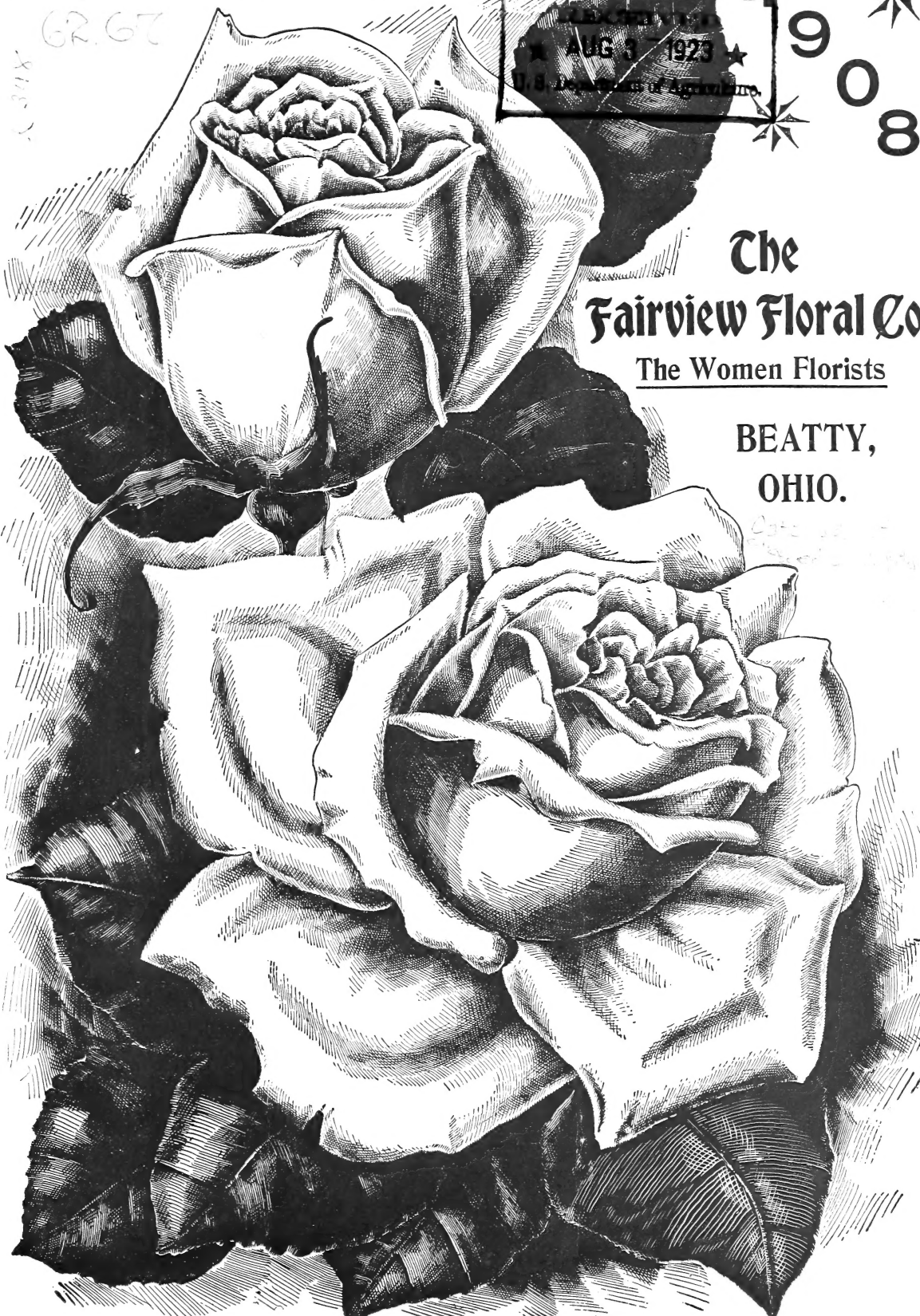

A WORD About Our Roses and Other Plants

THERE ARE FOUR CLASSES OF ROSES:

FIRST—Roses that have been forced.

