

POT-GROWN

Those marked (P.) have pistillate or imperfect flowers, and must be planted near perfect-flowering kinds, in order that the flowers may fertilize. The varieties not so marked are bi-sexual, or perfect-flowering, and can be planted alone. When properly pollenized the pistillate varieties are the most prolific.

Most dealers recommend planting Strawberries in August. However, we hope you will see the advisability of setting pot-grown plants as early in July as possible, when they will produce a large crop the next summer and we believe if you follow our advice the results will be much

more satisfactory.

Our list includes all the newest and best standard varieties, extra strong, healthy plants. We exercise the utmost care in packing for shipment, which is of great importance to the pur-chaser. Place your orders early.

Hardy Perennial Flower Seeds

Hardy perennials are easily raised from seeds and give better results when sown in the open ground during the summer and fall. The soil should be kept evenly moist but not saturated. Transplant the seedlings once or twice if necessary to prevent crowding.
