## CALOCHORTUS

"Mariposa Lily" or "Butterfly Tulip." The flowers are of the most varied and showy colors and resemble a tulip in form. Among the most beautifnl of our native plants. The following varieties, with the exerption of C. Kennedyi, grow best in a rather heavy loam, but must have good drainage. Plant 4 to 5 inches deep. C. Kennedyi grows in decomposed granite mixed with leaf mould.

Albus. "Fairy Bell" or "White Globe Tulip." An extremely graceful plant. The flowers are pendant like bells and globular in form, of the most exquisite silky texture and pearly white; from 10 to 20 on a plant. Growis 1 to 2 feet high. Each, $5 c$; per doz., 40 c .

## Bulbs for Fall and Winter Planting

## HYACINTHS

Hyacinths may be grown in the open ground, in pots, or in glasses, and can be planted from the beginning of October until the end of December.
For the open ground, plant in light rich soil, covering to the depth of 4 or 5 inches.
For pots, plant one in a 5 -inch pot, pressing the earth down firmly and leaving one-third of the bulb exposed; then place the pots on the north side of a building or in a cellar and cover with a layer of sand, earth or leaf mould to the depth of about 8 inches; after 4 or 5 weeks unearth the pots and gradually inure to the light.
For glasses, fill the glass with water so as to nearly touch the base of the bulb, place in a cellar or dark place for a few weeks until the roots have grown half way to the bottom of the glass; the water should be changed frequently, eare being taken not to injure the roots. A piece of charcoal placed in the water will help to keep it pure.

## NARCISSUS

The Narcissus is one of our most beautiful spring flowering bulbous plants, and thrives well in California. Some very desirable effects can be had by planting them in solid beds, and also by planting them among shrubbery,
and allowing them to become naturalized. They may be planted from the first of October to the middle of January, in any good garden soil, covering the bulbs to the depth of about five inches. The polyanthus varieties, of which the Chinese Lily is the best known, also succeed well in water.

PANSY
Pansy. Truly speaking a perennial, but an annual in California. To obtain the best results the seed should be sown in August, September, or early part of October. Sow the seed in boxes of fine, rich soil mixed with plenty of leaf mold and sand, cover the seed lightly and keep in a frame, lath house, or outside in some sheltered and partially shaded place. When the plants are large enough to handle, transplant to beds of rich, well prepared soil, and cover the surface with a layer of well rotted, sifted manure. Pansies prefer a rather heavy soil with plenty of well rotted manure, this is very essential. Indeed it is almost impossible to use too
much manure on pansies and the richer the soil the larger and more perfect will be the flowers. Later sowings may be made up to the beginning of February, but they will not do as well as those sown early in the fall and the blooming period will be much shorter.