THIRD—Roses that are grafted.

SECOND—Roses grown for cut flowers.

FOURTH—The only kind—Roses that are grown naturally.

Read the following and you will understand the difference between inferior Roses and our strong, summer propagated, winter rested, pot grown Roses on their own roots.

First—Roses of this class are propagated, started and forced to grow in the winter time at a high temperature (when they should, naturally, have a season of rest), which impairs their vitality and therefore makes a weak plant.

Second—Roses of this class are planted on the benches of the greenhouse and grown for cut flowers, being forced several years until they are practically exhausted, then they are dug and sent out to the innocent plant buyers, who plant them and expect them to grow.

Third—Roses of this class are grafted on wild Rose roots to sustain a growth, for Roses grown and forced as stated above become weakened so that it is necessary to graft them. The objection to grafted Roses is that wild Roses will grow from the root and draw the strength from the grafted plant and in a short time you will have nothing but a wild Rose.

Fourth—Our Roses are grown under entirely different method of propagation—which is a natural one—growing during the growing season (summer), and resting during the non-growing season (winter), we produce a Rose that can have no superior.

Another reason why our pot grown Roses are superior is that you receive them with their fibrous roots undisturbed, as shown in cut. When the supposed field grown plants are dug, the large roots are broken, thus making success doubtful. Our Roses and other plants as well, are grown cool, which produces a strong, sturdy, well rooted plant; as it is well known that good, strong, healthy roots are absolutely essential to healthy plant growth. When our plants, which have vitality stored, are planted in the Southland or elsewhere, they start into a vigorous growth and produce a wealth of luxuriant foliage and bloom.

