KingNew. Originated near Grand Rapids, Mich. Supposed to be a seedling of the Concord. It is of the same color and flavor but more tender, less seeds and ripens a trifle earlier. Bunch and berry large and very compact. Wood hard and very short jointed. Highly recommended for home use and local market. Awarded medals by both the St. Louis and Pan-American Expositions.

## McKinley New, white. A cross between Niagara and Moore's Early. It ripens

 ness. Bunch and berry large. Very sweet and of high quality. A good shipper and remarkable keeper.
## Regal

New, red. Exceedingly productive. A one year vine planted in 1901 on the grounds of Mr. M. Crawford, of Ohio, ripened ten clusters in 1902 and 110 in 1903, the largest weighing 14 ounces. Very vigorous, healthy and hardy. The clusters are medium to large and very compact. Berries large, dark red, juicy; skin thin but tough. Pulp tender releasing seeds easily.

## CURRANTS

## Perfection

New, red. A cross between Fay's P. and White Grape, but superior to either in size of bunch and berry, quality and productiveness. The only small fruit ever awarded the Gold Medal by the Western New York Horticultural Society.

## RASPBERRIES

## Black Diamond

Probably the most popular blackcap among market growers. Its great vigor and hardiness, productiveness, large, rich and jet black color brings it in great demand. Equally valuable for evaporating, canning, market and home use.

## BLACKBERRIES

## Blowers

 Originated here in the Chautauqua "Grape Belt," and is, no doubt, the most productive blackberry known. 2694 berries have been grown on one bush, and 2720 quarts on $1 / 3$ acre. Of good size and quality. Jet black and a good shipper.
## Mercereau

Probably the hardiest blackberry known, having stood without protection and uninjured 20 degrees below zero. ## SHRUBS

## Althea, Meehanii

 Variegata This grand, new variegated leaved Althea shows the same white and yellow variegation on green leaves as the old variety, but it opens its flowers wide, while in the old variety the flowers never open but appear only as purple buttons on the bush.The flowers are single and are of a beautiful pinkish purple color, the plant blooming profusely. The contrast of color between the flowers and the silver variegation of the leaves makes the bush very striking in appearance. The flowers are from $31 / 2$ to 4 inches across and the plant begins to bloom when quite small. Hardy wherever any Althea succeeds.

## Hydrangea Arborescens Sterilis

 variety of the hardy native species $H$. arborescens, commonly found "wild" in most of the states east of the Mississippi river. The sterilis is likewise absolutely hardy and is, moreover, of easy culture and is an exceedingly prolific bloomer. A five-year-old plant has produced one hundred and twenty-six perfect blooms at one time.The size of the flower is one of the striking features of this shrub. Twelve-inch blooms are frequent on young plants, while the average size on matured plants is usually six inches or more.

The color of the flower is a pure snowlike white, without the creamy and later pink tints that are characteristic of the $H$. paniculata grandiflora. The length of time this whiteness is retained depends somewhat on local conditions, but usually from four to five weeks, when the flowers begin to change slowly and gradually to a light green color, and by October the foliage and flowers are of a similar shade. The flower clusters remain intact long after the leaves have fallen, and frequently throughout the following winter.

This Hydrangea gives every promise of becoming even more popular than the well known $H$. paniculata grandiflora, as it lacks the coarseness and stiffness of that variety; it is refined in tone and effect, and with its abundant and handsome foliage it lends itself readily to landscape effects. It is a comely, handsome shrub at all times. It reaches a height of five or six feet, and when in full bloom is one of the most striking as well as the most beautiful shrubs of its season, suggesting the descriptive synonym referred to in Bailey's "Cyclopedia of American Horticulture," viz. : "Hills of Snow."

## Philadelphus, Purpurea Maculata a purple spotted Mock

 tion. Of compact growth three to four feet in height. Its flowers are flat, pure white with bright purple center. Its exquisite perfume cannot be surpassed, and we know of no flower to equal it in this respect. June.
## HARDY DUTCH BULBS

## For Fall Planting Only

These offer more enjoyment and gratification for the money and trouble invested than almost any other flower.

1st-They cost but little to start on and last for many years without replanting.
2nd-They bloom so early in the season when flowers are scarce.
3rd-They furnish such a mass of gay colors with but little foliage and no brambles or thorns. Many of them are very fragrant also.

4th-They are prompt in their habits. Bloom for some five weeks early in spring. Then the leaves dry up early in June and make room for annuals or bedding plants the rest of the season.

5th-They can be grown in the house in pots or boxes of earth or even in water as well as in the garden, and they are better adapted for that purpose than any other flower.

Plant them any time during September, October, and up to the middle of November at the North and during November and December at the South. Plant Hyacinths and Narcissus some 6 inches apart and 4 inches deep. Tulips 4 inches apart and $21 / 2$ inches deep. Crocuses 2 inches apart and $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inches deep. Plant in good soil and where water drains off readily. Although hardy, the protection of a little barnyard manure is desirable.

