## About Warranted Seeds.

There has been considerable discussion in the trade papers the last few years about warranted seeds, and several seedsmen have criticised the warranty which we have given always,-only to the amount actually paid for the seed. With other reputable seedsmen, who insist upon the usual "disclaimer," we agree in so far that it would be little short of quackery to warrant any seeds to always produce good crops. Success is sometimes beyond human control. Under adverse conditions even the best seeds may fail.

We maintain, however, that a Seedsman should know thoroughly the seeds he sells, and after using every possible safeguard, in case of failure from any fault of the seed, should refund the price paid. Further responsibility than this it is impossible to assume. Such a guaranty, however, shows confidence on the part of the Seedsman that he is sending out only first-class seeds, and insures the careful co-operation of his employees.

It is necessary; of course, that samples be tested of every lot of seeds, not only for vitality (for even "weed seeds grow" "), but also for genuineness and quality of strain. Our complete system of trials at Fordhook Farms, as outlined on page 4, is the most extensive in America, while with our constant watchfulness in the filling of orders at the city warehouse the chance of mistakes is reduced to the minimum. Should any mistake occur, however, as would be shown by comparison of samples of the same lot tested in our Trial Grounds, we are prompt to refund the price paid. While this does not compensate for any contingent loss, yet it proves that we have more than usual confidence in the thorough care constantly exercised by us in growing and selling

## To the Trade:

In considering our prices, please bear in mind that we do not handle a second grade of seed, grown cheaply for the wholesale or jobbing trade. In many cases we could buy seed on the open market to sell profitably at prices considerably below the actual cost of production to us. This we will not do.

Our retail mail trade-the largest in the world-has been built up by the constant care taken in growing and testing our seeds. Neither with the seeds grown on our own farms nor by our contract growers will we consent to cheapen the cost of production to a point where it is impossible to produce "The Best Seeds That Grow."

Quality before price is ever our motto. Therefore, this wholesale list will not appeal to dealers who make lowest cost the first consideration. Therefore, again, we employ no travelers, nor do we issue any so-called "cut-prices to jobbers." All orders from the trade (and this list is never mailed to Market Gardeners) will be invoiced at prices given herein without any further discount than the usual five per cent. for cash, unless on special lots prices have been given by letter and are quoted in the order.

We are glad at any time, wherever possible, to make special quotations by letter, but it must be understood that such offers are for immediate acceptance and do not hold for future orders.

It is gratifying to announce that last year-notwithstanding the position we took in withdrawing all travelers from the road and in having uniform prices to all, as printed herein-we did the largest wholesale business in the history of our house. This shows conclusively that there is room for a legitimate wholesale trade on quality, without any attempt to meet the "cut-throat" methods that have so nearly demoralized the American trade in Seeds.

Packets, although not dated (because the electrotypes generally require the entire front of the bag), are all filled with the same choice quality of the Best Seeds that Grow for 1899.

Seeds of the best quality cost very much more to produce than do seeds of the ordinary commercial grade. And yet many merchants, having little or no knowledge of the value of High=class Seeds, purchase their supplies wherever they can be obtained the cheapest. It was brought to our notice that some merchants would buy a bill of seeds from us, obtain copies of our catalogues and showcards, and then purchase a portion of their supplies from other seedsmen, who, growing " cheap seeds," could sell at much lower prices. In many cases planters who purchased from their local merchants, thinking that they were obtaining BURPEE'S SEEDS, got only a few of our seeds (perhaps in packets), and often the seeds bought by weight or measure were of inferior quality, falsely sold on our reputation, but for which we were not in any way responsible.

This deception was brought so prominently to our attention a year ago that we debated seriously whether we should not decline altogether to sell BURPEE'S SEEDS at wholesale. Further considieration, however, showed us that this would hardly be fair to the honorable merchauts who had been handling our seeds exclusively for years. Therefore we announced last year, that

## Hereafter we will sell Burpee's Seeds ONLY in sealed packages.

Packets and ounces, in the Spangler IVater-tight Bags, are sealed, and bear, plainly printed, either our Name or Registered Trade=mark Monogram, protected by United States Letters Patent. Quarter-pounds, pounds, pints, and quarts, in paper bags or cartons, have pasted across the top a green label, worded as follows:

SEEDS IN BULK,-that is, Peas, Beans, ete., by the peck or bushel, and quantities of small seeds in bags, will have each sack sealed with our Trade Mark on a leaden seal. This plan will be a protection to honest merchants from competition with other seeds falsely claimed to be BURPEE'S SEEDS, and at the same time will be a guarantee to the purchaser.

## TERMS OF SALE.

Philadelphia, January 19, 1899.
All bills purchased after this date will be charged at the prices quoted herein,unless special offers are made by mail and referred to in the order. Not less than ten pounds of one variety will be invoiced at the rates per hundred pounds.

