



# DON'T FAIL TO OBSERVE A FEW SIMPLE SWEET PEA SUGGESTIONS

DON'T expect Sweet Peas to thrive in soil too poor for any other culture, or in a sunless location. They need, as nearly as possible, a free clay loam, moderately rich and freely

DON'T sow too shallow. Plant the seeds not less than two inches deep, and, as the plants become established, bank the soil against tuem, repeating this two or three times throughout the season.

DON'T over-feed. With a view to obtaining vigorous growth and profusion of bloom, bone, in some form, is the best fertilizer. Nitrate of soda will do for a "hurry up" stimulant, should such be needed; but use it sparingly.

DON'T gather the blooms grudgingly. The more you cut, the longer the vine will continue DON'T fail to make a good selection before you sow.

DON'T try to raise seed and have fine flowers at the same time. They don't go together.





The ground must be well dug, raked, and leveled, and every semblance of a weed-root removed. After the seed is sown, which should be done on a calm, dry day, rake the seed in and roll well, or, in the absence of a roller, pat the ground well with the back of a spade or shovel. 
