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



STEIN'S EARLY FLAT DUTCH CABBAGE.

This is one of the earliest cabbages for its size. The demand for the seed has steadily increased since it was introduced. It is a sure header, very regular and well adapted for shipping. Is planted exclusive of all other kinds by some of the largest cabbage growers.

FROTSCHER'S SUPERIOR LARGE LATE FLAT DUTCH CABBAGE.

This is the most popular variety for winter cabbage, and cultivated by almost every gardener who plants for the New Orleans market. Heads are large and solid, often weighing from 15 to 25 pounds. Plant during July and August. We have tried seed of the Flat Dutch from different growers, but have found none yet to equal the stock which is raised for us by contract.

The Onion is one of the most important vegetables planted in this section. Thousands of barrels are annually shipped from here to the West and North.



LOUISIANA OR RED CREOLE ONION.

Has been cultivated here for a century—supposed to have been brought here first from the south of Europe, we presume the bulbs produced but few seeds. It is hard to say from what variety this onion originated; having been planted here for so long it has become a distinct kind. It is not as red as the Wethersfield, and not as light as the Strassburg; in flavor it is similar to both varieties, but much stronger than the Italian kinds. In this latitude the seed should be sown from the 15th of September to about the 25th of October; if sown sooner, a good many will throw up seed stalks, which impairs the keeping quality of the onion. We sow the seed broadcast, protect the seed beds by spreading green moss over them, which is removed every evening and replaced in the morning. Some gardeners use lataniers for coving the bed. When the seed is coming up, say in 7 or 9 days, the cover has to be removed entirely; but if the weather is dry the watering has to be continued. They thrive best in loamy soil. Can be planted in the same ground for years, and require no rotation as other crops. When the plants have reached the size of a goose quill they are transplanted into rows, which can be from one to two feet apart, according to the mode of cultivation, and about five or six inches apart in the rows. The ground should be prepared before setting out the plants. We generally shorten the tops and roots. In April the onion will be ready to be taken up. In sections where it is too cold to sow onion seed in the fall, the Creole seed can be sown in January and February; in that case they should be sown very thinly in drills, thinned out to a proper stand, and by the end of spring they will produce good size onions. Growers here use very little, if any, fertilizers, but it can be used with advantage. For spring sowing we recommend the Bermuda seed. The seed of the Creole Onion, which we offer, is grown for us by experienced onion growers. No better stock can be found.

CRYSTAL WAX ONION.

This variety is the best White Onion we have ever seen. It is of a pure white and sells on sight. Should be planted in rich soil; if left exposed to sun after ripening they turn to a greenish color. Excellent for shipping and the finest flavored onion in existence.

The Louisiana Red Creole, White or Yellow, Red Bermuda and Crystal White Wax are the four leading Onions for our Southern States. Many of our readers are, no doubt, familiar with the quality and merits of these onions. The Creole has predominated in this country for 40 or 50 years and still leads, but the Bermuda is getting to be a close second and does very well. It ripens early, nearly two weeks ahead of the Creole, which makes it quite an advantage to the farmer. The Bermuda Onion has made Texas famous and has made many farmers independently wealthy, hence we advise planting this variety largely.


BERMUDA WHITE OR YELLOW ONION.

Extra early, a heavy cropper and the mildest flavored of all onions. Suitable for planting in all parts of the South in the spring. If you want sweetness and mildness in an onion this is the right variety. While usually called White Bermuda, it is really a light straw color. Plant this spring.



RED BERMUDA ONION.

Genuine seed imported direct from the Island of Teneriffe. A very early pale red onion grown extensively in the Bermudas and southern parts of the United States for early shipping to Northern markets. Grown in our climate the bulbs are smaller, but mature early and retain much of the extremely mild, sweet flavor of the imported ones.



We also advise planting Onion Sets, as they will give you onions three weeks or 30 days sooner than if you planted the seed, and the early onions get the price.



CROSBY'S IMPROVED EGYPTIAN BEET.

More largely planted for early market in the South than any other kind, and has proved a most profitable and satisfactory crop, particularly with our truckers and large shippers to Northern markets. The beet is of very handsome form, good size, small tops and small tap-root, and above all, of very quick and rapid growth. The shape is very desirable, being not quite so flat as the ordinary Egyptian, nor quite as round as Eclipse. It takes on its turnip shape even in very early stages of its growth, a decided advantage both for forcing and early cropping, which accounts very largely for its popularity.

ENDIVE.

Endive is used largely as a salad during the cool fall, winter and early spring months. The leaves have a slightly pungent flavor which somewhat resembles that of the dandelion. The finely cut leaves are quite ornamental in appearance. The plants are very attractive when blanched, so as to show a white or golden-yellow center surrounded with green. This is accomplished by gathering the outer leaves closely together and tying loosely with soft twine or a wisp of straw for a week or ten days in advance of the time you wish to use them.



GREEN CURLED ENDIVE.

Green Curled is the hardiest variety and has deep green leaves, finely cut or fringed. **Giant Fringed**, or "Oyster," is similar in appearance, but grows to a larger size, with longer leaves. **White Curled** is similar to the Green Curled, but the leaves are naturally of a light golden tint and they do not have to be tied up to blanch them for table use.

