## OPHELIA

This beautiful new variety is one of the very best for cut flowers. It is a strong grower and a free bloomer, with fine large dark green foliage and excellent habit. The flowers are well formed; salmon-pink, shading to pink, base of petals light yellow, borne on long stiff stems.

## FRANCIS SCOTT KEY

This new variety is entirely different and distinct from other indoor roses grown to-day.