For the house, plant in pots or boxes so the tops of bulbs are even with the surface. About three Hyacinths or Narcissus to a 6 inch pot, 6 Tulips or 12 Crocuses.

## Fall Planting

As a rule fall is much the best time for planting hardy trees, vines, shrubs and bulbs, and we can and do ship them all through October and November. We recommend, however, that they be left standing in the nursery up to October 15th to ripen and harden. When planted in the fall, the cut ends of the roots callous by spring; the winter's rains and snows settle the soil closely around the roots, and the tree is ready to start to grow early and with vigor. Do not trim the tops of trees in the fall, but do so early in spring. It is also well to bank the soil high around the trees and plants as a protection to the roots and to prevent too much swaying in the wind. This applies to all stock offered herein except strawberries, black raspberries, dewberries and perhaps peaches. These do not do as uniformly well, planted in the fall, as other stock.

Another thing in favor of fall planting is that the weather is usually better, the soil dryer, and you have more leisure than in spring. But if the weather is wet and you are finally obliged to plant in the mud, if at all, the winter's frost will pulverize the soil again; while if you plant in the mud in the spring, the ground will be hard and uncongenial all summer.

After fall planting the next best time is early spring. Plant as early as the ground is dry enough to work well, especially strawberries and black raspberries. Late spring planted stock may do well if the weather is favorable; but if it should turn hot and dry early, as it sometimes does, the stock will certainly suffer, even if it does not die. For this reason it is a good plan to get the trees and plants in the fall, even if you do not plant until spring. Heel them in as recommended below, and have them on hand to plant whenever you are ready.

CARE OF STOCK WHEN RECEIVED-When the stock arrives, unpack and plant at once. Should it, however, appear frozen, do not unpack, but cover it up in a cool, dark cellar or other convenient place where it may thaw out gradually. Freezing does not injure plants. but rapid thawing with exposure to air and light does. If not ready to plant when received, heel them in, in a dry place, protected both against sun and sweeping winds. Dig a trench deep enough to hold the vines, plants or trees, open the bundles and spread them out against the side of the trench an inch or two thick; cover them with a layer of soil, which press against the side of the trench to exclude air; and put on another layer of stock and soil, etc., until completed, taking great care to keep the different varieties separate and well labeled. If the vines and plants are left to be heeled in over winter, both root and top must be well covered with earth, and over that place a cover of coarse horse manure or other litter to insure safety. Trees are heeled in leaning with the prevailing wind at an angle of 30 to 40 degrees and buried one-third to one-half of their length. The balance may be covered with evergreen boughs or other brush, but nothing that would attract mice.

FUMIGATING-There are no San Jose Scales in our Nursery. Still the laws of some states require the fumigation of nursery stock with hydrocyanic acid gas, and the commissioner of this state recommends it. On this account we have built a fumigation house of the most approved pattern, where we will fumigate the stock free of charge for all those who need or desire it.

FREIGHT PREPAID-Orders of $\$ 10.00$ or over, with a remittance for full amount, will be sent freight paid to any shipping point in the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, New Jersey, Delaware, and all the New England states except Maine. Also to the following shipping points: Wheeling, W. Va.; Louisville, Ky.; Indianapolis, Ind.; St. Louis, Mo.; Chicago, Ill.; Portland, Me. ; Richmond, Va., and Baltimore, Md. Also to the following points if one-tenth is added to the price of the stock, viz.: Raleigh and Wilmington, N. C.; Charleston, S. C.; Savannah, Ga.; Jacksonville, Fla.; Chattanooga, Tenn.; Kansas City, Mo.; Omaha, Neb. ; and St. Paul, Minn. From these points ${ }^{\prime}$ to destination the purchaser pays the freight on receipt.

POSTPAID-At single and ten rates the following will be mailed postpaid: Grape Vines, Small Fruits and small plants of Ornamental Shrubbery. Also small trees, cut back, at the single rate of the smallest size priced. Inasmuch as postage on vines and plants to the Pacific States and some other distant points is cheaper than express charges we often get orders for hundreds and thousands of vines and plants to be mailed. This we do when postage is added to the price, according to the following table:


Our vines and plants are very strong, hence the large amount of postage required. The postage on No. 2 grape vines, gooseberries and currants is but two-thirds as much as on No. 1.

CLUB ORDERS-Parties requiring but a few plants or vines are invited to take advantage of our offer to send $\$ 10.00$ worth, freight paid, by clubbing in with or taking orders of their neighbors.

CLAIMS of any kind must be made within five days after receipt of goods. Those made after a lapse of ten days will not be entertained.

TERMS-Cash with order. Remit by postal or express order, bank draft, or registered letter at our risk. Money loose in ordinary letters is at the risk of the sender.
