## EXTRA SELECTED STOCK—Strong and Well Rooted. Will Yield a Full Crop of Berries Next Season. Ready About August 15th.

The time of shipment is from about August 15th to October Ist. The advantages in planting pot-grown strawberry plants are realized by a full crop of berries the following year. Our plants are carefully grown in clay pots and, prior to shipment, are transferred with the original ball of earth at their roots to substantial paper pots in which they are forwarded, thus insuring the buyer getting them in first-class order and reducing the transportation charges about 25 per cent.

> It is Adrisable to Send Strawberry Plants by Express Only, as They Cannot be Successfully Shipped by Mail, and by Freight the Risk of Delay is too Great. Plants Take a Special Low Express Rate.

Layer Plants of Strawberries may be obtained about October ist. Layer plants will yield a moderate crop of berries the season following, and are recommended (because of their low cost) where one has a very large number to plant.

Note-Some varieties which are marked P. are pistillate (or imperfect flowering), and while they embrace often the best kinds, it will be necessary in order to get fruit to plant bisexual (or perfect) flowering sorts near them. About five imperfect to one perfect flowering is the general rule.

## CULTURAL NOTE ON STRAWBERRIES

Strawberries delight in good rich soil, that has had plenty of manure added to it. The plants should be set 12 to 15 inches apart, in rows 2 feet apart. A row 100 feet long requires approximately 75 to 100 plants or about 14,500 per acre. If the weather is dry, when planting, water well at the time and for a few days thereafter, if it is possible. Press the soil well around the ball, when planting, and keep the soil well cultivated, cutting off all runners that may form. At the approach of permanent winter it pays to cover the entire bed to a depth of 2 inches with clean straw or salt hay. This protects the plants during severe weather. Do not use leaves, as they hold the moisture and cause damage to the plants in winter. At the approach of spring, rake the covering from the plants proper and leave it between the rows; this will serve as a mulch during the summer, protect against drought, and also keeps the fruit more free from sand, at the same time to a large measure controls the growth of weeds. In planting Strawberries, keep in mind that there are perfect and imperfect or pistillate flowering kinds. The first type of blossom is shown by cut No. I below; the pistillate type by cut No. 2. The perfect flowering produce freely alone, while the pistillate sorts require hybridiz-


No. 1 ing with the pollen, which is generally accomplished by bees. Pistillate sorts embrace some of the finest varieties, but in planting them, every' fourth or fifth plant should be of a perfect flowering type to insure an abundance of fruit.

This type, while producing its main crop of berries with the general sorts, continues uninterruptedly to mature its fruit, until checked by hard frosts; it has actually been known to bear strawberries until Christmas, when the weather is open and mild. In order to get the greatest crop of berries late, the blossoms should be kept cut off until August ist, so as to conserve the energies of the plants for the fall crop. Treated in that way, ripe fruit will be borne in about four weeks after that date and continuously until frost. The plants must not be allowed to suffer for water in the fruiting season and the ground should be well enriched. A mulch of well rotted cow manure will be found of great advantage. High cultivation is essential for best results and any special attention that is given this type will be well rewarded with a good crop in September and October.

The two varieties listed below, are best adapted for the American climate and soil conditions.

Progressive. A recent introduction; considered the largest in size and of extreme producing qualities. The plant is of medium size and very resistant to heat. A WORD ON CELERY CULTURE.-Celery delights in a good, rich, moist soil. Locations where the soil may become dry should be avoided. Nothing is more beneAcial or so little work as the watering of celery during periods of drought. After it has been transplanted and made some growth, the plants should be set in permanent rows 6 to 8 inches apart in the row. Many private gardeners prefer to use the two-row system of trenches; it will be found very advantageous to work. If the idea of the market gardener is carried out, the celery is planted in single rows about 2 feet apart, 6 or 8 inches apart in the row. By the former method the celery is usually banked up to blanch until almost entirely covered with soil; the top is then covered with leaves or other litter' as winter approaches. In the single-row system the celery is banked up gradually to blanch, and after this process is over, at the approach of winter it is dug up and laid in shallow zrenches after being cleaned. Storing for winter is done by covering it with waterproof celery paper and topping off with soil or leaves. The celery may thus be gotten out for market during the severest weather. Good cultivation is highly necessary during the growing period.

Cultural Note-In order to obtain best results, attention to the following brief directions will assist materially: Upon receiving the bulbs, pot them immediately. Place a handful of well-rotted cow manure in the bottom of the pot and place the bulb directly on top, covering it with soil. After watering, place in an outside pit and protect from the ciirect rays of the sun; cover well with soil, ashes or any other suitable litter. When the bulbs have become thoroughly rooted, bring inside, in a temperature of about $60^{\circ}$; let the plants grow slowly urder a bench or some other suitable place until atout 6 inches high; then place on top of the bench. About two months lefore Easter they can be brought into a warmer temperature and gradually forced into flower and height at one time. An occasional application of liquid cow manure, starting about six weeks before flowering time, will stimulate the plant wonderfully. Thorough rooting is the most essential point.

## JAPANESE EASTER LILIES

Upon arrival of bulbs plant at once in suitable size pots, using coarse soft-coal ashes for drainage in the bottom, giving them a soil composed of sandy loam and well enriched with about $1 / 3$ well rotted horse or cow manure.
Put them in a protected place, soak down with water very heavy, and after two or three days cover the pots with 2 or 3 inches of ashes.
Place lilies where they are to bloom after January ist, giving them a temperature, as near as possible, of $60^{\circ}$ night and $70^{\circ}$ day for about io days, then $70^{\circ}$ night and $80^{\circ}$ day until buds can all be counted.

During this period manure-water them regularly once a week with the following liquid: I bushel cow manure (fresh), and one 4 -in. pot full of nitrate of soda to each 50 gallons of water.
Spray the foliage once a day (twice a day when clear weather). It is also very important to never allow the soil to get very dry, and never feed unless the soil is moist.
When the buds can be counted easily, move plants where you can get the temperature down gradually, and finally mulch them with either a little sheep manure or bone-flour.

## BRIEF CULTURAL DIRECTIONS FOR GROWING MUSHROOMS

THIS delicacy is within the reach of any one who has a greenhouse or a cellar. A crop is produced with good spawn, a little care and patience in about 4 to 6 weeks, and continues in bearing about two months. New beds can be started at intervals which will give a supply the entire season. The first planting can be made in July, the last in March Summer spawned beds do not bear well.

Get a quantity of absolutely fresh horse manure and remove the excessive heat by turning it once a day, for 3 days, or until the temperature has fallen to about $100^{\circ}$. Then form a bed 8 to io inches deep and allow it to remain undisturbed until the temperature has fallen to $80^{\circ}$. Now is the time to plant the spawn. Break the bricks in pieces the size of a walnut, and place at regular intervals of in to 2 inches below the surface of the bed in distance to plant 8 square feet with one brick, compress the manure after spawning to make the bed solid. Nothing now must be done until the bed has a whitish appearance which shows that the spawn is running, nor must it be watered previously. Now place a layer of fine sifted soil, (which should be procured in advance) to the depth of 1 to 2 inches on the bed. With an occasional sprinkling when dry, the bed should begin to produce in from 4 to 6 weeks from spawning time, conditions being favorable: New beds must be made at each planting.
