HOW TO ORDER.

In making out orders from this list the following rules must be complied with:

- 1st. You may state how many Roses, Geraniums, Carnations, &c., &c., you want, and give the color preferred, but we reserve the right to select the varieties. Persons wishing special named varieties will please select from catalogue at prices therein given.
- 2nd. No order will be accepted from this list for a less amount than 50 cents unless other goods are ordered that will together amount to 50 cents or more.
- 3rd. No discounts or premiums will be allowed. The prices are net—5 cents each.
- 4th. Persons ordering 50 or more plants and who are willing to pay the express charges may select plants from this list at 4 cents each. Such orders will be carefully packed in light baskets or boxes, purchaser to pay express charges. We can usually send larger plants by express and always add extras to help pay charges.

To all, both old and new, we tender our sincere and hearty thanks, and ask a continuance of your kind patronage. It shall always be our aim to carefully fill all orders entrusted to us in an honest and faithful manner. The old saying

"Honesty is the Best Policy"

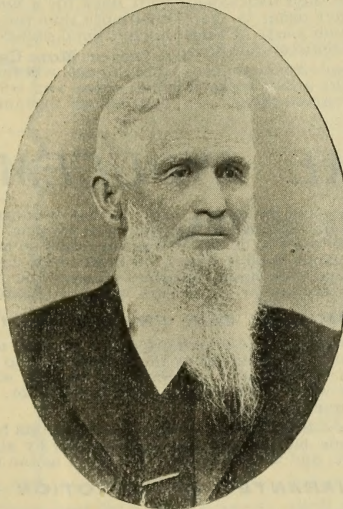
can nowhere be better applied than in the Florists and Seedsmen business in these times when deliberate misrepresentations are so common, and Catch Penny offers are confronting the buyer on all sides. We point with pardonable pride to the rapid growth of our business during the recent years of financial depression, when the complaint was general among other dealers that trade was not satisfactory. We believe our success due to truthful representations and reasonable prices which are interesting features of our catalogue.

OUR METHOD.

Our method of doing business differs materially from that of other dealers. The general custom is to issue large, showy catalogues with fancy colored covers and numerous lithograph plates, and depend on extensive newspaper advertising for their distribution, all of which is wonderfully expensive, the expense of course being paid by the patrons who are charged more than the actual value for the goods they purchase. Our idea is that

A Pleased Customer is the Best Advertisement.

We aim to be economical in expenses. We issue an inexpensive catalogue, and do not spend a cent in newspaper advertising but depend entirely on our patrons to aid us in extending our trade. As a result our expenses are nominal, and we are able to sell our goods at from 20 to 50 per cent. less than other dealers; of course other dealers try to make you believe that our goods are too cheap to be good and that you must pay their prices to secure reliable goods, whereas the fact is you are simply paying for their fancy catalogues and expensive advertising and not for any superior quality in the goods you get. A year ago we asked our patrons for names of their friends that we might send each a catalogue; after sending out two hundred thousand catalogues, we had more than fifty thousand names left. Now do you think we would have received a quarter of a million names from our patrons if they had not been satisfied?

Please notice that we are offering almost everything at only 2 to 3 cents per packet, which is from 25 to 50 per cent. below other responsible dealers. We also state very plainly just how many seeds each packet will contain, which will be found to be considerably above the average quantity furnished by other dealers. We handle only the best grade of seeds and do not hesitate to guarantee them equal in every respect to the majority of seed sent out, and vastly superior to some. We don't claim our seeds to be better than all others, as seedsmen generally send out good seed, but we do insist that they are equal in quality.

HOW TO ORDER.

MUCH TROUBLE, DELAY AND DISAPPOINTMENT MAY BE AVOIDED BY OBSERVING THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS.

Use our Order Sheet. Please use the enclosed Order Sheet, as it will insure the more prompt and correct filling of your order.