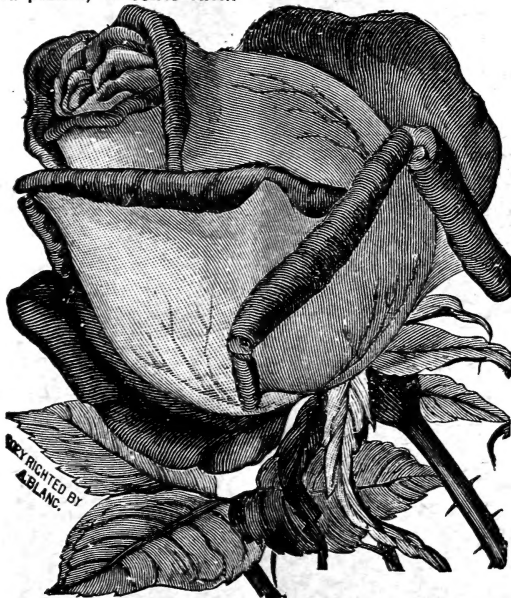

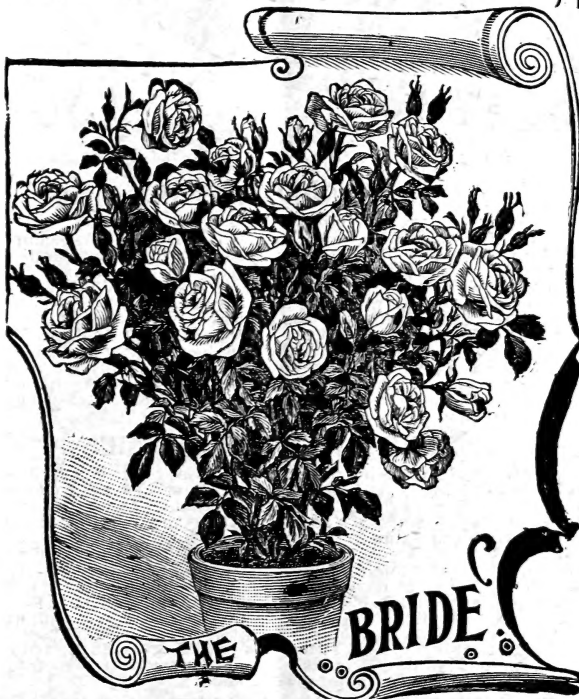

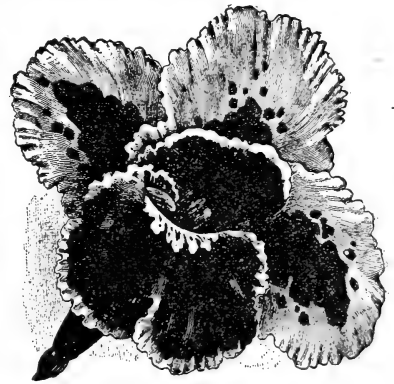

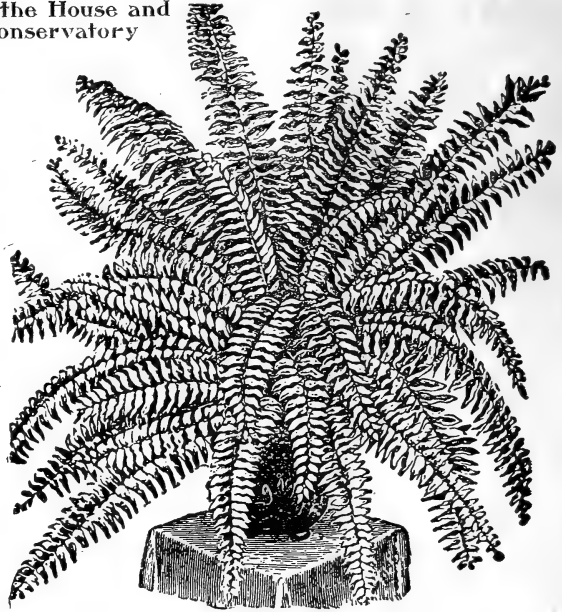

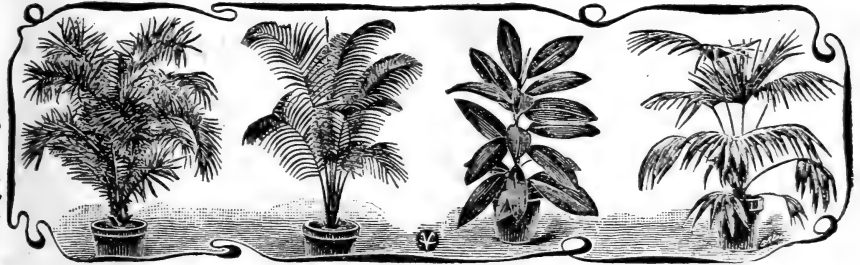

