

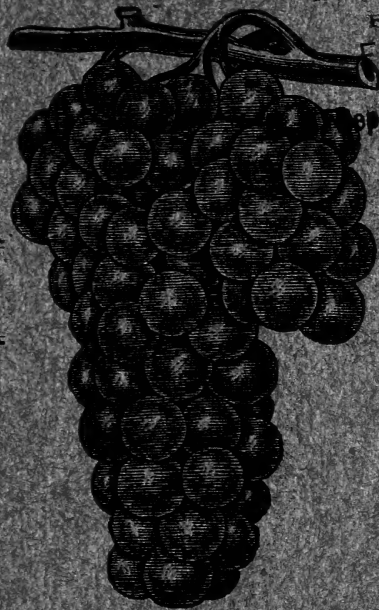

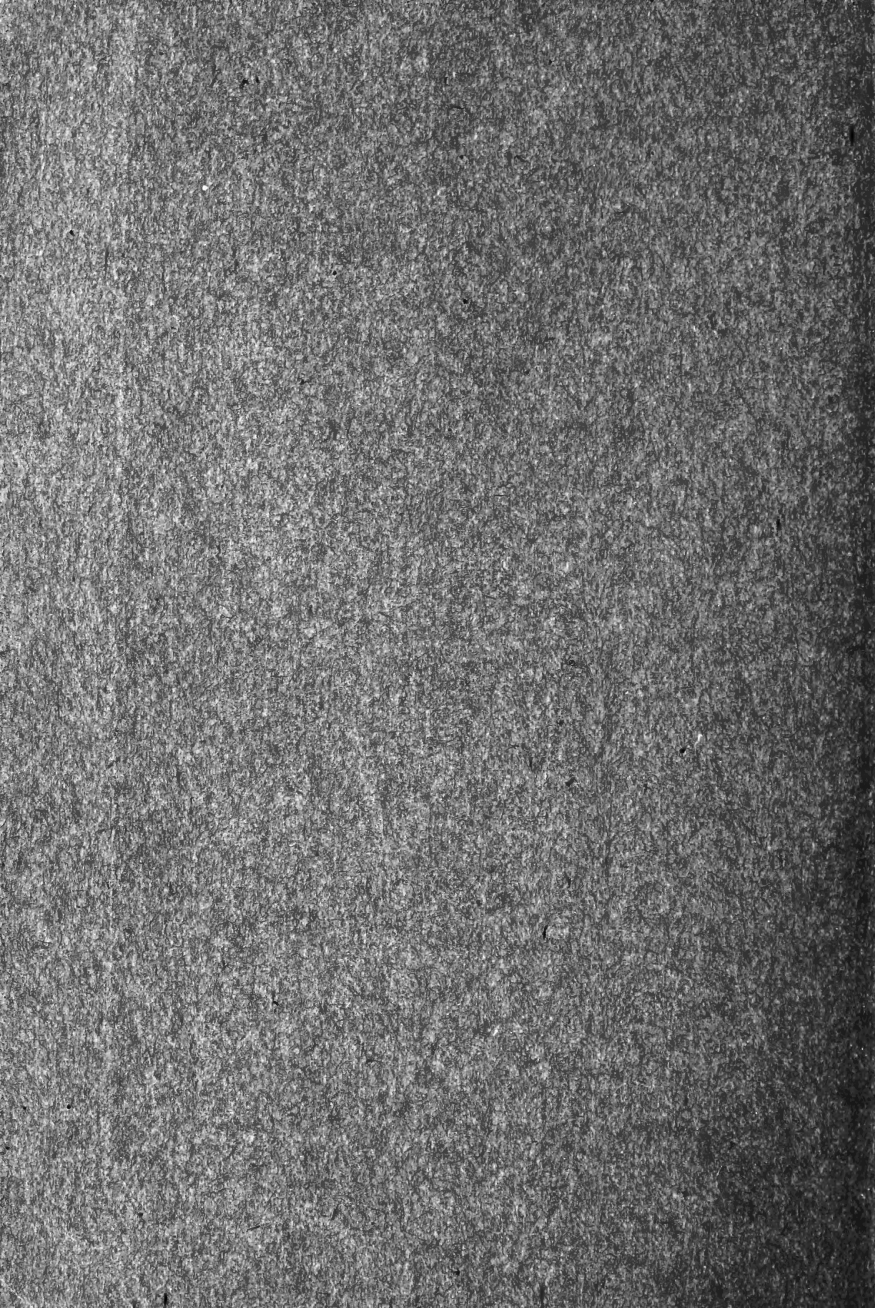

Grapes, Blackberries, Currants, Geoseberries, and Red Raspberries in the cellar where they can be packed and shipped any day. Can usually begin digging Strawberries and Black Raspberries the last of March to the first of April, or as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

There is no nursery better situated for transportation than is ours. On the west of us we have at Angola, the Lake Shore, the Nickel Plate and the Pennsylvania Railroads, and the Erie; the other way, with Buffalo but twenty miles distant—the best distributing point in the world. We also have the American, the Wells Fargo, the National and Adams Express Companies.

