## LIBERTY.

### THE FINEST CRIMSON WINTER-FLOWERING ROSE.

Certainly when this variety is well grown, it leaves nothing to be desired in the way of a crimson rose. Flower is of large size, magnificent color—rich, velvety crimson,—and exquisite fragrance. It is a remarkable keeper, flowers retaining their brilliancy of color, which is heightened as they develop. Some growers have found it a difficult rose to grow, while others have succeeded with it admirably. It does not require a high temperature like *Meteor*, but can be grown successfully in same house with ordinary varieties, like *Bride*, *Bridesmaid*, etc. When successfully grown, certainly nothing can surpass it in color and general desirability.

No other rose approaches it for beauty or profit.

**Kaiserin Augusta Victoria.**—This is a particularly fine rose for forcing under glass, especially during the spring, summer, and early fall, when *Bride* is of no use whatever, *Kaiserin Augusta Victoria* being at its best in the very hottest summer weather. Flowers are pure white, of the largest size, borne on magnificent long, straight stems; buds ideal in form, being long and pointed. This is also the largest and finest white rose for summer-blooming in the garden.

**Souv. de Wootton.**—This is the best crimson winter-flowering rose for general cultivation, as it is much more easily grown in midwinter than *Meteor*, on which account it is largely grown by those who cannot succeed with *Meteor*. Flowers are deliciously fragrant, and much like *Jacqueminot* in size and color. Throws good stems, but frequently in clusters; if disbudded, size of flower is largely increased.

**Golden Gate.**—Of exquisite color,—shell-pink, shading to creamy flesh on the outer petals. Under favorable conditions, its shapely blooms are often as large as *American Beauty*, on canes two to four feet long, stiff as reeds. As a cut flower it is *par excellence*, as it is of remarkable substance, being almost as durable as a carnation. It should be grown cool; will do best in a temperature that grows *Bridesmaid* to best advantage. This rose has been grown quite largely in the vicinity of Washington, where it has been received with great favor.

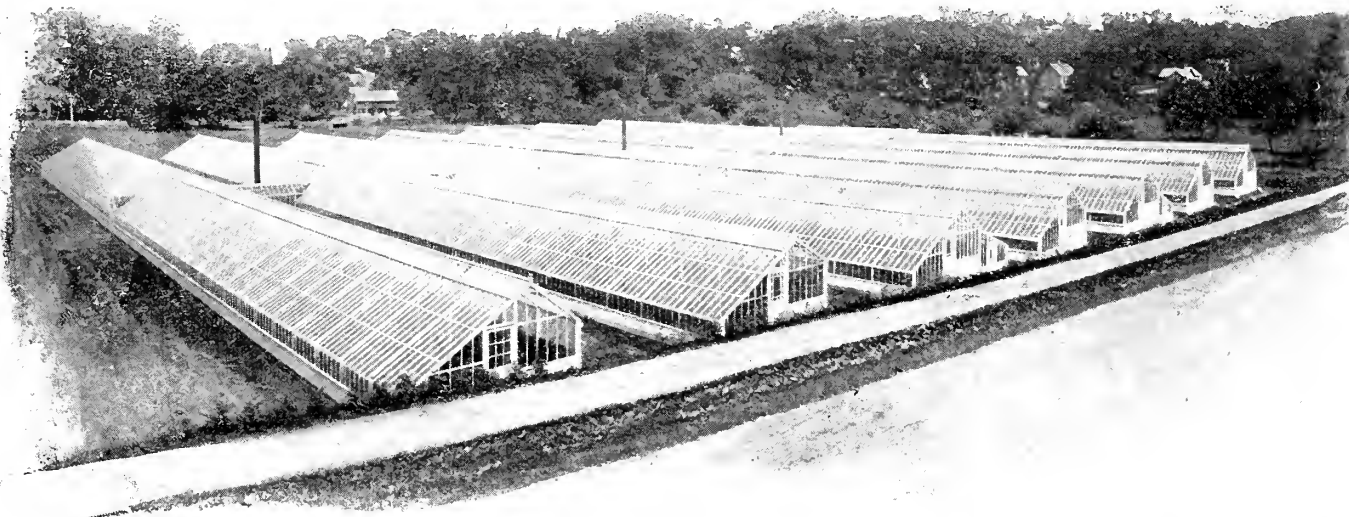
**Mrs. Pierpont Morgan.**—A sport from *Mme. Cusin*, and very similar to that variety, but a more robust grower, and the flowers are larger, well-grown blooms measuring four and a half inches through. The color is an intensely bright cerise, or rose-pink.

**Papa Gontier.**—A desirable winter-flowering rose, as it can be grown in a much lower temperature than any other variety, doing best in a temperature suitable for carnations. **Meteor.**—This is one of the very freest blooming roses of any color, and one of the most desirable colors,—very dark, velvety crimson. Buds are of fine shape, good size, and highest quality. Many growers find it a difficult rose to grow in midwinter, but it requires no particular skill or care to grow it in the early spring, summer, and fall, as it luxuriates in the hottest summer weather. When successfully grown, there is no crimson rose, excepting *Liberty*, that compares with *Meteor* in any respect.

**Snowball.**—A new polyantha rose; one of the most charming acquisitions. Dwarf, compact habit. Flowers are as white as snow, and are produced in large clusters of from twenty-five to fifty, literally covering the plant. It is an elegant pot plant, and is also fine for bedding.

It is a strong, vigorous grower and a very free bloomer, producing large quantities of the finest shaped buds on long, stiff stems. At its best the same seasons as *Kaiserin Augusta Victoria*. One of the finest ever-blooming roses that has ever been introduced for garden cultivation.

**La France.**—This old-time favorite is one of the finest summer-blooming roses in the garden, and is also fine for flowering under glass. The flowers are light silvery pink, and no rose is so deliciously fragrant.