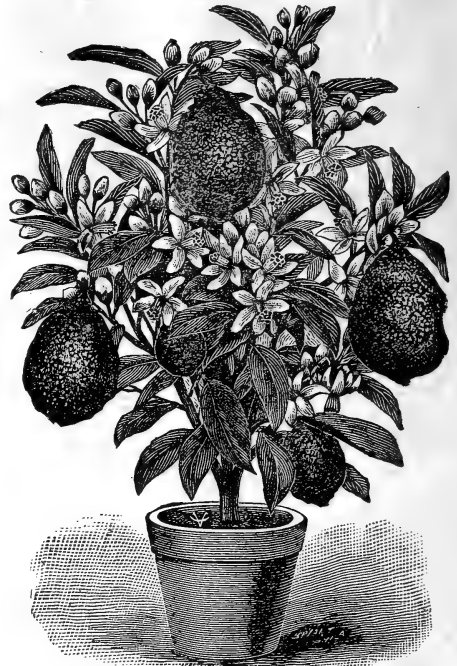

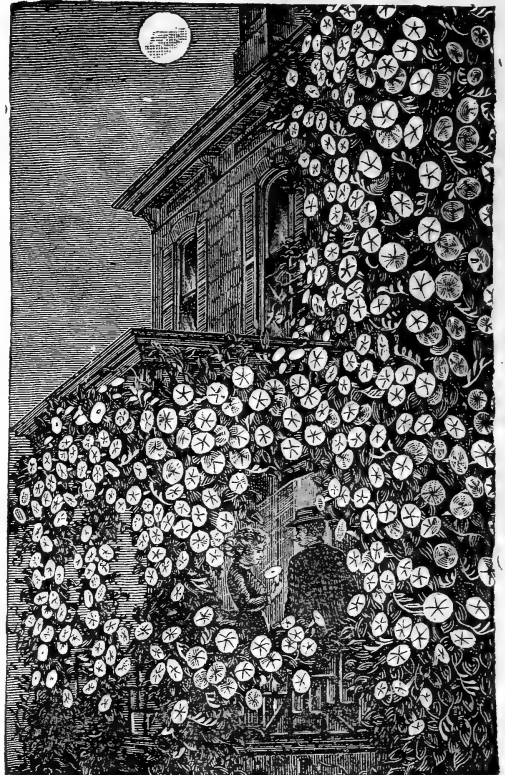

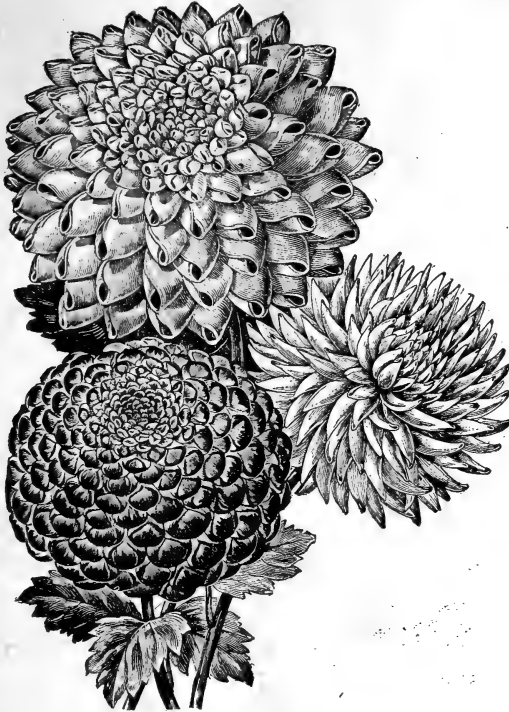

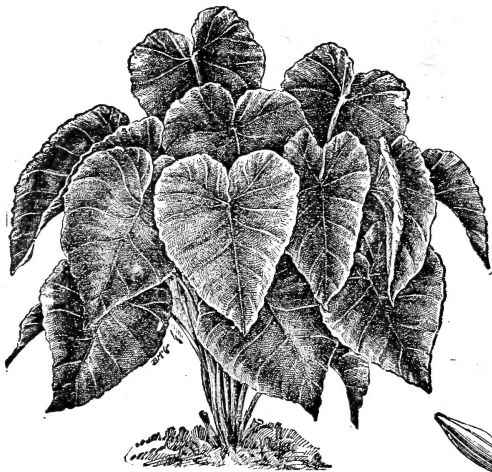

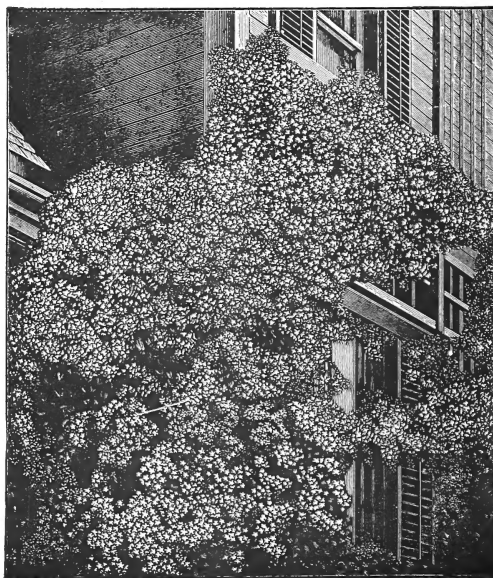
