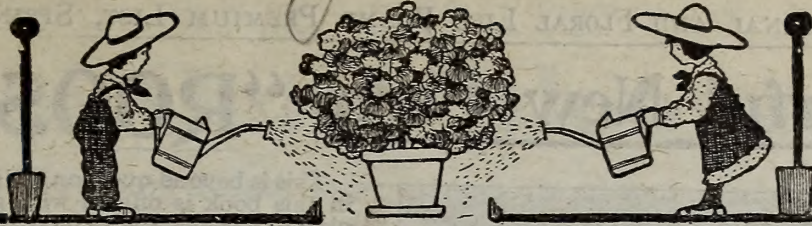

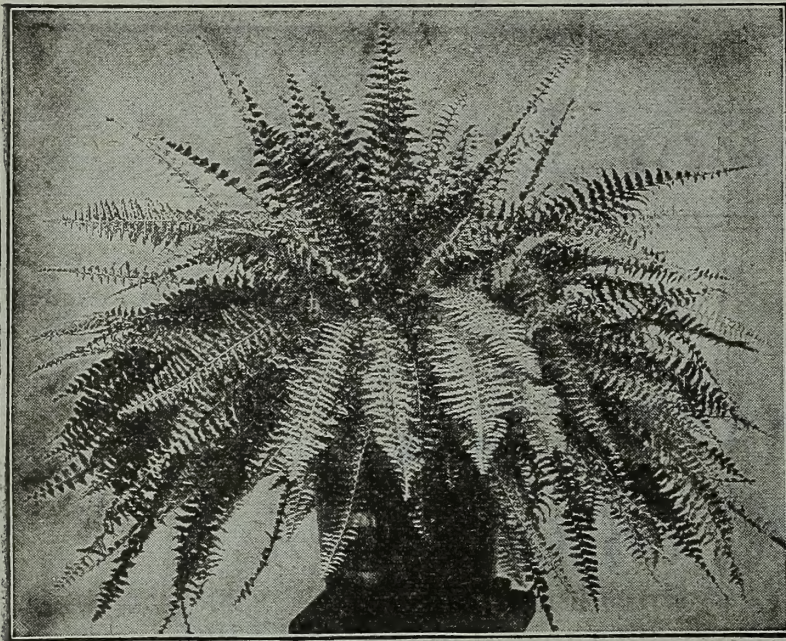


Photo of New Fern Roosevelt.