Every effort will be made to please our patrons, and no trouble is too great for us to make every exertion to have stock reach its destination promptly and in good order.

No charge for packing package or cartage to depot. But after delivery to forwarders, it must be with the understanding that we are released from all further responsibility. Should the stock happen to be delayed, wire or write us and a tracer will be immediately sent after them.

### Guarantee

We believe every plant stored in our cellar true to name. But we also recognize that no one is infallible, and should a mistake occur we will refund money paid for those that prove untrue or replace with such as are true. We are not otherwise liable to damages, and stock is sold with above understanding.

## Terms

Parties not known to us who desire credit should always send references with order. All bills payable June 1st; on all bills remaining unpaid at that date we will draw at sight without further notice, unless otherwise arranged.

## Important

When plants are wanted by express, always name the company you want them sent by. In the hurrying season it is about impossible for us to look up your express company. For best service they should if possible start by the company that will carry them without change.

## Blackberries.

Virginia Experimental Station Bulletin No. 147. Report on careful experiment with old and most popular new varieties, recommend the Eldorado and Rathburn as the best for home use and market. The Eldorado is one of the most valuable in cultivation, as hardy as the old Snyder and in quality ranks as one



of the best. It is a dwarf bush, suckers sparingly and therefore will stand planting closer than any other variety I know of. Especially recommended for sections of the country where the temperature falls extremely low.

Mr. Crawford, of Horticultural fame, Cuyahoga Falls, O., says:

—The Blowers Blackberry had been in bearing about a month and all others on the place were gone. I found several rows in a town lot, supported on a very high trellis. It appeared as if the crop had just began to ripen, for there was one of the largest crops in sight that I ever saw, and I have been familiar with blackberries all my life. From near the ground to a height of ten feet, the trellis was full of berries, many of them ripe, many red and many green ones not yet commencing to turn red. The man in charge told me that the crop would not be all gone until October, and I had no reason to doubt his word. Some weeks later the owner wrote me that he was still picking berries. Although carrying such a tremendous crop the bushes seemed to be perfectly healthy. In two other gardens and on a large plantation in a field the same green, healthy appearance was observed. It was the same with a plantation growing from

root cuttings. One bush was tied to the trellis over twelve feet high, and still growing, and was perfectly healthy.

From all I have been able to learn the variety has never been winter killed. One man who has 2 short rows in his garden for his own use informed me that he had fruited it for seven consecutive years and he never knew of its failing.

We, ourselves, have fruited the Blowers Blackberry the past six years and two seasons were about as cold as we ever experienced, we have had no loss from winter killing, the crop each year exceeding our expectations. The fruit is superior to nearly all other varieties, large, glossy black berries that make the finest appearance in the basket. On account of its large size, productiveness and hardiness I feel sure every one who plants the Blowers will be delighted with it. The bushes we offer are strong rootcutting plants.

## *The Ruby Red Raspberries.*

ITS STRONG POINTS. THE BEST BERRY TO  
GROW FOR PROFIT.

This Grand variety was originated at Marlboro, N. Y., and is a seedling of the well known variety "Marlboro." It is a strong grower of large, hardy canes, and a good plant maker.

It ripens with the earliest and continues picking a long season. Its fruit is large, bright red in color, exceedingly firm and of a good flavor. It stands shipment long distance, being shipped daily from this point to Boston through its whole season.

It has been grown commercially for seven years, and to-day stands ahead of all others as a berry for the grower to plant for profit. Orders for this grand new berry should be booked early in the season. Its doubtful if the supply holds out the entire season.

## *Eaton Red Raspberry.*

We have not yet fruited this variety. It comes from Michigan, highly recommended by reliable growers. Said to be large, remarkably bright red and firm, hardy, productive and a strong growing bush. Considering the strong recommendations made for it we think it well worth a trial. Strong transplants, \$2.00 per 100.
