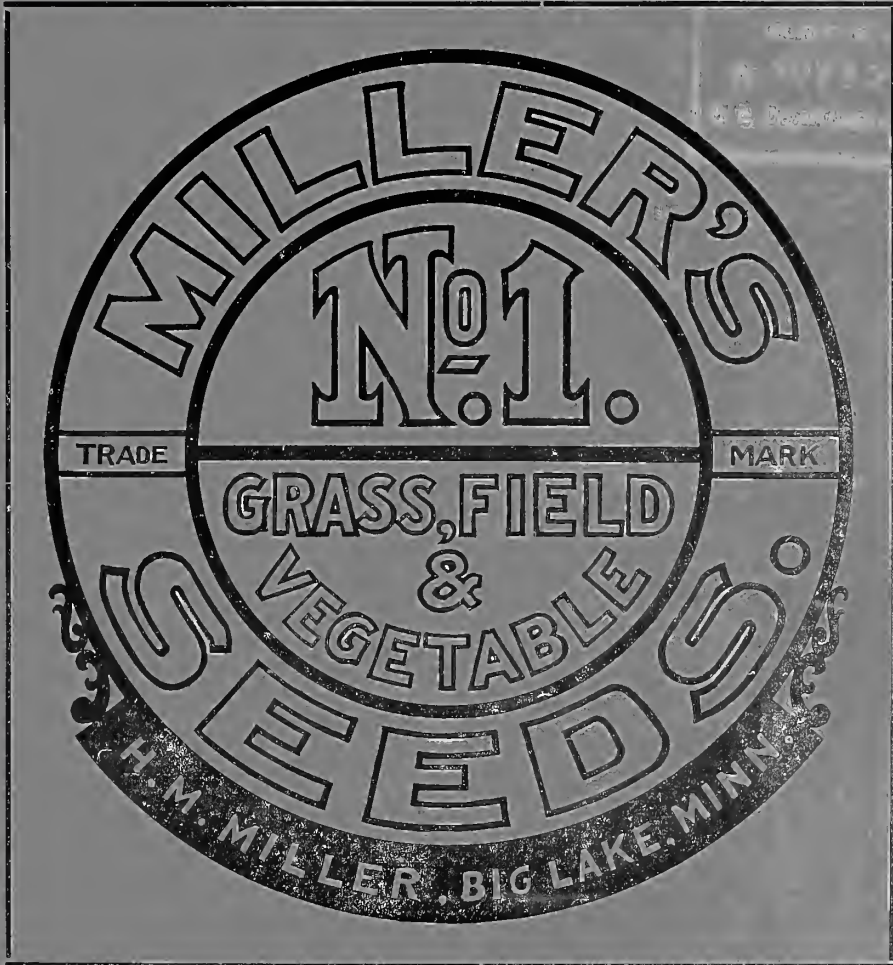

∴ SEEDS THAT GROW ∴

We frequently receive letters containing money and orders which we can not fill because the sender has failed to sign his name or the postoffice address is omitted and the post-mark blurred. Use our order blank and envelope, filling out the blank and signing your name and address, and you will have no reason to censure us.

Terms.—With every order you send us, please inclose a remittance for the full amount as we sell seeds for cash only.

How to Send Money.—Money can be safely sent either by postoffice money order, bank draft, express money order or in a registered letter. Do not send money loose in a letter without registering it, as it is not safe, and if lost we can not be responsible for it. Silver coin should be sewed in cloth to prevent wearing through the letter. Postage stamps may be sent. If you live away from a convenient bank or postoffice and have money deposited in some bank, send your personal check.

Service.—We endeavor to fill all orders same day received, if possible, everything is handled rapidly and carefully. Customers are promptly notified when goods are shipped and how forwarded. As bulbs, onion sets and other perishable goods can not be shipped during freezing weather; orders for them are acknowledged and the goods sent forward as soon as the weather moderates, and the purchaser is notified of their shipment.

Forwarding.—We deliver prepaid to any postoffice in the United States any garden or vegetable seeds in pkt., oz., $\frac{1}{4}$ -lb., $\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. or lb. packages at prices quoted in catalogue. All larger sized packages, and field seeds, and garden tools are shipped by express or freight at purchasers' expense. If seeds which are quoted without postage are ordered to be sent by mail add 8c a lb. or 15c a qt. If seeds which are quoted prepaid are ordered to be sent by express or freight with other goods deduct 8c a lb.