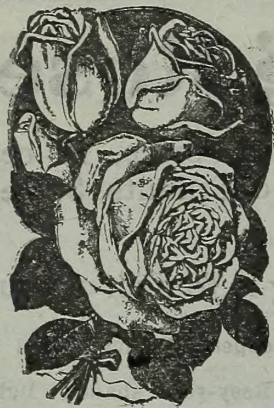

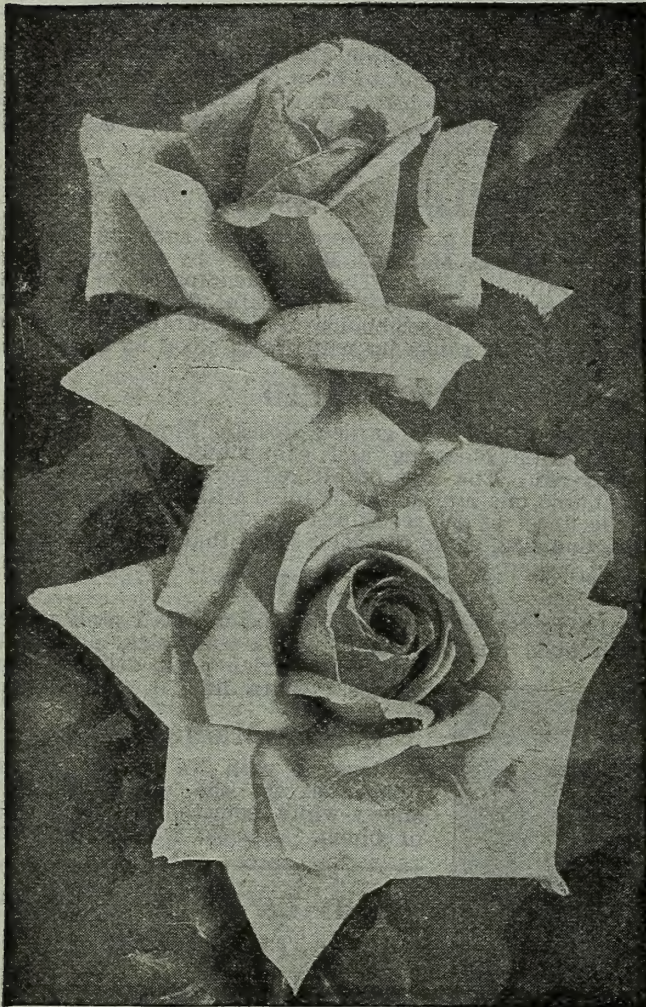

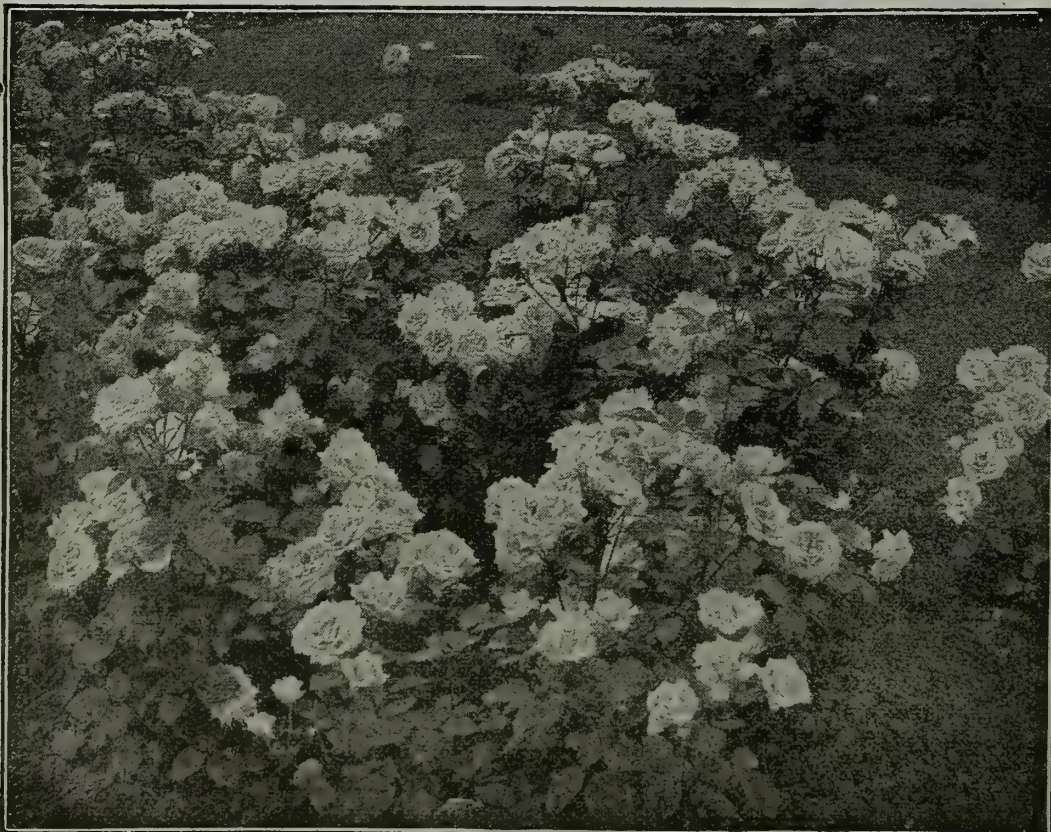


The New Baby Rambler Rose as a Pot Plant.

