

TERMS: CASH with order or satisfactory references from unknown correspondents. We allow a discount of 5 per cent. for cash with order and 2 per cent. for remittances within 30 days from date of invoice. Unless otherwise arranged, all accounts become due and subject to draft 60 days from date of invoice.

DOMESTIC REMITTANCES are requested by Postal or Express Money Order or Bank Draft. All banks charge now for collecting local checks.

FOREIGN REMITTANCES are payable in U. S. currency through International Money Orders on Atlanta, Ga., Post Office or Bank Draft on New York. We ask that payments not be made in foreign postage stamps or foreign individual checks.

EARLY ORDERS: We do not sell any old seeds and do not take in stock therefore much more than we can be reasonably sure to sell during the ensuing season. It is imperative on this account that orders, especially for large quantities and for early ripening kinds, should reach us at as early a date as possibly convenient. While we anticipate at this writing supply of all kinds here offered, our acceptance of orders is not a warranty for delivery but is subject to crop accidents and limits to crops. All quotations are subject to change without notice.

POSTAGE: We prepay postage on all seeds sold at package rates but charge postage for all seeds sold by weight. Domestic and foreign postage for seeds and roots is 8 cents per pound. Limit of weight of one package in domestic mails is 4 pounds, in foreign mails 12 ounces. Registration fee is 8 cents per package.

PARCELS POST packages are allowed to Germany and a few other countries. The rate is 12 cents per pound or fraction of pound and the limit of weight for a package is 4 pounds and 6 ounces (2kg).

FREIGHT AND EXPRESS. We desire to receive instructions as to the kind of conveyance or we shall ship at our own discretion. Nearly all Express companies allow now a deduction for shipments of seeds and roots of 20 per cent. from regular merchandise rates. All goods travel at risk and expense of consignee.

FOREIGN SHIPMENTS: Unless otherwise instructed we shall hand over all consignments for foreign places to our forwarders, Messrs, R. F. Downing & Co., 13 William St., New York City, or their correspondents in other ports, who will also effect insurance, if desired.

WARRANTY: While we exercise greatest care to have all our seeds, bulbs, etc., pure and reliable, they are sold without warranty and without any responsibility, expressed or implied, in respect to the crop. If our goods are not accepted on these terms we must be informed at once after their inspection upon arrival at destination, to arrange for their return.

This is our first catalogue under our present firm but it is in fact a continuation of those sent out formerly by the now discontinued Pinehurst Nurseries, at Pinehurst, N. C., which were in charge of our Mr. Otto Katzenstein during their entire existence.

We take gladly this opportunity to give expression to our appreciation of the many favors shown our Mr. Katzenstein during his former relations and we hope that not only our old friends will continue to let us supply them with their requirements in our lines but that all those, whom this catalogue reaches for the first time, will give us a trial.

It will be our desire to send out strictly fresh seeds only, true to name, in the best quality obtainable and at lowest prices possible.

In the DESCRIPTIONS given in the body of the following lists we have endeavored to be as concise as possible and to give information of interest to the planter.

The NOMENCLATURE continues in its unsettled state. We have used our best judgment and have as much as possible adhered to names, which while perhaps not strictly correct in accordance with recent researches, have a meaning and familiar sound to the consumer. We give the authority for each name and we have cross-referenced where deemed necessary.

The HARDINESS of a plant is so indefinite a term, especially if local climatic and soil conditions are taken into consideration, that we have arbitrarily decided to designate as hardy such plants, which generally survive the winters of Philadelphia and New York (40-42 degrees latitude).

We have omitted from this catalogue quite a number of seeds and of roots and plants, the supply of which was rather doubtful at this writing, but we shall at all times be very happy to submit prices on any lists which may be sent us by our friends and we solicit correspondence.

CONIFERS,

About Sowing Seeds of Conifers and Woody Plants.

Sow small quantities in cold frames or in shallow boxes filled with carefully sifted mellow sandy loam. Larger quantities sow in seed-beds which must be naturally or artificially sheltered from heavy East or Northeast winds. Enrich soil with well rotted manure. Work the soil—a well drained sandy loam—thoroughly to a depth of twelve inches, removing sticks, stones, etc. Destroy weeds before sowing and avoid subsequent annoyance.

Seeds with hard shells soak in almost boiling water just before sowing.

Seeds with thick pulp (as Magnolia) macerate and wash off pulp immediately before sowing.

Seeds which naturally dry up or which "lay over" stratify by placing them in boxes or other vessels between alternate layers of sand, storing them in sheltered places out of the way of mice and other vermin. In due time, sow like any other seeds. Keep stratified seeds moist. Sow broadcast or in drills. Last is preferable as facilitating cultivation. Cover seeds with soil equal to about the thickness of the seeds. Do not cover seeds too deep, especially not those of conifers. After sowing press soil firmly with roller or back of spade and water thoroughly with fine rose. Shade seed-beds until seedlings appear when shade must be removed gradually. Keep beds well weeded at all times.

ABOUT SOWING SEEDS OF HERBACEOUS PLANTS: Sow in late fall or early spring either in cold frames or preferably in shallow boxes, filled with finely sifted mellow sandy loam. Press soil firmly before sowing and cover seeds with loam to their own height after sowing. Water well and carefully and do not let the soil get dry. To prevent "dampening off" sprinkle pulverized charcoal over and between the seedlings, Shade carefully. Prick off as soon as the second leaves appear. Cover seed-boxes with mulch of chopped shagnum moss or some similar material, to retain even moisture.
