# BULBS FOR FALL PLANTING 

## FOR THE

## Garden, Conservatory and Window Garden.

BULBOUS plants are anong the showiest of our garden favorites, and with little care and following the cultural instructions the growing of bulbs can be made a pleasure.

Beginners have an impression that there are many difficulties to overcome in the management of bulbs, in order to have them produce their flowers to perfection, while in reality no other plants succeed as well, under all circumstances, as the different classes of bulbs and tuberousrooted plants, with as simple and little care as bulbs require.

There are a few necessary points to be considered, and these will be found in the various cultural instructions, which, if you follow them closely, will remove the supposed difficulties.
The growing of bulbs, other than the charms their flowers possess, has many advantages over that of any other class of flowering plants; among others, and a very great one, is that many of them produce their flowers in very early spring, at a season when few other plants are in blossom.

At this season, in a sheltered, sunny spot, a few clumps of Snowdrops, Crocus, Scillas, will present a mass of color, in graceful forms, while the snow yet lingers in shaded places; before these are gone the Hyacinths refresh us with their grateful fragrance; these are soon followed by the Narcissus and Early Tulips, and all before vegetation is fairly started. In rapid succession follow the gorgeous Parrot Tulips, Crown Imperials, and before these are gone the Lilies commence their long succession of bloom. Interspersed with these is a host of other bulbs, equally valuable for their flowers, but whose names are rarely mentioned.

## How to Grow Hyacintbs Oatdoors.

For the open border but one condition is absolutely necessary, viz., they must be protected against frost. Although Hyacinths are classed with the hardy bulbs, they are by no means such, and where the bulbs are cultivated for purposes of sale the ground is so thoroughly mulched that the frost rarely, if ever, touches the bulbs

In planting the Hyacinth, no matter what the nature of the soil may be, make it deep, and work in liberal quantities of well-rotted manure; if it is a heavy loam the bulbs should not be covered more than two inches; if in a light sandy soil, cover them fully four inches. Upon the approach of frost, cover the beds with nervly fallen leaves, to the depth of six inches; this covering should be extended at least eighteen inches beyond the bed on all sides, and then kept in place by Evergreen boughs, brush or pieces of boards. Thus protected, the Hyacinth will be among the first plants to put in an appearance above ground in spring.

No further work will be required for the perfect development of the flower. Bulbs should be planted from 4 to 6 inches deep and about 6 inches apart.

## HYACINTHS IN DOTS.

For pot culture there is no plant that succeeds better than the Hyacinth. Let the soil under the bulb be quite loose, in order that the numerous roots may penetrate the soil without obstruction, but press the soil firmly around and over the bulb, which should be even with the rim of the pot, which will afford more room for the roots. After potting they should be plunged in some convenient, unsightly place in the garden, where they can be easily reached at any time and covered to the depth of a foot or more with soil, coal ashes, or whatever is the most convenient, and over this throw some coarse leaves or litter of any kind, to keep the frost from the soil, in order that the pots may be reached without difficulty as wanted.

Let them remain in this situation until the middle of December, by which time they will have made considerable growth; bring into the conservatory, or bring as many at a time as is desirable. When first brought in they should be kept as cool as convenient, the temperature not to fall below the freezing point.

A four-inch pot is amply sufficient for a single bulb, and three will grow nicely in a six-inch pot, and if one bulb each of Red, White and Blue is used, the effect is very pleasing.

The Hyacinth is one of the few plants that will perfect their flowers without sunshine. While a little is preferable, they will thrive well in rooms where the sun's rays rarely enter, which makes them in many cases particularly desirable.

Although most varieties do well grown in pots, some sorts are more desirable than others, owing to their strong growing habit, producing full spikes of bloom. The following "Exhibition Collection" is especially adaptable for this purpose, as it comprises a variety of exceptionally beautiful sorts, such as we have found to succeed best when grown in pots.

## HYACINTHIS IN GLASSES.

Hyacinths grown in glasses are beautiful ornaments for the sitting room or parlor and can be easily grown, by forcing only such sorts suitable for this purpose, and by following the directions.

