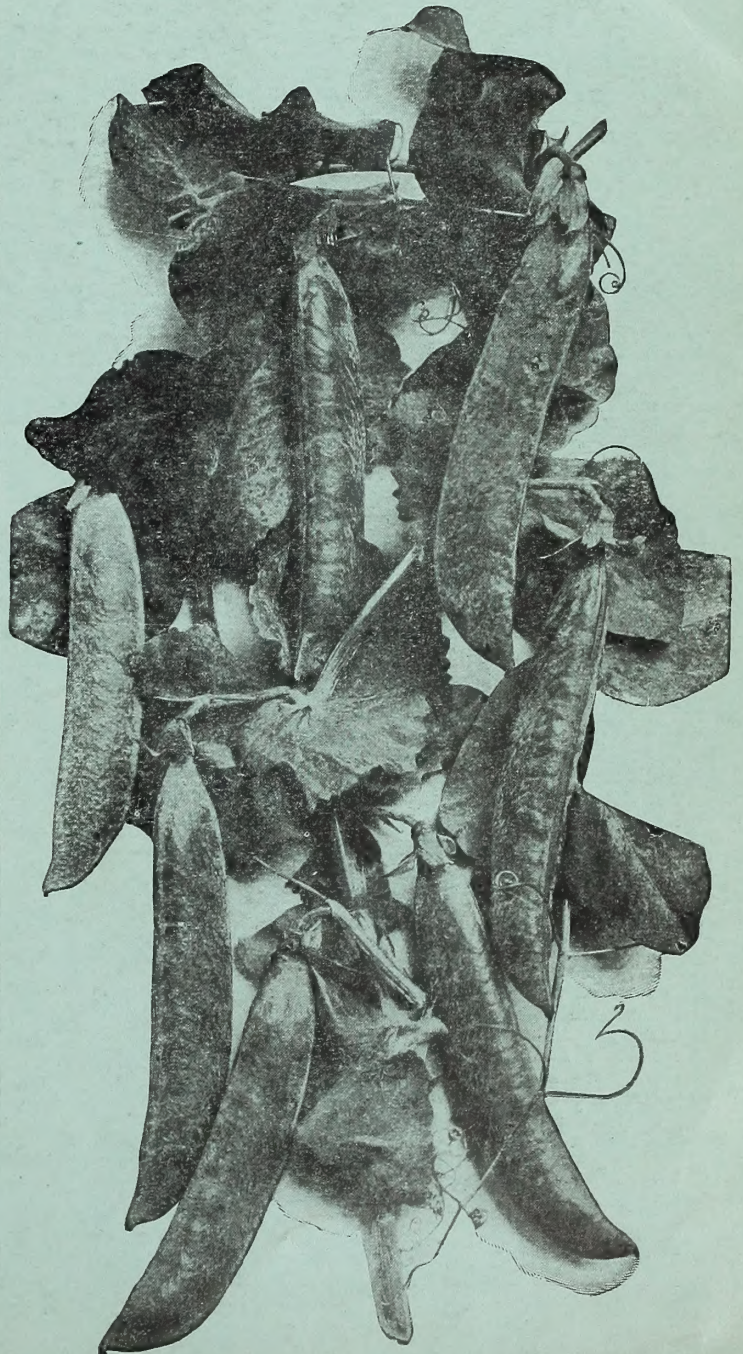

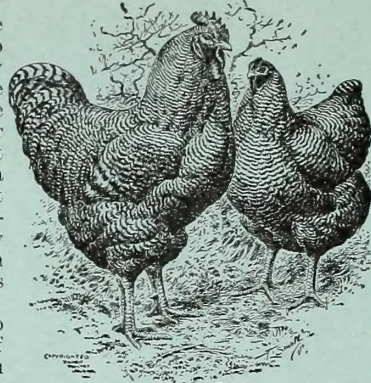

**SELECTION OF BREEDS.**

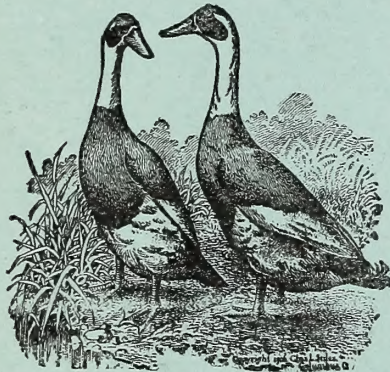
This subject may well be considered the foundation to success or failure in the poultry business and it should receive your careful thought. You are going into the business for profit, so do not be content with scrub stock for it makes a poor investment. We do not mean that you should purchase "fancy fowls" or "show birds," but endeavor to obtain thoroughbred fowls or eggs from thoroughbreds.

