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



Early Orders. It is advisable to get your bulbs in the ground as early as possible after the first of October, although bulbs can be planted as late as they can be got in the ground. Yet those planted early give finer flowers, as it is necessary for bulbs to make some root growth in fall to give best results.

Depth Bulbs Should Be Planted.

We are continually having letters from customers inquiring what depth to plant certain bulbs. The following chart, published in a recent is sue of the "American Gardening," seems to illustrate this



point equal to anything published, giving not only the depth, but the distance apart that bulbs should be planted.

Hyacinths.

Hyacinths are great favorites with all flower lovers on account of the ease with which they are cultivated, their varied colors, their beauty, and their fragrance.

CULTURE IN Pots. — Select solid bulbs without regard to size for this purpose, and place a single bulb in a five-inch pot filled with any good potting soil; a light, rich soil is preferable; and place the bulb in firmly, but do not have the soil hard beneath it, leaving about one third of the bulb visible. After potting, give them a good watering and set away in some cool, dark place, and cover six or



eight inches with soil or cocoanut fiber, that the moisture may be retained and the frost or heat excluded. Leave in this condition until well rooted, and then for a succession of blooms bring to the light some every two weeks, bearing in mind that they should not be placed directly in the sun at first, as they will need several days to get acclimated to the new atmosphere. The bulbs should be selected and potted as early as possible to obtain the best results.

Culture in Glasses. — The single varieties are better adapted for glass culture than the double, and the best-named sorts should be selected. Soft water should be used in filling the glasses, a little charcoal put in, and the bottom of the bulbs allowed to just come in contact with the water. They should then be put in a dark, cold place till the roots are four or five inches long, a little additional water occasionally as it evaporates, and then brought into light and warmth as directed for culture in pots.

Outdoor Culture. — The bulbs may be planted any time after the beginning of October and before the winter frosts set in. Any good, well-drained garden soil will answer. Dig deep, and mix in a little decomposed manure; set the bulbs from three to four inches below the surface, and about six inches apart; after the ground becomes frozen, give a good covering of stable litter. In spring, about two weeks after the flowers have faded, the bulbs may be lifted, cleaned, packed in a box of dry sand, and stored away in a cool place until wanted again for planting in the fall.

Single Early Named Tulips.

Of all bulbs grown, the Tulip is, without doubt, the most popular. It is hardy, easily grown, and if cultivated properly, retains its peculiarity of marking for an indefinite period. If allowed to remain in the ground year after year, the bulbs work so deeply into the soil that they become weak and lose much of their beauty. The proper method is to take them up every year, and the bulbs when packed away in a dry place will be safe until the next fall. They require similar cultivation to Hyacinths, except they should not be planted so deep.

The letters following the varieties indicate their earliness. Those marked "A" are the earliest and flower together, and those marked "B" follow, etc. The figures indicate the height attained in inches.

Narcissus.

The numerous varieties of Narcissus are very beautiful, and are among the most popular of our flowering bulbs for both garden and house culture; the double and single varieties, being perfectly hardy, are better suited for general outdoor planting, and after once planted they may remain undisturbed for several years; but in time they will become so thick and matted together that re-setting will be necessary. The Polyanthus varieties may be planted out if a good covering of leaves or litter is given them to exclude the frost, when they will make an excellent show in the spring, and well repay for any extra trouble. All the varieties are excel-lent for growing in the house, and with similar soil and treatment to that recommended for Hyacinths, very satisfactory results are sure to be obtained.





CULTURE. — Take fresh horse manure, and use nothing but the fine portion of it, shaking out the straw. Mix this with fresh loam, one part loam and two parts manure, and turn every day to keep it from burning, until the fiery heat is nearly all out of it. Prepare the bed about four feet wide, and as long as required. Put in the preparation about eight inches deep, making it very solid as it is put in. Let it remain in this condition until the temperature has become reduced to ninety degrees. Make holes two or three inches deep, into which put the spawn, in pieces about as large as an egg, and at a distance of twelve inches apart each way. Cover the spawn and let it remain for eight or ten days. Then cover the whole bed with fine loam to the depth of two inches, making it firm with the back of a shovel or spade. If everything is favorably done the mushrooms will appear in from six to eight weeks. After the bed has



been spawned, do not water unless quite dry, and when necessary use lukewarm water only.




