




STRAWBERRIES.

We do not propose to give in this small catalogue lengthy descriptions of our whole list of strawberry plants. Most everybody is now well acquainted with all the older and tried varieties. We however, give descriptions of a few of the newer and promising varieties:

Repeater.—Originated in New Jersey. We have a fine supply of plants, but it has not yet fruited with un. The introducer has this to say of it: "For the past seven years I have given especial attention to perfecting a new strawberry and I think that I have to-day the most perfect one ever offered to the berry growers of this country. It is a most remarkable berry, having every year since its origin produced two crops, one in June and the other in September. This may seem very strange to many, but it has proven to be a fixed characteristic of this plant and it is from this feature that I have decided to call it the Repeater, which it surely is. The plant itself, is the healthiest I have ever tried, and I have tried nearly all of the leaders; producing fine strong plants in great numbers and during the most trying weather when other varieties burned and crisped up, the Repeater continued to grow and shows no tendency to rust or blight. The fruit is of the finest for table use, having a nice conical shape, a beautiful dark red color, delightful aroma, a pleasing spicy taste, and is termed by all who like strawberries as king of the table. As a shipper it is equal to the Gandy and in yielding surpasses it by 150 per cent. in June besides the September crop." The plant is indeed vigorous at Cheswold, and we believe entirely clear of rust and all other diseases. We have about 15,000 of these plants.

Nick Ohmer .- The plant is very large and stocky, sending out plenty of



strong runners, equal to any variety for vigorous growth; very productive. The fruit is of the largest size; dark red glossy color; regular, roundish, conical shape; firm and of most excellent quality. Foliage is healthy and vigorous. Perfect blossom. If we had to name a single variety for the family garden it certainly would be Nick Ohmer. Our stock of these plants is very fine; the true article, well rooted, vigorous and healthy.


Johnson's Early. — The introducer says: "It ripens with Michaels Early, is as

large as Lady Thompson, as firm as Hoffman and as prolific as Crescent. It ripens all over at once and holds to a good size. The plant is perfectly beautiful and is believed to be absolutely rust proof. Plants looked so green after the crop had been gathered, that they did not appear to have been picked. Results have been equally good in light loam and also in stiff clay soil." We have a good supply of these plants and they are fine.

Parsons' Beauty.—This new berry originated in Maryland. We procured a supply of plants last Spring from the introducer, and now have about 30,000 of fine clean healthy plants. We are very favorably impressed with it. The introducer says: "It was so much better than anything else grown in the neighborhood that it soon became quite popular. I bought the plant and have since given it a fair test. I am delighted with it myself. It resembles the old Wilson in color and firmness, and the Sharpless in other respects except that it is enormously productive. I grew last year one acre and picked from it 8,000 quarts before the prices got too low to justify shipping, and left fully 2,000 quarts on the vines. The berry is very symmetrical and handsome in appearance, dark red, as we have said like the old Wilson: and colors up admirably well all over-there are no white tips. The foliage is very rank and entirely clean; there being no appearance of rust, blight or other disease upon it. I began picking my Mitchell's Early on May 12th and on the 14th I began on my Parsons' Beauty and in three weeks picked 8,000 quarts. It has a perfect blossom." We believe it is worthy of a trial by all who grow strawberries.

Gladstone.—The originator says: "The Gladstone must command the attention of the small fruit growers of the world. As large as the Sharpless at its best, as early as the Michaels Early, and not excelled in quality by any strawberry grown." It is highly praised by many leading horticulturists and prominent newspapers who we hardly think can afford to misrepresent it. We shall plant it largely this season.

Tennessee.—This grand variety still holds its own. Healthy foliage and a heavy cropper. Still holds the lead as a fertilizer of the pistillate sorts.



ROUGH RIDER.

William Belt.—Heavy stocky plants. Perfect bloom, very stong stamens. Very productive; of large to very large, bright, deep scarlet berries with yellow seeds. Flesh deep pink, very firm, rich, sweet and high flavored. A superb berry for family or fancy market. One of the few strawberries that thrives on almost any soil. Should be found in every family garden.

Rough Rider.—This is entirely a new comer Originated in Oswego county, New York. The introducer says: "It is a seedling of Eureka fertilized by Gandy. Prolific runners like Eureka, the individual plants closely resembling the Gandy in leaf and stalk. Enormously productive, hardy and free from disease. Berries very large, roundish but elongated, mostly shape of illustration, but some flattened. Color dark red like Gandy. The latest and firmest strawberry in existence. Blossom perfect.

Superior.—Entirely new in Delaware. Originated in Virginia and first introduced last year. We have a fair supply of the plants and like their appearance very much. It is a vigorous and healthy variety. The originators say: "As a variety to grow for shipment to distant markets it has no equal, it is exceedingly firm and enormously productive, of large size berries of the most delicious flavor, of good, uniform shape, and a beautiful oright glossy red color. It ripens uniformly all over, with never a white tip. Season early. Continues in fruit through a long season, and the fruit holds up well in size to the end of the season. It has a strong fruit stem which holds the fruit up well from the ground. This variety is very hardy in fruit-bud and never fails to produce a crop of berries. It has a perfect blossom and is very rich in pollen: one of the very best to, plant with the pistillate varieties. We have a fair supply of these plants.



Big Stem Jersey—In regard to size, this is a "Whopper" and probably n ore so as to productiveness, for indeed it is a heavy cropper. Beautiful golden yellow color, a strong grower, and is readily distinguished from all other varieties by its large dark green foliage. We must say however, that after four years of experience with all due respect for its many good qualities, it is not a first class keeper. It must be kept in a very regular and high temperature. And we notice that there is a growing condemnation of its table qualities, of which we never thought it first class.

Vineless Gold Coin.—This is called by its admirers the greatest production of the nineteenth century. A vigorous grower and very productive. One of the best of keepers, any temperature above the freezing point will insure its good keeping. In vine it is about as large as the top of a bushel basket. It is not of a good yellow selling color, as the name would imply; it is rather white faintly tinged with pink. Neither is its shape just the best for a market potato. In quality it is rather hard to cook, very sweet, but sobby. This last fault is not objected to by Southern taste, but is entir-ly condemned in the North.
