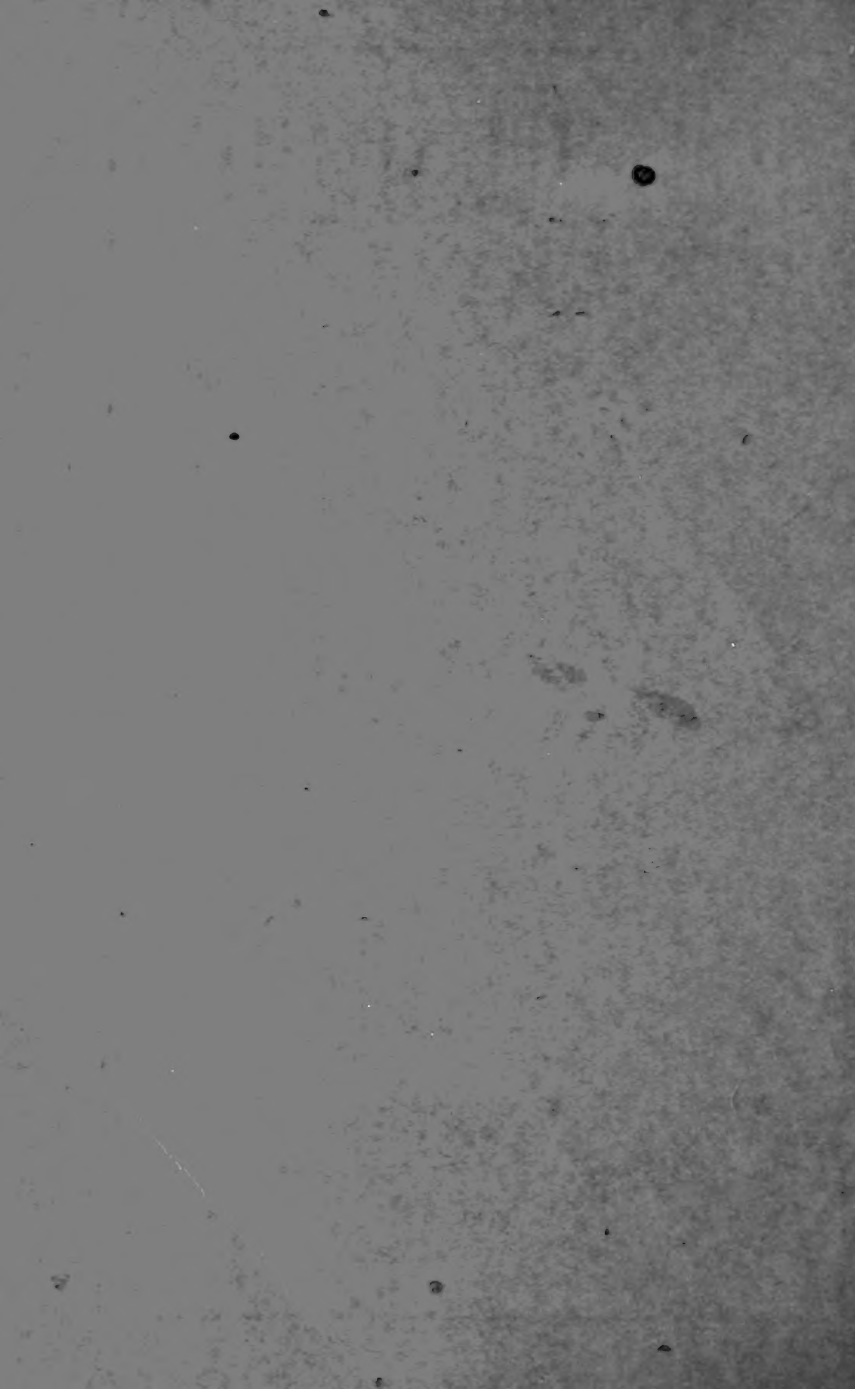

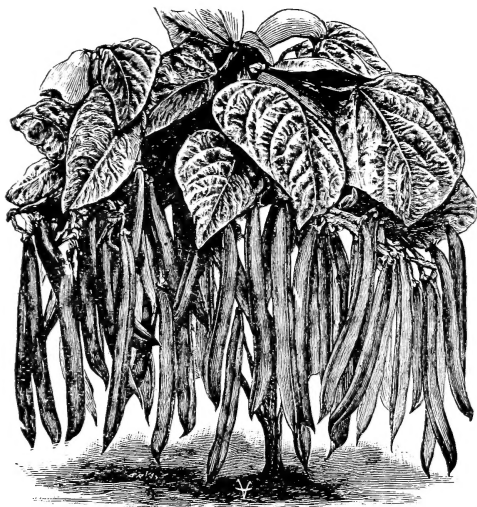

We buy only from good growers and take every precaution to get the best seeds obtainable, and should they prove not true to name we will replace them with other seeds or replace the money paid.