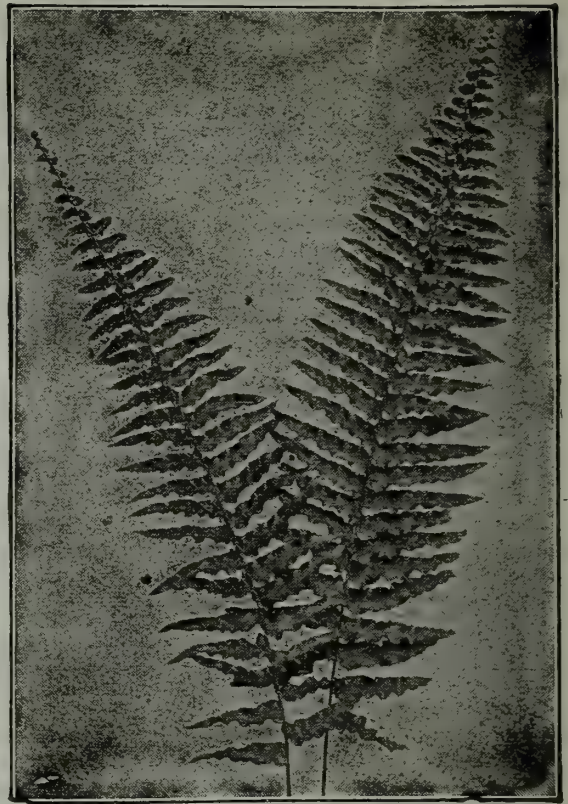

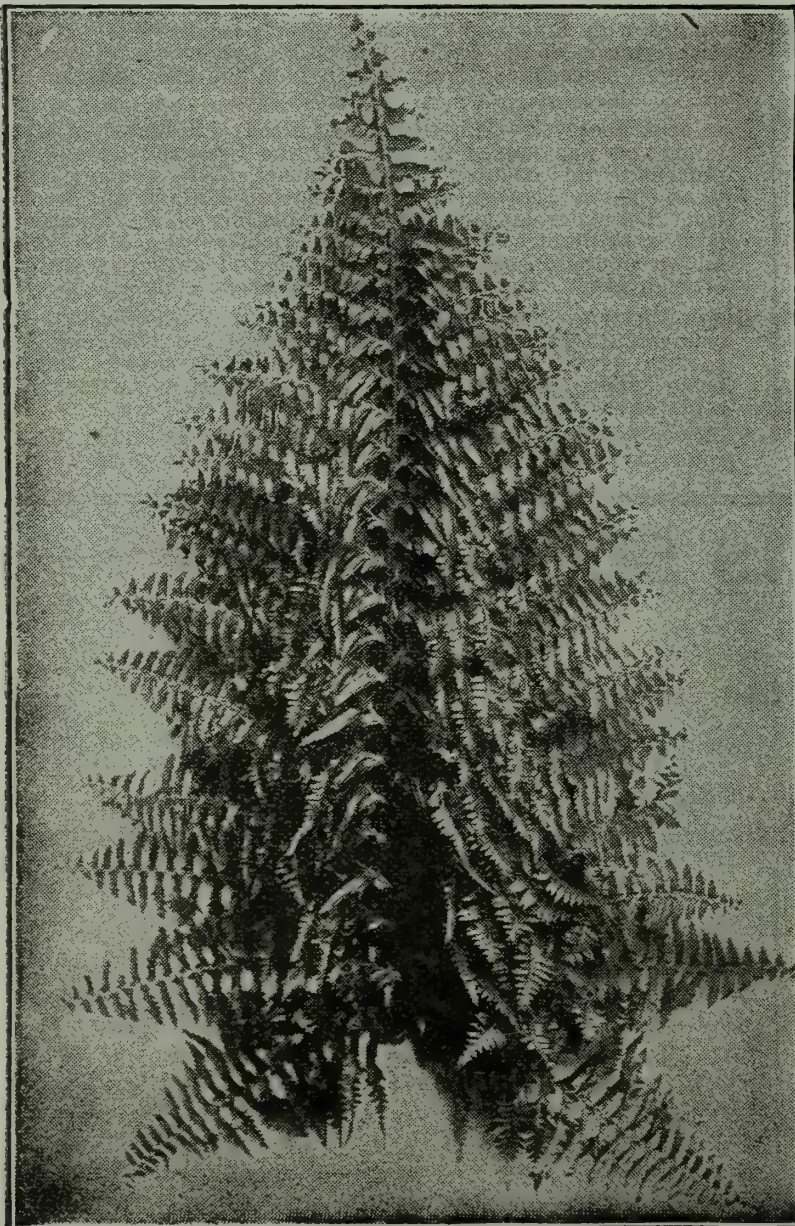

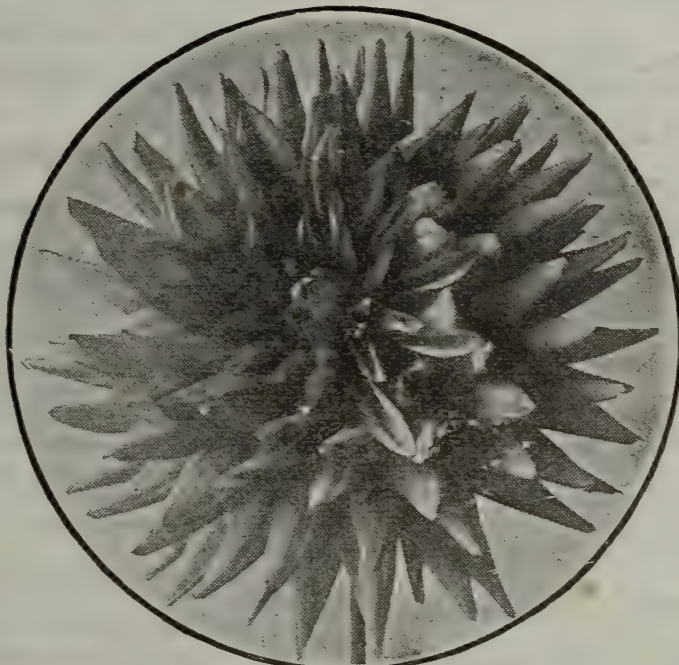

BEGONIAS

Begonias are fine to plant on the