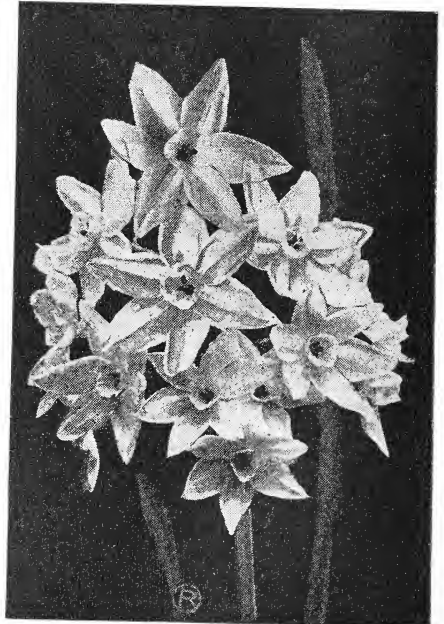

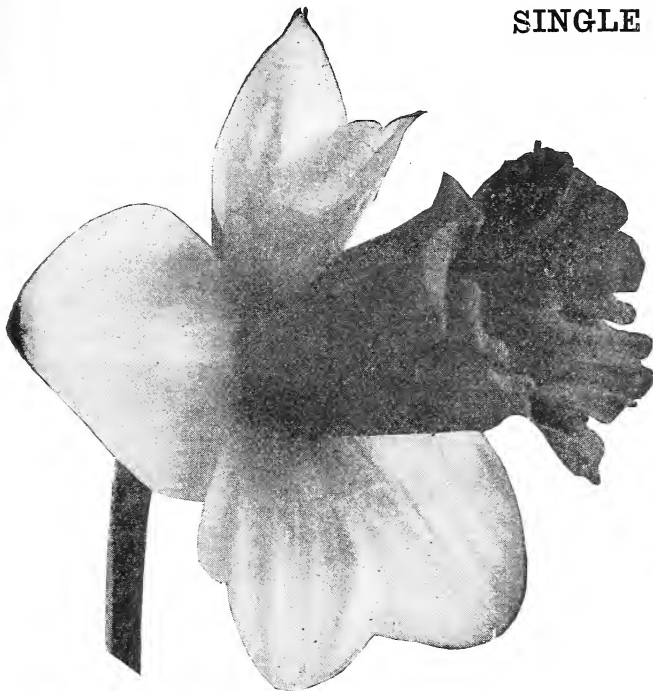


Narcissus (Paper White Grandiflora).