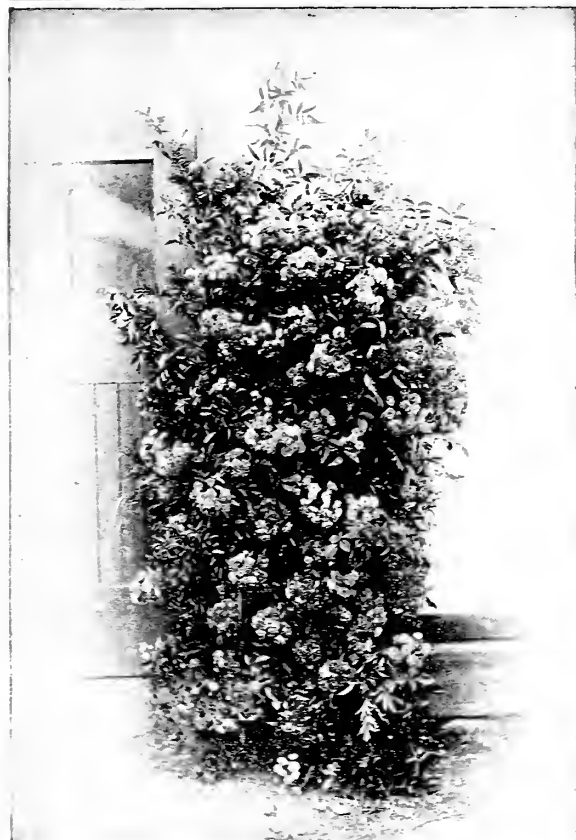

**Perle des Jardins.**—Clear golden yellow; very large, beautifully formed buds. A fine summer-blooming variety. Extra large and desirable.

**Etoile de Lyon.**—Deep golden yellow; very large and full buds; strong, vigorous grower. Blooms constantly, producing the very finest buds. By many considered superior to *Perle des Jardins* as an outdoor summer-blooming rose.

# CLIMBING ROSES.



CRIMSON RAMBLER.

**Psyche** (*New Pink Rambler*).—A fine companion for *Crimson Rambler*. This variety is a cross between *Crimson Rambler* and the Polyantha rose *Golden Fairy*. It is a strong climber of the *Crimson Rambler* type. Flowers are produced in large clusters of from eight to thirty-five each, and are two to two and a half inches across,—white, suffused with salmon-rose and pink, base of petals suffused with yellow. Received Award of Merit of the Royal Horticultural Society of England.

**Crimson Rambler.**—Nothing equals this as an all-round hardy garden rose, on account of its brilliant color, profusion with large bush form—in fact, its uses are almost endless. It blooms in large clusters of fifty to a hundred flowers in a cluster, covering the foliage its entire length with a solid mass of the most beautiful perfectly shaped miniature crimson blossoms. No description can give an adequate idea of its beauty. It begins to bloom about the middle of June, and remains in flower longer than any other hardy outdoor rose.

**Pink Rambler.**—A lovely climbing rose, very similar to *Crimson Rambler*, but flowers are a light, delicate pink, or bluish—intermediate in color between *White Rambler* and *Dawson*,—and about as large as a twenty-five cent piece. Blooms before *Crimson Rambler* in immense clusters like that variety, and is almost equally showy and valuable. A grand variety.

**White Rambler.**—Pure snowy white. Flowers same size as *Multiflora Japonica*, but instead of being single, are double. Blooms at same time as *Yellow Rambler*.

**Yellow Rambler.**—Bud beautiful bright yellow, opening straw color, fading to a beautiful creamy white. Blooms early, before *Crimson Rambler*.

**Dawson.**—This should have been called *Pink Rambler*, as it is among climbing roses in pink what *Crimson Rambler* is in red. It is equally showy, and is one of the loveliest of all climbing roses. Flowers are much larger than *Pink Rambler*. Blooms before *Crimson Rambler*.

**Multiflora Japonica.**—Flowers single, about the size of a twenty-five cent piece: snowy white with bright golden stamens. They are borne in large clusters—twenty to fifty flowers in each,—the plant being covered with a mass of snowy whiteness. The individual flowers last a long time, plants showing bloom for about a month. A charming addition to any collection.

**Carmine Pillar.**—Flowers single, about four inches in diameter; brightest rosy carmine, produced in large clusters and opening in succession, so that the plants remain in bloom a long time. Beautiful.

**Setigera** (*The Michigan, or Prairie, Rose*).—Very large single flowers, three inches in diameter, soft rosy pink. A luxuriant grower, blooming after all other climbing roses are gone, coming into bloom when *Crimson Rambler* is about gone. Blooms in immense clusters. Fine for planting where wild or natural effects are desired. Very showy.

In addition to their value as climbers, they are also beautiful trailing roses, on which account they are exceedingly valuable for covering the ground among shrubbery or rocks, or on banks

where grass will not grow, producing beautiful landscape effects. On account of their wonderfully beautiful and luxuriant foliage, which is bright green, shining as if varnished and of almost evergreen character—remaining green until nearly midwinter,—they are invaluable for this purpose. They are especially beautiful when covered with their large, showy clusters of flowers, which are produced in the greatest profusion.

**Sweetheart.**—A novelty of 1901. A great addition to our list of climbing roses. It is a cross between *Wichuraiana* and *Bridesmaid*. Flowers are of large size—two and a quarter inches in diameter.—bright pink in bud, opening white with pink base. A spray of bloom makes a perfect symphony of pink and white. Plants in bloom are a mass of color, making a gorgeous sight.

**Debutante.**—A novelty of 1901. Another exceedingly valuable rose, produced by crossing *Wichuraiana* and *Baroness de Rothschild*. Deeper in color and larger than *Sweetheart*. The varieties of roses on this page are extra sized blooming plants, ready for immediate bloom, and will bloom this summer. They are grown in the open ground, and can be planted as soon as frost is out of the ground, and not later than May 1st, when growth begins. The earlier they are planted, the better they do. On account of the large size of these plants, when ordered in quantity, they can be sent cheaper by freight or express; but to distant points, or where small quantity is ordered, can be sent by mail, in which case 3c. each must be added to cover postage and packing. Standard, or tree, roses can be shipped by express or freight only.



# HARDY VINES AND CLIMBERS.

## AMPELOPSIS.

**Veitchii** (*Boston or Japan Ivy*).—Probably no climber has been so generally used the last few years. The leaves of this beautiful climber, resembling in shape the English Ivy, overlap one another closely, changing in the fall to the most vivid autumnal tints—gold, purple, and scarlet—remaining so until they drop. It clings to wood, stone, or brick, painted or unpainted—requiring no other support than a smooth surface, to which it clings with tenacity. No buildings are considered too handsome to cover with this plant, and the most unsightly buildings are made picturesque by its use. Many city residences are covered with it, to which it lends an air of elegance. It preserves and enhances the beauty of the most intricate architectural outlines.