Fill Out All Blanks Carefully, especially for your name and address, and state how you wish goods forwarded, whether by mail or express.

One Article on Each Line. Write name of only one article on each line and mark the price on the same line and in the proper column.

Plant and Seed Orders Separate. Please enter order for Seeds and Plants separately, and therefore avoid errors and annoyance.

Club Order. Do not forget to give full name of each member of club. Plants will be mailed direct to individual members if desired, when the amount is fifty cents or more. Otherwise they will be forwarded together to the one sending in the order.

Write Your Name Plainly and always the same way. Ladies sometimes send orders in their own name, and perhaps make enquiry about their order in their husbands name. This often causes much waste of time and annoyance in looking through our registers and files.

Don't Mix Your Order and correspondence together; if you wish to write concerning the order, write it on the back of order sheet or on a separate sheet.

Be Explicit. When writing concerning an order state full particulars: when order was sent, how much money was enclosed, and in what manner, whether by Money Order or Registered letter, etc. Wait a reasonable time before entering complaint, as we are sometimes overwhelmed with orders that it is impossible to respond as promptly as we would like.

Rectifying Mistakes. In the rush of filling thousands of orders mistakes sometimes occur. We always hold ourselves in readiness to correct all errors. In writing, state just what was omitted as briefly as possible. Don't take it for granted that we can remember everything regarding your order. When we receive and fill almost a thousand orders in a single day it is impossible for us to recollect any particular order.

Size of Order. Orders for plants will not be accepted for a less amount than fifty cents, as it requires almost as much trouble and expense registering, checking, packing and filling small orders for one or two plants as it does for a dollar order, and the expense would cost more than the order would amount to. We will accept Seed orders amounting to 25 cents or more.

Two or More Catalogues. It sometimes occurs that persons will receive two or more catalogues. In such cases you will confer a favor on us as well as your friends by handing it to those interested.

SPECIAL INDUCEMENTS.

A common practice among Florists and Seedsmen, and one that we formerly followed, is to offer special premiums, discounts, plants or seeds extra, etc., with each order, ranging from 20 to 25 per cent, according to the size of the order, and of course in order to do this it was necessary to mark all prices that much above the actual value. Now we believe this system is all wrong. It is misleading, a source of misunderstanding and unjust to the purchaser of limited means. We have therefore adopted the plan of marking all prices down to their net value so that whether you want one or ten dollars worth, you know just what each article will cost.

PLEASE COMPARE OUR PRICES WITH OTHERS,

and we believe you will find that you can purchase more goods for your money from us than from any other responsible dealer in the country. Don't be deceived by their offers of 10 to 25 per cent. discount. Notice that we offer you almost everything in the seed line at 2 to 3 cents per packet, which is equivalent to almost 50 per cent. discount, and plants that others want to charge you 10 to 15 cents for, we offer you at 5 to 6 cents, which is also equivalent to 50 per cent. discount or more.

CLUB ORDERS. Of course we cannot offer the liberal inducements for club orders that others can who charge you double the prices for goods, but we will pay you liberally by allowing you to select extra goods, select what you think you should have, and we will be just as liberal as the nature of the order will allow.

REMEMBER WE GUARANTEE SATISFACTION IN EVERY CASE.

TERMS:

REMITTANCES. All orders must be accompanied by cash. We keep no book accounts with our customers and will in no case fill orders when there is no remittance.

HOW TO SEND MONEY. All money should be sent by Post Office Money Order, Bank draft on New York, Express Money Order, or by Registered Letter. If sent by any of the above ways it is at our risk, but if sent in an ordinary letter it will be at the sender's risk. It is to your interest to send money in the safest way.

MONEY ORDERS. We consider the Postal Money Order the most convenient and safest as well as the least expensive. Since the Postal Note has been discontinued, you can purchase a Money Order for any amount under \$2.50 for 3 cents, and from \$2.50 to \$5.00 for 5 cents. We would recommend our patrons to always purchase a Money Order where they can be procured.