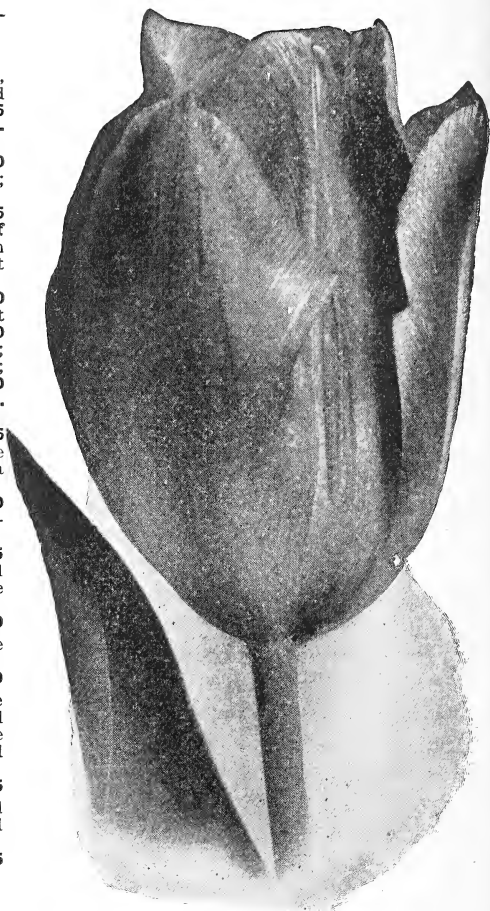

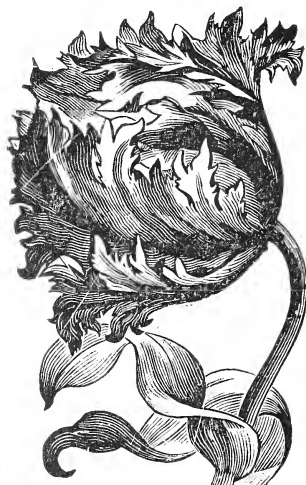

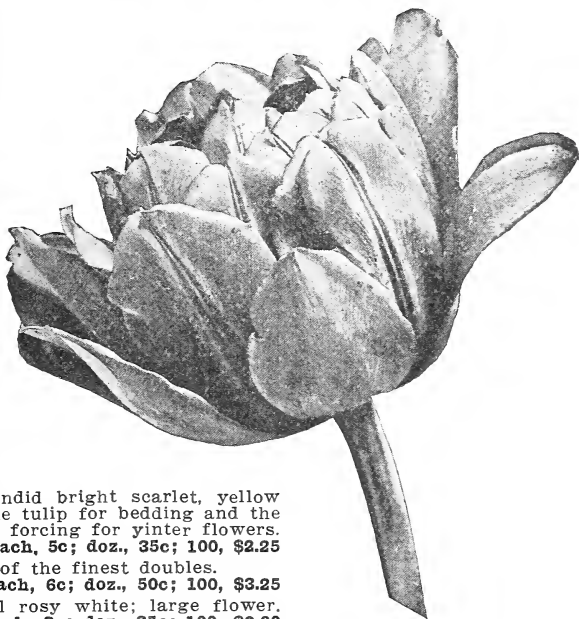

The Calla is one of the best winter flowering plants for room culture, needing little care beyond abundant water and an occasional washing of the leaves to keep them free from dust. Take a 4 or 5-inch pot, fill it with good, rich loam ($\frac{1}{4}$ leaf mould and $\frac{3}{4}$ good garden soil), then put in bulb, cover it one inch, water well and set away in a dark place for three or four weeks. As soon as it starts growing bring to the light, give abundance of water, light and heat and the result will be most satisfactory. A dozen bulbs started in this way at intervals will give a succession of bloom throughout the winter.