## ACTINIDIA POLYGAMA

(*Silver Sweet Vine*).

The effect is very marked and beautiful. Growth is rapid and vigorous, and the foliage is almost absolutely free from insect pests. *Actinidia arguta* is often sold for this variety. 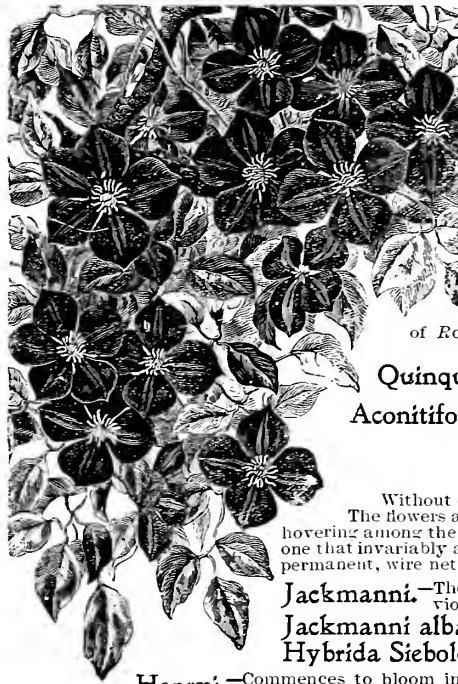
## WISTARIA.