The poultry business is no exception to the rule that if you desire paying results, you must have a foundation for success, and no man can succeed who tries to build with poor stock. It costs no more to feed and care for a standard fowl than a mongrel, and you cannot realize high class results from the latter. From such attempts have come some of the failures recorded against the industry. You would not try to run a dairy without the very best grade of stock, nor would you expect the best crops without planting the best seed obtainable. This is the point on which many poultrymen fail, so make it a point to start right. Select a breed that is making a good showing for your particular purpose; and have your stock of some reliable strain. Make sure that the birds are healthy and vigorous individuals.



**Barred Plymouth Rock.**

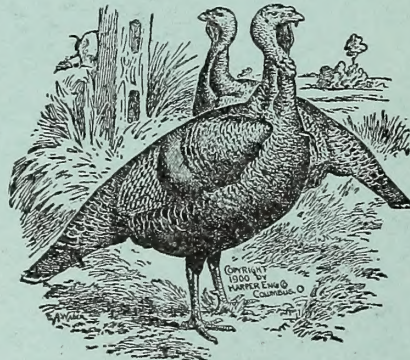
In every line you will find the man who has a hobby. Watch out for him. He is a good talker, believes in himself and his hobby, and is forever seeking converts to his wonderful ideas. Follow the advice and methods of the man whose ideas are paying him and whose experience is showing in actual dollars and cents. It is a case where money talks and outweighs fads and fancies. Experience is often an expensive teacher, so let the knowledge of the man who is winning be a help, and take the short road to profit. It is generally more profit-

able to keep but one breed of fowls, and much care should be exercised and investigation made regarding the stock for the climate and location, instead of going into the business blindly.

**Different Breeds**—The space in this little book will not allow us to fully describe all the different breeds of fowls. Every poultryman should procure a copy of "THE AMERICAN STANDARD OF PERFECTION," which gives the weight, shape, markings, and color of each breed for male and female, as well as all points for judging value. This book which is published by the American Poultry Association, is the guide for all judges in awarding prizes. Revised every five years and sells for the uniform price of \$2.00. The most popular breeds just now seem to be the Leghorns, Wyandottes, Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds and Orpingtons. But we must not infer from this that there are not other breeds with qualities equally good. According to the The Standard of Perfection, the different classes of fowls may be noted as follows:

**Selecting Eggs for Hatching.** Gather the eggs several times during the day, or at least so in cold weather; chilled eggs do not hatch so well. Keep them in a moderately warm, but well ventilated room, and turn them once a day. Only nice, uniform and smooth eggs should be selected for hatching.

It is also necessary for your breeding stock to be healthy, well cared for, not too fat and have plenty of exercise.

### SUGGESTIONS FOR MAKING A LAWN.

There is nothing more essential to the well appearance of any place, whether it is a small city residence, suburban home, or a spacious country estate, than a well-established and kept lawn. The essentials for a fine lawn are: First, a rich, well-drained soil; second, careful preparation of the ground, making it fine and smooth but as mellow as possible; third, a wise selection of seeds and fertilizer; fourth, sowing at such a time as to give the young plants a chance to become well established before being subjected to very dry or to very cold weather. However much care is bestowed on the soil, seed and fertilizer no lawn will be beautiful without frequent mowing and rolling. Too much care cannot be bestowed upon the selection of grasses, as some varieties are the most luxuriant in Spring, others in Summer, others again in Autumn; and a combination of the proper sorts is required for perfect, carpet-like lawn. We have given much thought and made many experiments to secure the best selection, and think our **Roland Park Mixture** is the best possible for permanent lawns. It may be planted early in Spring or Fall, and should be sown at the rate of forty to fifty pounds to the acre and one pound to 200 square feet. In sowing the seed it could be mixed thoroughly with a good bone fertilizer in order to produce more bulk, which will enable it to be distributed more evenly on the ground. If sown in the Spring, sow as early as possible, making the surface very smooth and firm, then raking it over and sowing the seed just before a rain, which if the surface has been raked, will cover the seed sufficiently. If the expected rain does not come cover by rolling with roller or patting