MAKE ALL MONEY ORDERS PAYABLE AT CALLA, OHIO.

STAMPS. Please don't send stamps unless absolutely necessary, as they so often become damp in transit and stick together, causing much annoyance and frequently the entire destruction of the stamps.

SILVER may be sent for small amounts, but should always be wrapped in paper before enclosing to prevent it wearing through the envelope. Where Money Orders cannot be procured, silver may be sent in amounts under 50 cents at our risk, but for larger amounts have it registered and select extra goods to value of fee.

IMPORTANT. We wish to urge the importance of sending all money in a safe manner as described above. We will bear the extra expense by allowing our patrons to select extra goods to the amount of Money Order or Registering fees. It is to your interest to send money in the safest manner possible.

PLEASE BE CAREFUL and write your Name and Address plainly. We can readily make out what is wanted in an order, no matter how carelessly it is written, as we are acquainted with the names of all our plants, but we have no means of knowing what your name is or how it should be spelled unless you write it plainly. We receive many orders that are well written throughout, but when we look to see who sends them the name is so carelessly written that we are obliged to guess at it. Again we say, please sign your name carefully, as it will save much annoyance, and possibly prevent errors.

The average cost of all the seed sold throughout the country by the different Seedsmen, does not exceed two cents per packet, delivered, postpaid at your Post Office. The great expense of the business is in the large, showy Illustrated Catalogues with fancy colored covers and numerous lithograph plates, and in the extensive newspaper advertising required to secure the orders. You will no doubt be surprised when we tell you that it costs probably twice as much to sell the seeds, as the seeds themselves cost, nevertheless this is a fact. One Seedsmen, it is said, spends over thirty thousand dollars annually in newspaper advertising, and as much more in Catalogues; another Seedsmen made the statement, that every new order he received cost him on an average eighty cents in newspaper advertising, and we venture to say that the seeds required to fill these orders did not cost him half that amount. Of course all this expense is added to the cost of the seed, and the purchaser pays it by paying 5 to 10 cents for a small packet of seed, the real value of which is not over half as much. Our object in stating these facts is to show you that it is possible to sell the best grade of

Garden Seed at 2 to 3 cts. per packet.

We differ from other Seedsmen in several particulars. We have a well equipped printing office, and do all our own printing, (our M. B. Templin being a practical printer.) We are issuing this season two hundred and fifty thousand Catalogues, requiring over twenty tons of paper. In this alone we save largely in expense. We do not spend a nickel in newspaper advertising, but depend exclusively on the aid of our patrons to extend our trade. Last season we ask our patrons to send us the names of their friends in order that we might mail each a copy of our Catalogue. How did they respond? After sending over two hundred thousand Catalogues, we had over fifty thousand names left that we did not use. Why do our patrons respond so liberally? Because they get more good, honest, reliable seeds from us for their money, than they can procure elsewhere, and they are anxious that their friends and neighbors may have an opportunity to patronize us also. We handle only the best grade of seeds. We don't claim them better than all others; such assertions are silly. We are enabled to offer them at such reasonable prices, because of your liberal patronage and kind assistance in extending our trade, thereby obviating the necessity of expending all our profits in newspaper advertising. We simply pay our patrons for aiding us by furnishing seeds at reduced prices, rather than to pay newspapers for advertising.

DISCOUNT OR PREMIUMS.

The usual custom among Seedsmen, is to allow a discount of about 20 per cent. from Catalogue prices on seeds in packets, or in other words, send them \$1.00 and they will allow you to select seeds to the value of \$1.25 which is equivalent to paying 4 cents for each 5 cent packet, and 8 cents for 10 cent packets. Please notice that we have marked our lowest net cash prices throughout the catalogue, for example, all seeds that other dealers list at 5 cents per packet we price at 2 and 3 cents per packet, and seeds that they list at 10 cents we price at 5 cents per packet, which is equivalent to about 50 per cent. discount. In fact for the last two years we allowed a uniform discount of 50 per cent. on all seeds in packets. This plan was not altogether satisfactory, as many patrons did not fully understand and would write us for explanation. They could not believe it possible to sell reliable seeds so cheap. In order that there be no further misunderstanding, we will hereafter mark all goods down to the lowest net cash prices, so that our patrons will know just what they are paying for.

