





Top and bottom bars in all heights of AMERICAN FENCE are No. 9 hard Bessemer Steel Wires. All bars between the top and bottom ones are No. 11, and all stay wires are No. 12. All wires are thoroughly galvanized.

DISTANCE BETWEEN STAYS.

12 Inches Apart-Experience has demonstrated that for LARGE ENCLOSURES it is not necessary to have stays closer together than 12 inches. Hence we unhesitatingly recommend our 12 inch stay fence for pastures, ranches, etc.

6 Inches Apart—In building hog pens, sheep or cattle yards and for use about small enclosures, we strongly urge the necessity of having stays 6 inches apart in order to secure the most satisfactory and lasting service.

OUR SPECIAL HOG, CATTLE, AND HORSE FENCE. (See Cut Above.)

This SPECIAL FENCE in structural principal is identical with our regular style, the difference being only in spacing between bars and consequent difference in heights. In these combinations we secure somewhat lighter weights in practically corresponding heights, and therefore lower price per rod. Sizes of wire, galvanizing and distance between stays are the same as in the regular fence.

The 26-inch height of this fence with 6-inch stays is our No. 726 Special Hog Fence, and is one of the most popular of all the designs for hog-raising sections.

Plants are generally known and described as Annuals, Biennials, and Perennials. The term annual is applied to plants which flower and ripen their seeds the same season. Hardy annuals are those which may be sown in the open ground. Half hardy annuals are those which should be started in the house and transplanted to the garden. The term biennial is applied to plants which flower the second season after planting and then perish. The term perennial is applied to plants which flower the second season after planting, and continue to flower year after year.

In soils which posed largely of clay, it will generally pay to put about two inches of sand in the bottom of the trench and to sow the seed on this, covering with more sand. Often it will be an advantage to cover the row with a board so as to shed the rain and protect the soil from the hot sun, but care should be taken to remove this as soon as the young plants cut through the soil. When the



plants are about five inches high, fill up the trench and furnish some support for the vines to run upon. The flowers should be picked before they form pods, or the plants will soon stop flowering.

CUPID SWEET PEAS.

When the Cupid Sweet Pea was introduced, it seemed to most people that its distinct habits had so delighted its propagators that they had exaggerated its value, but continued trial demonstrates that in those localities where the conditions of soil and climate are favorable for its best development, it is even more valuable than was claimed. For growing in pots, for edgings and bedding, the Dwarf Sweet Peas are a valuable addition to our flowering plants. They require no support, but form a low, compact bush covered with large, finely formed flowers.

CULTURE.

Cupid Sweet Peas require a well drained, rich soil, and care should be taken that the seed is not covered to exceed one inch in depth, and that the surface soil does not become caked or hard. Sow in a sunny situation somewhat later than other Sweet Peas, and give each plant plenty of room. The white seeded varieties are especially liable to rot if exposed to extreme moisture. They germinate best in moist, sandy soil. If such is not available a little damp sand should be placed in the bottom of a trench and the seed imbedded in it and then covered to a depth not exceeding one inch. Place a board over the row, supported two or three inches above the soil, so as to afford protection from rain and sun. Be careful to remove the board as soon as the young plants begin to appear.



who cultivate flowers. For some unknown reason the idea seems prevalent that their cultivation is difficult. We do not so consider it. They require a well enriched soil, a location partially shaded, and protection from severe winds. The soil should be moist but never soggy. Given these conditions, their culture is simple and easy. For best results, tubers should be started early in the house and then be planted out only when danger of frost is past. They will come into flower very soon and bloom profusely and continuously until frost. The tubers can then be taken up and stored in dry sand in a moderately warm place.

The flowers are marvels of beauty—delicate yet brilliant, of beautiful form and very large, often measuring, when conditions are favorable, over four inches in diameter. In color they are extremely varied, ranging from pure white through many shades of pink and rose to scarlet and deep crimson, and from pale yellow to deep orange. The foliage is remarkably clean and healthy, varying in form, deep green, presenting a very pleasing

contrast with the bright flowers.