with board or spade or our new lawn padders. If sown in the Fall sow before the Autumn rains have ceased and before very cold weather; and if the seed has not been mixed with bone fertilizer, as mentioned above, apply a light dressing of same.

### THE KITCHEN GARDEN.

Every suburbanite, in fact every one who has the piece of ground and time to devote to same, should be provided with a kitchen garden, which affords an endless lot of pleasure, is instructive for the children, and provides abundance of fresh vegetables for the dinner table. We regret exceedingly that the confines of this book will not allow us to go into the details of describing when and how to plant the various varieties of vegetables and seeds, but in the preface of each variety of seeds in this catalogue you will find full instructions how to proceed.

### THE FLOWER GARDEN.

The pleasure resulting from a large and varied collection of flowers will amply repay for time and labor spent. The soil adapted to flowering plants is generally a light, moderately rich loam, containing a sufficient amount of sand to make it pliable. A great many varieties will live in almost any soil, but to give them a fair chance to develop some care should be taken to make it suited to their needs. Many flowers are better if produced on plants of vigorous growth; so a portion of the garden should be prepared by deep digging, thorough pulverization and liberal enriching with large quantities of well-rotted manure or bone fertilizer. Cultural directions are given on nearly all flower seed packets, and we urge the gardener to study them carefully. While some seeds need special treatment, the following general rules will apply to all: Make the surface as fine and smooth as possible; do not plant any seeds when the ground is wet; cover each lot of seeds to a uniform depth, which should never be more than three or four times the diameter of the seeds; press the soil firmly over the seeds; plant in rows so that the young plants can be easily seen, and pull up all weeds as soon as they appear. A great many of the most fragrant and gorgeously brilliant colored flowers are produced from bulbs, and as these require no special attention for the most satisfactory results, we strongly recommend planting them. Every one can succeed with bulbs. Every Autumn no lover of flowers should neglect to make provision for planting an ample supply of the stately Hyacinth, gorgeous Tulips, the favorite Narcissus, or Daffodils, bright Crocus, dainty Snow Drops, beautiful Japanese Lilies and Irises, and the exquisite Lily of the Valley, which everybody loves, proud, hardy Lilies and fragrant Paeonies. ### FRUIT AND SHADE TREES, AND SHRUBBERY.

As soon as beetles and caterpillars, scale and fungus diseases make their appearance, get your spray pump and insecticides and start warfare on them, if not they will destroy plants, shrubbery and trees for you. For beetles and caterpillars use arsenate of lead; for scale insects, the most dreaded of which is San Jose scale, use kerosene emulsion, lime and sulphur solution, or miscable oil solution, the latter being the easiest to apply. For fungus diseases use Bordeaux mixture. As we have stated before, the confines of this book does not allow us to go thoroughly into details, but the desired information can be had for the asking.

**ASPARAGUS—Seeds and Roots.** (Ger. Spargel)**One ounce to forty feet of drill.**

**CULTURE.** Sow in March or April, in rows one foot apart. When two years old transplant into permanent beds, which should be well and deeply manured, and trenched to the depth of two feet. Set the plants (in rows) from three to four feet apart, and two feet in the rows, spreading out the roots, and covering from six to eight inches. On the approach of winter cover with manure or compost; fork the beds early in the spring, and apply a dressing of salt. Cut for use the second year after planting in permanent bed.

Set poles four feet apart each way, and plant four to six beans, about one inch deep, around each pole. Thin out to three plants to a pole, if the soil is rich; pinch off the ends of plants when they overrun the top of the poles, to effect more perfect growth below. Lima Beans for early use may be grown in frames and transplanted.