Remember we guarantee our seeds equal in every respect to any on the market.

We don't claim them to be better than seeds sold by other reliable seedsmen. In our opinion any seedsmen who attaches his name to almost everything he offers, and claims that none are genuine unless purchased from him needs watching. We only claim to furnish good, honest, reliable seeds in large well filled packets, at reasonable prices. Our goods speak for themselves. Our future business depends on the quality of the goods we handle. Our trade has increased at a remarkable rate during the recent depressing times, while the universal report from the seed trade was very unsatisfactory. We mention this fact only to prove that our goods give general satisfaction. We are determined to furnish in the future, as in the past, only seeds of excellent quality.

PLEASE NOTICE! There is just one condition that we ask our patrons to comply with and that is this: Please do not send orders for a less amount than 25 cents. It will be readily seen that we cannot except orders for only one or two packets of seed at 2 or 3 cents per packet, as the clerical work of registering, filling, checking, blinding, etc., would cost more than it would amount to. Ask your neighbors to join with you, we always add liberally of choice extras to pay for club orders.

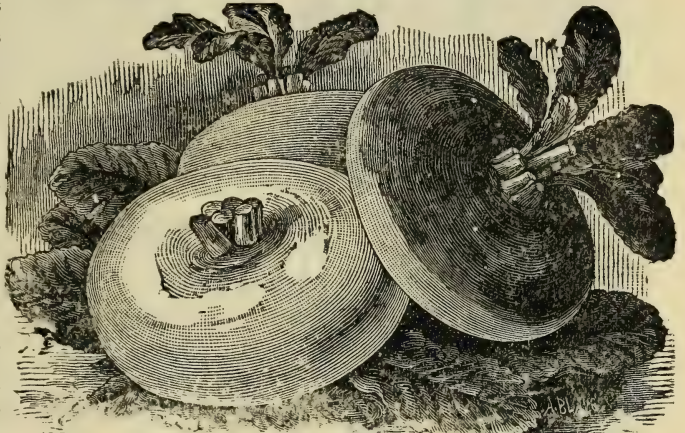

HINTS ON SOWING SEEDS.

A great many amateurs fail to get their seeds to grow and then condemn the seeds when the fault is altogether in the treatment and not in the seeds. Our space will only allow us to give very brief directions, which however if followed out will insure success even to the amateur.

THE SOIL.—The soil should be a mellow, sandy loam well enriched with old, well rotted manure. A good plan is for every flowerlover to have soil always prepared as follows: Cut a quantity of sods from some fertile pasture or fence corner; pile them up with alternate layers of old manure, leaf mould, chip dirt, etc. If the soil is not naturally sandy add some sand. Allow it to decay for two or three months after which cut down and thoroughly incorporate, and you will have a prime article of potting soil, which should be covered to prevent becoming too wet during autumn and winter.

SOWING THE SEED.—Make the surface of the soil as fine and even as possible; lay off in rows three or four inches apart with a lath or edge of a thin board; mark out very shallow for the finest seeds, and from one-fourth to one-half an inch for the larger ones, according to the size of the seeds. Sow evenly in the rows, being very careful to drop no seeds between the rows. The finest seeds, such as *Portulacaeas*, *Lobelias*, etc., should not be covered at all. Larger seeds should be covered from one-eighth to one-half inch in depth, according to size. When sown go over the entire bed and press the soil down evenly and firmly with the hand. Now be very careful that the soil does not become dry on the surface before the seeds come up. A good plan is to cover the bed with a damp cloth until they begin to come up. There are some kinds of seeds that should be sown before the ground is fit to be sown in out of doors; they should be started in boxes in the house or in hot beds; the latter is always the most satisfactory as it provides a warm, moist, even temperature, which is difficult to obtain with boxes in a living room. We wish to emphasize the importance of close attention as the tiny germs are very tender; once allow them to become too dry after they commence to germinate and they will perish; while on the other hand it requires very careful watering to prevent washing them out