Sealed Packages.-We make no charge for sealing pounds, pecks, or bushels, but, at the low bulk prices quoted herein, we charge for putting up in smaller sealed packages, as follows :

In Ounces.-One cent per ounce.
In Quarter-Pounds, Pints, and Quarts.-Two cents for each package.
In Two-Quarts and Four-Quarts.-A charge of three cents per package.
Terms of Credit.-To regular customers and well-known houses of established credit, all bills bought from this Catalogue are due June 1st, without regard to date of purchase. All accounts are subject to sight draft on June 10th if payment is not received previously by mail. Goods purchased atter June 1st are payable on October 1st and subject to sight draft.

Wez Bills purchased on special quotations, made by letter, are due three months from date, or subject to a discount of one and a half per cent. for cash within ten days of date of invoice.

Grass and Clover Seeds, Onion Sets, and Seed Potatoes in quan tity are invariably net Cash.

Unknown correspondents desiring credit are requested to give satisfactory reference in Philadelphia or New York.

Terms for Cash.-We will allow a discount of Five per Cent. on orders accompanied by a cash remittance, and also on all bills (at Catalogue prices) paid within ten days from date of invoice.

Shipping Instructions should be sent with each order, and will be followed carefully. Otherwise we will use our best judgment as to route.

The Prices Quoted are those ruling at this date. We expect to adhere to them through the spring, except in cases where important changes in the market compel us to advance or reduce our prices, when we will be governed by the market. 10 lbs. and over will be supplied at the rates per $100 \mathrm{lbs} . ; \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{H}$ and $\frac{1}{4}$ bush. at the pound and bushel rates; but smaller quantities will be subject to a higher charge.

Seeds by Mail. - When desired, small packages will be forwarded by mail at 8 cts . per pound, 15 cts per quart, extra.

NO CHARGE for Boxes, Barrels, Packing, or Cartage. Bags are Charged at Cost. After delivering to forwarders in good order (as shown by Bill of Lading) our responsibility ceases. Insurance effected only when so directed.

WE DO NOT COMMISSION SEEDS.-In response to hundreds of inquiries each year, we would state that we positively decline to send out any Seeds on Commission. Dealers handling seeds in packets will be supplied on liberal terms, and by ordering judiciously, those left over can be destroyed, and the business yet be more profitable and satisfactory than the handling of commission seeds.

To the original Fordhook Farm, so long famous as the most complete trial grounds in America, we have added, from time to time, several small tracts by purchase. Last winter, learning that the very desirable farm immediately adjoining Fordhook was for sale, we gladly purchased it, in order to have more land not only for our trial grounds but also for the growing of seed crops, which experience had shown could be produced to the best advantage in this section of Bucks County. Instead of giving a new name to our new farm we have merely written the plural,-Fordhook Farms, -and can promise our customers that our best endeavors shali be constantly put forth to maintain and extend the fair fame of Fordhoor.

Both farms are devoted exclusively to the raising of the choicest regetable and flower seeds, the extensive trial grounds, poultry yards, and kennels of Scotch Collie dogs. The only farm crops are grain and hay, to afford a proper rotation. ## "Mall Order Houses are Honest."


#### Abstract

The truth is, some of the greatest business successes in the United States are exclusively catalogue houses. I know from careful investigation that the goods listed in their catalogues are honestly described. I also know that the way they do business is entirely satisfactory to their thousands of patrons. Catalogue houses have distinct adrantages over houses that send out traveling salesmen. A catalogue house can sell small lots as cheaply as the other houses sell big lots. If a moder-ate-salaried salesman could seli two or three "big bills" in every town, and keep this up right through the year, his ratio of selling expense would possibly be as low as that of a catalogue house. But he cannot do it.

Last month I visited all of the Southern States. While in the South I talked to dozens of merchants who are regular patrons of catalogue houses. I never heard of any one of them being humbugged. They seemed to be delighted with this quick way of doing business. They said the cash terms of the catalogue houses were liberal, and that they got better bargains than they could from the road drummers. They are pleased because the catalogue houses do not "substitute." They send along just what is ordered.

I do not know of a catalogue house that does not guarantee every article it sells to be exactly as represented. Every one of them is always ready to rectify an error. There is no business rule that forces any merchant to keep goods that are not precisely as asked for in his order. The constant growth of the catalogue houses speaks loudly in favor of their honesty, and that fakes and swiadles are not permitted. A business to succeed through the mails must above all be truthful. The catalogue houses all know this.-Sam E. Whitmire in Fame, New York, September, 1898.


## We Protect the Dealer in Seeds.

Our Wholesale Catalogue, or "Red List," is sent only to legitimate dealers, and is never mailed broadcast to addresses of general merchants taken from Bradstreet's, nor is it ever sent to market gardeners. ## Telegraphic Cipher (or Cable Code) FOR WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The telegraphic cipher word for quantities must always precede the cipher words for seed, but if the same quantity of several varieties is ordered, the cipher word meaning that quantity need not be repeated before each variety, but may be placed only before the first. For example :

Arad Jacket Jetty, Aragon Primrose Beauty, Malmo Balcony, would mean, ship at once, cheapest route, ten pounds each Blanche Burpee and Meteor Sweet Peas, three hundred packets each Primrose and Burpee's Beauty Cupid Sweet Peas, and ten bushels Burpee's Stringless Green-Pod Beans.