**TABLE BEETS. (Ger. Salatrübe.)**

One ounce of seed sows sixty feet of drill; five pounds will sow an acre in drills.

**CULTURE.** The soil best suited to the culture of the beet is that which is rather light, provided it is thoroughly mixed with manure. If wanted very early, sow in hotbeds and transplant; but for main crop sow in the Spring as soon as the ground becomes fit to work, in drills 18 inches apart and two inches deep. For Winter use sow as late as June. When the plants have attained three or four inches in height, thin out so that they stand five or six inches apart. Keep free from weeds. Before freezing weather sets in, the roots may be stored in cellars or pits, same as Potatoes; dry earth thrown over them before the straw and earth covering is put on insures their keeping over Winter. Be careful not to bruise them in handling.

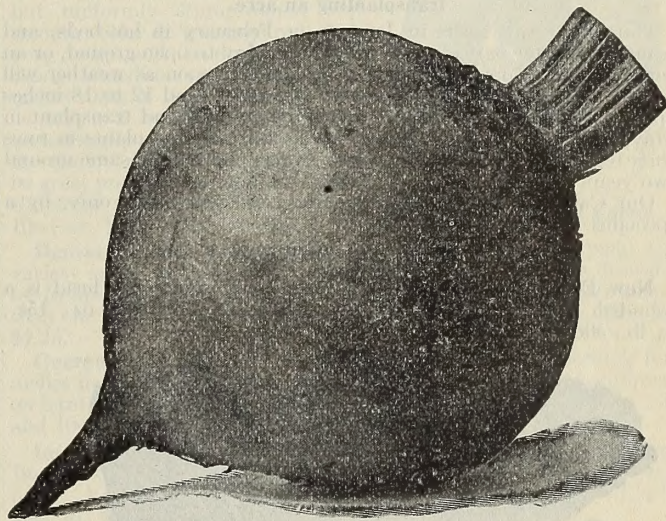

Frequent hoeing and a liberal supply of rich, liquid manure, to keep up a continuous and rapid growth, will produce splendid heads of the most delicate flavor. It facilitates blanching if the leaves are gathered loosely together and tied over the top of the head to protect it from the sun. Cut before the flowers begin to open. Sow as late as June 20 for late crops, in beds or in hills, covering one-half inch deep.

By rolling or pressing in the seed the result will be more satisfactory than when covered. Cut the tops off once or twice before planting out, to make them stocky. When the plants are five or six inches high transplant the dwarf varieties three feet, and the taller sorts four feet between the rows; plant six inches apart in the rows. Cultivate well, and when large enough, blanch by earthing-up. The first operation is that of "handling," generally done the beginning of September; after the soil has been drawn up with the hoe it is drawn closer around each plant by the hand to keep the leaves firm, in an upright position and to prevent spreading. When the plants have become set in an upright position the Celery wanted for early use should be banked, by throwing the soil up as close to the plants as possible with a plow and finishing it with a spade, bringing the earth up nearly to the tops of the plants.

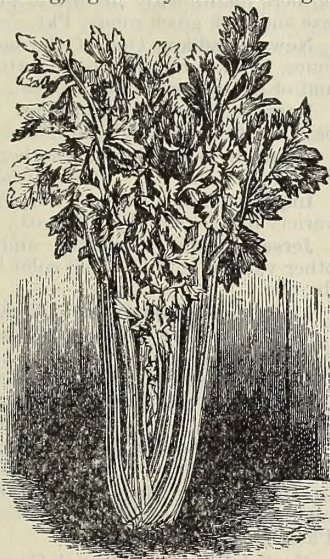
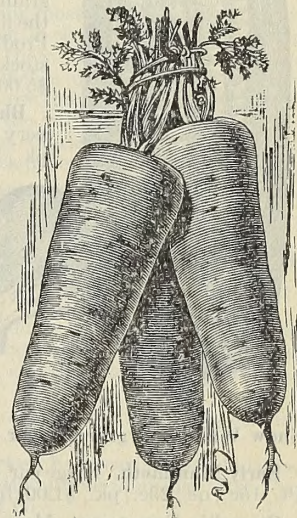