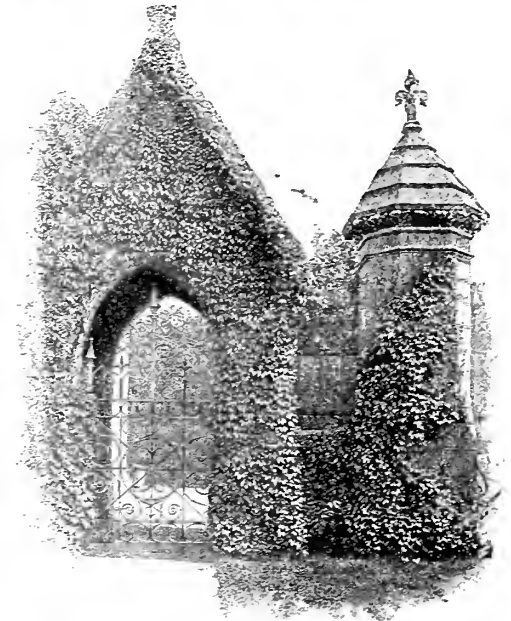


## CLEMATIS.

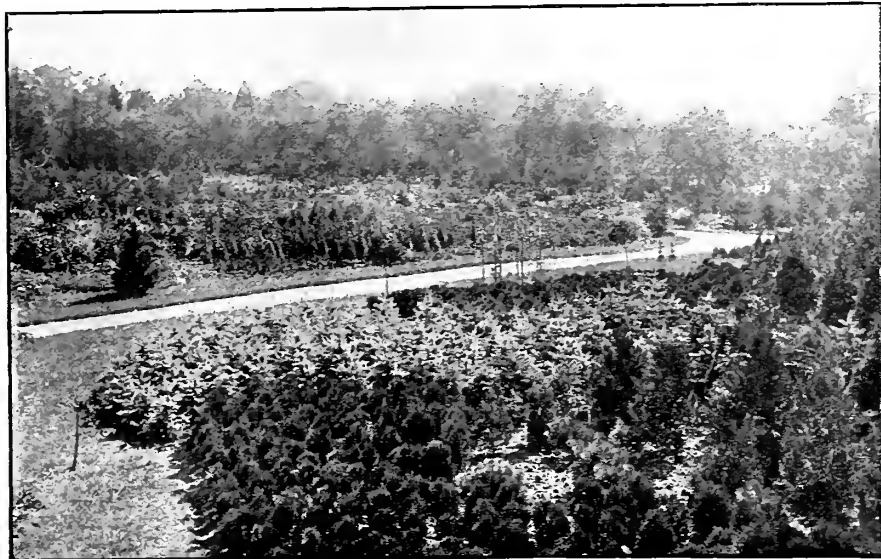

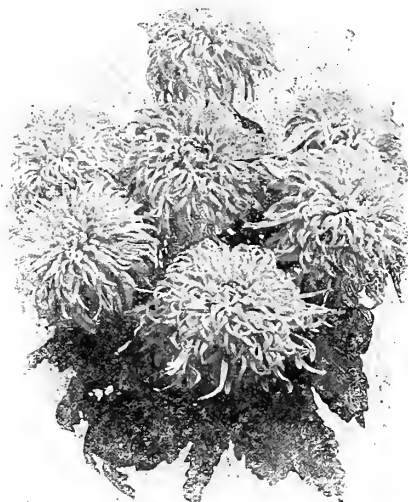

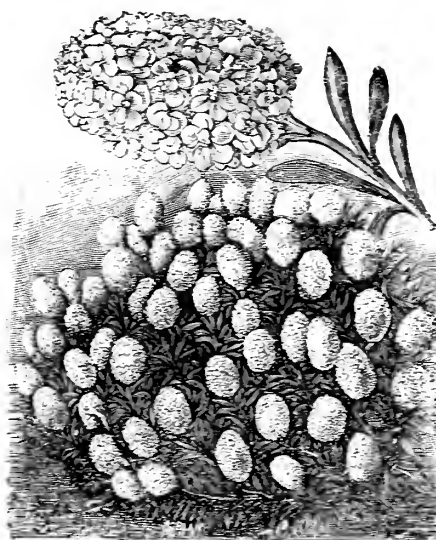

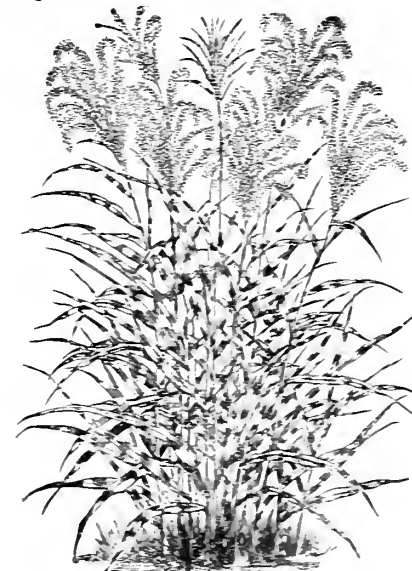

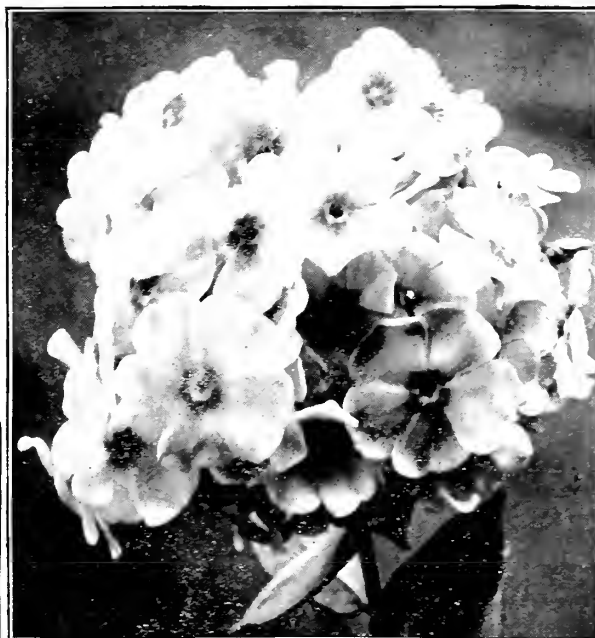

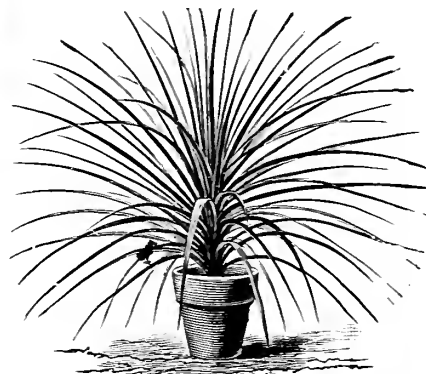

## HYDRANGEAS.

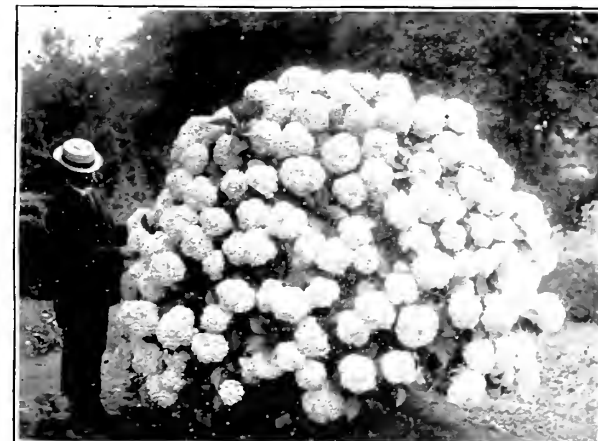

# NOVELTIES IN CARNATIONS.

### TARRYTOWN

#### THE FINEST OF ALL CANNAS.

This variety, sent out by ourselves three years ago for the first time, was *very* highly recommended, but we are glad to state that it has exceeded our anticipations in every way; we believe we can justly claim that it is the finest canna for bedding grown to-day. No variety approaches it for display. The flowers are large, but its particular value lies in the earliness with which it blooms, the abundance of flowers produced, its branching habit, and the length of time the flowers remain after they open. Another point of superiority is the fact that the flowers are thrown well above the foliage, and the heads of bloom are held very evenly, and so freely produced that the foliage is almost hidden. One characteristic of this variety which largely gives it its value is its wonderful branching habit, two or three spikes of flowers being in bloom on the same stem at the same time, producing a mass of bloom. The flowers, which are an exceedingly brilliant carmine-crimson, have decidedly more substance than any other variety, and last for an unusually long time. The stem carries no withered, dried-up flowers, but is always bright, clean, and fresh. There is so much substance to the flowers that heavy wind and rain storms have no effect upon them, leaving them bright and fresh, when other varieties have been knocked to pieces. It is a fine, strong, healthy grower of moderate height. No variety compares with it in any way for a constant, continuous display; it is perfectly safe to say that it showed six times as many flowers for the same amount of space as any other variety in our fields. Wherever it was planted, it stood out prominently among the best. Many canna experts who have visited our trial grounds invariably pronounce *Tarrytown* unquestionably the finest of all bedding cannas introduced up to this time. It cannot be praised too highly. It is as much ahead of all other cannas to-day for bedding as *Mme. Crozy* was ahead of all its contemporaries at the time of its introduction. Notwithstanding the fact that this variety has been offered for three years, the demand for it last season exceeded the supply.

**Rosemawr.**—A grand pink variety. Rich shade of soft rosy pink, slightly dappled with deep rose. One of the freest-blooming cannas that we have, either inside or out. Flowers are very large and of good shape, with broad, well-rounded petals, frequently two inches across and uncommonly thick and of good substance, and the trusses are enormous. Dwarf habit, averaging about three feet in height. A wonderfully fine acquisition; no up-to-date collection is complete without it. It occupies the front rank among cannas of any color.

**Sam. Trelease.**—This is one of the finest introductions in cannas that has been made in years. Flowers are of almost ideal form and size, petals being very broad and overlapping each other, making the contour of the flower almost circular. It is the most brilliant of all the scarlet cannas, being an intense, vivid scarlet. Base of the petals is bright golden yellow, giving the flower a decided yellow centre,—a very beautiful combination, producing a very striking effect. It is one of the earliest varieties to come into flower. It is a strong, vigorous grower, growing about three feet high, producing large branched spikes of flowers thrown just high enough above the foliage to show them off to the best advantage.

**Pierson's Premier.**—This variety, which we introduced in 1896, still maintains its prominence as an ideal dwarf canna. The plants grow unusually compact, throwing up a remarkable number of flowering shoots, making it an exceptionally profuse and abundant bloomer. It holds its flowers an unusually long time, making it extra desirable as a bedding canna. On account of its dwarf habit and the freedom with which it blooms, no canna in the list equals *Pierson's Premier* as a pot plant. Carmine-scarlet, intermediate in color between *Queen Charlotte* and *Sour, d'Antoine Crozy*, centre of the petals being very much darker and richer than *Queen Charlotte*, with a narrow gilt edge.

