## Order Early

We make it a rule to fill orders in rotation as received. Those who order early will be sure of getting the best stock.

## Packing.

We pack all trees in the most careful manner free of charge, either in bales or boxes according to the size of the order and distance to be shipped.

## Shipping Instructions.

Please state distinctly how you wish us to ship, by freight or express and by which route. Otherwise we will use our own discretion in forwarding.

## Substitution.

In case we cannot fill the order to the letter, state whether substitution will be allowed, and to what extent. Where no instructions in this respect accompany the order we shall feel at liberty to substitute other varieties as nearly similar as possible. To those who are planting a home orchard and are not acquainted with the different varieties, we would suggest that they leave the selection to us, as we would send only such varieties as are acknowledged to give general satisfaction.

## Terms.

Our terms are invariably cash or sufficient guarantee that the money will be forwarded on receipt of the goods.

## Prices.

Articles mentioned in the following list will be furnished at prices named as follows: Less than five of a variety at single rates; five and under thirty at the ten rate; thirty and under 300 at the 100 rate; 300 or over at the 1000 rate.

## Estimates.

We will cheerfully furnish estimates on all lists submitted.

## Certificate of Inspection.

All the requirements of the Horticultural Commissioners of the county have been complied with and certificates will be furnished with every shipment.

## Guarantee of Genuineness.

RULE, SQUARE METHOD. Multiply the distance in feet between the rows by the distance the plants are apart in the rows, and the product will be the number of square feet for each plant or hill; which, divided into the number of feet in an acre ( 43,560 ), will give the number of plants to the acre.

RULE, EQUILATERAL TRIANGLE METHOD. Divide the number required to the acre "square method" by the decimal .866 . The result will be the number of plants required to the acre by this method.