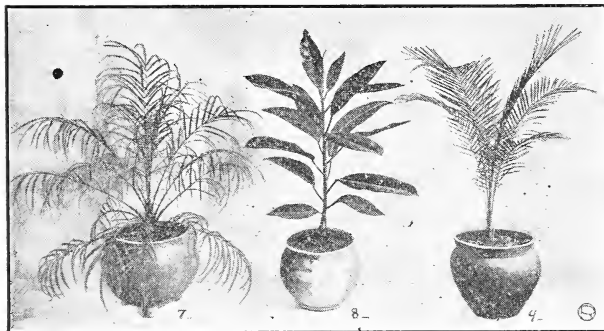

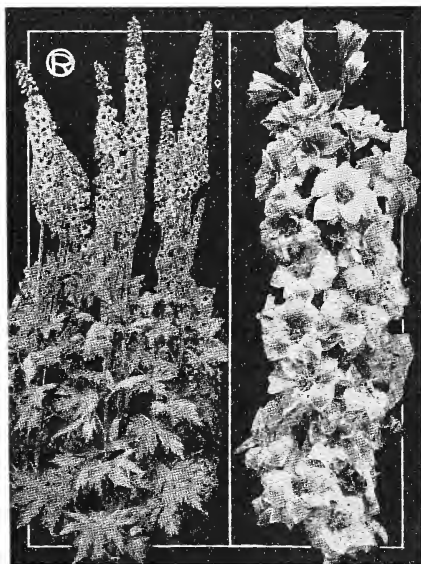

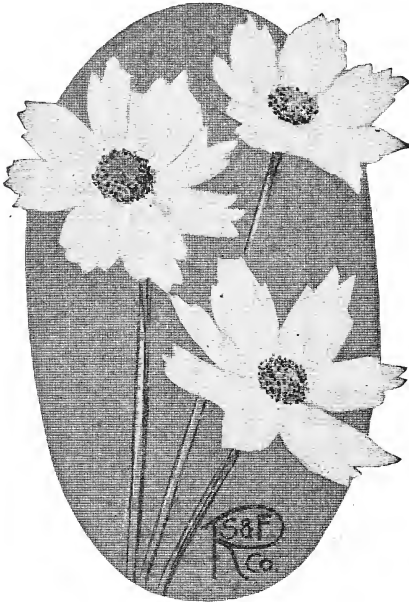

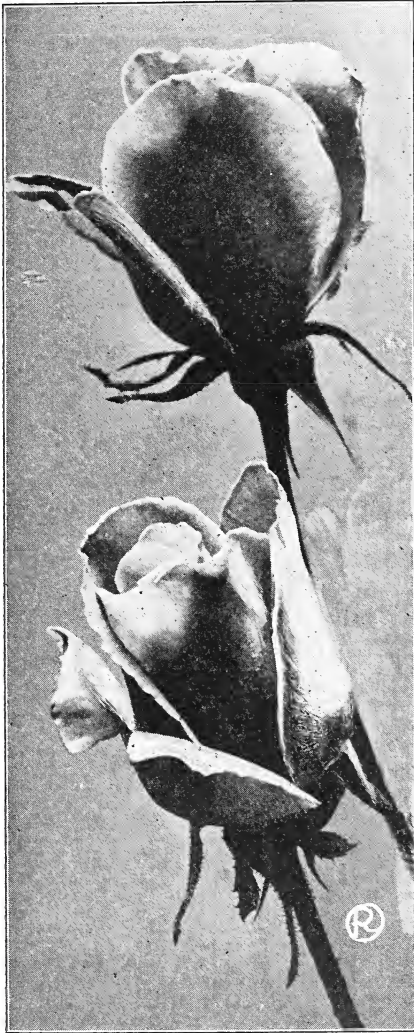

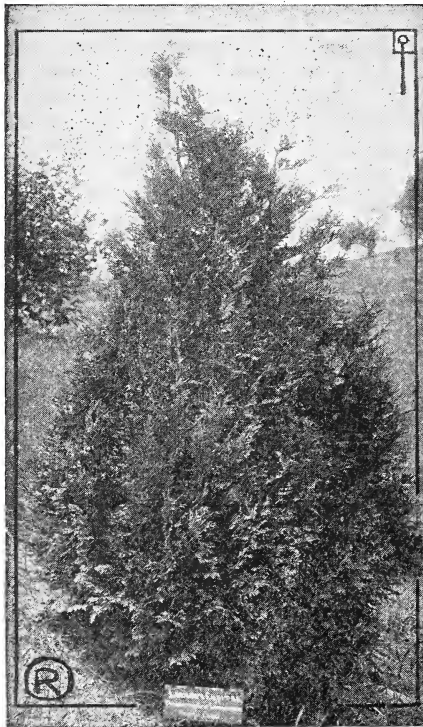

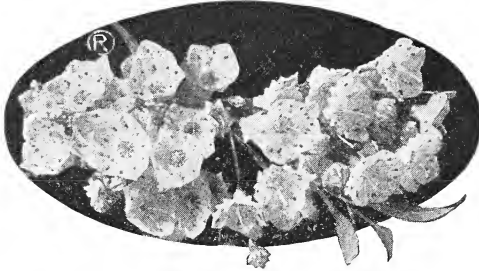

