It was one of the most comprehensive collections of vegetables ever staged at Horticultural Hall and credit is due the T. J. Grey Co. for the artistic and educational way they were displayed." ## ARTICHOKE (2rtififdofe)

## One ounce will produce about 500 plants.

Sow seeds in April in good, rich soil, in drills 10 to 12 inches apart and about 1 inch deep. Plants should be protected from freezing during Winter, and the following Spring they should be transplanted, setting them 3 feet apart in moist, rich soil. Upon the approach of Winter the stems and leaves should be cut away and the bed covered so as to prevent freezing. Artichokes can also be cultivated as annuals by sowing seeds in hot bed in January and producing strong, vigorous plants, which should be transplanted into moist, rich soil in May.
Large Green Globe. The best variety; heads large and scales tender and excellent. Pkt. 25c., oz. 75 c .
Jerusalem Artichoke (Helianthus tuberosus). Cultivated for its tubers. Qt. $35 \mathrm{c} ., \mathrm{pk} . \$ 2.00$.

## ASPARAGUS

(ভpargel)
One ounce will produce 200 plants.
A deep, rich, mellow soil is best adapted to the growth of Asparagus. It may be grown from seed or propagated by roots. Sow as early in the Spring as the ground will admit, in drills from 12 to 14 inches apart, and cover 1 inch deep; when the plants are well up, thin to 3 inches apart in the drills. Keep the plants free from weeds during Summer, and protect slightly during Winter.

The following Spring the roots will be ready to transplant into permanent beds; the roots should be set in rows 3 to 4 feet apart, and 1 foot apart in the rows; the crown of the root should be 4 to 6 inches below the surface of the ground. A fair crop may be expected the third year from the seed, or in one to two years when roots are used, according to the age of the roots planted. By planting two-year-old roots a fair crop may be obtained in one year, and after that a full crop every year.

## BEANS, Dwarf or Bush mankstum

One guart will plant 100 feet of drill. One and one-half bushels will plant one acre.
A warm, light soil is best adapted to the growth of Bush Beans, but they will do well in almost any situation, unless it be very wet. Plant in rows 2 or 3 feet apart, dropping the beans 3 inches apart and covering 2 inches. Keep the ground free from weeds and cultivate often. Never disturb the vines when wet, as the pods will become rusty. All the varieties are tender, and must not be planted until the soil is dry and warm.

## MUSHROOM

## (Champignon)

## One pound of spawn is sufficient for nine square feet of bed.

Mushrooms are more easily cultivated than many people imagine, and may be grown in any dark room or cellar where the temperature can be maintained at from fifty to sixty-five degrees. For the bed, use a mixture of horse manure and good fresh loam in equal proportions. Before being placed in the bed let this material be thoroughly mixed, and well turned three or four times to sweeten in some dry place. Upon a dry, firm bottom, proceed to make the bed, by spreading a thin layer of the prepared mixture and pound it firm till the bed is eight inches thick. Leave it thus for about a week, or till the temperature of the bed has subsided to ninety or ninety-five degrees. Then make holes about 10 inches apart, and put in each a piece of spawn about the size of an egg. Cover the holes and press the soil solid and smooth. Let the bed remain in this condition ten days. Then cover with 2 inches of fresh loam. Over this place a few inches of straw. If the temperature is right, Mushrooms will appear in six to eight weeks from time of spawning. The bed will continue bearing about a month. After the first crop is gathered, spread over the bed an inch of fresh loam, and moisten with warm water. In the event of the surface of the bed getting very dry at any time, it should be moistened freely with water at a temperature of eighty to eighty-five degrees.

Make the drills deep enough to allow room for the manure, which should be scattered along the bottom of the drill and then covered thinly with soil before sowing the Peas, so that they will not come in contact with it. Successive plantings can be made every ten days up to the middle of July. For the later plantings the early varieties are preferred.

## TOMATO (Eitefeapfic)

One ounce will produce 1500 plants.
Seed should be sown in a hotbed about the first week in March, in drills 5 inches apart. When the plants are about 2 inches high they should be set out 4 or 5 inches apart in another hotbed, or removed into small pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. About the middle of May the plants may be set out in the open ground; they are planted for early crops on light, sandy soil, at a distance of 3 feet apart, in hills in which a good shovelful of rotted manure should be mixed. On heavy soil, which is not suited for an early crop, they should be planted 4 feet apart. Water freely at the time of transplanting, and shelter from the sun for a few days until the plants are established.

## LAWNS

The following simple directions may be found useful to those who are not familiar with lawn making.
The soil should be of good depth, moderately rich and in many the land should be carefully drained. Grading should be done and the soil thoroughly pulverized by careful harrowing and raking. Some good fertilizer-pure ground bone, wood ashes or a specially prepared lawn fertilizer-should be used. After spreading the fertilizer the surface should be carefully raked and rolled. The rolling often develops uneven spots which should be leveled before the seed is sown. After sowing, the ground should again be lightly raked and rolled.

The selection of seed is important. Use only such mixtures as are free from weed seeds, and such as will produce a firm, strong turf and a fine growth. A liberal quantity is necessary to secure good results (not less than 60 lbs. per acre). The best time to make a lawn is from the middle of August through September. If seed is sown at this season the grass will become strong enough to withstand the Winter, and a good lawn is assured the following season. If seed cannot be sown at this time it should be sown as early as possible in the Spring.

## AQUATICS

The cultivation of aquatics is of the simplest; their requirements are sunshine, water and plenty of rich soil. They are divided into two classes, hardy and tender; the former may be planted in ponds, lakes or sluggish streams, early in the Spring, and, under the same conditions as our native Water Lily, they will grow luxuriantly and flower profusely the entire season; provide the same conditions in artificial ponds or tanks, and the results will be equally satisfactory. Plant the tender varieties at the approach of warm weather and when the watcr is warm. The plants can be grown in pots where protection can be afforded them until safe to transfer to Summer quarters. The after-treatment is the same as for the hardy varieties. When grown in tubs, only the moderate growers should be selected. In storing in tubs through the Winter, they should be kept where it is not warm enough to excite growth or so cold as to freeze.

Dormant tubers of Nelumbiums can be supplied only from May 1 to June 15, after which date only such varieties as we can furnish in pots should be planted.