The above is the picture of the interior of the Sherburne County State Bank, Big Lake, Minn., to which we refer you for reference as to our responsibility. This catalogue necessarily must go to many who have never dealt with us, and to such we would say, that you are perfectly safe in sending us your money. We send out nothing but the best of seeds and when they arrive, if you are not perfectly satisfied with them, you may send them back at our expense. You are the sole judge. But they must be sent back within fifteen days after they arrive at your station. That will give you ample time to satisfy yourself that they are as represented and of good germination and purity.

Packing.—No charge is made for boxes or packing or delivery to freight depot or express office.

Prepaid Railroad Stations.—Many of our farmer customers live at a prepaid railroad station where there is no agent. In such cases we must request them to send sufficient money to prepay freight charges. If this is not done we will ship to nearest pay station.

Railroad Connections.—We are located on the main line of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific. We have quick connections and transfer with all roads running into the Twin Cities. Our railroad connections are the very best.

Safe Arrival of Packages.—We endeavor to secure the safe arrival of packages of seeds and supplies in every case. When customers fail to receive their packages in reasonable time they should inform us, sending a copy of the order and any other information necessary to trace the goods.

Errors.—We exercise the utmost care in filling orders, still sometimes errors will creep in. In case there is a mistake made in a shipment, notify us promptly and we will make all corrections necessary for satisfaction.

Disclaimer.—As seeds are subject to conditions over which we have no control, we do not give any warranty, either expressed or implied as to description, purity, productiveness or any other matter concerning the seeds, bulbs or plants sold by us and we will not be in any way responsible for the crop. No employe of ours is authorized to give any warranty whatever. While we exercise great care to have all seeds pure and reliable, you can readily see that it would be impossible to warrant any seeds as they are subject to conditions over which we have no control, such as sowing too deep or too shallow, unfavorable weather, insects, etc. We take great care to ascertain the germination and purity of all seeds, and will be glad to give a prospective purchaser a sample of any seed he may want to buy so he may have an opportunity to determine for himself the germination and purity. If the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these conditions, they must be returned within fifteen days.

Parcels Post.—We can deliver to your door packages weighing up to and including fifty pounds in the first two zones and twenty pounds in the rest. We can deliver to you at 8 cents a lb. If there is an surplus over money sent for parcels post we will refund with return invoice.

Purity and Germination Tests.—All of our seeds are carefully tested for purity and germination and comply with the seed laws of the state. We do not buy anything but the best of seed and have it tested by the State Department. We will gladly send a prospective purchaser a sample of seed or he can send a sample of any bought, to the nearest experimental station and determine for himself that the seeds are labeled correctly. All our seeds are marked with the germination and purity test and date of examination.

The attention of our customers is respectfully called to the following directions, which will, if followed, be an aid to the purchaser as well as ourselves.

Name and Address.—Please remember to write your name, postoffice, county and state, also number of postoffice box as distinctly as possible on every order sheet as well as on every letter sent us.



Our No. 1 brand of seeds are the best that can be obtained both for purity and germination. In order that we may protect our customers and ourselves we put out this brand in sealed bags only. With our No. 1 brand, sacks are furnished free. We will not guarantee the seed as genuine after the seal has been broken.

Our No. 2 or Fancy seed is free from foul, obnoxious weeds and of high vitality but not as good and perfect in every respect as our No. 1 brand.

Our No. 3 or Choice seed is a healthy, and fairly clean seed but not as plump and good color as our fancy grade.

All of our grades comply with the Minnesota Seed Law. You are perfectly safe and well protected in buying any of our three grades.

We have the latest equipment for cleaning seeds and do not buy any except seeds free from foul weeds and which in our judgment will clean up well and make good seed.

Where grade is not specified we will ship our No. 1 grade.

MAMMOTH RED CLOVER.

Mammoth Clover is a distinct strain from Medium, growing larger and coarser, and is about three weeks later. The seed crop is obtained from the first crop. It is a splendid clover for hog pastures and should be included in any permanent pasture mixture. Our strain of clover frequently grows five or six feet tall. For plowing under it is superior to medium red clover, providing more green fertilizer.
