We would like to add that our certificate of fumitory is held in such esteem that parties having goods they wish to ship to States where the quarantine laws are strict have made applications to us to fumigate their stock and place our certificate of inspection and fumigation on the goods, knowing that they could be shipped to any point under these certificates without question. This we absolutely refuse to do.

We merely state this fact to show the value of our certificate and fumitory.

CONDITIONS OF SALE. While we use the greatest care to have our goods true to name, and satisfactory in every way, yet we do not give any warranty either express or implied.

All errors should be reported within six days after receipt of goods; and in case of an error on our part it being mutually agreed between our client and ourselves that we will not be held responsible for more than the original value of the goods.

We will supply goods in lots of 500 at 1000 rates, 50 at 100 rates.