**Secretaire Chabanne.**—Extra large deep salmon flower, the older flowers being suffused with a silvery lustre, shading lighter as they become older. An exceptionally large flower, and a beautiful bright color. Exceedingly distinct, and an exceedingly early and free bloomer.

**Eldorado.**—Notwithstanding the many yellow cannas that have appeared from time to time, *Eldorado* still remains the favorite yellow variety. It is a fine compact grower, and an exceedingly free bloomer.

**Robt. Christie.**—Brilliant orange-scarlet; almost identical in color with *Chicago*, but a much stronger and taller grower. *Chicago* is well considered one of the very finest varieties, but *Robt. Christie* excels it in freedom and profusion of bloom in a very marked degree. This variety is an exceptionally early and free bloomer. It has a remarkably large flower and an enormous truss.

**Pres. Max Michelli.**—This is the finest and largest-flowered of all the dark-leaved varieties. Bright orange-scarlet, shaded carmine, with bright carmine splashes. Flowers are as large and fine as any of the green-leaved cannas. Dwarf grower.

**Duke of Marlborough.**—Darkest of all cannas,—very dark crimson. Very free bloomer and a tall, strong grower. Very desirable.

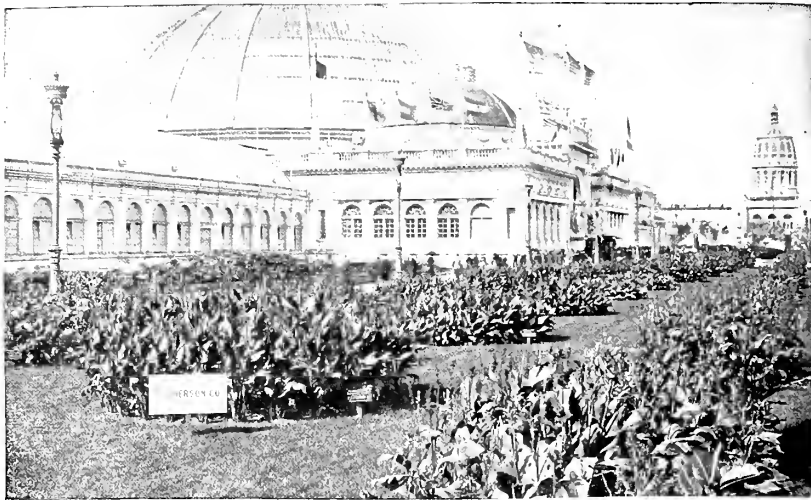
**Souv. d'Antoine Crozy.**—This is a superb variety in every respect, and is one of the very finest that we have to-day. In color, it is an intense, vivid scarlet, bordered with a narrow band of the deepest golden yellow, the yellow border intensifying the brilliancy of the scarlet. The effect of a group of these flowers in the sunlight is dazzling. It is an exceedingly free bloomer. The heads of bloom are very large, and the flowers are retained upon the spike more than an ordinary length of time. It grows about six feet high. Those who wish to have the best cannas should certainly have this variety.

**Mlle. Berat.**—This is a pink canna of French origin. Dark carmine-pink. Heads of bloom are held erect and well above the foliage. A showy, effective beider. Tall grower and exceedingly free bloomer.

**Beaute de Poitevine.**—A fine dwarf, compact grower. Flowers are of good size, crimson-scarlet, with no shading of any kind. A free bloomer, throwing up large trusses of bloom. Foliage is very distinct,—glaucous green.

## DARK-LEAVED SORTS.

**Admiral Avellan.**—An exceedingly free and early-blooming variety, being a mass of color all summer. Deep orange, much darker than *J. D. Cabos*. Fully as free a bloomer as *Egandale*, and considerably taller.

**Egandale.**—This is a dwarf, very compact, free-blooming dark-leaved variety. Foliage is dark greenish maroon; flowers bright cherry. An exceedingly free bloomer, and a favorite sort.

**F. Neuvessele.**—A fine dark-leaved variety; foliage is very handsome. Orange-scarlet flowers, showing a pinkish tinge on the older blooms. Tall grower and very free bloomer.

**J. C. Vaughan.**—Dark purplish foliage, with very large vermilion-orange flowers of a satiny lustre. Flower spikes very large and showy.

**J. D. Cabos.**—Dark greenish maroon colored foliage, with a bronze metallic lustre. Flowers bright apricot, sometimes brightened with a pinkish tinge. A fine grower and a very early, profuse, continuous bloomer.

**Robusta.**—Foliage, dark chocolate-maroon. This well-known variety, although not a large-flowering sort, is still valued on account of its luxuriant foliage, making it desirable in sub-tropical gardening, where rich foliage effects are a desideratum. It is a strong, vigorous grower.