Directions.-Place the Bulbs in Hyacinth Glasses as early in the season as possible. making sure that only the base of the bulb touches the water; keep in cool, dark room, closet or cellar, until the roots nearly reach the bottom of the glass. Then bring them to the light, taking the precaution, however, not to keep them in the glaring sunshine, nor on the hot mantelpiece where, as in both instances, the fluctuations of heat and cold will make these positions most unsuitable for successful cultivation.

## PAN HYACINTHS ssometimes called duter Reomens.

This method of growing Hyacinths for winter flowering in the house has given the most satisfactory results. A number of florists used this method for creating something new in the line of an Easter display, with the result that there was a much greater demand than supply, owing to the beautiful display the Hyacinths in pans make. The secret of acquiring success is simply the following: Plant only one kind of Hyacinth in one pan, in order to have them all bloom at once, and to have them all the same shade. The various sorts of Hyacinths invariably grow different from one another, and if planted together, the result will turn out accordingly. The $\mathrm{fo}^{1}$ lowing varieties of pan Hyacinths are the best known sorts for this mode of growing, and if by planting 10 to 12 bulbs of either of the twelve varieties mentioned in a pan 8 to 9 inches in diameter, and following the directions of planting Hyacinths in pots, the most satisfactory results will be obtained.

In ordering bulbs for this purpose, be sure to mention Pan Hyacinths.

They should be treated in all respocts like the other classes, only that they come into flower much earlier, and should, for first flowers, be brought in by the 15 th of November; by so doing, they will give their flowers in perfection by Christmas.

The great beauty of this class of Hyacinths is their profusion of flowers, each bulb giving from three to six spikes, according to the size and strength of bulb. The flowers are smaller than those of the Dutch Hyacinths, but more graceful. The bulbs being small, three can be put in a 5 -inch pot.

The Tulip is perfectly hardy and of easy culture, Howering as freely in the shade as in the sunshine, and producing as fine flowers in a confined town garden as in a more favored place. Double and Single Tulips, when associated together and planted in front of shrubs, maintain a longer display than if either is separately planted. In gardens where the flower beds are to be kept gay from the earliest day of spring, plant between the lines of Tulips, Scilla Sibirica, Chionodoxas, Snowdrops or Crocus, as these flower first and are through when the Tulips come into floom. ## Lily of the Valley

The Lily of the Valley is a plant so well-known and such a universal favorite that little need be said in its description. If they are to be forced during the winter place the pips in shallow boxes during the month of November; put them in a cold frame or in the open ground, covering them so that they do not get severely frozen. They should remain in this condition for at least four weeks previous to being forced. They should be kept covered with boards or any light covering until the pips have attained a height of four inches, when the covering may be lifted a few inches to admit air and light. When they are six inches high remove the covering altogether. If required for outdoor culture, plant in some partially shaded spot where they may remain for years without being disturbed.

## MUSHROOM SPAWN,

## Ten lbs. will spawn 10 feet square.

Culture.-Mushrooms are easily grown, with little care and attention, under a square shed, portion of a cellar, or any dark, dry place. Collect a quantity of fresh horse droppings, throw them into a heap, leaving it until it commences to ferment, then turn it over and mix it up well, and place it where you intend to make the bed; spread it regularly about 18 inches thick, tread firmly and level the surface, then apply the soil about three inches in thickness all over the bed. Leave this to heat for a few days, and as soon as the heat drops to 90 degrees, make holes in the bed about a foot apart each way, into which put pieces of the spawn about the size of an egg; fill up the holes with the compost. Beat the surface level, afterward keep it dry, and the mushrooms will make their appearance in about five or six weeks. When the first crop has been taken give the bed a good watering, leaving it as before, when they will again make their appearance. Beds can be made at any time of the year, and as one declines another should be made, to keep a constant supply. The spawn should be kept in a cool, dry place. When gathering, remove the stalks; do not cut them or they will rot and breed maggots.
