

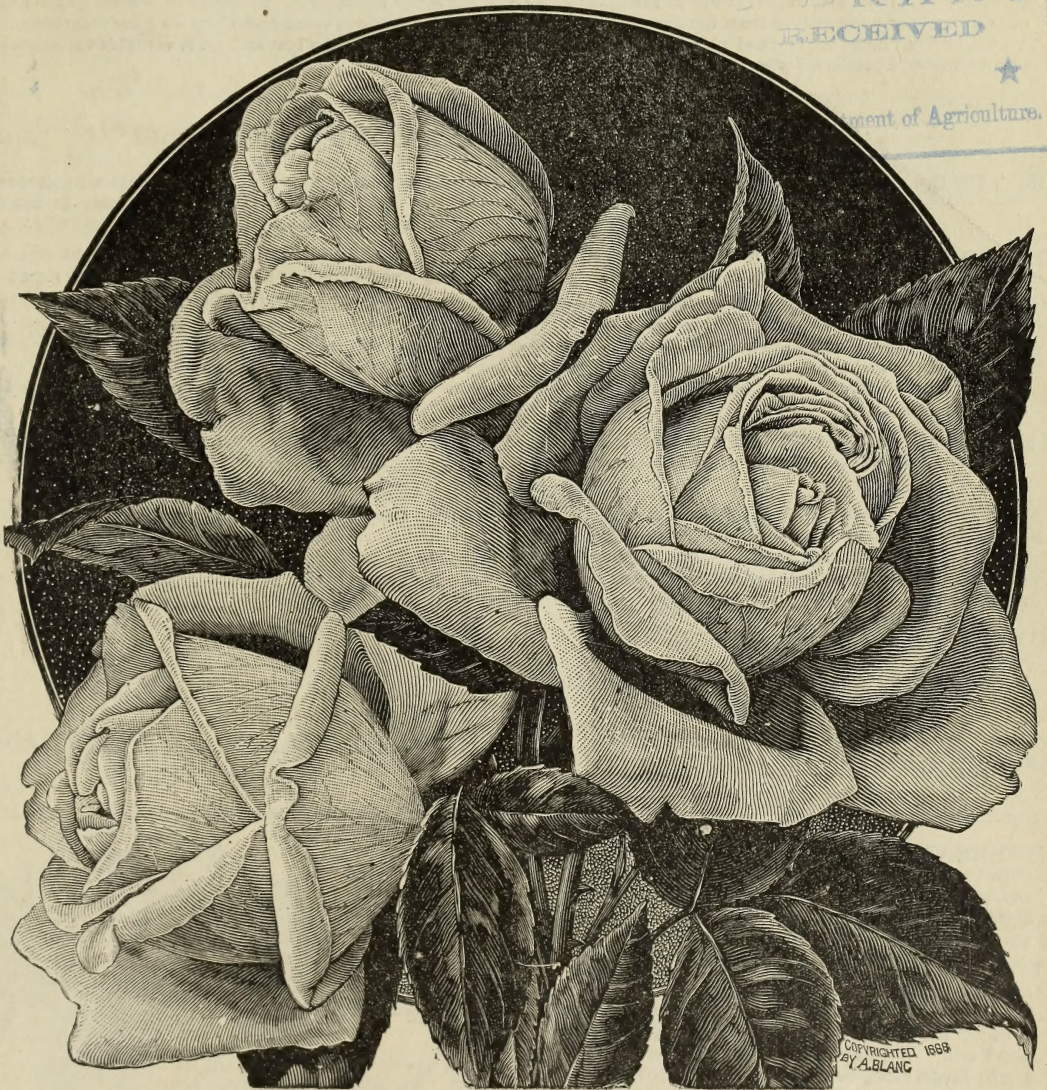

President Carnot—Charming, Hardy French rose; strong and handsome bronzy-green foliage; large, fine shaped buds of rosy flesh, a trifle deeper at center. Very profuse in bloom.

The plants, under the hottest sun, produce enormous flowers in great numbers, and make noble specimens. They can be grown in tubs and kept for years. A very good way to make them bloom freely and facilitate the lifting in the Fall, is to transplant each plant into a pot two-thirds size larger than it has grown in, then plunge the pot into the ground—the soil to cover the surface one or two inches deep. Then in the Fall the plant can be lifted without injury.

Auriantica—Large, double, orange-colored flowers. An early and profuse bloomer.

Sub-Violaceous—Flowers of enormous size, a beautiful carmine, tinted with violet, probably the largest flower of the Hibiscus family, and an unusually free bloomer.

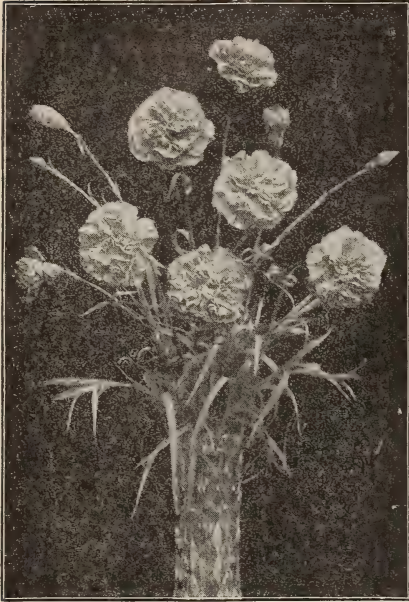

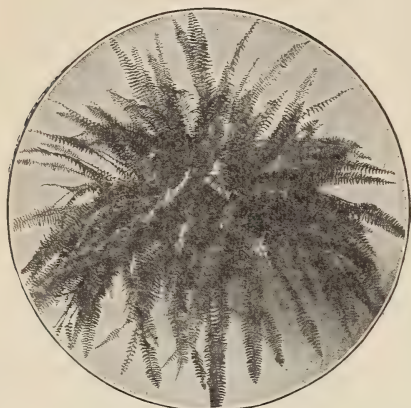
