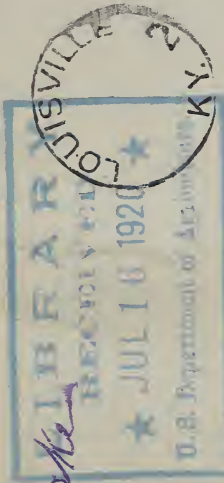

BULBS**HYACINTHS**

Single and dozen prices postpaid, larger quantities at buyer's expense.

Bulbs in the open ground should be set out from the middle of October to December. Remove four inches of surface soil and arrange the bulbs on the freshly exposed surface, placing them six inches apart, then replace the soil. Protect from frost by covering beds with four inches of leaves kept in place by the weight of light sticks or branches, but do not cover until the ground has become well frozen. Remove this covering in early spring.

For indoor culture place one bulb in a four inch pot, or several in a larger pot, using any good soil, first placing drainage in the bottom of the pot. Plant the bulbs even with the surface, water thoroughly, and place in a cool dark place for six or eight weeks, taking care not to let the soil dry out, then gradually bring them into full light and water freely. Keep in a cool room.

They can be set outdoors, the pots being buried several inches below the surface and brought into the house as needed.

NARCISSI OR DAFFODILS

Plant four or five inches deep and five to six inches apart. Do not disturb them until the second year of flowering, then dig as foliage is dying, off and held until fall but do better replanted at once. No mulching required.

Indoor culture same as for Hyacinths.

Victoria—Deep yellow trumpet, with creamy white collar, 10c. each; 60c. per dozen; \$3.00 per hundred.

CHINESE SACRED LILY

"Jos. Flower" or "Flower of the Gods"

The flowers are very fragrant, pure white and yellow, and are borne in clusters on stiff spikes. Place the bulb in a pan or bowl three or four inches deep, containing a little sand, fill in about the bulb enough sand and pebbles or shells to steady it, and fill bowl with water. Keep in a cool dark place for about two weeks, then bring into light. Keep bowl filled with water and do not keep in a very warm place. Postpaid, 15c. each; 3 for 35c. or \$1.25 per dozen.

FREESIAS

A little bulb splendidly adapted for winter blooming. Plant five or six in a five inch pot. Do not put in the dark as in starting other bulbs. Postpaid, 2 for 5c.; 25c. per dozen; \$2.00 per hundred.

OXALIS

Bermuda Buttercup—Produces an abundance of rich yellow flowers. Place several bulbs in a four inch pot, keep in a warm place and they will bloom in about two months. Postpaid, 15c. per dozen; 75c. per hundred.

IRIS

Spanish Iris—One of the most satisfactory flowers for out door planting, their beautiful coloring making them especially desirable for cut flowers. Plant three inches deep and three inches apart. Mixed, 15c. per dozen; 75c. per hundred, postpaid.

SCILLA

The brightest and prettiest of the early spring flowers, closely following the Crocus. Plant about three inches deep. White or blue, 20c. per dozen; \$1.25 per hundred, postpaid.

CHIONODOXA

A flower which increases in popularity as it becomes better known. Produces sprays of blue flowers similar to Scilla except that each flower has a white center. Plant about 3 inches deep, 25c. per dozen; \$1.50 per hundred, postpaid.

These dainty little flowers come into bloom often before snow has gone. Plant about 2 inches deep and 2 inches apart. Single, 2 for 5c.; 20c. per dozen; 90c. per hundred, postpaid. Double, 5c. each; 35c. per dozen; \$2.00 per hundred.

ANEMONE
