





Beans in different parts of Michigan and Wisconsin, where the soil produces the bright sample and high germinating quality; peas in selected parts of northern Wisconsin and Michigan, where freedom from bugs and full maturity is assured; vine seeds and sweet corn in several states where the conditions are most suited to their growth; garden seeds of all kinds at the points safely adapted to their best development. The acreage in each section being large enough to counterbalance part failures that may occur at others, gives it, even in what are termed the poor yielding years, a sufficiently good working stock to meet the demands of its large and constantly increasing trade. The fact that it "fills orders" is one reason why its business continues to increase. Another drawing card is the quality of the stock it grows. Its original idea was that quality is the essential element in seeds and among market gardeners, the class of planters whose trade this firm first put forth its efforts to reach, no garden seeds are classed higher than the Leonard brand. Therefore, while we exercise great care to have all seeds pure and reliable, we sell no seeds with warranty expressed or implied in any respect, and are not in any way responsible for the crop. If the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these terms, they must be returned at once, and any money that has been paid for same will be refunded.

LIBERAL DISCOUNTS. To those of our customers who get up clubs for small quantities of the different kinds of seeds, we make the following liberal discounts: This offer refers to Vegetable Seeds in packets and ounces, and to Flower Seeds in packets. It does not include novelties nor special collections, nor bulbs nor anything but vegetable seeds and flower seeds taken from the standard list at regular catalogue prices, in packets and ounces for vegetable seeds, and in packets only for flower seeds.

YOUR PART-READ IT.

SEND CASH WITH THE ORDER. This can be done either in the form of a Money Order, Bank Draft, Express Order, Registered Letter, or cash may be sent by express. Remittances sent in any other way are entirely at the sender's risk. Small amounts may be sent in postage stamps.

SIGN YOUR NAME. Name and address should be written as plainly as possible and care exercised to have Postoffice, County and State in full. 



A distinguishing feature of this bean is the peculiar markings on the seed. The eye side is purplish black more or less extended up over the ends, the remainder being a clear white, dotted with dark Leopard like spots. O Na trip in 1904 to the Pacific Coast our Mr. S. F. Leonard spent several days in the eastern part of the State of Washington. 











For the earliest supply, seed may be sown in September and the plants wintered in cold-frames, or seed started in hot-beds or cold-frames early in the spring. For the fall crop the seed should be sown early in June, and the young plants transplanted to the rows during the latter part of July. One ounce of seed will sow 300 feet of drill; two ounces sown thinly should provide plants enough for one acre.







CUCUMBER.







GENERAL CULTURAL DIRECTIONS.

Most of the varieties thrive best on rich, sandy soil, which should be carefully prepared and well cultivated, as the young plants are for the most part delicate and easily choked out by weeds. Sow as early as the ground can be made ready, in drills sixteen to eighteen inches apart, taking pains that the soil is fine and pressed firmly over the seed; or they may be planted as a second crop—the seeds sown in beds in April, and the plants set out in June. Most of them should be cut when in bloom, wilted in the sun and thoroughly dried in the shade.







WINTER RADISHES.

Sow about the same time as winter turnips, on light, rich soil, in drills eighteen inches apart; give frequent cultivation, and thin two to six inches apart, according to size of the variety. For winter use pull before severe frost, and store in damp sand in cellar.

Scarlet China. Roots cylindrical, or largest at the bottom, tapering abruptly to a small tap. Skin very smooth and of a bright rose color; flesh firm, crisp, tender and quite pungent.

CULTURE. Rhubarb succeeds best in deep, somewhat retentive soil. The richer its condition and the deeper it is stirred the better. Sow in drills an inch deep, and thin out the plants to six inches apart. In the fall transplant the young plants into very highly manured and deeply stirred soil, setting them four to six feet apart each way, and give a dressing of coarse manure every spring. The stalks should not be plucked until the second year, and the plant never allowed sorts, but like the seeds of truit trees, rhubarb seed cannot be relied upon to reproduce the same varieties.













COW PEAS.

Note.—Cow Peas are held in very high esteem for forage purposes, especially on sandy soils. It has been said that the Cow Pea has almost as much agricultural importance in the South as red clover in the North or alfalfa in the far west. Great changes are now in progress, however, in farming methods, and there is to-day a wide spread disposition to plant Cow Peas farther north than formerly, on account of their quick growing habit, their drought resisting ability, and their great value for silage and soil improvement purposes. Some of the newer forms of Begonias are among the most brilliantly beautiful of flowering plants. With care they can be grown from seed. Sow in February or March, in pots, on a smooth surface of fine soil, without any covering of earth, but cover the pot with glass and keep in a warm but shaded place, taking great care not to wash out the very small seeds or young plants in watering. The plants will give an abundance watering. The plants will give an abundance of bloom the first year and at the end of the season they may be dried off by withholding water, the tubers kept in a dry place, free from frost, and planted the following spring, when they will bloom more freely than before.