Purchasers by mail will add to these prices a sufficient amount to cover postage. On quantities of from one-half pound upwards, 8 cents per pound; 15 cents per quart for peas and beans, or 10 cents per quart for sweet corn. All seeds in quarter pounds or ounces prepaid.

Novelties in Vegetable Seeds



BURPEE'S STRINGLESS GREEN POD.

Very early and hardy. For either market or home garden no other green podded bean is so satisfactory. The pods are a rich green, very round and straight, five inches long, solidly meaty, tender and brittle. Always entirely stringless, even when fully matured.

GIANT STRINGLESS GREEN POD.

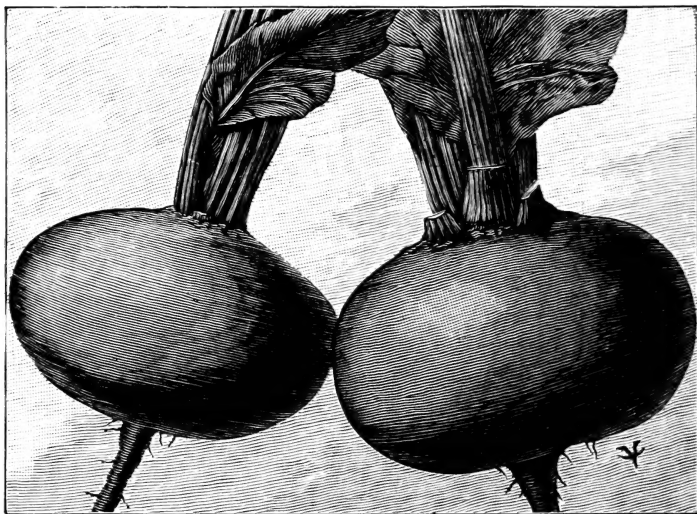
This new variety should not be confused with Burpee's Stringless Green Pod. It resembles more closely the Valentine, the pods averaging one-third larger than the latter variety. About as early as the Early Valentine. The plants are of strong growth, the pods are five to six inches in length, absolutely stringless. Crisp, round, full and fleshy. An excellent succession to Burpee's Stringless Green Pod.

EMPEROR WILLIAM OR DWARF DUTCH CASE KNIFE.

Earlier than Dutch Case Knife. Pods are very tender and of excellent flavor, often ten inches in length and flat. Bushes very prolific. A good growing bean.

B E E T S ,

Jones' Crosby's Egyptian. Selected stock; the earliest beet on the market. A selection from the Early Egyptian which retains the earliness of the parent stock and has added thickness, giving it a more desirable shape. The color is a deep red; almost black. Sweeter and smoother than the Egyptian. It is the most desirable sort for early bunching. It is a rapid grower and can be sown outside as late as July.



Acme. Top low, spreading, dark color, roots thick, turnip shaped with small tap root. Outside color dark purplish red, flesh crimson and ninety per cent. of roots have no white zones. It is a general crop beet and a remarkably long keeper. Especially adapted to gardeners and canners use.

Giant Feeding Sugar Beet or Half Sugar Mangel. This valuable stock beet is the result of careful seed breeding and selection. It has the richness of the sugar beet combined with the size and yield of the mangels. It will yield twice as much as the sugar beet, is much easier handled and keeps better, and in every way is more valuable to the farmer and stock man. Roots are large ovoid in form, very smooth with few rootlets, white in color with small tops. It should be planted closer than mangels.

CABBAGE.



Danish Round Winter. The best cabbage for late spring sales and for shipping. For several years shipments of cabbage have been imported from Holland and sold in the market at prices nearly double those obtained for the product from home gardens. The heads of this variety are of medium size, averaging a weight of eight pounds, are very solid and deep and of a fine white color, making them entirely distinct from any other strain; their quality is superior and they keep better than any other sort, their heads being just as solid and perfect when taken up in the spring as when they were put away in the fall. Will bring double the price of any other variety.

CELERY.

