







Autumn, Imp., at same prices as Cooper; Dewdrop, Per., same prices as Cooper, and Frances, Per., same prices as Pan American.

I would not guarantee these varieties to bear you a full crop in the Fall, for they have never done so with me but they do bear fruit in the Fall, but not like the Fall-bearing cranks say they do. You may expect pure plants of these varieties and all will come postpaid at above prices.