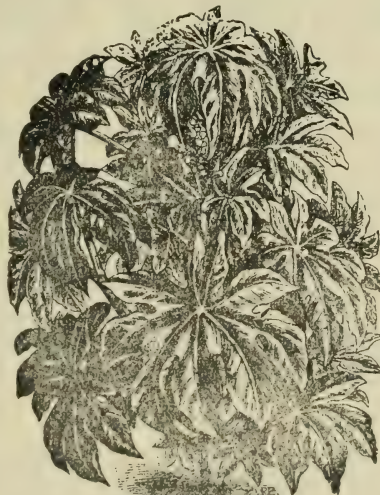

OUR GUARANTY. We Guarantee all Plants and Seeds to reach their destination in a good growing condition.

OUR RESPONSIBILITY. As stated above, we guarantee all goods to reach their destination in a live condition, but when we have done this our responsibility ceases, because we know that if they receive proper treatment they will grow nicely. Many plants die from careless treatment and neglect. In such cases we cannot and should not be expected to replace them, as we cannot guarantee plants when neglected.

PURCHASER'S CHOICE OF VARIETY is always complied with if remittance is made at full single rate as per catalogue. In growing so many varieties our stock of some will occasionally become exhausted. To provide for such cases we request that two or three plants be named at the end of orders as **Second Choice**, from which we can choose, but we will not use them except in case of necessity.

CORRECTION OF ERRORS. We take all possible care to avoid errors, and when they occur we wish to be informed at once that we may correct them. We cannot afford to have our patrons dissatisfied, and will not, if prompt and careful attention to their wants will prevent it.

TREATMENT OF PLANTS.

PLANTS RECEIVED BY MAIL, if wilted, should be placed in luke-warm water for twenty to thirty minutes. This restores their vigor, revives their leaves and increases their vitality.

THE SOIL for potting should be composed of about two-thirds well rotted sods and one-third rotted manure. When the rotted sods cannot be procured, good rich garden soil with the addition of the rotted manure and a little sand thoroughly mixed together will answer very well.

POTTING. Do not use too large a pot at first; we would recommend not larger than three inches, and as the plants grow re-pot into larger ones. Place a few pieces of broken pots in the bottom of the pot and be careful to press the soil firmly about the roots. Do not fill the pot quite full of soil, but leave a half-inch space to receive water. When potted, water sufficiently to soak the soil thoroughly, then place the pot in a warm sheltered place where they will not be exposed to the wind or sun for two or three days, or until they commence to grow. After they have become thoroughly established they should not be watered too freely, as there are more plants injured by too much water than too little.

BEDDING. Great care should be used in bedding out plants when received by mail. They should be thoroughly watered and carefully protected from the wind and sun until they become well established. It would be better in most cases to plant in pots for a few days before bedding out, as they must be well protected until they commence to grow.

INSECTS. For *Scale*s, which attack *Palms*, *Ivies*, *Camelias*, &c., lodging on the stems and under sides of the leaves, there is no remedy but scratching off and destroying. The white *Mealy Bug* shows itself in a brown dried condition of the leaves, and is an indication of too dry an atmosphere. Frequent and thorough spraying to moisten the foliage is the best preventative, and the only cure. *Green Lice*, or *Aphis*, is best destroyed by tobacco smoke, or tobacco tea made of ½ lb tobacco stems to six quarts of water and applied to the foliage.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS.