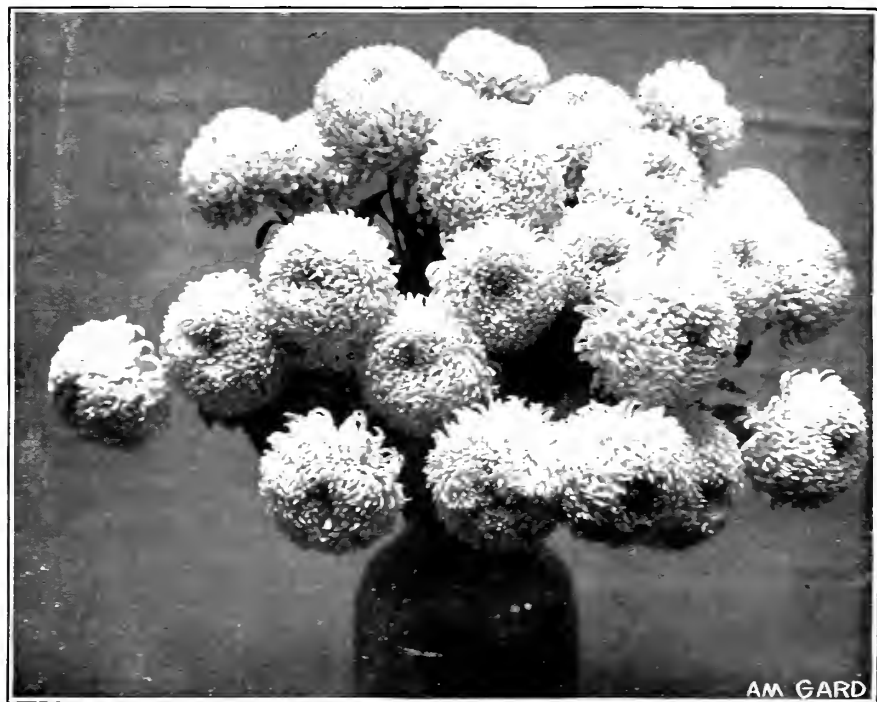

# NOVELTIES IN CHRYSANTHEMUMS.

## THE SENSATIONAL NEW CHRYSANTHEMUM TIMOTHY EATON.

This now famous variety was the centre of attraction and stood out conspicuously at all the fall exhibitions, and captured every prize and cup for which it was entered. It won the silver cup of the C. S. A. at Chicago; silver cup of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society at Philadelphia; silver cup of the Horticultural Society at New York; silver cup offered by the Board of Trade for the best novelty not yet in commerce, at Elmira, N. Y.

We know of several large growers who intend to plant this variety extensively the coming season, and we think it will prove to be as fine a white chrysanthemum as *Col. D. Appleton* has a yellow. It is the largest globular Japanese incurved white chrysanthemum yet raised. Flowers are of mammoth size, very compact and of good form; color, ivory white. It is a splendid keeper and a fine shipper. It has fine, stiff stems and splendid foliage, and is a fine, healthy grower. It can be grown as close on bench as six by nine inches. Medium height, three and a half to four feet.

It can be grown very easily, and will undoubtedly become the leading white chrysanthemum for commercial purposes. Crown buds must not be taken earlier than Aug. 15th. Terminal buds bring magnificent blooms. Time of flowering, Nov. 15th and later.

### LADY ROBERTS.

We take great pleasure in introducing this valuable new variety, of which we have purchased the entire stock. It was raised by Mr. George Hollis, of Toronto, to whose patient work we owe *Timothy Eaton* and several other fine varieties. It was raised two years later, and is the result of the same cross that produced *Timothy Eaton*, and is very similar to that variety; but several Toronto chrysanthemum experts who have seen both varieties growing and have been able to watch them, consider *Lady Roberts* superior. No doubt every one will wish to grow both, and test them side by side. If it should prove, as claimed, superior to *Timothy Eaton*, it will be exceedingly valuable, as *Timothy Eaton*, as everybody knows, has swept the country as a white variety for exhibition. *Lady Roberts* was exhibited last fall before the Toronto Gardeners and Florists' Association, and was certificated by that body. Stem and foliage are all that can be desired. Use second crown bud.

### NELLIE POCKETT.

This is a beauty, and we have great pleasure in offering it. We think it will prove fully as satisfactory as *Col. D. Appleton*, which we introduced last season, on account of its immense size, high quality, and earliness. This grand new variety, which originated in Australia, is an extra early white chrysanthemum of mammoth size—larger than *Col. D. Appleton*—and earlier than *Mrs. Henry Robinson*. It will be especially valuable, both on account of its large size and earliness. Flower is creamy white reflexed Japanese, with long, drooping florets, curling to the tips, making a very solid, compact bloom, the depth of the flowers equaling the breadth. It is a fine, healthy grower, with grand stem and foliage, and will prove to be one of the finest exhibition varieties that can be grown. It will be particularly valuable for market growers on account of its earliness and large size, being also of the very biggest quality. There is a demand for a high quality early white, and this will meet the most exacting demand in this particular. Use second crown bud.



NELLIE POCKETT.

**Alice Byron.**—This is a magnificent variety, with every good quality. Color, purest white with clear, smooth florets. In some stages it resembles *Mrs. H. Weeks*, but as the florets expand, the whole fall back and form into a deep, solid bloom. This will be found an extraordinarily fine exhibition variety.

**Mrs. Barkley.**—We take pleasure in offering this exceedingly valuable new pink chrysanthemum, which is now offered in this country for the first time. It is undoubtedly by far the finest pink variety in cultivation, and a phenomenal variety in every way. The flower is a very large and full incurved Japanese, measuring at least seven inches in diameter and as much in depth, and of a grand color—lovely shade of pink, surface coloring rosy mauve, reverse of petals silvery. It is a fine, healthy grower, and will prove exceedingly valuable both for commercial purposes and for exhibition. Use second crown bud.

**Mrs. Coombes.**—An extra fine new early pink variety of enormous size, blooming earlier than *Mrs. Henry Robinson*. Color, beautiful rose-pink, reflexed flower. Fine grower. Dwarf. NOVELTIES OF LAST SEASON.

COL. D. APPLETON.

A MAGNIFICENT YELLOW VARIETY OF IMMENSE SIZE.

Equally Desirable for Exhibition or for Commercial Purposes.

This variety, which we introduced last season, has proved to be the finest yellow chrysanthemum for mid-season ever sent out. It is an ideal exhibition variety, with flowers of immense size, measuring twenty-two inches in circumference, with a depth as great as the breadth. Flower is a magnificent Japanese incurved, bright yellow in color, of great depth and solid build, not showing any centre, the lower florets reflexing to the foliage. Besides its immense size and beautiful color, another point in its favor is its almost faultless stem and foliage. Stem is strong, carrying the flower erect; foliage, strong, but not too large, growing fully up to the flower. Use second crown bud.

It has won the highest approval and commendation wherever grown, and has brought phenomenal prices, showing that fine chrysanthemums are still appreciated and that none but the very finest will now pay. One grower in Chicago realized six dollars per dozen for all his blooms of this variety. Last fall we offered a silver cup, photograph of which is here shown, at the Tarrytown Horticultural Society's fall exhibition, for the best dozen blooms of this variety. The competition for this was keen. Six grand vases of flowers were exhibited, and the different exhibits were so excellent that the judges found great difficulty in deciding as to the merits of each. "American Gardening" Nov. 10th, in referring to this prize, wrote as follows: "One of the great features of the show was the Pierson prize for the best twelve blooms of *Col. D. Appleton* chrysanthemum. For this there were six contestants. Some idea of the excellence of the exhibits may be gathered from the figures on scaling four of the exhibits. We found a difference of only eleven points between the fourth and the first; between the first and the second a difference of six; between the first and third, seven. The cup was awarded to Wm. Anderson, gardener to F. A. Constable, Mamaroneck, N. Y., for twelve magnificent examples of this champion of all yellow chrysanthemums for this season.

