



well and deeply manured and trenched to the depth Set the plants in rows from 3 to 4 feet of 18 inches. apart and 2 feet in the row, spreading out the roots, and cover gradually during the season 6 or 8 inches. On the approach of winter cover with manure or compost, fork the beds early in spring, and apply a dressing of salt at the rate of 600 pounds to an acre. Cut for use the second year after planting.

After settled warm weather, set poles 4 to 8 feet long in rows 4 feet apart and extending north and south, the poles being 3 feet apart in the row. Let the poles slant slightly toward the north. Set in this way the vines cling better, and the pods are straighter and more easily seen. Around each hill plant fiveto eight Beans 2 inches deep. When well started thin to four plants, and see that they all climb around the pole in the same way, for they will not grow if tied up in the opposite direction. Another plan is to plant in rows thickly enough so that there will be one plant to 8 or 10 inches Set posts 5 feet high firmly at each end of the rows and drive stakes made of 2 x 2 lumber at intervals of 16 feet along the rows. Stretch a wire, size number 10 or 12, between posts along each row, and fasten it to the tops of the stakes in the row with wire staples. Run a light wire or twine along the row about 6 inches from the ground and fasten to the tops stand stakes with wire staples. Tie twine to the wire above and the wire or twine below, wherever there is a plant. The vines will run up these until they reach the top wire, when they will care for themselves. Another way is to omit the bottom wire and stick small stakes 2 to 6 inches in the soil and fasten to the top wire.

CULTURE - In sections where the temperature never falls to 20 degrees below freezing point, seed may be sown in the open border in October and transplanted to rows very early in spring, but in northern states we sow in hotbeds in February, or, still better, from September to to 20, and winter the plants over in a coldframe. Transplant March 15 to April 15, about 18 inches apair, in rows 2 feet wide; this earliest crop matures in June. For second-early crop, to mature in July and August, 800 eeds of early kinds early in April and plant out in May. For a late cop, to mature from September to December, 800 late varieties early in May and plant out in July; the plants 2 and the rows 3 feet apart. Cabbages should be hoed every week, and the ground stirred as they advance in growth, drawing up a little earth to the plants each time until they begin to head, when they should be thoroughly cultivated and left to mature. Loosening the roots will sometimes retard the bursting of full-grown heads Of late years many cops of early Cabbages have been destroyed by maggots at the roots. The best remedy seems to be to remove the earth from around the stem and apply an emulsion of kerosene, made as follows: Add one quart of kerosene oil to two quarts of boiling soft soap, which has been thinned to the consistency of cream. Stit the oil thoroughly by churing or other method, until it has united with the soap and forms a cream-like substance. Then didute with five times as much water. To accodust, ashes, slaked line and coal dust, are all recommended as preventives, and, with his, have proved valuable in the order named. 



Culture.—Sow the seed (which is slow to germinate) in shallow boxes, or in a finely prepared seed-bed out-of-doors, in straight rows, so that the small plants may be kept free from weeds. See to it that the seed is not covered too deep, and that the bed is kept moist, almost wet, until the seed segminate, as plenty of moisture is essential to get a satisfactory growth. When about 2 inches high, thin out and transplant so that they may stand 3 inches apart, and when the plants are 4 inches high, tou off the tops, which will cause them to grow stocky.

The crop is usually made to succeed some carlier one, but in order to grow good Celery, the soil must be made as rich as possible, the essentials to success being very rich soil and plenty of water. If good plants are used, they may be set out as late as the middle of August, but the best results are usually obtained from setting about the middle of June or the first of July. The most desirable time will depend upon local climate, and is that which will bring plants to maturity, during cool, moist weather. In setting prepare broad, shallow trenches about 6 inches deep and 4 to 6 feet apart, in which the plants should be set 6 inches apart, cutting off the outer leaves and pressing the soil firmly about the roots.

