This Catalogue is intended for the use of Nurserymen, Seedsmen, and Florists, or purchasers in dozen and hundred quantities.

Location. - The Nursery is situated in Reading, on the line of the Western Division of the Boston $\mathbb{\&}$ Maine R.R., 12 miles north of Boston, there being about thirty-six trains each way during the day.

The Reading \& Lowell Street Railway also passes the Nursery, making it possible to connect by the electrics for Boston, Lowell, Lynn, and all of the surrounding towns.

FUMIGATION. - I would like to state that although having gone to the expense of having my grounds throughly examined by an expert entomologist, I have also taken further precaution in the interest of my clients and erected, under the direction of Mr. A. H. Kirkland, a fumitory where all stock is fumigated when received and when shipped, using for fumigation Hydrocyanic Acid Gas; this being considered by Professor Fernald and other leading entomologists as the only way to deal with the nursery stock of to-day.

We are to-day about the only Nurserymen that are making practical use of the fumitory. We would like to add that our certificate of fumitory is held in such esteem that parties having goods they wish to ship to States where the quarantine laws are strict have made applications to us to fumigate their stock and place our certificate of inspection and fumigation on the goods, knowing that they could be shipped to any point under these certificates without question. This zve absolutely refuse to do.

We merely state this fact to show the value of our certificate and fumitory.
CONDITIONS OF SALE. - While we use the greatest care to have our goods true to name, and satisfactory in every way, yet we do not give any warranty either express or implied.

All errors should be reported within six days after receipt of goods; and in case of an error on our part it being mutually agreed between our client and ourselves that we will not be held responsible for more than the original value of the goods.

We will supply goods in lots of 500 at iooo rates, 50 at roo rates.
In a case where long lists of selected varieties are made up of two or three of each kind, we will not supply them at our wholesale rate, but will charge our retail rate, allowing a liberal discount.

TERMS. - Cash, or satisfactory security upon delivery of stock.
PACKING. - We pack all our goods in bales or boxes, so as to insure their safe arrival at any point in the United States and Europe.