**Primo.**—An extra early white variety. Planted before July 1st, it comes in the first week in October, when chrysanthemums are most valuable. It is a clear white Japanese bloom of very large size, discounting all other extra early white sorts, as it is of much better quality. Keeps and ships well.

**Wm. H. Chadwick.**—While this is not new, its exceedingly great value warrants us in calling particular attention to it. It is the finest late white chrysanthemum that has ever been introduced, either for commercial purposes or for exhibition. Flowers are pure white, occasionally tinted pearly pink. An ideal grower, with very strong stem and luxuriant foliage, meeting all the requirements of a first-class, A No. 1 market flower, every stem producing a perfect flower of the very largest size.

**Mrs. J. Lewis.**—An exceedingly large white exhibition bloom.

**Adele.**—A grand extra early pink variety. Flowers are of the largest size, lovely shade of pink, slightly hirsute. Fine grower with splendid foliage. Blooms just after *Glory of the Pacific* and before *Pink Ivory*. Extra. Tall.

**Charles Davis.**—A sport from *Viviani Morel*, but different in color, being bronze. Tall. Midseason.

**Cullingfordii.**—Rich crimson-maroon, quite unequalled for brilliancy and velvetiness.

**Eureka.**—An extra high-class variety. Ivory white, petals incurving, very double to the centre; of the very largest size and of fine form and finish. Medium. Midseason.

**George W. Childs.**—The earliest dark crimson variety. Flowers very large, bright crimson, reflex orange. Fine grower with fine foliage. Extra desirable.

**Glory of the Pacific.**—The best early pink; the first to come into bloom, being ready to cut October 5th. Strong, stiff stem and excellent foliage. Dwarf.

**Ivory.**—A favorite early white variety.

**Wm. H. Lincoln.**—An immense full flower, reflexed, golden yellow. Medium. Midseason to late.

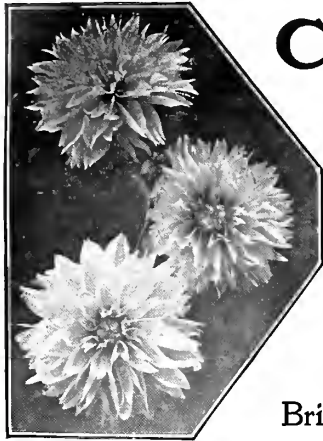
**Yellow Fitzwygram.**—The earliest yellow chrysanthemum; can be had in bloom September 25th. Identical with *Lady Fitzwygram* except color, which is a beautiful light yellow. This must be started early so that the bud can be taken not later than July 25th.