When the plants are nearly full grown they should be "handled," which is done by one man gathering the leaves together, while the second draws the earth about the plant to one-third its height, taking care that none of the earth falls between the leaves, as it would be likely to cause them to rust or rot. After a few days draw more earth about them, and repeat the process every few days until only the tops of the leaves are visible. Or it may be blanched by pressing the leaves together with two wide boards held in place by stakes, or by wire hooks at the top. This is the method commonly used by market-gardeners, but Celery so blanched is more likely to become pithy than that blanched with earth. Care should be taken that the plants are not disturbed while



CUCUMBERS

One ounce will plant about 50 hills: one to two pounds to the acre

CULTURE.—To obtain early Cucumbers, and at the same time avoid most of the annoyance of the striped bug, it is a good plan to plant the seeds about the first of May in frames, without much bottom heat. Small sods, turned over, may be placed close together in the frames, and upon these the seeds may be planted; or small pots may be plunged into the soil in the frame, and a few seeds placed in each. In three or four weeks these may be transplanted into open ground. Set without disturbing the plants, each piece of sod into hills made 3 or 4 feet apart each way. If transplanted in the evening, and one watering given, the plants will not droop. When the plants have become well started, thin out, leaving four of the strongest in each hill Pick all Cucumbers when large enough for use, whether needed or not, for if leit on the vine to ripen they will cease to be productive. The seeds may be planted in the hills late in May, making the crop somewhat later. Use dry plaster or an infusion of powdered white hellebore in water to destroy the striped bug. For pickles, plant during the last two weeks in June.

PARSLEY

CULTURE.—Parsley is used for seasoning soups, meats, etc., for salads and garnishing, also for ornamental border for the flower garden; succeeds best in a rich, mellow soil. As seeds germinate very slowly, soak well in water for twenty-four hours. Three or four weeks sometimes elapse before it makes its appearance. It should be sown early in the spring in rows 1 foot apart, sow thick and cover half an inch deep; finally thin to 5 or 6 inches apart or transplant and cut back frequently. For winter use protect in a frame or light cellar, or pot up a few plants and grow in the window.



TABLE TURNIPS

For feeding stock in fall and winter there is nothing superior to Turnips and Rutabagas, as they are much liked by all kinds of stock and serve to keep them in good condition. We cannot too earnestly recommend farmers to increase their sowings largely, for we are sure the crop will prove remunerative. This wholesome and agreeable vegetable is most easily affected in its form and flaver by soil, climate and mode of culture. There are a great many varieties, but our list comprises the best for the garden or term.

Cut furt. Sow in drills about two feet apart and half an inch deep, or sow broads ast, but in either case be sure to have the ground rich and freshly stirred. Be careful to weed and thin out, so the young plants will not be cheeked and impired. Any overcrowding will result in rough and poorly flavored roots. It is important to get the spring and summer crops larted very early, so that the Turinps may have time to grow to sufficient re before hot weather causes them to become tough and bitter. In this middle and western states sow for fall and main crop from middle of July to last of August, and in the manner given for spring sowing. In the field Turinps are often sown broads ast, though in most cases better results are obtioned by dealless tare. To preserve Turinp in good order for winter

store in a cool cellar and cover with sand or turf to keep them fresh. Another method is to put them in a pit dug in dry soil where there will be no danger of water standing, and to cover with straw overlaid with earth sufficiently deep to keep out frost. Thus protected, Turnips will keep well till spring.

General Cultural Directions.—The well-known Annual Flowers, such as Sweet Alyssum, Calliopsis, Calendula, Marigold, Mignonette, Nasturtiums, etc., sow directly out-of-doors when danger from frost is past in the position where they are intended to flower. The ground should be dug and raked fine on the surface, sowing the seeds evenly and thinly either in lines or beds, covering not over four times their size, and firming the soil over them. For those which should be started indoors, such as Heliotrope, Celosia, Lobelia, Salvia, Vinca, Verbena, etc., the best plan is to sow in boxes, which should be filled to the depth of an inch with broken po's, coal ashes or any rough material that will furnish perfect drainage. The upper inch should be nicely sifted soil, composed, if possible, of about one-third each sand, leaf mold and light garden loam. Press firmly and evenly, and water thoroughly the day before sowing. Sow the seeds thinly over the surface, covering about one-eighth of an inch as d pressing firmly, cover with a pane of glass to prevent too rapid evaporation of the moisture, and kee, in a temperature between 60 and 70 degrees. Water carefully as needed. The importar co-of uniform attention to this detail is one that can only be learned by experience and observation. To omit a single watering, or a too frequent watering, usually leads to failure. Remove the glass after the seeds have germinated, and when the seedings are large enough to handle they should be transplanted into similarly prepared boxe an inch apart each way, or put into small pots and kept in same until time to plant out in the open ground. At all times they should have an abundance of air; otherwise the young seed-lings are liable to damp-off.


