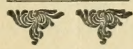

Achillea Ptarmica—A neat growing plant, covered during Spring and Summer with sprays of white flowers, useful for cutting. \$1.00 per doz.

Anemone Coronaria (St. Brigid's)—A magnificent strain of dwarf Anemones, with flowers of immense size, varying in color from pure white to dark crimson. \$1.00 per doz.

Aquilegia Cœrulea Hybrida—A new and beautiful strain. Hybrids, between our native species "Chrysantha" and the Rocky Mountain variety, Cœrulea; in size the flowers exceed either of the parent species. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Aubretia Leichtlini—A handsome plant suitable for rockeries, covered during Spring and Summer with rosy carmine flowers. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Begonia, Tuberos Rooted—Single varieties; color: white, yellow, light rose, dark rose, orange, dark blood red, cream, scarlet. 25c each; Double varieties, 30c each.

Mrs. A. Hardy—White incurved, hairy.

Mrs. Robinson—White, late. Extra.

Mrs. Rieman—Yellow. A grand variety.

Mrs. Ames—Yellow. Very fine.

Philadelphia—Light yellow.

Princess May—White, incurved. Late.

R. J. Gause—Reddish bronze; immense size.

Vivian Morel—Pink. The best early variety.

Pres. Smith—Shell pink. Extra.

Chrysanthemum Maximum—A perennial species with bright green leaves and handsome pure white flowers, 3 inches in diameter. Invaluable for cutting purposes. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Cinerarias—In assorted colors, extra strong. 25c each, smaller 20c each.

Clematis Jackmanii—Large flowered purple variety. An elegant climber for shady situations. 75c each.

Coreopsis Grandiflora—One of the most useful perennials of recent introduction. Flowers golden yellow on long wiry stems; useful for cutting. 15c each, \$1.50 per dozen.

Cyclamen, Giganteum Strain—A magnificent selection, ranging in color from pure white to dark crimson. 20c each, \$2.25 per doz. *4 in pots \$1.00 per 100*

Cyperus Alternifolius—Ornamental foliage plant: useful for decorative purposes. 15c each.

Daisies—New Giant Double. 30c per doz.

Dahlias—Assorted, Double. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Delphiniums—These are coming plants for Californian gardens. Our collection includes many fine varieties, both double and single, ranging in color from sky-blue to indigo and purple. When well grown the spikes of bloom reach a height of six feet. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Forget-me-not (Myosotis), Blue Perfection—The finest of all Forget-me-nots, large flowers, sky-blue. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

“ **Victoria**—Dwarf and compact, useful for pots. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Fuchsias—In variety. Single and Double. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Gaillardias—New large flowering hybrids, very useful for cutting, the blooms lasting a week, in water. Colors, yellow to deep crimson. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Geraniums—New large doubles. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

“ **Souv. de Chas. Turner**—A new Ivy-leaved variety with flowers of immense size, the individual florets reaching a diameter of two inches. Color, deep rich rose. 15c each.

Helianthus Multiflorus—Double perennial variety. Flowers, golden yellow; extremely useful for cutting. 15c each.

“ **Bouquet d'Or**—A new variety, the petals of the flower are imbricated, resembling a reflexed Japanese Chrysanthemum. 20c each.

Heuchera Sanguinea—An elegant low growing plant from Mexico, bearing on long foot stalks delicate, coral red, bell-shaped flowers, useful for hanging-baskets. 15c each.

Iberis Gibraltarica—A handsome plant of procumbent habit; flowers, white and lilac, useful for borders. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz. *\$9 per 100*

Iberis Jucunda—In habit similar to the preceding; flowers, rose color. 15c each.

Iberis Garreuxiana—One of the best; flowers pure white. 15c each.

Iris Kaempferi (Japanese Iris)—The finest of all Iris. Our collection includes both double and single varieties. Strong clumps. 20c each, \$2.25 per doz.

Inula Glandulosa—A handsome Alpine with large golden-yellow flowers. 20c each.

Lillium Tigrinum, Fl. Pl.—The double Tiger Lily. Flowers orange, spotted crimson. Strong bulbs from pots. 15c each.

Lobelia—Useful for borders. \$1.25 per 100.

Pansies—All the finest strains, Bugnots, Cassiers, and others. 25c per doz.

Pæonies (Herbaceous)—In great variety. 30c each.

Papaver Orientalis—New Hybrids. The flowers of this strain reach the diameter of twelve inches. Extra fine young plants. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Papaver Naudicale (Iceland Poppies)—These like the preceding are of perennial duration, but with smaller flowers. Colors, white, orange and yellow. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Penstemons—Flowers bell-shaped on long graceful spikes, fine for cutting. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Petunias—Giant, single varieties, 75c per doz. Giant, double, \$1.25 per doz.

Polyanthus—Elegant plants for shady positions.

“ **Giant White**—An extra fine variety. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

“ **Mixed Gold Laced**—10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Phlox (Perennial) Decussata—From one of the very finest European collections, trusses immense, invaluable for border decoration. Strong clumps. 15c each.

Potentillas—Plants of dwarf habit, bearing double flowers, ranging from yellow to crimson. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Primrose—New large flowered Hybrids, varying much in color. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Primula (Chinese Primrose)—Unexcelled for winter blooming, useful for indoor decoration. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Pyrethrum (Uliginosum)—One of the most useful plants for cutting purposes, growing four to five feet high and covered during Summer and Autumn with large pure white flowers. Strong clumps. 25c each.

Pyrethrum Roseum—One of the most useful of all hardy plants, having elegant deeply divided fern-like foliage and large flowers, both double and single. Colors pure white to dark crimson. Strong clumps. 25c each, smaller 15c.

Ranunculus (Giant French Varieties)—These excel in size of flowers and vigor of constitution both the Turban and Persian strains. Dry roots 50c per doz.

Ranunculus Repens—A creeping species with glossy green foliage and double golden yellow flowers. Exceedingly useful for shady rockeries. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Roses—In great variety. List on application. \$2.00 to \$3.00 per doz.

Smilax—Strong roots. 10c each, \$1.00 per doz.

Spiræa Japonica Compacta—One of the finest of all Spiræas, large plumes of feathery white flowers.

Statice Latifolia—This species forms heads composed of myriads of bright blue flowers. A single head often measuring two feet across. 15c each, \$1.50 per doz.

Violets (Double)—Swanley White. The best double white, fragrant. 35c per doz.

“ **Marie Louise**—Blue. 35c per doz. The largest and best double.

Violets (Single) Czar—Intensely fragrant, deep purple. 35c per doz.