Evans' Triumph. This new variety is by far the best late celery; is very strong and vigorous, with large, very white, crisp, brittle, tender and fine flavored stalks. It is late and requires the whole season to develop and will keep longer than any other sort.

MUSK MELON.



Jones' True Osage. Grown in Michigan by the originator of the Osage Musk Melon. This seed is saved only from ripe, perfect melons. Seed cavity very small; flesh thick, yellow and luscious. Market gardeners cannot afford to use cheaper seed. We have seen a field of five acres grown for the Grand Rapids market without a sport or melon not true to the osage type.

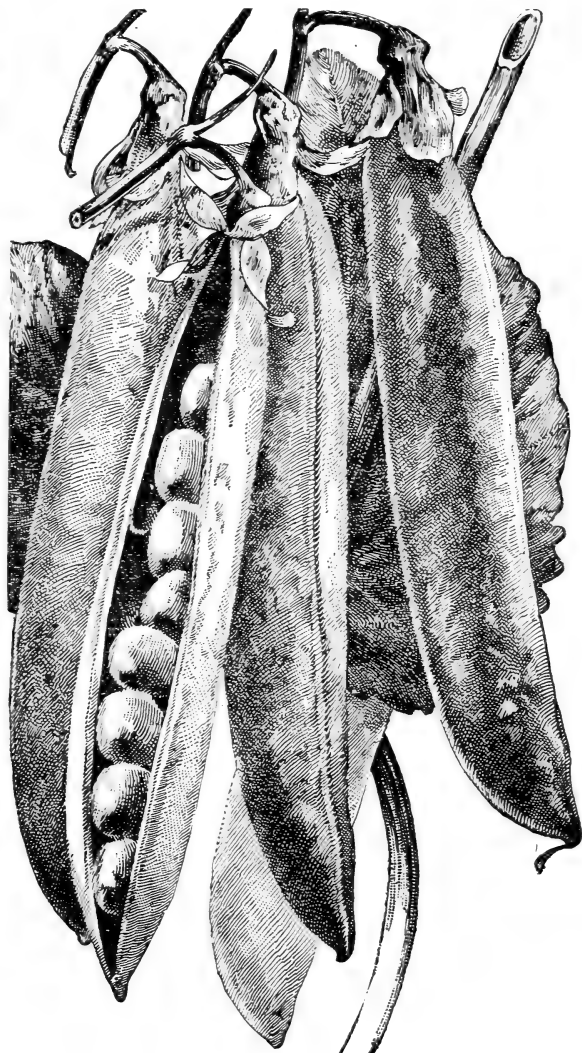
SWEET CORN.

Oakview Early Market. A new and distinct variety similar in general character to the Mammoth White Corn but with larger ears which mature quite as early. It is said to be especially valuable to the market gardener.

CUCUMBER.

Arlington Forcing White Spine. The very best forcing cucumber. Fruit grows very even in size and regular in form. Color dark green, which it holds well under glass. Very prolific.

PEAS



Prosperity or Gradus. This grand pea is very large and of the best quality. Pods as large as the Telephone and almost as early as the First and Best and Extra Early. It is hardy and may be planted as soon as the ground is fit to work in the spring along with the smooth peas. Gradus is a wrinkled pea with vines growing about two feet high. It requires no sticks or brush. The pods are a bright green color; peas very large and sweet.

Crops failed and we have now but a limited stock.



THE "NEW SURPRISE" PEA.

Gregory's Surprise. This is the earliest of all wrinkled peas; fully as early as the Alaska. The vines grow about 18 inches high and require no poles. A very full cropper. Though equally as early as the smooth peas it has the delicious sweetness of the wrinkled sorts. The pods continue longer in condition for the table than the First and Best, and crop matures very evenly so that the entire crop can be gathered in one or two pickings. From the more tender character of the wrinkled peas it cannot be planted quite as early as the Alaska or First and Best.

May Queen. A first early pea of the best quality and particularly valuable for the home garden because pods remain in condition for use so long. Vines slender, about two feet high, pods large and handsome. Peas very large, sweet and tender and remaining so until full grown.

RADISH.

Scarlet Conical. The very best forcing radish. Tops smaller than Vick's Globe. Very scarlet color. shape conical; tender and brittle and can be held longer without becoming pithy than any radish grown.

TOMATOES.

Freedom. Introduced in 1898. It is a robust plant and a great bearer. Fruit grows in clusters, are bright scarlet and unlike most early varieties. This tomato increases in size after first picking. It has a tough skin and firm flesh, making it the best shipper of the early sorts.