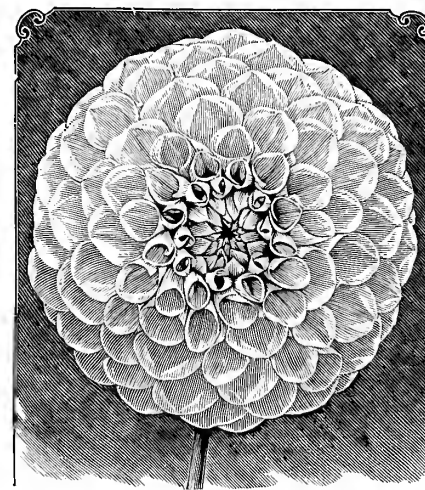

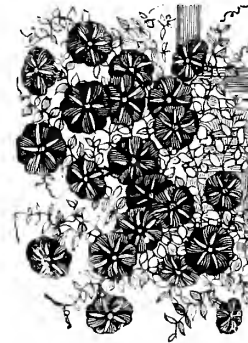

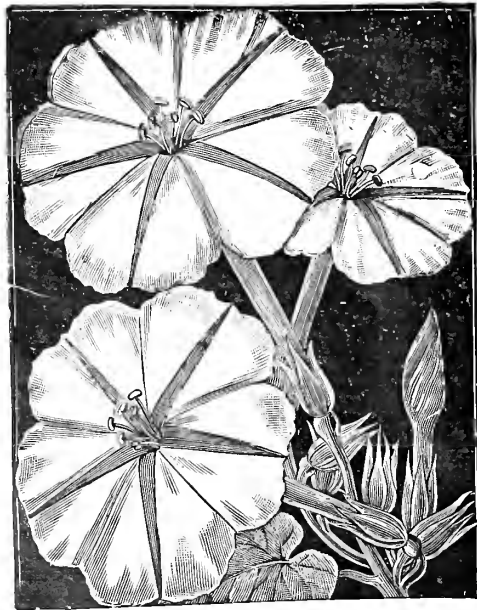

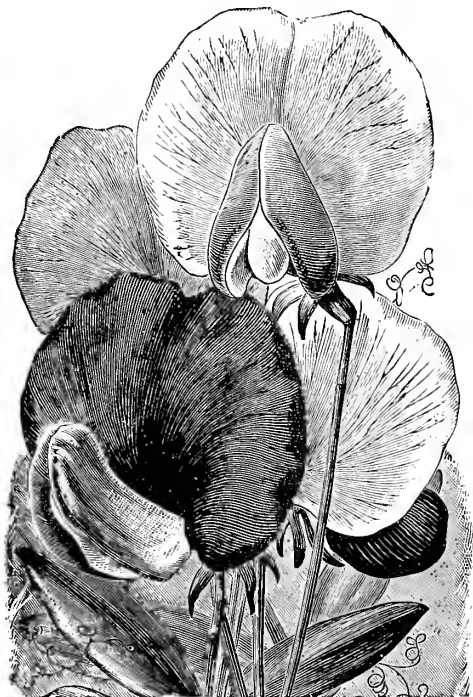

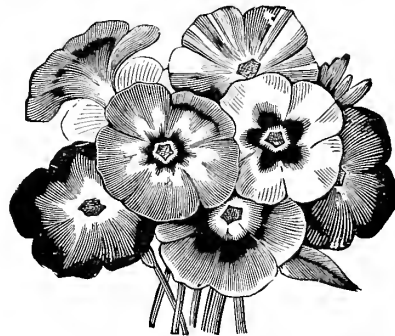

## ASPARAGUS.

Asparagus is one of the earliest spring vegetables and possibly might be more extensively grown were it not for the prevalent idea of the difficulty in growing it successfully. We think this is a mistake. Asparagus can be as cheaply and easily grown as any of the vegetables on our list. A bed once made and properly cared for will last for years. Seed should be sown in April in drills one foot apart and about two inches deep. Soon as seedlings are large enough thin out to two or three inches apart in the rows, removing the weakest plants. Care should be taken to keep the plants free from weeds during the season. One year old plants can be transplanted to permanent beds thoroughly prepared beforehand by trenching two FEET deep, mixing the soil thoroughly with plenty of manure, as no more can be applied after the beds are planted except by surface dressing; the soil can scarcely be made too rich. A plot of ground 20 x 50 feet, requiring 300 plants to plant the plot, will be large enough to supply a moderate-sized family. Plant in rows three feet apart, plants one foot apart in the rows. To plant the bed, open trenches six inches deep and the width of a spade, spread the roots out carefully in all directions, keeping the crown six inches from the surface. Plant always in spring, as early as the ground can be worked. In autumn cut old stalks off, remove all weeds, and cover with a top dressing of manure, which should be forked in, in the spring, with a dressing of fine salt, about 2 or 3 pounds per square yard, or 200 pounds for a bed of the above size. A new bed should be left until two years, cutting the third year.

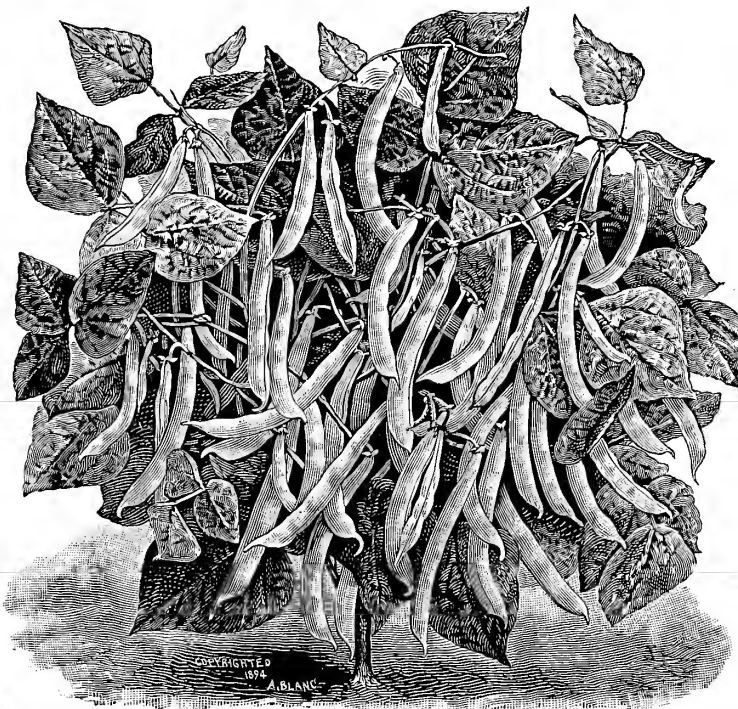

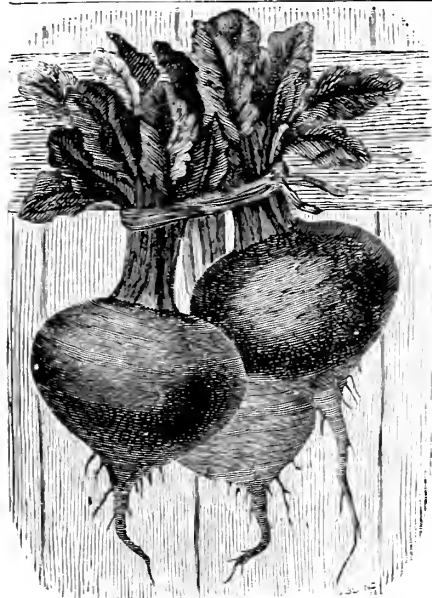

When very early they produce a fair crop, but never so good as that raised in autumn, when cooler. Set the young plants for fall crop in June or July; keep soil well stirred until they begin to head, then mulch thoroughly, and, if dry, water thoroughly once or twice—a pailful to each plant being none too much. Plant on as moist a soil as possible.

**BEET (for Table).**

One ounce will sow 100 feet of drill.

To grow good beets the ground must be very rich, as a rapid growth is essential. Plant for early beets, as soon as the ground can be dug, with later sowings (about June 1st) for succession and winter crops; sow in rows 12 inches apart. When the plants have made three or four leaves, thin out to 6 inches apart. The young tops then make excellent greens.

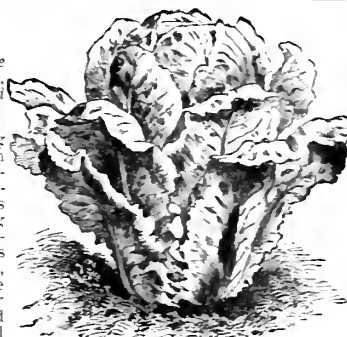

# PEAS.

One quart will plant about 125 feet of drill; from 1 to 2 bushels per acre.

For small gardens we advise the general planting of the Dwarf sorts, like Surprise, Nott's Excelsior, American Wonder and "Premium Gem," requiring no brush and less care than the tall kinds; they are as productive, giving as much or more returns from same ground, as they can be planted closer. For CANADA, add double the amount.

**How to have Plants sent.**—In large lots the best means of shipment is by Express; but in small lots and to distant points, plants go cheaper and as well by Mail.  
**WE PACK OUR PLANTS FOR THE MAILS** securely in a strong wooden box, made especially for the purpose, which insures the safety of the plants and prevents their being crushed.

**How far Plants can be sent.**—Our manner of packing is so perfect that we guarantee everything we send by Mail or Express to reach any part of the United States in perfect order, in good growing condition; after that our responsibility ceases. If packages are delayed and plants injured, we will make good any loss sustained, if notified of the fact at once upon receipt of plants.

**Shrubbery, Hardy Plants, and Bulbs, when dormant, Palms, Azaleas, etc.,** can go as well by Freight as by Express, when there is no danger of their freezing, and at a large saving in expense. Where Boat-lines reach they should always be availed of. We can ship from New York City by any route desired. We assume no responsibility for FREIGHT shipments.