north side of the house or other building, or in front of porch where they get shade. 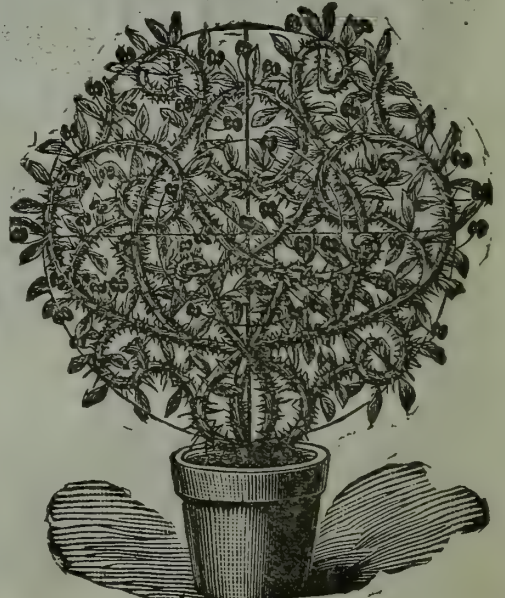

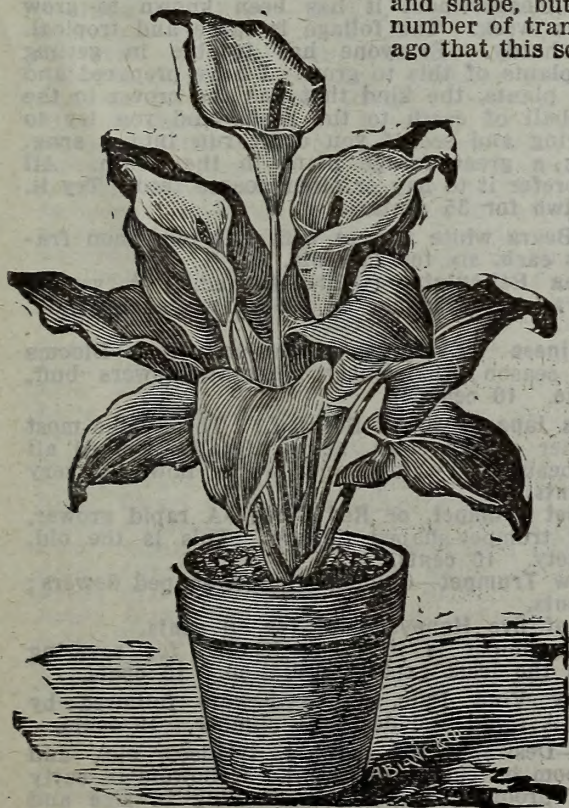