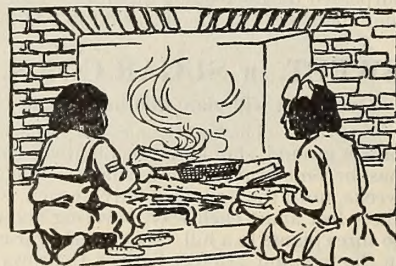

**ENDIVE. (Ger. Endivie.)**

**CULTURE.** Sow in June, July and August; cover lightly; when up, thin out to eight inches apart, and water well afterward, if dry. When the leaves are six or eight inches long, blanch by gathering in the hand and tying together near the top with yarn or bast. This must be done when quite dry, or they will rot. At the approach of Winter, take up carefully, with a ball of earth to each plant, and place close together in frame or cellar for use. They must be kept dry and have plenty of air.

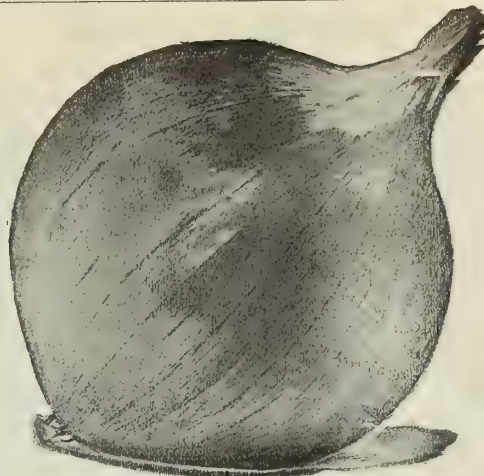

## PEANUTS. (Ger. Erdnuesse.)

For medium light, loamy or sandy land, Peanuts are one of the most profitable crops that can be grown. They yield very largely—yields of 50 bushels per acre being reported on land too poor to plant in corn. In addition to the yield of nuts, they yield quite largely of nutritious forage, and will yield ordinarily about a ton of excellent dry forage per acre, in addition to the crop of nuts.

**CULTURE.** Peanuts should be shelled before planting. They should be planted in May or early June, in rows about 2½ to three feet apart, dropping the nuts eight to ten inches apart, one in a hill. Cover one or two inches deep. Cultivate three or four times with a cultivator, so as to loosen the earth and keep down weeds, and at the last working, with a small turn-plow throw the dirt to the nuts. Do not cultivate too late in the season, as late cultivation is likely to injure the formation of the nuts. It is also advisable to make an application of lime, scattering it on top of the row just after planting, and to use a top-dressing of land plaster just after the last working. Peanuts require plenty of lime to make first-class nuts, and the use of lime and land plaster as above mentioned is recommended by the most successful growers.

In harvesting, plow the Peanuts and then stack against stakes stuck into the ground, the roots with the Peanuts on them to the center, and the leaves outside.

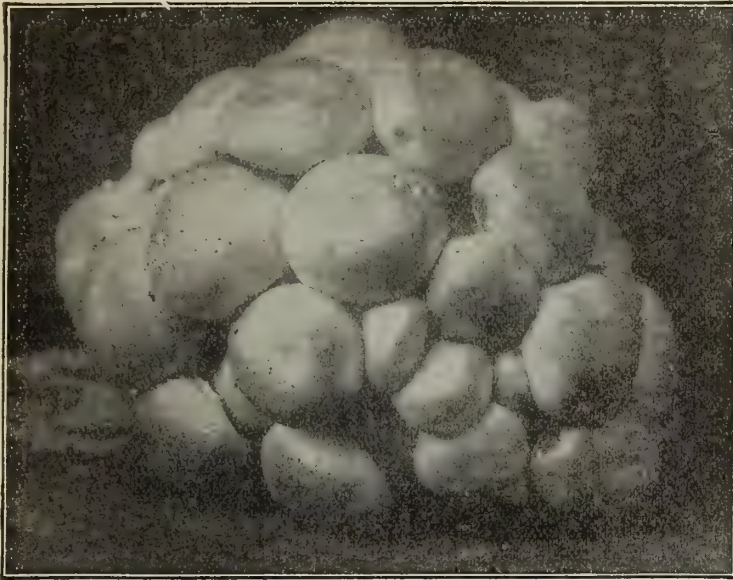

If roots are used, a crop may be had after one season, which is much better than sowing seed where only a few plants for family use are needed. In the Fall the bed should have a thick dressing of coarse manure, to be spaded under in Spring.

