


NOTHER year has rolled around and we wish once more to extend to our friends and customers our thanks for their most liberal patronage during the past year, and to present to them our modest catalogue for the season of 1906. Our business during the past season largely exceeded any previous year, and we have already booked for this season more wholesale orders than our entire business of the previous year, and we still have several months in which to sell.

While we wish to heartily thank all our customers for the orders which they have given us, yet we feel that we have given them value received and have earnestly tried not only to fill orders promptly but to give them the very best seeds that it is possible to produce. No doubt some have been disappointed in not receiving their orders quite as promptly as they might desire. During the rush of the Spring business it is almost impossible to keep up with the orders and if customers would send in their orders a little earlier in the season it would help us very much and there would be no cause for disappointment innot receiving seeds by return mail or express. Last season, we received so many more orders than we expected on some particular varieties of seeds and plants, we were obliged to return many orders unfilled as it was impossible to secure the stock. We have made liberal preparations this season and hope to be able to fill all orders, but some varieties of seeds are very short crop this year and it may be possible that late orders will have to be returned on account of our not being able to furnish just the variety desired. It is therefore advisable to send in your orders as early as possible.

As we stated in our last year's catalogue, we consider that there are two distinct classes of buyers, one looking for something cheap regardless of quality, the other looking for quality. We consider that it is impossible for any seedsmen to cater to both of these classes and it is our aim to cater to only one of them, those who desire quality, supplying them with the best possible quality of seeds and naming such prices on them as to give us only a fair margin of profit.

The term "packet" is so elastic and indefinate, meaning anywhere from 5 to 5,000 seeds that we give in most instances the number of seeds contained in a packet. We have seen packets of Sweet Peas put out by some dealers that only contained 5 or 6 seeds, while our packets contain from 75 to 150.

Again thanking you for past favors, trusting that we will be favored with your orders this season, and that you will speak a kind word for us to your neighbors and friends, to whom we shall be pleased to send one of our catalogues free, we are, Very Respectfully yours,

SUGGESTIONS TO CUSTOMERS.

NAME AND ADDRESS. Please remember to write your name, postoffice, county and state, and also the number of your street or postoffice box. Write plainly.

POSTAGE PAID. We deliver, postage paid, to any postoffice in the United States or Canada, all seeds in packets, ounces, pounds, also plants and bulbs, except when otherwise noted.

TERMS OF SALE. Remittances must accompany the order. Stamps in one and two cent denominations will be accepted for small orders. Remittances can be made safely by P. O. Money Order, Bank Draft, Express Order or Registered Letter. Do net send personal checks. On all orders amounting to \$1.00 or over, the customer may deduct the cost of the Money Order. Blank Money Order application is enclosed in catalogue.

DISCOUNTS. Instead of quoting high prices on packets and ounces and then allowing a discount, which must be taken in seeds, we make a low price on all of them and do not allow extra premiums. If, however, several growers wish to club together and send a large order, we are able oftentimes to make special prices.

GUARANTEE. We guarantee all seeds, plants and bulbs to reach our customs safely and in good condition. There are so many contingencies continually arising to prevent even the best seeds always giving satisfaction, such as sowing too deep, too shallow, in too wet or too dry soll, insects of every dercription destroying the plants, wet weather, cold weather, frosts, etc., that it is impracticable to guarantee seeds under all circumstances. We, tarefore, in common with all other responsible seed firms, have adopted and print the following disclaimer:

"While we exercise great care to have all seeds, plants and bulbs pure and reliable, we do not give any warranty, expressed or implied. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these condition, they are to be returned at once."

FREE SEEDS. As has been our custom, we shall give free trial packets of the choicest varieties of various seeds with each order for 25 cents or over. We not only use some of the very best of the standard varieties, but also new and rare varieties. The larger the order the more trial packages sent.

NE not familiar with the seed business would, in reading some of the modern catalogues issued by We not raminar with the seed obsides would, in reading some of the modern catalogues issue by certain Seedsmen, think that there were many new varieties produced each year. Inreality there are but few varieties produced from year to year, and the number of new varieties that are worthy of place in a reliable catalogue are indeed very few. Yet some Seedsmen devote page after page to the so-called GRAND and WONDERFUL varieties, while as a usual thing they are some well known or standard variety dressed up with such a wonderful description that its most devoted friend would not know it. Or, possibly it may be a new variety but very often inferior in quality and growth to some well known standard sort.

By careful selection and breeding stocks are grown up that are far superior in every way to the original or parent stock, but what is the use of calling the Hubbard Squash some other name, using all the adjectives that can be found in praise of it, and then asking 10, 15 or 20 cents per packet for it when the same seed could be bought under its true name for 5 cents per packet. This is only an illustration but will apply to many well known varieties. You will always notice that when a large list of noveltes and wonderful new creations are offered, that the prices are 2, 3, or 4 more times the cost of the well known varieties. This no doubt adds to the profits. If you are looking for a catalogue that is full of novelties and wonderful new plants, Cabbages that will





Mangel Wurzels and Sugar Beets.

The Most Economical and Valuable Food for Cattle and Sheep.

No root crop is a better paying investment for farmers than Mangel Wurzel. Forty to forty-five tons can easily be produced from an acre, which is much more valuable than the same amount of coarse fodder, for the Mangels are wholly digestible, there being no waste, and cows fed on them during the winter will give more and better milk than they will on any other food. Sheep, also, are much healthier, and ewes raise bet-ter lambs where Mangels are fed. Mangel Wurzels should be grown by all interested in poultry. It is hard to find a better substitute for green clover than chopped or shredded Mangels. You should sow from seven to ten pounds to the acre.

127. Improved Long Red Mangel Wurzel. ★ This is the heaviest cropping and largest in size of all the Mangels. In England eighty tons have been grown to the acre. The roots grow from one-half to two-thirds above the surface, which renders the harvesting easy. They are frequently two or more feet in length by six or eight inches in diameter. They have dark richly colored foliage and a dark red skin. The flesh is white or eight inches in diameter. They have dark richly colored foliage and a dark red skin with veined rings of pink. This is probably more generally used than any other variety.