BROAD-LEAVED BATAVIAN ENDIVE

Is known as **Escarolle** in the South. It has broad thick leaves with rounded ends, much larger in size and not deeply fringed like the preceding sorts. This is used in the natural state as an appetizing and most wholesome salad, and is also used for a boiling-green to be cooked like spinach.

One ounce will sow about four hundred feet of row.



LARGE PURPLE OR NEW ORLEANS MARKET EGG PLANT.

This is the kind mainly grown here, is large, oval in shape and of a dark purple color and very productive. Southern grown seed of this, as a good many tropical or sub-tropical vegetables, is preferable to Northern seed, as it will germinate more readily, and the plant will last longer during the hot season. It is the best variety for shipping, superior to the Northern raised kinds. It carries better. The cut is made from three specimens, and represents the true form.

COLLARDS.

These slightly resemble cabbages in growth and appearance, and are largely planted in the South for use as boiling-greens during the winter months and also to furnish green forage for poultry and stock in the winter. The young plants can be started in a seed-bed, and when large enough transplanted to regular rows like cabbage. It forms a mass of leaves on a tall stem, and in the South continues in

growth all winter. As the leaves are pulled off, the stem increases in height, bearing new leaves. Two to four ounces should produce sufficient plants for one acre.

RYE (Southern Grown.)

It stools heavily, can be grazed several times and then allowed to go to seed. Cut and feed green, has made as much as 10 tons of green food per acre in five months. Rye grown in Tennessee, Virginia, and the North and West is cheaper, but it is spring sown and often runs along the ground. It is slow growing and is not so good here. It is an entirely different type to our Southern Rye.

Rye is extremely hardy, and will grow on the poorest kind of land. It makes the finest kind of winter and spring pasturage, and if sown early can be grazed until late fall. If cut when in bloom, or before fully headed out, it makes a fair quality of hay, and when used for grain, the straw is excellent for bedding purposes.

It is not truly a soil-improving crop, but makes a great deal of humus, and when turned under on the land, will greatly help impoverished lands. It is sown from the middle of August until November, and then again in the early spring. The main planting time is in the fall, however, as it more valuable when sown early.

It is a very hardy plant, withstanding all kinds of very cold weather without serious injury. The ground should be well prepared before you sow; plant early, thus giving the young plants plenty of time to get a good stand. Sowed both broadcast and in drills. The seed should be covered no more than two inches.

For hogs, sow from September 10th to November 1st, together with crimson clover. Graze from December 1st to April 15th. Rye can be planted for late fall and winter grazing at the last laying by of cotton.



FALL BEARING STRAWBERRIES.

You can have strawberries just as early in the fall as in the spring by planting the Iowa, Americus and Superb, known as the fall-bearing varieties. These varieties will produce heavy crops in the fall of as fine berries as any spring ripening strawberries. Truly a luxury for home and profitable for market. 

SWEET PEAS.

Culture: Sweet Pea delights in a soil inclined to be clayey, and, as the little beauty is a gross feeder, a good supply of well-rotted manure should be mixed with the ground. Fall is the best season to prepare the soil. A good many failures are caused by manuring in the spring, for the reason that all pea vines like a moist ground, and the heat originated by the manure combined with the heat from the sun is too much for the young vines, which turn yellow and die. The best season to sow the seed is as soon in the spring as the ground can be worked. Late sowing produces rank growth, but few flowers. Dig a trench a foot deep by 16 or 18 inches wide and mix in it 6 inches of top soil with old manure. In this plant your seed in two rows, dropping one every inch or two; then cover with two inches of soil, gradually filling the trench as they grow. One side has to be a little lower to allow the surplus water to drain off. The flowers must be picked every day if

you want them to bloom through the summer. Bone dust and nitrate of soda will hasten the time of flowering.

FENNEL FLORENCE OR NAPLES.

(Fennoul de Florence, Finocchio di Napoli.)

To grow vegetable plants of any kind, put **Kaint** on the ground about 6 weeks before the seed is planted, at the rate of 600 to 800 pounds per acre. The above preparation is to avoid cut and ground worms.

RATES FOR SEEDS BY PARCEL POST.

Your postmaster will tell you the parcel post zone in which your postoffice is located, measuring from New Orleans.

All Seeds and Plants shipped by mail takes parcel post rates. Packages up to eight ounces in weight are carried at the rate of one cent for every two ounces, regardless of distance. Packages over eight ounces are charged by the pound. The rate per pound varies according to the distance, which is measured by the Government Zone System, each zone covering a certain number of miles from point of shipment. Distances and rates are shown in the table below. Packages carried by the Parcel Post are handled like any other mail matter. They are delivered to your box by your rural mail carrier if you live on a rural route, or delivered to your door if you live in a city where there is carrier service, or delivered to your local postoffice if you live where there is no carrier service.

In most instances, Parcel Post Shipments are more desirable even if the cost is slightly higher than express shipments, because the package is usually delivered to your box, whereas it is sometimes necessary to drive several miles to the town to get an express package.

No Plants or Live Stock sent C. O. D. by Express.

When ordering write your name plainly, give correct F. O. address if by mail, if by express give your express office or nearest express, to avoid any delay; also if by rail or boat give station or landing, and if possible the name of railroad or name of boat. Where no instructions are given as to how shipment should be made, we will use our own discretion, but we urge all customers to state plainly whether they want goods mailed, expressed, or shipped by boat or by rail.

All C. O. D. orders must be accompanied by at least half the amount.