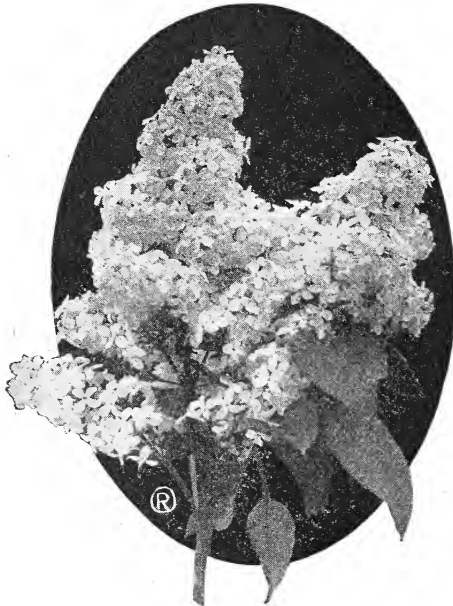

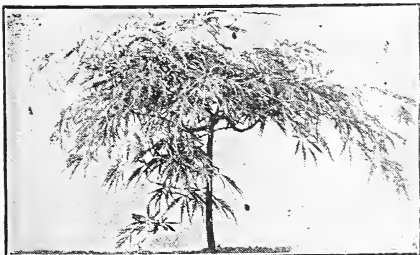

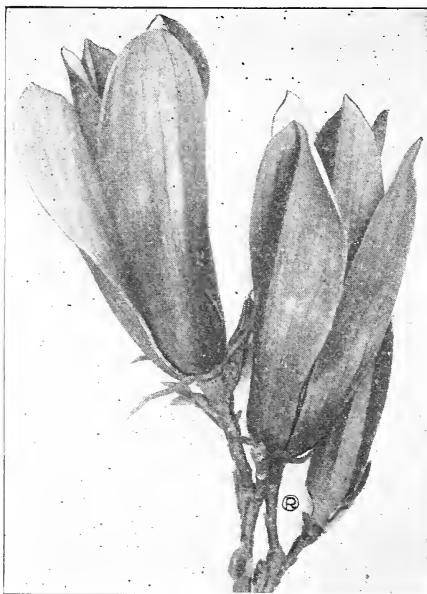

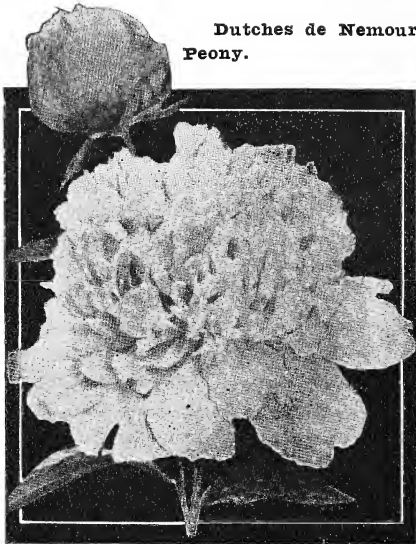

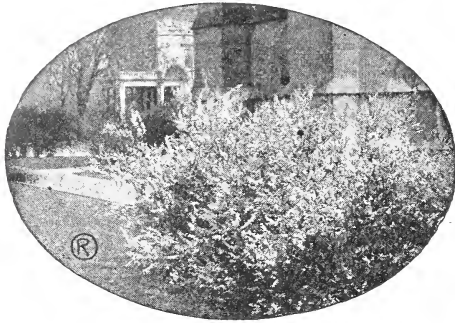

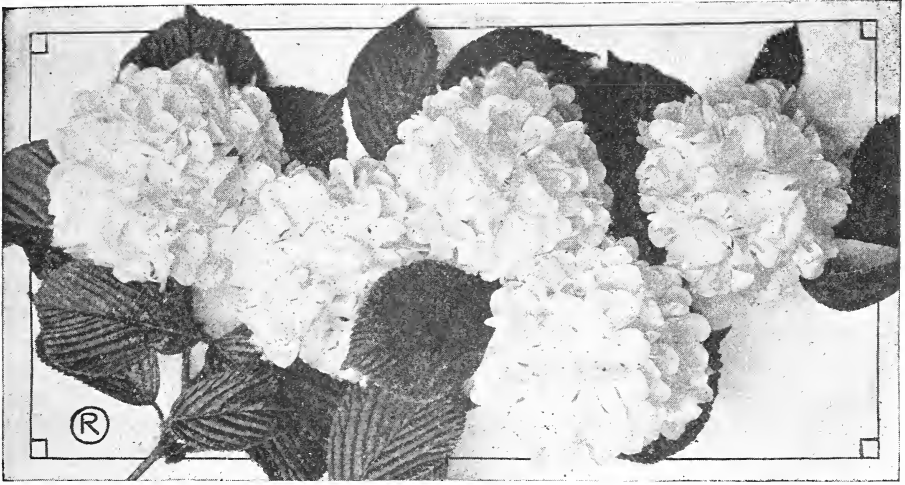
