tennessee line, surrounded by the Cumberland mountains; in a beautiful valley, 800 feet above the level of the sea and at the foot of Monte Sano Mountain which rises 1000 feet higher; it is 320 miles by government survey noth of the Gulf, and about the same distance from Indianapolis. The topography is not unlike many

sections of New England.

The winters are not severe but too cold to attract northern people seeking a mild climate, they go farther During the six winters we have lived here the mercury has twice fallen to four below and once to six below zero, of course but for a short time, every winter we expect two to six above weather. Four winters ago one of our cousins came to visit us and froze her ears the first day she was here, not because it was awfully cold here, but because she thought a sunny day in Alabama could not For the last week of January, 1894, the average minimum temperature here was 19, average maximum temperature 43, while in Rochester for the same week it was, minimum 17, maximum 42. For the first two weeks of February, 1895, the average minimum temperature here was 16, maximum 31: Rochester minimum 5, maximum For the month of August, 1895, average minimum temperature here was 69, maximum 90: in Rochester it was minimum 60, maximum 77.2. Spring opens earlier here than farther north. We can usually begin planting the latter part of February, and our stock has a longer season of growth while our trees ripen in the nursery much earlier than in the nurseries in New To our mind a Hydrangea grown here is as hardy as if grown "down in Maine" and is as well adapted for planting at Bar Harbor as if grown there, perhaps better, because heavier rooted and a little stronger, and we think our Cherry or Plum trees as well suited for Iowa or Nebraska orchards as any grown on the globe. Orchards in these states that came from here will bear us out in this opinion.

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
