This list is intended to reach only those entitled to Wholesale Trade Prices. Errors are sometimes made, and in order that our mailing list may be corrected, we will thank any one in the trade to advise us should they have knowledge of our list reaching parties not so entitled.

DO WE HAVE YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS CORRECT? Occasionally we find that we are mailing a copy of our list to a nursery and another to its proprietor, under the impression that they are separate and distinct. You can have as many copies as you want and ask for, but we would like to have the business name and owner's name together on our lists for mailing, and shall be very grateful for correction of such errors in address.

TO THE TRADE

Herewith, our annual Wholesale Trade List, larger and more complete than before.

It would be hard to single out for special mention any particular items that have reached greater perfection than the offering as a whole. The full line is well up to the mark of Huntsville quality as will be noted from the illustrations shown on the following pages. We have not selected our best stock to show off. If space permitted us giving an illustration of each separate item listed you would find the same quality throughout.

Following the severe drouth of early summer we have had splendid growing conditions for the past ninety days and could not wish for more vigorous, thrifty, well grown stock than we now have to offer.

With the great nations of Europe involved in war and the air filled with conflicting rumors, it is impossible to venture any opinion as to the probability of the usual quantity of imported stock reaching this country during the coming season, but the impression seems to prevail among those best informed that the supply from the other side will be cut off. This would naturally cause a shortage and increased prices in several lines. Without assuming the role of prophets we feel safe in saying that NOW is a good time to buy nursery stock.

As usual we will issue lists showing surplus stock at frequent intervals throughout the shipping season. We have an especially fine assortment of American grown transplanting stock, fruit tree seedlings and scions which cannot be shown in this list, but which will be fully covered in the surplus sheets later. Anyone interested may have our list, samples and prices on request.

With increased facilities for handling your business and on the strength of our established policy of "A square deal and full value for all" we solicit your orders during the season 1914–15.

TERMS OF SALE

- **CASH** or satisfactory reference, with sufficient time to investigate before shipment, is invariably required of parties unknown to us. To responsible, prompt paying parties, we will extend usual time for payment.
- **REMITTANCES** should be made by Draft on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by Express or Postal Money Order.
- **CLAIMS** for damages or deficiencies to receive consideration must be made promptly upon receipt of goods.
- RATES apply as follows: When 10 trees and not over 50 are ordered, the price will be 2½ cents per tree more than the price per 100. Orders for 50 trees or more up to 300, when not less than 10 trees of each variety, will be charged for at the price per 100. Orders for 300 trees or more, when not less than 10 trees of each variety, will be charged for at the price per 1000.
- **TELEGRAMS**—Use Nurserymen's Telegraphic Code, copy of which we will mail upon request. In connection with this we give a cipher word in *Italics* for each grade. When this cipher word is used either in mail or telegraphic orders no other description of the stock desired is necessary.
- **PACKING**—We believe we excel others in the manner of handling stock. This is due largely to personal experience and supervision. We pack to insure contents from drying or freezing, even though the shipment be delayed in transit.

In packing small stock we can sometimes use goods boxes that will fill the purpose just as well as our own new cases, and there is considerable saying by so doing. Goods boxes will be used wherever possible, unless otherwise instructed.

Bales 25 cents to 75 cents, according to size.

- SHIPMENTS—When ordering, please state plainly whether freight or express shipment is desired, and give route if by freight. In the absence of this information we will use our best judgment without assuming any responsibility as to delivery. Goods are at purchaser's risk and cost after delivering to the forwarding company. Under the new Parcel Post system we are often able to forward small packages for less than the rates charged by express companies. Parties desiring to secure the benefits of Parcel Post should include sufficient for postage in their remittances; the difference, if any, will be refunded promptly.
- GUARANTEE—We are very careful to keep each variety true to name as labeled, and are ready at any time to replace, on proper proof, any that may prove otherwise, free of charge, or refund the amount paid, but it is mutually agreed between the purchaser and ourselves that we shall at no time be liable for an amount larger than the original purchase price.
- **CAUTION**—All orders are accepted upon the condition that they shall be void should any injury befall the stock from frost, hail, fire or other causes beyond our control.






