Not only is there a vast difference between seed that is placed on commission and that which is sold outright, but the merchant can readily see the large profit in buying May's seeds outright, there being between 100 and 200 percent profit to the merchant, whereas, in handling commission seeds he will only make between 25 and 40 per cent.



# THE GREAT WHITE CAP YELLOW DENT.—A Corn for Thin Soils and Drouth-Stricken Sections.

Last spring we received through Prof. Hays, of the Agricultural Department at St. Anthony Park, Minn., 10 bushels of this variety, and planted same with tolerable fair results as to yield, and notwithstanding the unfavorable season in the section of this state where it was cultivated. From our observations and trials we feel our State Experimental Station has certainly introduced a variety which is destined to be of great value in all spring wheat producing sections. Certainly great credit is due Prof. Hays for his untiring efforts in the manner in which he has so successfully carried and nursed this very promising variety, and the methods he has adopted in disseminating among our farmers a sort with so many good qualifications. While this wheat is not altogether brought to that state of perfection desired by Prof. Hays, we ask our patrons to fully peruse the history and note the many advantages this new wheat possesses. this new wheat possesses.

A Certified Variety of Wheat, Minnesota No. 163.

This circular is sent out with a new wheat named Minnesota No. 163 (Minn. No. 163), which was originated under a system of rigid selection. Its parent variety, Minn. No. 168 (Glyndon 811), is thought to be a variety of Red Fife wheat, though its name was lost by the burning of the station building in 1890. This parent wheat was grown at Warren, Marshall County, Minn., in 1890; at Glyndon, Clay County, Minn., in 1891; and at Power, Richland County, N. Dak., in 1892. At the last named place 400 kernels were planted in hills 12 in.x18 in. apart, one grain in a hill. Plant 2001 yielded 15.4 grams of fine wheat. This being the heaviest yielder among the 400 plants it was chosen as the mother plant of this new variety.

In 1893, 100 of the hardest seeds from this parent were planted at the College Farm, Fargo, N. Dak. (centgener 14301). After securing the best plants with which to continue the breeding experiments, and after discarding several of the poorest plants, the grain from the remaining plants of the plot was harvested in bulk. In 1894 this seed was planted in a small plot on University Farm, St. Anthony Park, Minn., and was increased so that in 1895 there was sufficient seed for a one-twentieth acre plot. In 1897 it was in the variety tests at University Farm, at Northwest Farm, Crookston, and at College Farm, Fargo, N. Dak. Owing to excessive rains in the Red River Valley just before harvest time, the conditions were so lacking in uniformity that the records of yields at Fargo and Crookston in 1897 have not been used in making up the average yields. In 1898, this wheat was in the variety tests at University Farm, at Northwest Farm, Crookston; at Northeast Farm, Grand Rapids; at College Farm, Fargo, N. Dak.; at College Farm, Brookings, S. Dak., and at College Farm, Ames, Iowa. The yields at these experiment stations of Minn. No. 163 are compared with the yields of the best two wheats se

# MUSHROOM SPAWN.

Mushrooms may be grown in cellars, under benches, of greenhouses, or in sheds, wherever the temperature of 50 or 60 degrees can be kept up through the winter. The bed should be made from November to February, according to the time the Mushrooms are wanted, and it requires about two months for them to begin bearing. Secure fresh horse manure, free from straw and litter, and mix an equal bulk of loam from an old pasture with it. Keep this under cover, taking care to turn it every day to prevent heating until the pile is large enough to make a bed of the required size. Three or four feet wide, eight inches deep and any length desired, are the proper proportions for a bed; these may be varied. Prepare the mixture of loam and manure, making the bed in layers, and pounding down each with the back of the spade. Leave this to heat through for a few days, and as soon as the heat subsides to 90 degrees, make holes in the bed about a foot apart each way, into which put pieces of the spawn two or three inches in diameter, fill up the holes with the compost and at the expiration of a week or ten days the spawn will have thoroughly diffused itself through the bed. Spread a layer of fresh soil over the heap to a depth of two inches, and cover with three or four inches of hay, straw or litter. Examine the bed often to see that it does not get dry. When water is given it should be at a temperature of about 100 degrees.

# VITALITY OF SEEDS.

The following schedule gives the length of time that seeds will grow freely. It is true that some varieties will even keep longer than the period mentioned, but their strength will be greatly impaired. Parsley and corn salad will grow more freely the second year than the first; and cucumbers, melons and squashes produce larger crops from seeds two years old than from the new, from the fact that they make less growth of vine and set their blossoms more freely.

Seeds of all kinds should be kept in a dry situation and in sacks in preference to barrels.