Our customers will find this a very inexpensive way of wiring their orders, but we must caution them that care be taken in writing out the messages, as we cannot hold ourselves responsible for errors arising from incomplete messages or incorrect translation.

IMPORTANT.-This telegraphic cipher must be used ONLY on orders by telegraph or cable, and never in written orders sent by mail.

Express Arden Calliope would mean: Send immediately, by express, twelve pounds of Burpee's Allifead Early Cabbage.

Mail Alem Perturb would mean: Send by mail, postpaid, to-day, one pound Burpee's Ruby King Pepper. If the word Register is used instead of mail, it would mean "Send by Registered Mail."

Notwithstanding their dwarf habit and neat, slender foliage, the plants are of vigorous growth and come into bloom always ten days to two weeks in advance of the Extra Early Blanche Ferry, which has been heretofore a week ahead of all other varieties. Growing only two feet in height, the plants do not require the support of brush or trellis. We are careful not only in the selection of stock seed, but also in the actual roguing of the general crops. We seek always not the cheapest, but the best sources of supply. Each variety is raised in that section which long experience with unequaled facilities for comparative tests at our famous Trial Grounds has shown to be best adapted to its perfect development. For instance, early strains of Canliflower, such as Burpee's Best Early, Snouball, and Extra Early Dwarf Erfurt, are grown for us in Denmark, although we could obtain for half the money seed of the same varieties grown either in California, France, or Italy.

## In the way they are put up.

 Haring the confidence of Seedsmen thronghout the world, we receive many wholesale orders from other leading houses, both in America and Europe. There are in America, however, many local merchants who handle seeds as a side issue, and it was brought to our notice that some merchants were using our show cards and catalogues to sell seeds bought from other growers very cheaply, and necessarily of inferior quality. Therefore, we were compelled, for the mutual protection of our customers and ourselves, to adopt a year ago the plan of selling only in sealed packages. This does not interfere with fellow-seedsmen purchasing any quantity they desire in bulk, but each bag when it leaves our warehouse is sealed, and the market gardener and private planter who orders from his local merchant should insist upon having exactly the quantity he wants ordered from us and delivered under seal. All linen and seamless bags are sealed with our trade mark on a leaden seal. Quarterpounds, pints, and quarts done up in paper bags lave our trade mark on a green label pasted across the top. All ounces have printed at the top of the bag "Best Seens that Grow for 1899," while both packets and ounces are done up in the best quality of the Spangler uater-tight bags, neatly printed in black ink, which to our taste is preferable to the gaudy lithographed bags so commonly used with the one idea that "the pictures sell the seeds."

## BURPEE'S NEW WAREHOUSE.

The new warehouse of W. Atlee Burpee \& Co., a front view of which is given in the illustration, is seven stories high, of modern steel, open-mill construction, with frontage on both Fifth Street and York Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa, of light pressed brick and terra-cotta.
The offices occupy the entire frontage on the ground floor on the Fifth Street side, while the receiving and shipping of goods is handled on the York Avenuie side, where are located the elevator shaft and the shipping clerk's office. A subcellar extends under the York A venue parement in which is located the boiler; by this means the main cellar is kept perfectly cool, and available for the storage of potatoes, bulbs, and such goods.
The second floor is devoted to the flower-seed and mail-order departments. The third floor contains the seed-papering and steam-printing rooms, besides extensive shelving for the storage of seeds done up in packages. The fourth floor is given up entirely to the freight and express and wholesale order departments. The fifth, sixth, and serenth floors are used for storage of seeds in bulk:
A visit to this new warehouse is an education in itself, in the matter of demonstrating how an extensive business can be conducted on the highest systematic basis. The utmost system prevails here, from the entering of the orders until the time the goods are dispatched by mail, freight, or otherwise. Eyery variety of seed catalogued has its bin or shelf in the various departments, and the alphabetical arrangement of the compartments renders comparatively light the work of filling the enormous number of orders received. Seeds are put up, according to necessity, in pints, quarts, or ounces, and stored in these shelves to await the rush. By an excellent system of book-keeping the firm can tell at a glance and at any moment just how the quantities of the various stocks handleỉ stand. Telephone communication extends to every floor, each one of which is thus connected with the other; in fact, the whole interior arrangement gives one the impression that every thing has been provided that can in any way facilitate dispatch. A bag-filling machine is kept constantly at work, in addition to the large force of girls, who fill, close, and seal the packets of seeds; which guarantee to the recipient thereof that the stock within the packet is Burpee's seed.
Mr. Burpee has a private office on the ground floor ; and an interesting feature here is the colored and other catalogue cover designs, together with the colored plates that have been distributed by the firm ever since they introduced that kind' of work for catalogue purposes. These plates are all in frames, and are both ornamental and instructive. - From The Florists' Exchange, New York, November 12; 1898.
