Terms. Cash with order, or satisfactory city reference. I will ship by express, C. O. D, on orders exceeding $\$ 10.00$, if 25 per cent. of the amount is remitted with order. Cannot ship C. O. D. by freight.

Write Address Plainly. Write your Name, Post Office and State plainly, and in full on every letter. When express or freight office is different from Post Office, advise me of the same.

Seeds, Etc., by Weight or Measure. Less than $1 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$. and $1 / 4$ bushel will be charged at slight advance in price above pound and bushel rates.

About Warranting Seeds. I would have it distinctly understood that I do not warrant Seeds in any sense of the term, and while I consider the goods I sell of superior order and QUALITY, and exercise the greatest care to secure only pure and reliable seeds, the fact is pertinent and undeniable that crops may fail, no matter how fresh or pure the seeds sown to produce them may be, owing to causes the most expert cultivator cannot control. Therefore, if the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these terms and conditions, they must be returned at once, and the money that has been paid for the same will be refunded.

Postal Service. The postal arrangements admit the sending of seed parcels, etc., to any part of the United States at the rate of eight cents a pound. I will send, postpaid, all Garden and Flower Seeds, sold in packets or by the ounce, but for seeds in bulk, postage to the amount of eight cents per pound must be added to Catalogue prices.

For postage on Peas and Beans, add 15 cents per quart, and on Corn 15 cents per quart to Catalogue Prices. When ordered by the ounce, either Vegetable or flower Seeds will be sent by mail at Catalogue price without extra charge.

Columbian Mammoth White Asparagus. This appears to be a distinct variety, producing fine large stalks, nearly a pure white the entire length, and retaining this condition as long as fit for use. It is very early and produces abundantly throughout the Asparagus season. It has become a great favorite in the markets and commands a better price than any of the older kinds. Price per pkt., 5 c. ; per oz., 10 c . ; per lb., 50 c .

Davis Kidney Wax Bush Beans. This Bean has been introduced as a little better than anything ever before grown, painted, or even thought of, and if half the commendations showered upon it are realized it should have a place in every garden. The plant is a vigorous grower, carrying the pods clear of the ground. It is early, very productive, making long oval pods of a rich golden yellow color, which hold in condition for a snap bean a long time and are absolutely rustless. ## The Lupton Cabbage.

Mr . Lupton, the originator of this Cabbage, is one of the largest producers of Cabbage seed in this country. For years he has made the business a
careful study and devoted his time to it exclusively and annually controls the crops on many acres on Long Island. A statement made by him is never questioned by people who know him. He says:
"The Lupton Cabbage is the result of an effort to combine in one variety the best qualities of the second-early and the late sorts. All late sorts are good because of their strong constitution and vigorous growth; and objectionable because they cannot be bred so true and will produce sporis and wild growth. The second early sorts, on the other hand, can be bred very true and are of better quality, but they have not the constitution of the late ones, and under unfavorable conditions, due to insects or other causes, will sometimes fail absolutely when a late sort might produce a partial crop. Now, if we could make the Lupton Cabbage combine the best points of the second-early and
 late sorts we should have the best main-crop Cabbage. To a certain extent it does this. I do not know anything with a more healthy constitution, and I do not know of a Cabbage which I would as soon plant for a maincrop variety as this one. It is a little earlier than any one of the various strains of Flat Dutch and Drumhead and of closer growth. The heads are particularly large in proportion to the plant, which grows strong, but does not spread out much. The stalk is rather short, color dark green. In a great measure we appear to have succeeded in getting rid of the coarseness of the late sorts, as the quality is fine; it is also one of the best keepers we have, and comes out in the spring bright and fresh; the heads are not likely to crack open, although it will not stand as long as All Seasons, which is quite a remarkable Cabbage in this respect." Young Asparagus shoots are fit for use in the spring, when a few inches high. Sow the seeds early in the spring, in drills about one inch deep, and rows about a foot apart. Keep the soil mellow and free from weeds during the summer, and in the fall or the succeeding spring the plants may be set out in beds about two feet apart each way, learing the crown of the root about four inches below the surface. Before winter, corer the bed with a dressing of manure. Purchasing roots instead of seed will save a year in time.

Thrives best in good rich, rather damp soil, and should be planted two weeks earlier than other beans, in rows about two feet apart and six in the row

Sow seeds in hot bed or very early in open ground (it is slow to germinate), and should be kept very moist or satisfactory results will not be realized. Sow in straight rows for convenience in weeding when plants are very small. When two or three inches high thin out, or transplant to three inches apart. Celery requires very rich soil and plenty of water. Plants may be set from May till the middle of August. The old method of setting in trenches is preferred by some, but usually in a small way. To set plants in trenches, remove six to ten inches of earth and replace with four to six inches of manure and loam. The large growers plant most of the crop upon the surface, having previously plowed in all the manure possible, and setting in rows two to four feet apartland six inches in the row. When the plants have nearly attained their growth the leaves should be drawn together and earth drawn up to them about one-third of the height of the plant, care being taken to prevent the earth falling between the leaves, which is very liable to rust and rot them. In about a week the second handling will admit drawing the earth nearly to the top of the leaves, leaving but two or three inches exposed and completing the blanching process. Blanching may also be accomplished by use of two wide boards set up firmly on either side and held together by stakes or other device for keeping firmly in place, and good results are obtained.

Mushrooms may be cultivated much easier than is generally supposed. They may be grown in a cellar or shed, or in beds prepared in the open air in the same manner as hot-beds. Take fresh horse manure, shake it well apart and lay it into a heap to ferment. Turn and mix it well every three or four days by shaking together the outside of the heap, which is cold and the inside, which is hot, so that every part of it may be equally fermented and deprived of its noxious quality. When the dung is in a fit state to be made into a bed, which will be in two or three weeks after it has been put together to ferment, select a dry spot for a foundation. Mark out the bed, which should be four feet wide and as long as you choose to make it. In making the bed mix the dung well together, beating it down with a fork until

Onion seed should be sown as early as it is possible to work the ground, in drills one inch deep and twelve to sixteen inches apart, in rich soil, deeply dug and lightly rolled. For general crops the ground should be well-manured the previous year, which causes them to yield more abundantly. They are usually planted in double rows, three or four inches apart, and covered to the depth of two and one-half to three inches. This is the average

depth, though some contend that greater depth prevents the premature decay of the vines. The height of the pea depends much upon the moisture and richness of the ground. The crop should be gathered as fast as it becomes fit for use. If eren a few of the pods begin to ripen, young pods will not only cease to form but those partly adranced will cease to enlarge. All wrinkled peas are superior to and more delicate in flaror than those that present a full and perfect form; like sugar corn, the saccharine matter which they contain causes them to shrivel when dried, and they will remain much longer in season than the other kinds.
