## Bulbs and Seeds for Fall Planting

There is no other class of flowering plants that are more highly prized than those which are produced from bulbs. The reason for this is not far to seek: Hardy bulbs, while of comparatively small cost, give us many of our most fragrant and gorgeously brilliant-colored flowers, while, on the other hand, their culture is of the very easiest, requiring as they do no special attention for the most satisfactory results. In fact, it is always a foregone conclusion that successful blooming will surely follow their planting. Everyone can succeed with bulbs.

Soon after the disappearance of snow and long before the ordinary outdoor flowers are available, the hardy Snowdrop and Crocus may be had in their perfection; then the fair and stately Hyacinth, followed closely by the varied and exquisite Tulip and the graceful and charming Narcissus.

The best time to order is immediately you receive this catalogue, as most bulbs offered herein are spring bloomers and should be planted from September to December, especially for indoor culture.

We will fill all general orders at once, with exception of Japan Lilies and a few other bulbs which will be sent as soon as received.

Postage and Express Charges-All bulbs will be sent by Mail or Express, charges prepaid, when ordered at single rates. The dozen and 100 rates are by Express or Freight at purchaser's expense, unless otherwise stated. Not less than 6 of any one variety supplied at dozen rates, 25 at 100 rates and 250 at 1,000 rates.

Shipping directions should accompany each order. State definitely if you wish us to send by express or freight. In absence of instructions we reserve right to decide as to route and manner of transportation. If we are to mail bulbs, add postage.


Substitution-It sometimes occurs that our stock of some named varieties of Hyacinths or other bulbs becomes exhausted before the close of the season, in which case we shall take the liberty of substituting others similar in color and price, being equally as good, if not superior, to the ones ordered. Should any of our customers object to this course, they will please so state in their orders.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR OUTDOOR CULTURE

Planting is usually done in October and November to enable the roots to make a good growth before cold weather. Bulbs can be set out even later if the ground is not frozen too hard.

Depth and Distances for Planting. Hyacinths, Lilies, etc., should be planted four inchas deep; Tulips, Narcissus, Jonquils, etc., three inches; Crocus and Snowdrops, two inches, always measuring from the top of the bulbs. The rows should be from six to twelve inches apart, and the bulbs four to eight inches, according to the size of bulbs.

Soil. Any good, thoroughly drained soil will grow bulbs well. If it should be a heavy clay it would
be best to add sand and well rotted manure to make it loose. The surface of beds should be slightly raised at center so that water will run off quickly, as bulbs are liable to rot if water remains on them any length of time.

Winter Protection. Before winter sets in cover the beds with four to six inches of leaves, if they can be had; if not, coarse manure will do nearly as well; if leaves are used, throw over a little brush or earth, to prevent blowing off. In the south, where the ground does not freeze more than a slight crust, they will require no protection.

## FOR HOUSE AND GARDEN

## Outdoor Culture

Plant in the Fall 6 inches apart each way and 3 to 4 inches deep. Give them slight protection over Winter and they will flash forth in beautiful bright colors early in the Spring and remain in bloom some weeks. Then the bulbs may be removed in time to set your Summer flowering plants. Or in some soils, bulbs do well a number of years without lifting or replanting. In such beds, for Summer bloom sow quick-flowering seed of Petunias, Verbenas and Portulacas, etc.

Pot Culture

Hyacinths potted in September may be brought to bloom by Christmas, and by successive plantings a succession of bloom may be had until Easter. Plant the bulb in the pot so that its crown just shows, then when finished set away in a cool dark place for 6 weeks or 2 months for root growth to develop. After this bring gradually to the light, heat and air, and give plenty of water, and you will be well repaid.

## Culture in Glasses

All Hyacinths succeed well in water. If Hyacinth glasses are not available use pebbles or shells to keep the bulbs in place and then set the bulb so that the lower end is almost but not quite in contact with the water. It is not essential to change the water; a small lump of charcoal in the bottom will serve tha same purpose. Put away in a cool dark place till you see the roots developed, then remove by degrees to full light and air. For indoor decoration single Hyacinths are desirable.

Plant plenty of Tulips-they are so inexpensive. In early spring, almost before the last snows of winter have gone, the gorgeous colors of their flowers will add a wonderful air of cheerfulness to your home surroundings. They are entirely hardy in the open ground, and should be planted about 4 inches deep and 4 inches apart. For indoor culture, plant them 3 inches deep.

Two colors are most effective, 91 for center of bed and 78 for the two outside rows.
A Border Tulip Bed, $21 / 2$ feet wide by 5 feet long, will need 120 Tulips for 8 rows, 15 in each row, and all 4 inches apart. 30 Red for 2 rows; 30 Pink for 2 rows; 30 White for 2 rows; 30 variegated for 2 rows.

## Narcissi or Daffodils

Plant in the fall in good garden soil, three or four inches deep, three to five inches apart. For indoor growing, Narcissi require the same treatment as hyacinths. Those in the Polyanthus group are not hardy.