THE improvements made in this popular autumn flower during the past few years has been so great, that, for late and early winter blooming, no other plant can compare with it. As the Chrysanthemum flowers only on terminal branches, the tops of the young branches should be pinched back when five or six inches high, allow four or five shoots to grow from the main trunk; when these shoots are four or five inches high pinch out the point and save only two or three branches that spring from each of these limbs; the last pinching should be done no later than August first, after which they should be allowed to grow undisturbed. If wanted for winter blooming they should be carefully lifted about the first of September and potted, give a thorough watering, and put in a shady place for a few days. Do not allow them to get frosted. If large specimen flowers are wanted, allow only one flower to each branch, pinching out all but terminal buds, as fast as they appear.

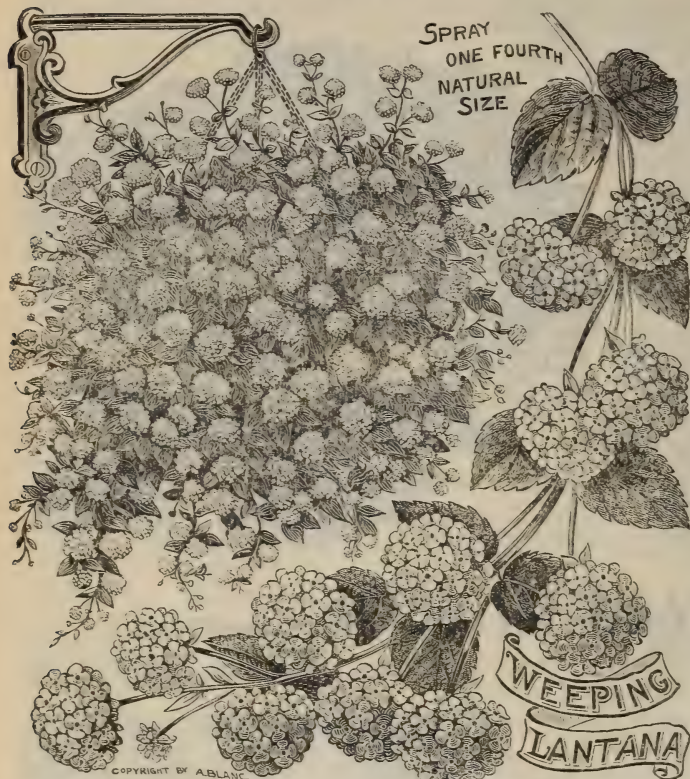

them. The above illustration was engraved for us from a photograph of one of these baskets. This basket was hung on an east porch where it received the full forenoon sunshine: at one time during the month of August this basket contained, by actual count,

590 CLUSTERS OF BEAUTIFUL FLOWERS.

In October when taken in for the winter it contained over 400. The photograph was taken in November at which time there were 300 or more clusters. In December every branch was cut for propagating. It at once threw out new growth, and by middle of January contained more than 100 clusters of flowers again. We have given this description to show its persistent blooming qualities.

The illustration on opposite page represents a Window Box grown at the R. R. Depot here at Calla, last season. The photograph from which the engraving was made was taken the last of September, after having been continually in bloom for over three months. It being taken from nature will give a better idea of the general habit of growth and blooming qualities than any description that we could write. Scarcely a day passed but what some passenger traveling by would enquire,

"WHAT IS THAT BEAUTIFUL FLOWER?"

As will be seen from the illustration it may be trained either in an upright position or allowed to droop. The young plants at first are of slender, upright growth, but as they increase in length they weep or droop gracefully over the sides of the vase or basket, giving them a fine appearance.

One of the most attractive ornaments we ever grew was an ordinary cracker barrel with a number of inch holes bored in the staves, filled with rich soil with a Weeping Lantana inserted in each hole and a half dozen or more planted in the top. It soon completely covered the barrel, and had a perfect mass of flowers throughout the entire season, attracting much attention and admiration.

