## DAHLIAS.

A well known summer and autumn flowering plant growing from 3 to 6 feet high and producing a profusian of flowers ranging from purest white to darkest maroon. We make a specialty of Dahlias. From hundreds of varieties we have selected fifty of the best, to which are added yearly such new ones as seem desirable. Our list contains the very cream of the famous Wilmore Dahlias as well as some choice varieties from eastern growers.

Plant Dahlias 4 to 5 in. deep and 2 ft . apart, with rows 3 ft . apart. Plant only where they can be well hoed or cultivated. Do not plant too early. Dahlias can usually be planted from the 15 th to the 20 th of April but do well planted as late as the 20th of May. As soon as plants appear above the ground the soil should be made loose and mellow with hoe or rake. When two feet high or over each one should be tied to a stake to prevent a possible breaking down by the wind.
