## FLOWER SEEDS

## Directions for Sowing, Etc.

To insure success, the conditions and requirements of the several species as to soil moisture, heat, ligbt, etc., should be studied and then observed in culture. Below we give a few general directions cor their culture.

The soil best adapted to most flowers is light, ricb loam, containing enough sand to make it porous. If there is some clay with it, the color will be hrighter. Make the surface as smooth and flne as possible, sow seed in rows, covering each sort of sced in proportion to its size (a good general rule being to cover twice the diameter of the secd) and press the soil down firmly over it. Do not plant seed when the ground is wet.