See to it that the bed is packed solidly and evenly. In this bed plant the broken pieces of Spawn six inches apart, covering the whole with two inches of light soil, and protect from cold and rain. One brick will plant eight or ten feet of bed. The Mushroom will appear in about six weeks. Water sparingly with lukewarm water.

### SQUASH. (Ger. Gemüse Kürbiss.)

Plant in well-manured hills, in the same manner as Cucumbers and Melons—the Bush Varieties three or four feet apart each way, and the running kinds from six to eight feet. Eight to ten seeds should be sown in each hill, thinning out after they have attained their rough leaves and danger from bugs is over, leaving three to four of the strongest plants per hill.

Cultivate thoroughly as long as the vines will permit, but the last two or three workings of the soil should be very shallow (surface cultivation), or the crop may be badly injured, especially if the cultivator is run too near the young plants.

**CULTURE.** For early use sow as soon as the ground opens in Spring, in drills from 12 to 15 inches apart; thin out to six or nine inches in the rows. For a succession, continue to sow every two weeks until June; for Fall and Winter crop, sow in July and August. The Ruta Bagas are grown for feeding stock, and are also excellent for the table. Take up the roots in November or before severe frosts; cut off the tops within an inch of the crown, store in a cool cellar or pit, or pile up in a conical form, out of doors, in dry ground; cover carefully with long straw and finish by earthing up, covering them with about 12 or 15 inches of earth, leaving a trench around the heap to carry off the water. Put away in this manner they will be found in good condition in the Spring.

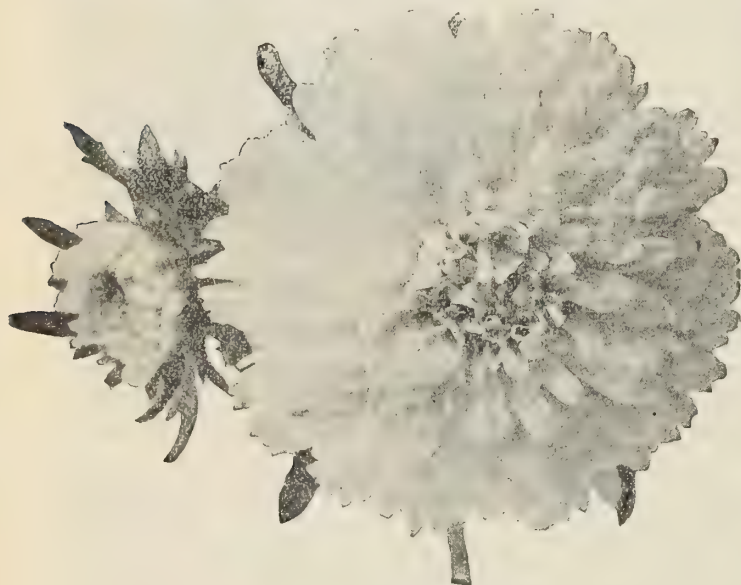

**CULTURE.** One of the most important points in the cultivation of the Dahlia is to select a well-drained position where they will receive the full benefit of the sun during the greater part of day.

As to soil, they are not at all particular, excepting that in the case of a stiff clay some loose material should be added, such as coarse sand, old mortar, or anything which will make the soil loose and friable. The soil must be deeply dug, if possible to a depth of two spades, and a liberal amount of suitable plant food incorporated. For this nothing is more satisfactory than well-decayed stable manure; but where this cannot be conveniently procured pure bonemeal, sheep manure, or any chemical fertilizer rich in ammonia and phosphoric acid will answer.

The planting of dormant roots in the latitude of Baltimore may be done at any time between April 25th and June 15th, the earlier planting being preferable. Green or growing plants must not be set out until all danger of frost is over, say May 10th.