The most satisfactory Hanging Basket may be had by preparing an ordinary nail keg, as shown in the accompanying sketch. Attach wires for hanging it, then fill with good rich soil: the more fertile the soil the better will be the results. Insert a Weeping Lantana in each auger hole, also three or four in the top. 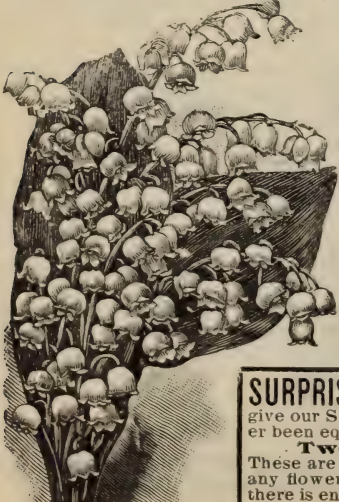

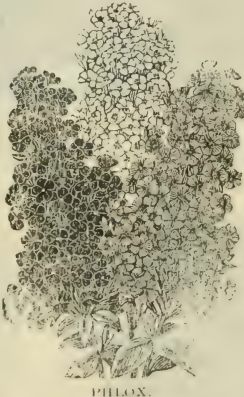

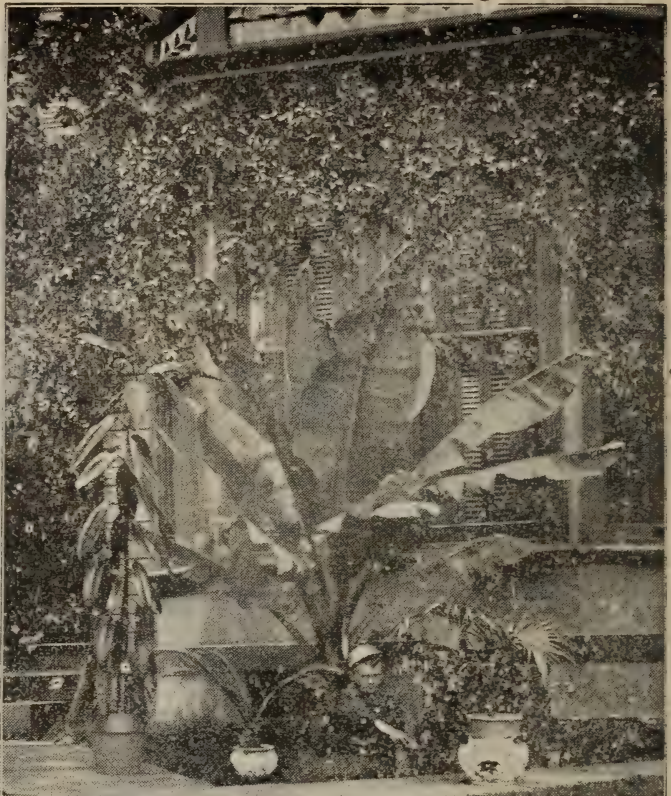

A FLOWER-Flour-BARREL.

We present herewith an illustration, which is an exact photograph, produced from an ordinary flour barrel, which we now show as transformed into a "Flower Barrel." Take an ordinary flower or cracker barrel, remove the upper head, and bore a dozen or more inch holes in the staves, distributing the holes regularly around the barrel, having the lower ones a foot or more from the bottom. Now prepare rich compost, composed of good soil, rotted saws, leaf mold, well rotted manure and a pound or so of bone dust. After thoroughly mixing, fill the barrel and pack well up to the lower holes. Insert plants of a drooping or trailing habit in each hole, and continue to fill the barrel with soil, being particular to pack thoroughly, inserting a plant in each hole as the barrel is filled. When the barrel is filled, plant a half dozen, or more choice plants on the top, using some pretty, erect growing plant for the centre. The centre plant in the illustration is *Grevilla Robusta*, or Silk Oak.
