Best Time to Order. As promptly after receiving the price-list as possible.

When We Ship. Fall bulbs are ready for shipment September 1 to 15. Trees, shrubs, etc., October 1. Peonies and Iris, September 1 to 15.

H. & O. Prices. Our prices are based on "H. & O. Quality," the best money can buy or produce, hence do not be deceived through cheap seed catalogs offering quantity rather than quality.

Cash with Order. Orders should be accompanied by cash. It requires time and expense at a busy season to look up credits.

How to Ship. Bulbs can go by express or parcel post. If by parcel post, postage should always be added to order. Trees and shrubs should be sent by express and freight.

Bulb Orders. Orders for bulbs accompanied by cash amounting to \$5, or over, will be delivered free

You Should be Careful. No matter how often you write us, always sign your name in full; give post office and state; write your order carefully and plainly, and do not mix with your letter.



Collections for Tulip-Beds

The arrangement of the following beds will give very striking results. The beds are 6 feet in diameter and require 156 bulbs, planted 5 inches apart each way. These combinations can be changed, if desired.

Quality Hyacinths

Culture Outdoors. Plant the bulbs 6 inches deep, very uniformly, that they may come into bloom at the same time. A good method is to remove about 4 inches of the soil, level the bed carefully and plant the bulbs 6 inches apart each way, pressing the earth firmly and evenly over the bulbs.

Culture in Glasses. Special glasses are manufactured for the culture of Hyacinths, the bulb fitting in the top. These glasses should be filled with fresh water, also some gravel, and if at hand, some charcoal.

Culture in Pots. Hyacinths are grown successfully by planting in pots. Use good, rich soil, with plenty of manure. Place some pieces of broken pots in the bottom for drainage, and use 4- or 5-inch pots. Firm the bulb well in the soil, allowing the top of it to stand just a little above the soil. If flowers are wanted for Christmas, the bulbs should be planted in September.



The length of the flower-stem is indicated by figures; the time of blooming by letters (E, early; L, late), so that you can select varieties of the same height and time of blooming.

Culture Outdoors. Any good garden soil, prepared by spading to a depth of 12 inches, is suitable. Plant the bulbs 5 inches apart and about 4 inches deep. The soil must be equally placed over the bulbs, so they will come up at the same time. Firm the earth well about the bulbs and mulch the beds during the winter.

Culture in Pots. Place six to eight bulbs in a 6-inch pot; set in the dark for a time. If you have a number of pots, take them from the dark room at intervals, so they bloom at different times.



Ornamental Trees

For Fall Planting. We do not advise the planting of all varieties of trees in fall, but those that can be planted will make and give you a better and larger tree the coming year.

The season for shipping begins October 1, and usually ends November 15. Our trees are dug fresh

from the nursery row, and shipped without being stored.

Transplanted Trees. The question is often asked, "What do you mean by transplanted trees." Just this: We are not what is termed a "commercial nursery;" we grow nursery stock from a landscape standpoint, making a specialty of ornamental stock for beautifying city and country homes. The trees and shrubs you have been in the habit of buying we transplant into nursery rows, setting them twice and three times the usual distance apart, cutting them back to make them put on a bushy head and heavier stem, and, most important, a better root-system. Such nursery stock, when planted in your ground, withstands the shock of transplanting much better than the ordinary, and responds much more quickly, giving you results that are more satisfactory.

What are Specimen Trees? This question is often asked. Specimen trees are selected specimens that have been transplanted from time to time, and have grown into a large size, and can be moved safely, giving quick results. Ordinarily, the large trees in a nursery are "culls" left over, or unsold, but the fact that they have never been transplanted makes them of little or no value.

Deciduous Shrubs

Nursery-Row Shrubs. We are asked how they differ from other shrubs. Nursery-row shrubs are those that are planted 6 to 8 inches apart in the row when they come from the seedling or cutting bed.


