

Terms.-3% discount for cash with order. 2% discount on all bills paid within 10 days.

Remittances.—Should be made by Draft, Postoffice Money Order, or Registered Letter. Remittances in any other way are entirely at the sender's risk.

C. O. D.-Plants to be sent C. O. D. must have one-fourth of the amount with order.


